For Use of UHF Land Mobile/Broadcast Auxiliary
Channels in Support of Vessel Tracking System
During America's Cup Sailboat Races July through September, 2013
Animation Research, Ltd., Applicant.

NARRATIVE IN SUPPORT OF STA APPLICATION

The applicant for a grant of Special Temporary Authority, Animation Research, Ltd. is a New Zealand company. It has no FCC licenses permitting use of radio transmitters in the United States. Animation Research has a need for the use of three, 25-kHz bandwidth channels in the 450-470 MHz band for the period July 4, 2013 through September 23, 2013 in the area in San Francisco during sailboat regattas sponsored by the America's Cup Authority.

The use of these channels is for data transmissions from each of the boats competing in a televised sailboat regatta as part of a tracking system. The applicant provides 2D and 3D graphics in support of the race showing vessel locations. In order to run this tracking system the applicant requires a maximum of three channels, each 25 kHz bandwidth (or six channels of 12.5 kHz bandwidth), to be used for the purpose of tracking boats in this racing event. The tracking system uses TDMA transmitters, with up to 12 boats transmitting twice per second on each channel. The transmitters will send 2 Hz occupied bandwidth data from each boat to a receive point on shore. The radios to be used will be TAIT data radios which have power settings at either 5 watts or 10 watts TPO. In virtually all cases, the 5 watt setting will provide adequate tracking data but in some cases the higher watt settings may have to be used. The antennas will be omnidirectional vertical high-tec col6 with about 1 dB gain. There will be 0.5 dB loss in the transmission lines.

The applicant will find three unoccupied channels in the 450-470 MHz band for use offshore and will monitor the channels prior to use for several days to insure against interference. Where possible, channels in the 450-451 and 455-456 MHz Broadcast auxiliary band will be utilized, and will be coordinated in real time with the SBE frequency coordinator for Part 74 facilities in San Francisco. If necessary, the applicant will alternatively utilize itinerant channels in the 450-470 MHz band in order to avoid interference with Business, Industrial or Land Transportation licensees. No channels in the Public Safety Pool (section 90.20) will be utilized whatsoever.

Should any interference be reported during the event the applicant will immediately cease using the channel on which the interference is reported and will not resume operation on that channel absent a complete resolution of such reported interference to the satisfaction of the licensee involved.
