Arkenets apologizes for any confusion that it may have caused.

Arkenets fully understands that experimental licenses should not be used to deploy equipment for customers on a commercial basis. Arkenets is not using its experimental license for commercial purposes.

In its previous response, Arkenets stated that it has requested multiple sites because of ever-changing opportunities and/or requests from potential customers to test at certain specific locations. Arkenets is currently hand-cuffed by the requirement to obtain site-specific authorization, but without sufficient advance notice to timely obtain experimental authorization for each specific site.

Arkenets further clarifies that it is seeking authority to test, in the aggregate, across all of its two granted and one pending experimental authorizations, a maximum of 120 devices across the U.S., using up to 12 devices at maximum of 10 specific sites at any given time.

If OET does not have a ready means to specify an aggregate limit across the three experimental authorizations, Arkenets suggests that, for the pending application only, OET grant authority for a maximum of 36 devices, using up to 12 devices at a maximum of 3 sites at any given point in time.
