



Guidelines for Enrolling Participants in the Limited Market Trial

Purpose

ArrayComm, Inc. has filed for Experimental Authorization for the 2300-2305 MHz band in the San Diego area. Included in that application is a request, in accordance with Section 5.3(j) of the Commission's Rules, for a limited market trial of up to 3000 participants. ArrayComm will implement procedures for enrolling participants in the market trial in accordance with the guidelines provided herein. These guidelines are designed to ensure that participants are fully aware that the service is provided under an Experimental Authorization and is strictly temporary. Enrolled participants will have no expectation of continued service beyond the timeframe or the geographic scope of the limited market trial.

Guidelines

1. In accordance with Section 5.93 of the Commission's Rules, ArrayComm will own all transmitting and receiving equipment used in the experiment. ArrayComm will require a deposit from participants, which will be refunded upon return of the equipment. This will encourage participants to return the equipment at the conclusion of the experiment.
2. Participants in the market trial will sign a contract clearly stating the temporary nature of the experiment and the limited geographic scope of the experiment.
3. Advertising, or other means of obtaining participants, will clearly state the temporary nature of the experiment and the limited geographic scope of the experiment. ArrayComm will not make false or misleading statements to participants about the timeframe or scope of the experiment. ArrayComm will declare that the purpose of the experiment is to obtain information that could help ArrayComm bring this technology to the wider commercial marketplace, but that this is an experiment which is limited in its time and geographic scope.



4. ArrayComm will not make false or misleading statements to participants about the i-BURST technology. ArrayComm will provide background materials about the technology, and its potential uses, but will state that the Experimental Authorization does not represent an endorsement of the technology any kind by the FCC, nor does it ensure its availability in the commercial marketplace.
5. Equipment used by participants will not transmit in the absence of a base station signal. Should a participant keep the experimental equipment after the conclusion of the trial, or take it out of the market trial area, it will be incapable of transmitting.
6. In no event will ArrayComm exceed the market trial limitations established by the Commission.
