The exclusive government spectrum is below 400 MHz. There are shared bands from 400-512 MHz but they do not have the same restrictions. We are okay with it on the FCC side but I'll still have to send it back over to NTIA for 400-512 MHz so they can officially clear it and enter it into their system too. Your email is acceptable to make the amendments. Hopefully we can get this resolved now for you without any further complications.

We are waiting on the FAA to give us clearance for the 136 MHz frequencies for WA2XDO, 0155-EX-RR-2000. As soon as we have that we can grant the license.

Two things on the other application WB2XFP, 0324-EX-PL-1999. Harris is asking for 225-512 MHz and you provided me the Air Force contract number. I found out that Dept. of Defense wants operations in the 225-450 MHz to be handled through the contracting entity. Therefore, the FCC is not involved and authorization would be provided to Harris through the Air Force for operation on these frequencies. Second, does Harris need the remaining 450-512 MHz for something different or does it relate to the Air Force contract also? If needed, we could grant the license for the non-govt

bands.
