**Re: Special Temporary Authority Application
Northrop Grumman Systems Corporation
Application Number 0868-EX-ST-2013**

Dear Chief Knapp:

On September 20, 2013, Northrop Grumman Systems Corporation ("Northrop") filed the above-referenced application seeking special temporary authority (the "STA") to utilize 700 MHz spectrum that is licensed to the First Responder Network Authority ("FirstNet"). The FCC previously granted, and FirstNet previously provided its consent for, an STA to utilize the FirstNet spectrum under call sign WGNXHQ to build and operate a trial LTE network. The licensed STA expires on November 1st. Certain modifications to that STA authority are needed, in addition to time to operate and test the trial network. Accordingly, the above-referenced STA application requests an operation start date of November 2, 2013 and an operation end date of May 1, 2014.

The following sets forth general information regarding the proposed temporary operation (complete information is contained in the application):

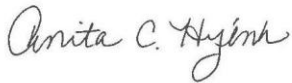
- 1) The STA will enable Northrop to construct and operate a trial 700 MHz LTE network in and between New York City and Northern Virginia. The objective is to use the 700 MHz LTE network with end-user devices and a backhaul system to test and develop enhanced first responder applications and solutions that will reside in the core network. The trial network will serve as an expository vehicle upon which advanced concepts of hypothetical first responder communications will be demonstrated.
- 2) In both locations, the trial network will utilize 758-768 MHz as the downlink band and 788-798 MHz as the uplink band.

- 3) One fixed base station will be deployed in Northern Virginia (in McLean), and two mobile base stations will be deployed in New York City (one in Brooklyn and one in Manhattan). Northrop obtained a permit for the New York City installations from the New York City Department of Buildings. No other government approvals are needed except for the consent of the Commonwealth of Virginia (already submitted to the FCC), the consent of FirstNet, and grant of the STA application by the FCC.
- 4) A fully redundant backhaul link has been deployed to couple the operations in New York and Virginia to a common LTE-evolved packet core.
- 5) Twenty experimental end-user devices will be provisioned for testing and demonstration by Northrop employees. In the New York locations, the end user devices will be operated within a radius of three miles or less of the base stations. In Northern Virginia, the end-user devices will be operated indoors.
- 6) Northrop's temporary operations will not be used in actual mission-critical operations or in the delivery of live transmissions to protect life, property, or safety.
- 7) Northrop has implemented internal procedures to monitor and maintain control of the handsets and will promptly respond to any reports of harmful interference. Each unit will be registered to its recipient, and Northrop will maintain a record of each device so that each can be easily recalled at any time during testing and when testing is complete.
- 8) Northrop analyzed information from the FCC's license databases, and commissioned Comsearch to undertake an engineering study. That study determined that the proposed operation will not interfere with, or create significant potential interference with, public safety operations in the 700 MHz band, including the operations of the Commonwealth of Virginia pursuant to WPTZ775.
- 9) The Commonwealth of Virginia provided its consent for the above-referenced STA application with the following conditions. STA operations must be strictly limited to the in-building parameters proposed in the application. Northrop must assume all causalities, risks, damages, and liabilities that may result from operations associated with the STA. If Northrop deviates from the terms of the STA, the Commonwealth can revoke its approval of the STA. As required by the Commonwealth consent letter, Northrop filed the Comsearch engineering study with the FCC on October 18, 2013. Northrop also agreed to notify the Interoperability Coordinator, the Commonwealth Spectrum manager and the Virginia State Police if any upcoming test associated with the STA deviates from the STA as granted. Northrop also will notify the STARS NOC prior to commencing any test and will only conduct such tests with the concurrence of the Virginia State Police.

10) Northrop understands that FirstNet has the right to monitor its operations. Northrop also understands that if additional time for its trial is needed beyond May 1, 2014 that it will be required to file an application with the FCC and, once again, seek consent from the Commonwealth of Virginia and FirstNet.
