

According to 447498 D01 General RF Exposure Guidance v05

The 1-g and 10-g SAR test exclusion thresholds for 100 MHz to 6 GHz at test separation distances \leq 50 mm are determined by:

[(max. power of channel, including tune-up tolerance, mW)/(min. test separation distance, mm)] $\left[\sqrt{f(GHz)}\right] \le 3.0$ for 1-g SAR and ≤ 7.5 for 10-g extremity SAR, where

--f(GHz) is the RF channel transmit frequency in GHz

--Power and distance are rounded to the nearest mW and mm before calculation

--The result is rounded to one decimal place for comparison

eirp = pt x gt = $(EXd)^2/30$ where:

pt = transmitter output power in watts, gt = numeric gain of the transmitting antenna (unitless), E = electric field strength in V/m, --- $10^{((dBuV/m)/20)}/10^{6}$ d = measurement distance in meters (m) ---3m So pt = (EXd)²/30 x gt

For BT mode

Field strength = 92.17dBuV/m @3m Ant gain =2dBi, so Ant numeric gain=1.58

So pt={ $[10^{(92.17/20)}/10^6 \times 3]^2/30\times 1.58$ }x1000 mW =0.8mW So (0.8mW /5mm)x $\sqrt{2.480} = 0.3<3$

For WIFI mode

Worse case is as below: [2437MHz 8dBm (6.31mW) output power] (6.31mW /5mm) $\cdot [\sqrt{2.437}(GHz)] = 2 < 3.0$ for 1-g SAR

Then SAR evaluation is not required
