#### **Equipment Function and Testing Procedures**

The EUT is a 902-928 MHz radio transmitter used to wirelessly interface remote sensors offering state/alarm conditions for use in an alarm panel installation. The 1105 is a remote contact point sensor wirelessly interfacing with the central control in installation environments. The EUT communicates with other compliant equipment. The unit is marketed for use to incorporate a wireless link in an alarm system solution. Test software was installed in a test sample allowing for special testing requirements and purposes. The modified software allowed the transmitter to be set to transmit on channels dependant on activation of the tamper and/or magnetic switch incorporated in the EUT. The unit operates from replaceable internal battery power only offers no provision for connection to utility power systems. The design has provision to connect to external contact relay point if installation requires.

#### **Equipment and Cable Configurations**

#### AC Line Conducted Emission Test Procedure

The EUT operates solely from replaceable internal battery power and offers no provision for connection to utility power systems therefore no AC Power line conducted emissions testing is required.

#### Radiated Emission Test Procedure

Testing of radiated emissions was performed as defined in section 8 of ANSI C63.4. The EUT was placed on a rotating 1 x 1.5-meter wooden platform, 0.8 meters above the ground plane at a distance of 3 meters from the FSM antenna. EMI energy was maximized by equipment placement, raising and lowering the FSM antenna, changing the antenna polarization, and by rotating the turntable. Each emission was maximized before data was taken using a spectrum analyzer. Refer to photographs in the exhibits for EUT placement.

#### **Units of Measurements**

Conducted EMI Data is in dBµV; dB referenced to one microvolt.

Radiated EMI Data is in dBµV/m; dB/m referenced to one microvolt per meter.

As per CFR47 Part 15, Subpart C, paragraphs 15.203, 15.205, 15.209, 15.249 and RSS-210 the

following information is submitted.

Antenna Requirements

The unit is produced with a permanently attached antenna inside the plastic case. No provisions

for modification or alterations of the antenna configuration are available to the end user. The

requirements of 15.203 are met there are no deviations or exceptions to the specification.

Restricted Bands of Operation

Spurious emissions falling in the restricted frequency bands of operation were measured at a

distance of three meters at the OATS. The EUT utilizes frequency, determining circuitry, which

generates harmonics falling in the restricted bands. Emissions were investigated at the OATS,

using appropriate antennas or pyramidal horns, amplification stages, and spectrum analyzer.

Peak and average amplitudes of frequencies above 1000 MHz were compared to the required

limits with worst-case data presented below. Test procedures of ANSI 63.4-2003 paragraphs

13.1 and 8.3.1.2 were used during testing. No other significant emission was observed which

fell into the restricted bands of operation. Computed emission values take into account the

received radiated field strength, receive antenna correction factor, amplifier gain stage, and test

system cable losses.

Other emissions present had amplitudes at least 20 dB below the margin.

#### **Summary of Results for Radiated Emissions in Restricted Bands**

The EUT demonstrated compliance with radiated emissions requirements of FCC Part 15C and RSS-210 Intentional Radiators. The EUT presented with 12.6 dB minimum margin below the limits. Both average and peak amplitudes above 1000 MHz were investigated for compliance with the regulations. No other emissions where found in the restricted frequency bands. Other emissions were present with amplitudes at least 20 dB below the Limits.

#### Radiated Emissions Testing Procedure

The EUT was arranged in a typical equipment configuration and operated through all available modes with worst-case data recorded. Preliminary testing was performed in a screen room with the EUT positioned 1 meter from the FSM. Radiated emissions measurements were performed to identify the frequencies, which produced the highest emissions. Plots were made of the radiated frequency spectrum from 30 MHz to 10,000 MHz for the preliminary testing. Refer to figures one through five for plots of the radiated emissions spectrum taken in a screen room. The highest radiated emission was then re-maximized at the OATS location before final radiated emissions measurements were performed. Final data was taken with the EUT located at the OATS at a distance of 3 meters between the EUT and the receiving antenna. The frequency spectrum from 30 MHz to 10,000 MHz was searched for radiated emissions. Measured emission levels were maximized by EUT placement on the table, rotating the turntable through 360 degrees, varying the antenna height between 1 and 4 meters above the ground plane and changing antenna position between horizontal and vertical polarization. Antennas used were Broadband Biconical from 30 to 200 MHz, Biconilog from 30 to 1000 MHz, Log Periodic from 200 MHz to 5 GHz and or, pyramidal horns and mixers from 4 GHz to 30 GHz, notch filters and appropriate amplifiers were utilized.

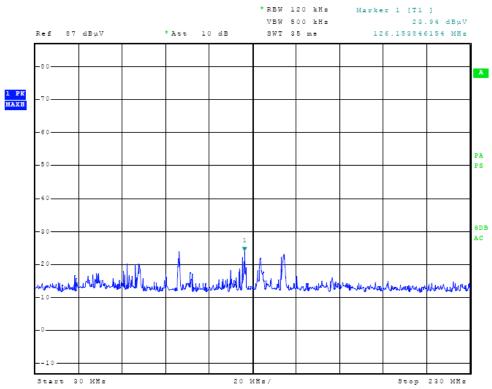


Figure One General Radiated Emissions taken at 1 meter in screen room

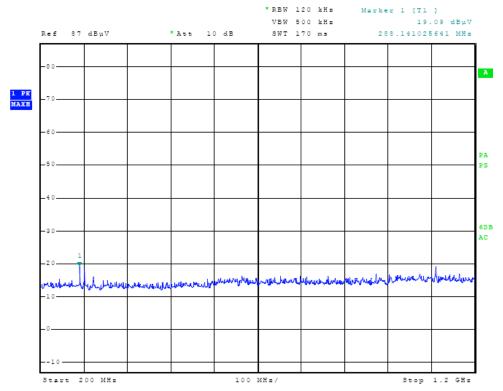


Figure Two General Radiated Emissions taken at 1 meter in screen room

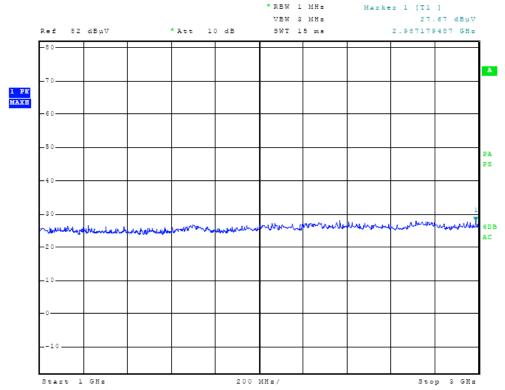


Figure Three General Radiated Emissions taken at 1 meter in screen room

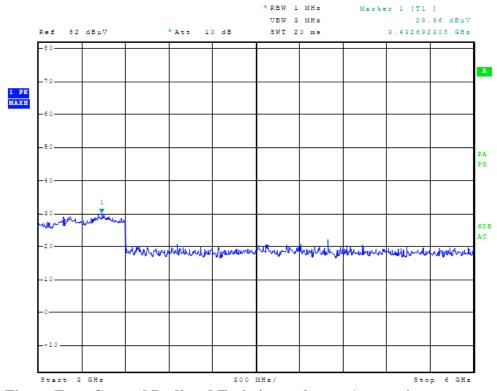


Figure Four General Radiated Emissions taken at 1 meter in screen room

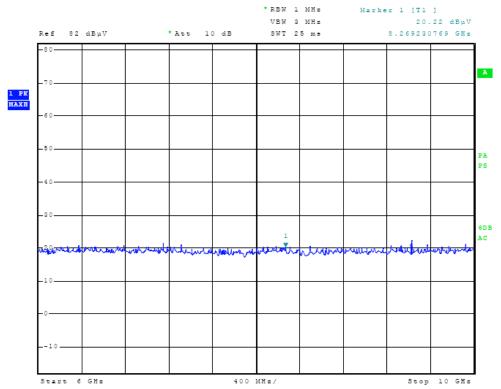


Figure Five General Radiated Emissions taken at 1 meter in screen room

#### **Summary of Results for General Radiated Emissions**

The EUT demonstrated compliance with radiated emissions requirements for CFR47 Part 15C, and Industry Canada requirements. The EUT presented with 22.7 dB minimum margin below the limit. Other emissions were present with amplitudes at least 20 dB below the limit.

#### Operation in the Band 902-928 MHz

The power output was measured on an open area test site @ 3 meters. Test procedures of ANSI 63.4-2003 paragraphs 13.1 and 8.3.1.2 were used during testing. The EUT was placed on a wooden turntable 0.8 meters above the ground plane and at a distance of 3 meters from the FSM antenna. The peak and quasi-peak amplitude of frequencies below 1000 MHz were measured using a spectrum analyzer. The peak and average amplitude of frequencies above 1000 MHZ were measured using a spectrum analyzer. The amplitude of the emission was then recorded from the analyzer display. Emissions radiated outside of the specified bands, except for harmonics, shall be attenuated by at least 50 dB below the level of the fundamental or to the general radiated emission limits in 15.209, whichever is the lesser attenuation. Refer to figures six through nine demonstrating compliance with operation in the 902-928 MHz frequency band. The amplitudes of each radiated spurious emission were measured at the OATS at a distance of 3 meters from the FSM antenna. The amplitude of each radiated spurious emission was maximized by varying the FSM antenna height, polarization, and by rotating the turntable. A Biconilog Antenna was used for measuring emissions from 30 to 1000 MHz, a Log Periodic Antenna for 200 to 5000 MHz, and Double-ridge horn and/or Pyramidal Horn Antennas from 4 GHz to 25 GHz. Emissions were measured in dBμV/m @ 3 meters.

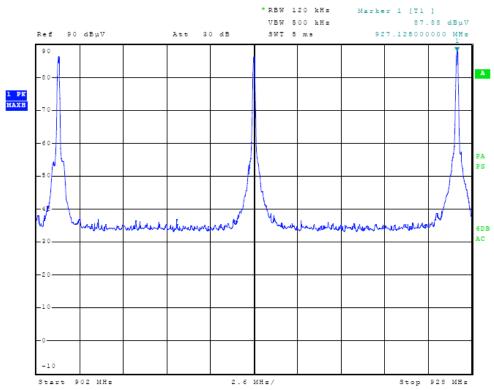


Figure Six Output power across band

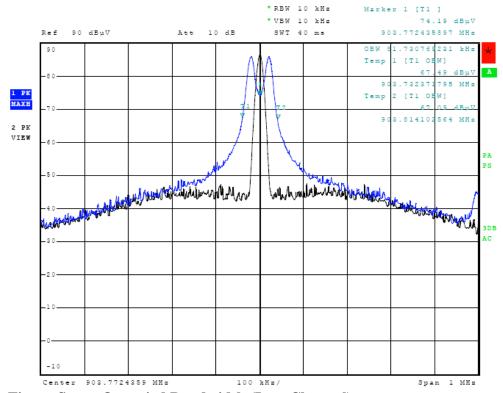


Figure Seven Occupied Bandwidth (Low Channel)

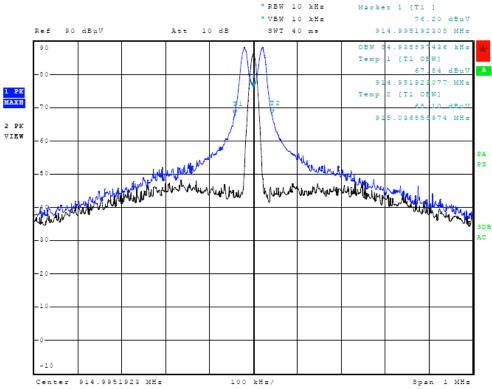


Figure Eight Occupied Bandwidth (Mid Channel)

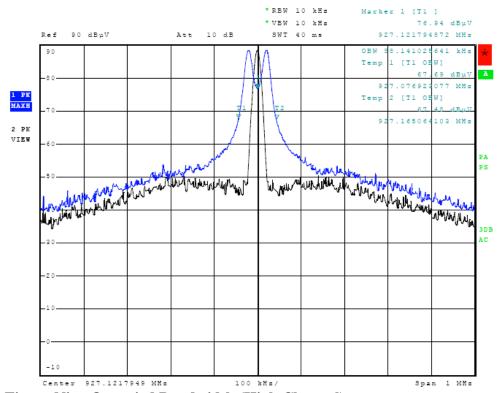


Figure Nine Occupied Bandwidth (High Channel)

#### Summary of Results for Transmitter Radiated Emissions
