

Technical Description

The transmitter of the EUT (IEEE 802.11a+g Wireless Access Point) is powered by power adapter and connected with managing computer through RJ45 port. The antenna is Dipole antenna with UFL antenna connector. Under normal use condition, the user has to keep at least 20cm separation distance between radiator and the body of the user.

This device is a IEEE 802.11a+g Wireless Access Point which operates in both of the 5GHz and 2.4GHz bands and can transmitting simultaneously, the maximum data rate could be 108Mbps.

Data transmission is always initiated by software, which is then pass down through the MAC, through the digital and analog baseband, and finally to the RF chip. Several special packets (ACKs, CTS, PSpoll, etc...) are initiated by the MAC. There are the only ways the digital baseband portion will turn on the RF transmitter, which it then turns off at the end of the packet. Therefore, the transmitter will be on only while one of the aforementioned packets are being transmitted.
