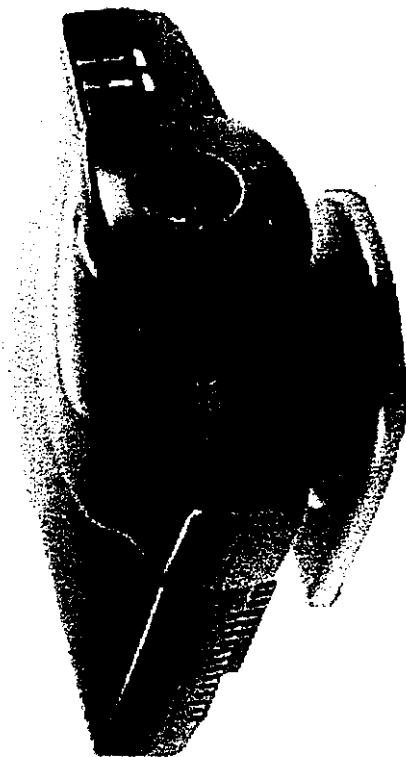

The Federal Communications Commission Statement

On the bottom of this equipment is label that contains, among other information, the FCC registration Number and Ringer equipment Number(REN) for the equipment, if requested, this information must be given to the Telephone company.

The REN is useful to determine the quantity of device you may connect to your telephone line and still have all of those device ring when your telephone number is called.

In most, but not all areas, the sum of the REN's of all device connected to one line should not exceed five(5.0). To be certain of the number of device you're local telephone company to determine the maximum REN for you're calling area. If your telephone equipment cause harm to the telephone network, the Telephone Company may discontinue your service temporarily. If possible, they will notify you in advance. But is advance notice isn't practical, you will be informed of your right to file a complaint with FCC.

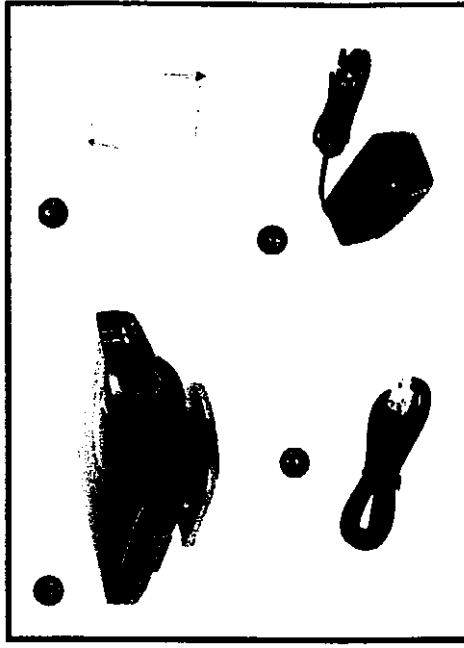

Making a Videophone Call

You have set up your videophone, you are now ready to make your first videophone call.

Note: Place your videophone on a stable surface.

1. Turn on your videophone (on the right side of the videophone). The logo appears on the screen.

2. Pick up the phone receiver, you will hear a dial tone and see yourself on the screen.

3. Dial your phone number.

4. When the phone is answered you can talk as normal.

5. If you would like to see your correspondent, you need to start the video. Press # on the phone keypad to show the menu on the bottom of the screen.

Note: Only one of you should start the video.

6. Press "1" to start the video.

The menu will change as shown and the number on the right will count up as the video is being connected.

Note: At this point you will not be able to hear your correspondent.

7. After 15-45 seconds, the screen will indicate that the video is connected.

8. Now you can see your correspondent on the screen! You can continue your conversation again.

9. Just hang up the phone to end the call.

Or press # and choose "5. End". You will see "End Video Call?", choose "yes".

If the count on the screen gets up to 60 seconds and the video has not started, you will see one of these messages.

No modem connection

1. Please make sure that your correspondent also has a videophone.

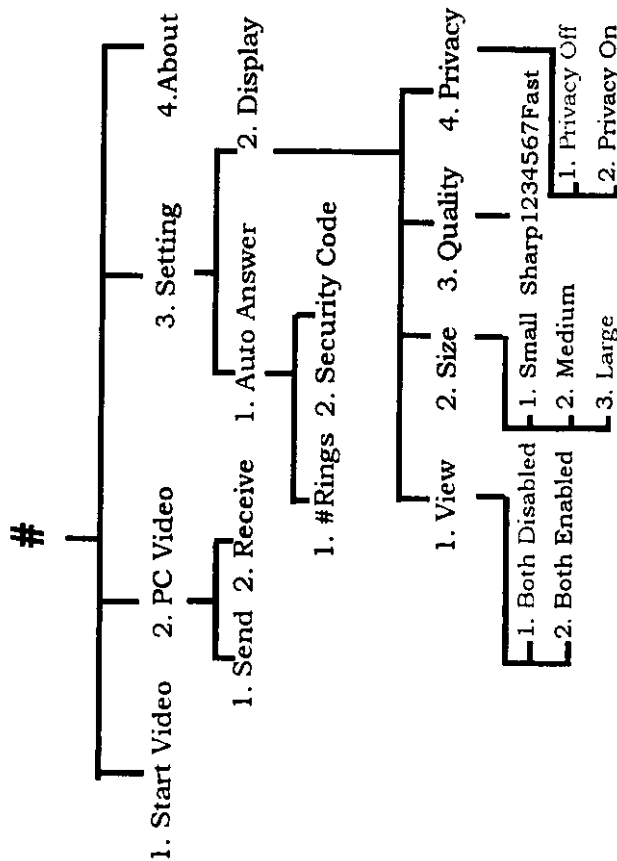
2. If so, hang up, wait for the videophone logo to appear on the screen and re-dial.

Before or after you make a videophone call, there are several useful features for you to use. These features are designed according to your needs to make your phone call more pleasant.

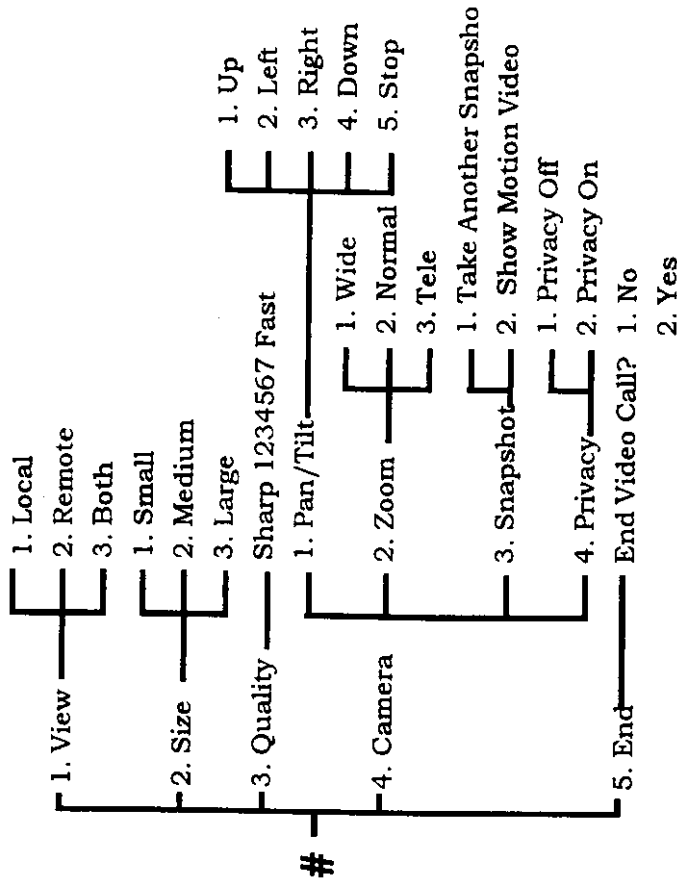
Here's a videophone menu tree for a quicker search:

2. To select a menu item, simply press the corresponding number.

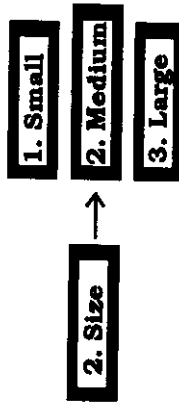
3. Press "8" if you would like to go back to the previous level.

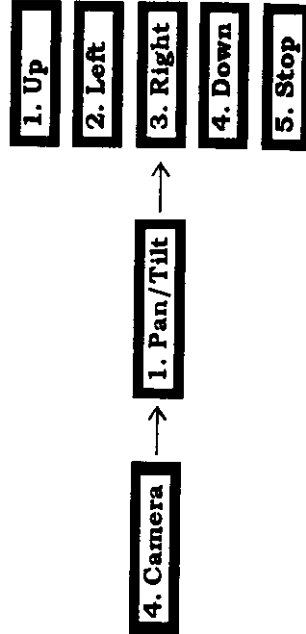

The Camera Menu has four features: 1. Pan/Tilt, 2. Zoom, 3. Snapshot, 4. Privacy. Each feature is described as below:

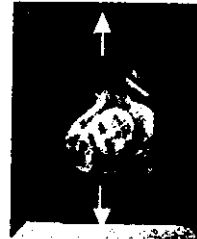
Pan/Tilt

In this menu, you need to press a key (1 - 4) to start the camera view movement and then press 5 to stop the movement in the correct place.



To pan the view left or right, press 2. Left or 3. Right

To tilt the view up or down, press 1. Up or 4. Down

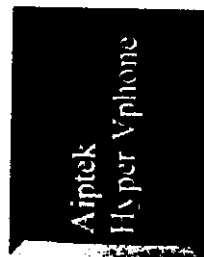
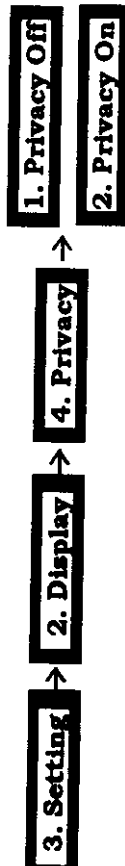

Menu After making a videophone call

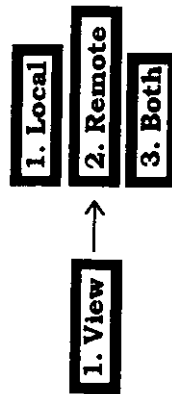
Once you make your videophone call, you can still use the following features to make your videophone call even more enjoyable. **To go into all features, you need to press # to begin with.**

a button in their PC software to receive the video from you. A delay of 15-60 seconds is expected.

c. Press **1. Send Video**

c. Press **2. Receive Video**

Some PC videophones do not allow you to talk to each other before the video is started, they start to send video immediately. If your correspondent's videophone does what is just described, press keys above to receive video.

Setting Menu

Auto Answering

when you are busy or not around to answer the phone, the videophone is able to answer calls for you. To do this:

1. Press # to bring up the menu.

2. Select **3. Setting**

3. Choose **1. Auto Answer**

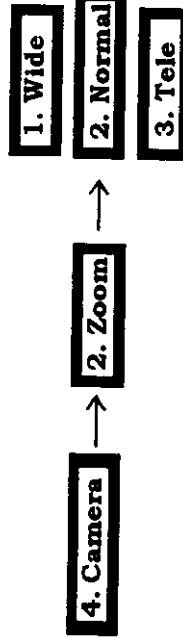
4. Choose **1. #Rings**

Here you can turn on Auto Answer function and decide the number of times the phone should ring before it answers. To do this, simply enter number 1-9

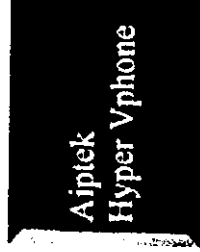
You can use this feature to take a high-quality still picture. This is very useful if you or your correspondent wants to show a photo, a magazine page, or other detailed picture.
