- Description of Circuit Functions, Device Operation: The HRM2A is a remote transmitter (4) for the sports enthusiast wishing to monitor heart rate during activity. The equipment incorporates a wireless interface allowing data transmitted to other compliant equipment over short distances. The transmitter was designed to communicate with compliant remote equipment. This device features communications operation in the 2400-2483.5 MHz frequency band.

- (8) Peripheral equipment or accessories for the equipment. No optional equipment was available other than that shown in the configuration diagram. The available configuration options were investigated for this report with worst-case data presented.
- (9) Transition Provisions of 15.37 are not being requested.
- (10)The equipment is not a scanning receiver.
- (11) The equipment is not a transmitter operating in the 59-64 GHz frequency range.

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#### **Equipment Function and Testing Procedures**

The EUT is a low power transmitter with operation capability in the 2402-2480 MHz frequency band (CFR47, 15.249 and RSS-210). The unit allows for communications to other 2400-2483.5 MHz compliant equipment. The design is offered for the outdoor enthusiast allowing remote monitoring of heart rate during periods of activity to other compliant equipment. The design allows for heart rate information to be sent to compliant equipment through wireless interface.

#### **Test Setup**

The HRM2A is a body worn transmitter incorporating a heart rate sensor used to interface with compliant equipment. The design incorporates a low power transmitter allowing short-range communications in the 2402-2480 MHz band. The EUT was arranged as a test system emulating typical user equipment configuration during testing. The transmitter offers no other interface connections than those in the configuration options shown below. The EUT receives power from internal batteries only and offers no alternative power source options. As requested by the manufacturer and required by the regulations, the unit was tested for emissions compliance using the available configurations with the worst-case data presented. Test results in this report relate only to the products described in this report.

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#### AC Line Conducted Emission Test Procedure

The equipment operates solely from direct current power and offers no provision to connect to utility AC power. Therefore, no AC power line conducted emissions testing were performed for this report.

#### Radiated Emission Test Procedure

The EUT was arranged in the test configuration as shown above for testing. The EUT was placed on a rotating 1 x 1.5-meter wooden platform 0.8 meters above the ground plane at a distance of 3 meters from the FSM antenna. EMI energy was maximized by equipment placement, raising and lowering the FSM antenna, changing the antenna polarization, and by rotating the turntable. Each emission was maximized before final data was taken using a spectrum analyzer. Refer to photographs in exhibits for EUT placement used during testing.

#### Units of Measurements

Conducted EMI: Data is in dBµV; dB referenced to one microvolt.

Radiated EMI: Data is in dBµV/m; dB/m referenced to one microvolt per meter.

Note: The limit is expressed for a measurement in dBµV/m when the measurement is taken at a distance of 3 meters. Data taken for this report was taken at a distance of 3 meters.

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#### **Subpart C - Intentional Radiators**

As per CFR47 Part 15, Subpart C and RSS-210 (A9.2) the following information is submitted for consideration in obtaining grant of certification for unlicensed low power intentional radiators.

#### 15.203 Antenna Requirements

The unit is produced with a permanently attached antenna inside the sealed plastic case. No provisions for modification or alterations of the antenna configuration are available. The requirements of 15.203 are met there are no deviations or exceptions to the specification.

#### 15.205 Restricted Bands of Operation

Spurious emissions falling in the restricted frequency bands of operation were measured at the 3-meter OATS. The EUT utilizes frequency, determining circuitry, which generates harmonics falling in the restricted bands. Emissions were investigated at the OATS, using appropriate antennas or pyramidal horns, amplification stages, and a spectrum analyzer. Peak and average amplitudes of frequencies above 1000 MHz were compared to the required limits with worstcase data presented below. Test procedures of ANSI 63.4-2003 paragraphs 8.3 and 13 were used during testing. No other significant emission was observed which fell into the restricted bands of operation. Computed emission values take into account the received radiated field strength, receive antenna correction factor, amplifier gain stage, and test system cable losses.

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#### Summary of Results for Radiated Emissions in Restricted Bands 15.205

The EUT demonstrated compliance with the radiated emissions requirements of CFR47 Part 15.205 restricted bands of operation. The EUT had a 24.6 dB minimum margin below the limits. Other emissions were present with amplitudes at least 20 dB below the required limits.

#### 15.209 Radiated emissions limits; general requirements

#### General Radiated EMI per 15.209

Testing was performed with the EUT arranged in all typical equipment configurations and operated through available modes. Preliminary testing was performed in a screen room with the EUT positioned 1 meter from the FSM. Radiated emissions investigations were performed to identify the frequencies, which produced the highest emissions. Plots were made of the radiated emission frequency spectrum from 30 MHz to 22,000 MHz for the preliminary transmitter testing. Refer to figures one through seven showing the worst-case radiated emission spectrum displayed on the spectrum analyzer taken in a screen room. Each radiated emission was then re-maximized at the OATS site before final radiated emissions measurements were performed. Final data was taken with the EUT located at the open field test site at a distance of 3 meters between the EUT and the receiving antenna. Test procedures of ANSI 63.4-2003 paragraphs 13.1 and 8.3 were used during radiated emissions testing. The frequency spectrum from 30 MHz to 25,000 MHz was searched for radiated emissions. Peak and average amplitudes of frequencies above 1000 MHz were compared to the required limits with worst-case data presented below. Measured emission levels were maximized by EUT placement on the table, changing cable location, rotating the turntable through 360 degrees, varying the antenna height between 1 and 4 meters above the ground plane and changing antenna polarization between horizontal and vertical. Antennas used were Broadband Biconical from 30 MHz to 200 MHz, Log Periodic from 200 MHz to 5 GHz, and/or Biconilog from 30 MHz to 1000 MHz, Double-Ridge horn and/or Pyramidal Horns from 5 GHz to 25 GHz, and amplification stages.

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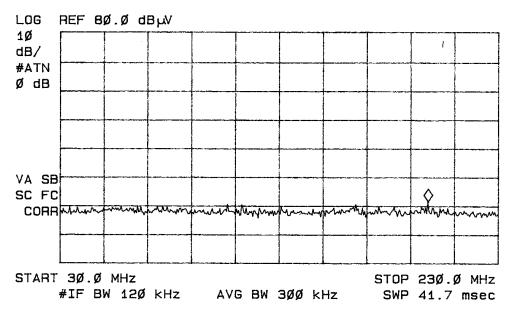

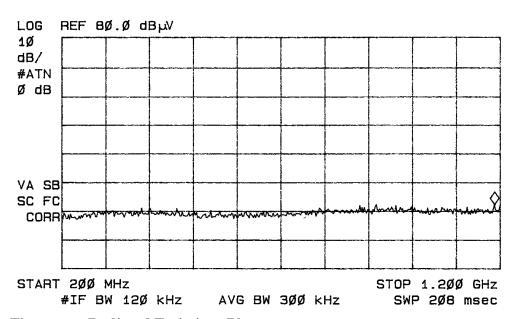


Figure two Radiated Emissions Plot

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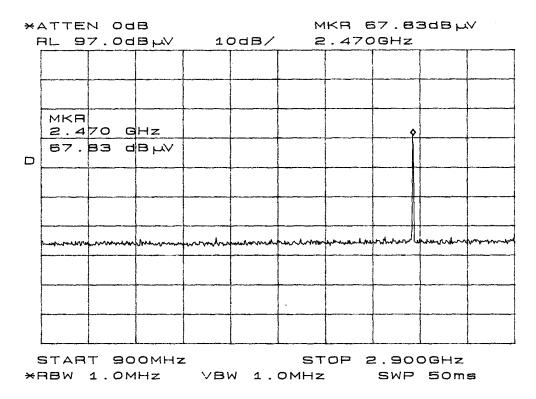

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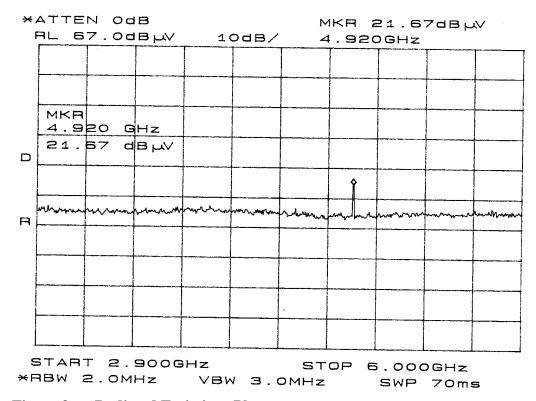
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#### **Figure three Radiated Emissions Plot**



**Figure four Radiated Emissions Plot** 

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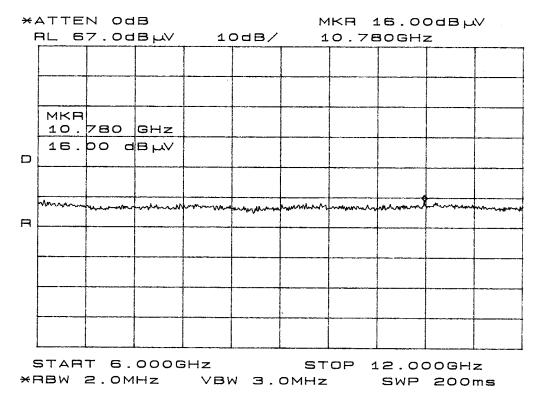
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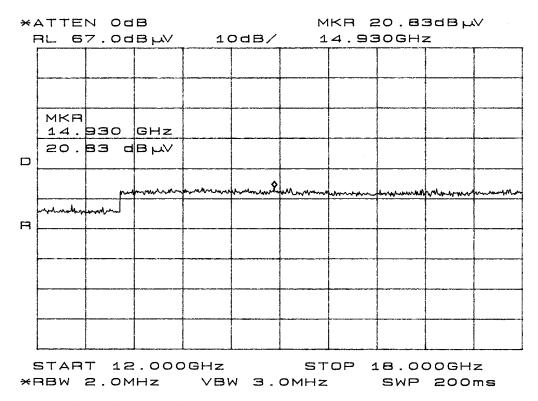

**Figure six Radiated Emissions Plot** 

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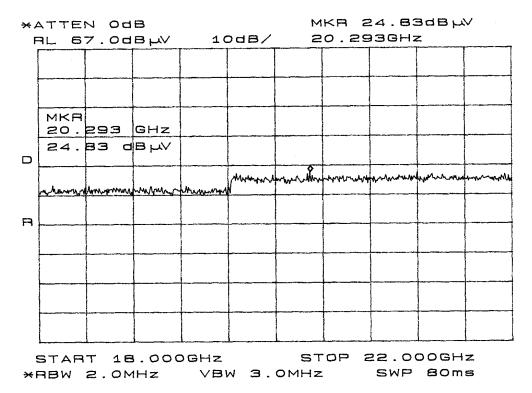
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**Figure seven Radiated Emissions Plot**

#### Summary of Results for General Radiated Emissions per 15.209

The EUT demonstrated compliance with the radiated emissions the requirements of CFR47 Part 15C and other applicable standards for Intentional Radiators. The EUT had a 34.0 dB minimum margin below the limits. Other emissions were present with amplitudes at least 20 dB below the Limits.

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#### 15.249 Operation in the Band 2,400-2,483.5 MHz

The power output was measured on an open field test site @ 3-meters. Test procedures of ANSI 63.4-2003 paragraphs 13.1 and 8.3 were used during testing. The EUT was placed on a wooden turntable 0.8 meters above the ground plane and at a distance of 3-meters from the FSM antenna. The peak and quasi-peak amplitude of frequencies below 1000 MHz were measured using a spectrum analyzer. The peak and average amplitude of frequencies above 1000 MHZ were measured using a spectrum analyzer. The amplitude of the emission was then recorded from the analyzer display. Emissions radiated outside of the specified bands, except for harmonics, shall be attenuated by at least 50 dB below the level of the fundamental or to the general radiated emission limits in 15.209, whichever is the lesser attenuation. Refer to figures eight and nine showing the occupied bandwidth, frequency, and amplitude of fundamental emissions as displayed on the spectrum analyzer demonstrating compliance. The amplitudes of each spurious emission were measured at the OATS at a distance of 3 meters from the FSM antenna. The amplitude of each radiated emission was maximized by varying the FSM antenna height, polarization, and by rotating the turntable. A Biconilog Antenna was used for measuring emissions from 30 to 1000 MHz, a Log Periodic Antenna for 200 to 5000 MHz, and Double-ridge horn and/or Pyramidal Horn Antennas from 4 GHz to 25 GHz. Emissions were measured in dBµV/m @ 3 meters.

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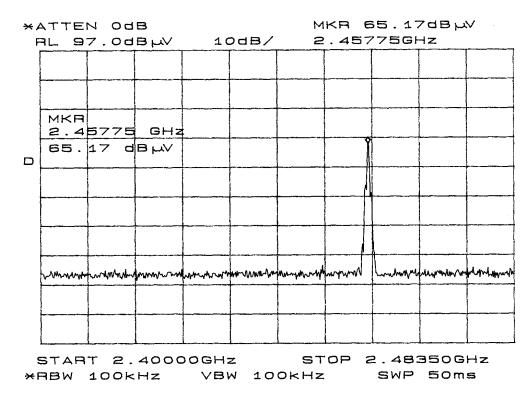


Figure eight Operation in Frequency Band

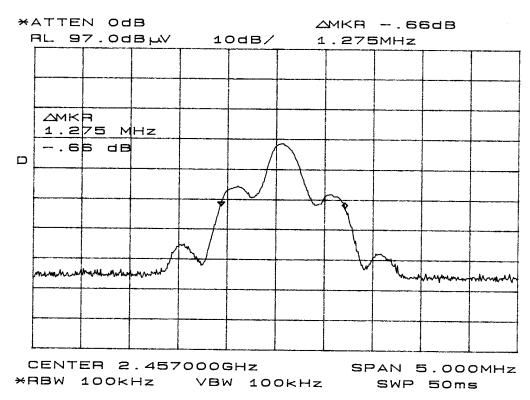


Figure nine Occupied Bandwidth

#### Summary of Results for Transmitter Radiated Emissions per 15.249

The EUT demonstrated compliance with the radiated emissions requirements of CFR47 Part 15.249, RSS-210 and other applicable standards for Intentional Radiators. The EUT demonstrated peak amplitude emission of 6.8 dB below the average limit of CFR47 15.249 and average amplitude of 55.8 dB below the limit. The EUT demonstrated Peak harmonic emission amplitude of 16.8 dB below the average limit of 15.209 and 15.249. There were no measurable emissions in the restricted bands other than those recorded in this report. Other emissions were present with amplitudes at least 20 dB below the FCC Limits.

#### Statement of Modifications and Deviations

No modifications to the EUT were required for the equipment to demonstrate compliance with the CFR47 15C or RSS-210 requirements. There were no deviations or exceptions to the specifications.

#### Notes:

- Uncertainties for the antenna and cable were estimated, based on a normal probability distribution with k = 2.
- 1.2 The receiver uncertainty was obtained from the manufacturer's specification for which a rectangular distribution was assumed.
- 1.3 The antenna factor uncertainty does not take account of antenna directivity.
- 1.4 The antenna factor varies with height and since the height was not always the same in use as when the antenna was calibrated an additional uncertainty is added.
- 1.5 The uncertainty in the measurement distance is relatively small but has some effect on the received signal strength. The increase in measurement distance as the antenna height is increased is an inevitable consequence of the test method and is therefore not considered a contribution to uncertainty.
- 1.6 Site imperfections are difficult to quantify but may include the following contributions:
  - -Unwanted reflections from adjacent objects.
  - -Ground plane imperfections: reflection coefficient, flatness, and edge effects.
  - -Losses or reflections from "transparent" cabins for the EUT or site coverings.
  - -Earth currents in antenna cable (mainly effect biconical antennas).
