4. DESCRIPTION OF TEST MODES

During the testing, the EUT was controlled via Rhode & Schwarz Digital Radio Communication Tester (CMU 200) to ensure max power transmission and proper modulation. Three channels (The top channel, the middle channel and the bottom channel) were chosen for testing on both GSM and PCS frequency band.

***Note: GSM/GPRS850, GSM/GPRS1900, HSPA band IV, HSPA band V, mode have been tested during the test.

The worst condition was recorded in the test report if no other modes test data.

5. OUTPUT POWER

5.1 Conducted Output Power

5.1.1 MEASUREMENT METHOD

The EUT was setup for the max output power with pseudo random data modulation. Power was measured with Spectrum Analyzer. The measurements were performed on all modes (GSM/GPRS850, GSM/GPRS1900, HSPA band IV, HSPA band V) at 3 typical channels (the Top Channel, the Middle Channel and the Bottom Channel) for each band.

The device supports MPR to solve linearity issues (ACLR or SEM) due to the higher peak-to average ratios (PAR) of the HSUPA signal. This prevents saturating the full range of the TX DAC inside of device and provides a reduced power output to the RF transceiver chip according to the Cubic Metric (a function of the combinations of DPDCH, DPCCH, HS-DPCCH, E-DPDCH and E-DPCCH).

When E-DPDCH channels are present the beta gains on those channels are reduced firsts to try to get the power under the allowed limit. If the beta gains are lowered as far as possible, then a hard limiting is applied at the maximum allowed level.

The SW currently recalculates the cubic metric every time the beta gains on the E-DPDCH are reduced. The cubic metric will likely get lower each time this is done. However, there is no reported reduction of maximum output power in the HSUPA mode since the device also provides a compensate for the power back-off by increasing the gain of TX_AGC in the transceiver (PA) device.

The end effect is that the DUT output power is identical to the case where there is no MPR in the device.

5.2 RADIATED OUTPUT POWER

5.2.1 MEASUREMENT METHOD

The measurements procedures specified in TIA-603C-2004 were applied.

- In an anechoic antenna test chamber, a half-wave dipole antenna for the frequency band of interest is placed at the reference centre of the chamber. An RF Signal source for the frequency band of interest is connected to the dipole with a cable that has been constructed to not interfere with the radiation pattern of the antenna. A known (measured) power (Pin) is applied to the input of the dipole, and the power received (Pr) at the chamber's probe antenna is recorded.
- 2 The substitution method is used. Substitution values at each frequency are measured before and saved to the test software. A "reference path loss" is established as ARpl=Pin + 2.15 Pr. The ARpl is the attenuation of "reference path loss", and including the gain of receive antenna, the cable loss and the air loss. The measurement results are obtained as described below: Power=PMea+ARpl
- 3 The EUT is substituted for the dipole at the reference centre of the chamber and a scan is performed to obtain the radiation pattern.
- 4 From the radiation pattern, the co-ordinates where the maximum antenna gain occurs are identified.
- 5 The EUT is then put into continuously transmitting mode at its maximum power level.
- Power mode measurements are performed with the receiving antenna placed at the coordinates determined in Step 3 to determine the output power as defined in Rule 24.232 (b) and (c) and 27.50(d)(4). The "reference path loss" from Step1 is added to this result.

5.3. Peak-to-Average Ratio

5.3.1 MEASUREMENT METHOD

The following steps outline the procedure used to measure the Peak-to-Average Ratio from the EUT.

- 1. The EUT was connected to Spectrum Analyzer and Base Station via power divider.
- 2. For GSM/EGPRS operating modes:
- a. Set the RBW = 1MHz, VBW = 1MHz, Peak detector in spectrum analyzer.
- b. Set EUT in maximum power output, and triggered the burst signal.
- c. Measured respectively the Peak level and Mean level, and the deviation was recorded as Peak to Average Ratio.
- 3. For UMTS operating modes:
- a. Set the CCDF (Complementary Cumulative Distribution Function) option in spectrum analyzer.
- b. The highest RF powers were measured and recorded the maximum PAPR level associated with a probability of 0.1 %.

5.3.2 PROVISIONS APPLICABLE

This is the test for the Peak-to-Average Ratio from the EUT.

Power Complementary Cumulative Distribution Function (CCDF) curves provide a means for characterizing the power peaks of a digitally modulated signal on a statistical basis. A CCDF curve depicts the probability of the peak signal amplitude exceeding the average power level. Most contemporary measurement instrumentation include the capability to produce CCDF curves for an input signal provided that the instrument's resolution bandwidth can be set wide enough to accommodate the entire input signal bandwidth. In measuring transmissions in this band using an average power technique, the peak-to-average ratio (PAR) of the transmission may not exceed 13 dB.

6. SPURIOUS EMISSION

6.1 CONDUCTED SPURIOUS EMISSION

6.1.1 MEASUREMENT METHOD

The following steps outline the procedure used to measure the conducted emissions from the FUT

- 1, Determine frequency range for measurements: From CFR 2.1057 the spectrum should be investigated from the lowest radio frequency generated in the equipment up to at least the 10th harmonic of the carrier frequency. For the equipment of PCS1900 band, this equates to a frequency range of 30 MHz to 19.1 GHz, data taken from 30 MHz to 20 GHz. For GSM850, data taken from 30 MHz to 9 GHz.
- 2, Determine EUT transmit frequencies: the following typical channels were chosen to conducted emissions testing.

6.1.2 PROVISIONS APPLICABLE

On any frequency outside frequency band of the USPCS spectrum, the power of any emission shall be attenuated below the transmitter power (P, in Watts) by at least 43+10Log(P) dB. For all power levels +30 dBm to 0 dBm, this becomes a constant specification limit of -13 dBm.


6.2 Radiated Spurious Emission

6.2.1 MEASUREMENT METHOD

The measurements procedures specified in TIA-603C-2004 were used for testing. The spectrum was scanned from 30 MHz to the 10th harmonic of the highest frequency generated within the equipment. The resolution bandwidth is set 1MHz as outlined in Part 24.238 and 27.50(d)(4). The measurements were performed on all modes (GPRS850, GPRS1900, HSDPA band IV, HSDPA band V) at 3 typical channels (the Top Channel, the Middle Channel and the Bottom Channel) for each band.


The procedure of radiated spurious emissions is as follows:

a) Pre-calibration With pre-calibration method, the Radiated Spurious Emissions(RSE) is calculated as, RSE=Rx (dBuV) +CL (dB) +SA (dB) +Gain (dBi) -107 (dBuV to dBm) The SA is calibrated using following setup.



b) EUT was placed on a 0.8 meter high non-conductive stand at a 3 meter test distance from the receive antenna. A receiving antenna was placed on the antenna mast 3 meters from the test item for emission measurements. The height of receiving antenna is 0.8m. The test setup refers to figure below. Detected emissions were maximized at each frequency by rotating the test item and adjusting the receiving antenna polarization. The radiated emission measurements of all non-harmonic and harmonics of the transmit frequency through the 10th harmonic were measured with peak detector and 1MHz bandwidth.

Radiated emissions measurements were made only at the upper, middle, and lower carrier frequencies of the PCS 1900 band (1850.2 MHz, 1880 MHz and 1909.8 MHz) ,GSM850 band (824.2MHz, 836.6MHz, 848.8MHz), UMTS band IV(1712.5MHz, 1732.5MHz, 1752.5MHz), UMTS band V(826.4MHz, 835.0MHz, 846.6MHz) . It was decided that measurements at these three carrier frequencies would be sufficient to demonstrate compliance with emissions limits because it was seen that all the significant spurs occur well outside the band and no radiation was seen from a carrier in one block of any band into any of the other blocks.

The substitution method is used. Substitution values at each frequency are measured before and saved to the test software. A "reference path loss" is established and the A_{Rpl} is the attenuation of "reference path loss", and including the gain of receive antenna, the gain of the preamplifier, the cable loss and the air loss. The measurement results are obtained as described below: Power=P_{Mea}+A_{Rpl}

6.2.2 PROVISIONS APPLICABLE

(a) On any frequency outside a licensee's frequency block (e.g. A, D, B, etc.) within the USPCS spectrum, the power of any emission shall be attenuated below the transmitter power (P, in Watts) by at least 43+10Log(P) dB. The specification that emissions shall be attenuated below the transmitter power (P) by at least 43 + 10 log (P) dB, translates in the relevant power range (1 to 0.001 W) to -13 dBm. At 1 W the specified minimum attenuation becomes 43 dB and relative to a 30 dBm (1 W) carrier becomes a limit of -13 dBm. At 0.001 W (0 dBm) the minimum attenuation is 13 dB, which again yields a limit of -13 dBm. In this way a translation of the specification from relative to absolute terms is carried out.





8. FREQUENCY STABILITY

8.1 MEASUREMENT METHOD

In order to measure the carrier frequency under the condition of AFC lock, it is necessary to make measurements with the EUT in a "call mode". This is accomplished with the use of R&S CMU200 DIGITAL RADIO COMMUNICATION TESTER.

- 1 , Measure the carrier frequency at room temperature.
- Subject the EUT to overnight soak at -10℃.
- 3 , With the EUT, powered via nominal voltage, connected to the CMU200 and in a simulated call on channel 661 for PCS 1900 band , channel 190 for GSM 850 band, channel 9400 for UMTS band II and channel 4175 for UMTS band V measure the carrier frequency. These measurements should be made within 2 minutes of Powering up the EUT, to prevent significant self-warming.
- 4 , Repeat the above measurements at 10° C increments from -10° C to $+50^{\circ}$ C. Allow at least 1 1/2 hours at each temperature, unpowered, before making measurements.
- 5 , Re-measure carrier frequency at room temperature with nominal voltage. Vary supply voltage from minimum voltage to maximum voltage, in 0.1Volt increments re-measuring carrier frequency at each voltage. Pause at nominal voltage for 1 1/2 hours unpowered, to allow any self-heating to stabilize, before continuing.
- 6 , Subject the EUT to overnight soak at +50°C.
- 7 , With the EUT, powered via nominal voltage, connected to the CMU200 and in a simulated call on the centre channel, measure the carrier frequency. These measurements should be made within 2 minutes of Powering up the EUT, to prevent significant self-warming.
- 8 , Repeat the above measurements at 10° C increments from $+50^{\circ}$ C to -10° C. Allow at least 1 1/2 hours at each temperature, unpowered, before making measurements.
- 9 , At all temperature levels hold the temperature to +/- 0.5°C during the measurement procedure.

8.2 PROVISIONS APPLICABLE

8.2.1 For Hand carried battery powered equipment

According to the JTC standard the frequency stability of the carrier shall be accurate to within 0.1 ppm of the received frequency from the base station. This accuracy is sufficient to meet Sec. 24.235 and 27.54, Frequency Stability. The frequency stability shall be sufficient to ensure that the fundamental emission stays within the authorized frequency block. As this transceiver is considered "Hand carried, battery powered equipment" Section 2.1055(d)(2) applies. This requires that the lower voltage for frequency stability testing be specified by the manufacturer. This transceiver is specified to operate with an input voltage of between 3.4VDC and 4.2VDC, with a nominal voltage of 3.7VDC. Operation above or below these voltage limits is prohibited by transceiver software in order to prevent improper operation as well as to protect components from overstress. These voltages represent a tolerance of -10 % and +12.5 %. For the purposes of measuring frequency stability these voltage limits are to be used.

This requires varying primary supply voltage from 85 to 115 percent of the nominal value for other than hand carried battery equipment, the normal environment temperature is 20°C.





CONDUCTED EMISSION IN GSM850 BAND Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 128 30MHz – 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 128 1GHz – 9GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 190 30MHz – 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 190 1GHz - 9GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 251 30MHz - 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 251 1GHz - 9GHz



CONDUCTED EMISSION IN PCS1900 BAND Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 512 30MHz – 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 512 1GHz – 20GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 661 30MHz – 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 661 1GHz – 20GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 810 30MHz - 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 810 1GHz – 20GHz



CONDUCTED EMISSION IN UMTS band IV Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 1887 30MHz – 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 1887 1GHz - 20GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 1987 30MHz - 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 1987 1GHz – 20GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 2087 30MHz - 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 2087 1GHz – 20GHz



CONDUCTED EMISSION IN UMTS band V Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 4357 30MHz – 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 4357 1GHz – 9GHz



Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 4386 30MHz - 1GHz




Conducted Emission Transmitting Mode CH 4386 1GHz – 9GHz







Occupied Bandwidth (99%) GSM 850 BAND CH 128




Occupied Bandwidth (99%) GSM 850 BAND CH 190



Occupied Bandwidth (99%) PCS 1900 BAND CH 512



Occupied Bandwidth (99%) PCS 1900 BAND CH 661




Occupied Bandwidth (99%) PCS 1900 BAND CH 810



Occupied Bandwidth (99%) UMTS band IV CH 1887




Occupied Bandwidth (99%) UMTS band IV CH 1987



Occupied Bandwidth (99%) UMTS band IV CH 2087




Occupied Bandwidth (99%) UMTS band V CH 4357







Low Band Edge GSM 850 BAND CH 128




High Band Edge GSM 850 BAND CH 251



Low Band Edge PCS 1900 BAND CH 512




High Band Edge PCS 1900 BAND CH 810



Low Band Edge UMTS BAND IV CH 1887




High Band Edge UMTS BAND IV CH 2087



Low Band Edge UMTS BAND V CH 4357




High Band Edge UMTS BAND V CH 4458








TOP VIEW OF EUT




FRONT VIEW OF EUT






