NOTE 1 to Table 1: Occupational/controlled limits apply in situations in which persons are exposed as a consequence of their employment provided those persons are fully aware of the potential for exposure and can exercise control over their exposure.

Limits for occupational/controlled exposure also apply in situations when an individual is transient through a location where occupational/controlled limits apply provided he or she is made aware of the potential for exposure.

NOTE 2 to Table 1: General population/uncontrolled exposures apply in situations in which the general public may be exposed, or in which persons that are exposed as a consequence of their employment may not be fully aware of the potential for exposure or cannot exercise control over their exposure.

Before you begin, make sure you have the following:


- Standard Ethernet NIC installed on your computer







Finding the best signal from the ISP

Connecting cables to the RDM

- 1. Plug the power supply into a wall outlet.
- 2. Plug the power supply into the RDM.
- 3. Plug the Ethernet cable into the RDM.



Checking the RDM's lights



The lights on the RDM blink to indicate the strength of the signal received by the RDM. The RDM is equipped with an internal antenna that receives this signal from your Internet service provider.



The more lights that blink on the RDM, the stronger the signal that the RDM receives.

If the RDM is not able to receive any signal, the lights blink in sequence. Choose another location in the building in which to operate the RDM.



After the installation is complete the lights remain continuously lit. This indicates the RDM can provide
