## BATTERY INSTALLATION

（1）Place the battery on the back of the handset and slide into place．（2）Push the battery down until it locks into place．


## BATTERY REMOVAL

1 （1）Pull down the release latch，lift up the battery and（2）remove the battery from the handset．


If the battery is not correcty placed in the compartment，the handset will not turn on and／or the battery may detach during use．

## BATTERY USAGE

BATTERY CHARGING POWER CONNECTION

Plug the AC Charger into a standard outlet.Plug the other end of the AC Charger into the bottom of your phone. The battery must be installed onto the phone.


When you charge the battery with the phone power off, you will see a charging status screen. You cannot operate the phone until it is powered on

- The battery is not charged at the time of purchase
- Fully charge the battery before use.
- It is more efficient to charge the battery with the handset powered off.
- The battery must be connected to the phone in order to charge it
- Battery operating time gradually decreases over time.
- If the battery fails to perform normally, you may need to replace the battery.

## BATTERY HANDLING INFORMATION

DOs

- Only use the battery and charger approved by the manufacturer.
- Only use the battery for its original purpose.
- Try to keep batteries in a temperature between 41야 ( $5^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ) and $95{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{F}\left(35^{\circ} \mathrm{C}\right.$ ).
- If the battery is stored in temperatures above or below the recommended range, give it time to warm up or cool down before using.
- Completely drain the battery before recharging. It may take one to four days to completely drain.
- Store the discharged battery in a cool, dark, and dry place.
- Purchase a new battery when its operating time gradually decreases after fully charging.
- Properly dispose of the battery according to local laws.


## DON'TS

- Don't attempt to disassemble the battery it is a sealed unit with no serviceable parts.
- Don't accidentally short circuit the battery by carrying it in your pocket or purse with other metallic objects such as coins, clips and pens. This may critically damage the battery.
- Don't leave the battery in hot or cold temps. Otherwise, it could significantly reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery.

TURNING THE PHONE ON / OFF

## TURNING THE PHONE ON

Press and hold $6^{\circ}$ until your "Power On" logo appears and the tone sounds.


- To select a logo, refer to page 62 for more details. (Settings>Display>Graphics) for more detail.
- If "Password" appears on the display enter your 4-digit password to unlock your phone.
- The default password is the last 4 digits of your phone number.


## TURNING THE PHONE OFF

1 Press and hold 60 until your "Power Off" logo appears.

- Immediately change or recharge the battery when "Low Battery Warning Power Off" appears on the display Memory may possibly be damaged if the phone turns off due to the battery completely draining.
- Turn the phone off before removing or replacing the battery. If the phone is on, unsaved data may be lost.


## ACCESSING THE MENU

Your phone can be customized via the menu. Each function can be accessed by scrolling with the Navigation Key or by pressing the number that corresponds with the menu item.

## MAKING A CALL

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## BASIC FUNCTIONS

## SPEAKER PHONE

The speaker phone feature lets you hear audio through the speaker and talk without holding the phone

1 To activate the speaker phone in idle, answering or calling modes, press and hold anim .

2 The phone returns to normal (Speaker phone off) after ending a call or when the phone is turned off and back on.

## PAUSE FEATURE

Pauses are used for automated systems (i.e., voice mail, calling cards). Insert a pause after a phone number then enter another group of numbers. The second set of numbers is dialed automatically after the pause. This feature is useful for dialing into systems that require a code.

1 To insert a pause, enter a phone number then press - [MENU]. Select either a Hard Pause ("P" appears) or a Timed Pause ("T" appears).

2 Press 7 to dial or $\odot$ [SAVE] to store. Please refer to page 30 for more details about storing a phone number.

## ANSWERING A CALL-

## 3-WAY CALLING

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be applied for each of the two calls.

1 Enter a number you wish to call then press $T$.
2 Once you have established the connection, enter the second number you wish to call then press 3 .

3 When you're connected to the second party, press $\rightarrow$ again to begin your three-way call.

N(187E) If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

## CALLER ID FUNCTION

Identifies caller by displaying their phone number. If the caller's name and number are already stored in your phone book, they both will appear.

## CALL WAITING FUNGTION

Notifies you of an incoming call when you are already on a call by sounding a beep tone and displaying the caller's phone number.To answer another call while on the phone, press 7 . This places the first call on hold. To switch back to the first caller, press $\quad 7$ again.

## ADJUSTING VOLUME

## KEY GUARD

The Key guard feature of your cellular telephone locks the keypad to protect against accidental key presses when the phone is turned on and no call is in progress. You can still answer or silence an incoming call.

## STORING A PHONE NUMBER

The phone book stores up to 300 entries.Enter phone \#then press © [SAVE].
2 Choose "New Contact" or "Existing Contact". Press © $\odot[\mathrm{OK}]$ to select.

3 The Phone \# will appear above a list of icons. The name of the icon is displayed below the list Use the Navigation Key to choose the type of \# you're adding, as indicated by the icon. Press © ${ }^{\circ}$ [OK] to select.

4 Enter a name then press ® [OK]. Please refer to page 31 for more details on entering letters, numbers \& symbols.
To change the input mode, press $-[\mathrm{Abc}]$. Press the Navigation Key down to select the group. Press the Navigation Key down to select other options (secret, email).

5 To store the entry, press - [SAVE]. "New contact added!" or "Contact edited!" will be displayed.

## ENTERING LETTERS, NUMBERS \& SYMBOLS

The input mode (Alpha editor) will automatically be activated when necessary to enter letters and numbers. As shown below, there are 4 available modes ; Standard input mode (Abc), T9 input mode (T9Word), Numeric mode (NUM), and Symbol mode (Symbols).
The input mode indicator appears on the upper right of the display when letters and numbers are entered. To select the desired input mode among the 4 modes below, press - [MODE], then enter letters and numbers.

The T9 input mode incorporates a built-in-dictionary to determine a word based on the entered characters. A word can be entered more quickly by pressing a key once per character.

2 Press a digit key once to enter the character you want then enter all the characters to input the word you want.To view the next matching word, press omed.
4 To accept the matching word then enter a space, press $\# \square$.

To enter a compound word:

- Enter the last part of the word then press (\#-0) to enter the word.


To enter "Fun fare" in the T9 input mode.

Ideal for frequently dialed numbers, this feature allows phone book entries to be dialed via the keypad with only one or two key presses. ONE-TOUCH DIALING:

1-9: Press and hold the corresponding memory number for more than 1 second.

## TWO-TOUCH DIALING:

10-20 : Press the first digit and second digits of the memory number short and long respectively.

\section*{ELECTRONIC DEVICES}

Most modem electronic equipment is shielded from RF energy. However certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone.

\section*{PACEMAKERS}

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of six ( \(6^{\prime \prime}\) ) inches be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independen esearch by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research. Persons with pacemakers :
- ALWAYS keep the phone more than six inches from your pacemaker when the phone is tumed on

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. 1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless
phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radiofrequenc energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce
heating ef-fects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological ef-fects. Some studies hav suggested that some biological ef-fects may occur, but such findings have not been confimed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for nt results.
2. What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical de-vices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wire-less phones are shown to emit radiofrequency energy (RF) at a level that is wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recal he phones so that the hazard no longer exists. Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regula-tory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:
Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;

- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible
information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.
FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:
- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health

Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some inter-agency working group activities, as well. FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the
United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones. FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF expo-sures that people get from these base stations phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.
. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?
The term "wireless phone" refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones.

These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radiofrequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decrease rapidly with increasing distance from the source. \section*{4. What are the results of the research done already?}

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radiofrequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of other laboratories. A few animal studies, how-ever, have suggested that low leved of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. Howeve many of the studies that showed increased tumor develop-ment used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-dis-posed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Thre large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neu-
roma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the ed the existence of any harmful health effects from wirele phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

\section*{5. What research is needed to decide whether RF expo-sure from wireles} phones poses a health risk?
A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological stud-ies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological stud-ies can provide data that is directly applicable to human popu-lations, but 10 or more years' follow-up
may be needed to pro-vide answers about some health effects, such as cancer This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a can-cer- causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do -may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiologi-cal studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phenes. Many fac-tors affe this measurem
6. What is FDA doing to
wireless phone RF? investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address impor-tant questions about the effects of exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF). FDA has been a leading participant in the World Heath
Orga-nization Intemational Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research pro grams around the world.

The Project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues. FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications \& Internet Asso-ciation
(CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and De-velopment Agremen (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research and De-velopment Agreement
(CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in govemment, industry, and academic or ganizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through con-tracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broa developments around the world. . How can I find the world

set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electri-cal and Electronic Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless
phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of
wireless phones must report the RF expo-sure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website (http://www.fcc.gov/oet/ffsafety) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your

\section*{8. What has FDA done to measure the radiofrequency en-ergy coming from wireless phones?}

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leader-ship of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, "Recom-mended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques," sets forth the first heads of wireless phone users. The test method uses a tissue-simulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the mea-surement of the amount of energy absorbed in
tissue, either by the whole body or a small part of the body. It is measured in watts \(/ \mathrm{kg}\) (or milliwatts \(/ \mathrm{g}\) ) of matter. This measurement is used to determine whether a wireless phone complies with safety guidelines.

\section*{. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radiofrequency energy} from my wireless phone?
If there is a risk from these products-and at this point we do not know that there
is-it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even is-it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even
potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to
radiofrequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.
- If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since
the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote an-tenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But you are concemed about the RF exposure from these products, you can us measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wire-less phone use.

\section*{What about children using wireless phones?}

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wire-less phone us and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce \(R\) R
exposure. Some groups sponsored by other national govemments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United King-dom distributed leaflets containing such recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that us ing a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their ecommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary

11. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?
Radiofrequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can inter-act with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000 . This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrilators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the
Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engi-neers (IEEE). This standard specifies test nstitute of Electrical and Electronic Engi-neers (IEEE). This standard specifies test
methods and per-formance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that that no interference occurs when a person uses a "com-patible" phone and a "compatible" hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the EEE in 2000. FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for pos-sible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to problem.
