## BATTERY USAGE

## BATTERY INSTALLATION

(1) Place the battery on the back of the handset and slide into place. (2) Push the battery down until it locks into place.


## BATTERY REMOVAL

1 (1) Pull down the release latch, lift up the battery and 2 remove the battery from the handset.


If the battery is not correctly placed in the compartment, the handset will not turn on and/or the battery may detach during use.

## BATTERY USAGE

BATTERY CHARGING POWER CONNECTION

Plug the AC Charger into a standard outlet.
2 Plug the other end of the AC Charger into the bottom of your phone. The battery must be installed onto the phone.


When you charge the battery with the phone power off, you will see a charging status screen. You cannot operate the phone until it is powered on

- The battery is not charged at the time of purchase.
- Fully charge the battery before use.
- It is more efficient to charge the battery with the handset powered off.
- The battery must be connected to the phone in order to charge it
- Battery operating time gradually decreases over time.
- If the battery fails to perform normally, you may need to replace the battery.

## BATTERY HANDLING INFORMATION

DOs

- Only use the battery and charger approved by the manufacturer.
- Only use the battery for its original purpose.
- Try to keep batteries in a temperature between $41^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ ( $5^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ) and $95{ }^{\circ} \mathrm{F}$ ( $35^{\circ} \mathrm{C}$ ).
- If the battery is stored in temperatures above or below the recommended range, give it time to warm up or cool down before using.
- Completely drain the battery before recharging. It may take one to four days to completely drain.
- Store the discharged battery in a cool, dark, and dry place.
- Purchase a new battery when its operating time gradually decreases after fully charging.
- Properly dispose of the battery according to local laws.


## DON'TS

- Don't attempt to disassemble the battery it is a sealed unit with no serviceable parts.
- Don't accidentally short circuit the battery by carrying it in your pocket or purse with other metallic objects such as coins, clips and pens. This may critically damage the battery.
- Don't leave the battery in hot or cold temps. Otherwise, it could significantly reduce the capacity and lifetime of the battery.
- Don't dispose of the battery into a fire.

TURNING THE PHONE ON / OFF

## TURNING THE PHONE ON

Press and hold until your "Power On" logo appears and the tone sounds.
(1) - To select a logo, refer to page 58 for more details. (Settings \& Tools $>$ Displays $>$ Wallpaper) for more detail.

- If "Password" appears on the display enter your 4-digit passwora to unlock your phone.
- The default password is the last 4 digit of your phone number.


## TURNING THE PHONE OFF

1 Press and hold until your "Power Off" logo appears.

- Immediately change or recharge the battery when "LOW BATTERY!! PHONE IS TURNING OFF!" appears on the display. Memory may possibly be damaged if the phone turns off due to the battery completely draining.
- Turn the phone off before removing or replacing the battery If the phone is on, unsaved data may be lost.


## ACCESSING THE MENU

Your phone can be customized via the menu. Each function can be accessed by scrolling with the Navigation Key or by pressing the number that corresponds with the menu item.


1 To access the menu in the idle mode, press ↔ [MENU].

2 Use the Navigation Key to scroll through the menu.

## MAKING A CALL

1 Enter a phone number.To modify the phone number you have entered:

- To erase one digit at a time press ©(an).
- To erase the entire number, press and hold came.

- When you place or receive a call from stored phone numbers, both the name and phone number will be displayed.
- There is another way to make a call through the VR mode, which is called "VAD (Voice Activated Dialing)".

- If "Enter Lock Code" appears on the display enter your 4-digit password to unlock your phone.

3 To end a call, press 6. .

## BASIC FUNCTIONS

## ANSWERING CALLS

1 When your phone rings or vibrates, press 15 to answer the incoming call.
(Depending on your phone's settings, you may also answer incoming calls by opening the phone or by pressing any digit key.)

2 To end a call, press © .

## SPEAKER PHONE

The speaker phone feature lets you hear audio through the speaker and talk without holding the phone.


To activate the speaker phone in idle, answering or calling modes, press and hold cmil).

2 The phone returns to normal (Speaker Phone Off) after ending a call or when the phone is turned off and back on.

## BASIC FUNCTIONS

## WAITTPAUSE FEATURE

Pauses are used for automated systems (i.e., voice mail, calling cards). insert a pause after a phone number then enter another group of numbers. The second set of numbers is dialed automatically after the pause. This feature is useful for dialing into systems that require a code.

1 To insert a wait/pause, enter a phone number then press $\AA$ [OPTIONS]. Select either a Hard Pause ("P" appears) or a Wait ("W" appears).

2 Press $\rightarrow$ to dial or $\because$ to save. Please refer to page 30 for more details about storing a phone number.

## ANSWERING A CALL

1 To answer a call, press any key except © (taniv, foreo.

By pressing © $\odot[$ [MENU] tnen select "Settings \& Tools" menu, press $5 \times$, 18.] , you can select either "Flip Open", "Any Key" or "Send Only" to answer a call. If "Send Only" is selected, the phone can only be answered by pressing $(7)$ See page 71 for more information.To end the call, press 60In Auto Answer Mode a call is automatically answered after a preset number of ring tones. See page 70 for more details.

## BASIC FUNCTIONS

## 3-WAY CALLING

With Three-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be applied for each of the two calls.

1 Enter a number you wish to call then press $(3)$.
2 Once you have established the connection, enter the second number you wish to call then press ( 0 .

3 When you're connected to the second party, press $(6)$ again to begin your three-way call.If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the cal and are the first to hang up, all three callers are disconnected.

## CALLER ID FUNCTION

Identifies caller by displaying their phone number. If the caller's name and number are already stored in your phone book, they both will appear. The caller ID is stored in the call history


## BASIC FUNCTIONS

## CALL WAITING FUNCTION

Notifies you of an incoming call when you are already on a call by sounding a beep tone and displaying the caller's phone number.

1 To answer another call while on the phone, press (?). This places the first call on hold To switch back to the first caller, press (7) again.

Call Waiting is a system dependent feature. Please contact your service provider for details.

## ENTER LOCK MODE

## 1 To lock the phone, press and hold a-0.

To unlock the phone, press $\rightarrow$ or $\uparrow$ [UNLOCK], then input your password, then press © (o) [OK].

## ADJUSTING VOLUME

## Adjusts the volume of the ringer, key beep and speaker

Master Volume : Controls the ringer volume.
Keypad Volume : Controls the keypad volume.
2 Adjust volume then press © [. [OK] to save it.To adjust earpiece volume during a call, press the Navigation Key up or down.

## DURING A CALL

Enables you to send a TXT message (SMS) during a call

To select the phone number in your recent calls List.

## SEND DTMF

Automatically transmits your phone number to a pager during a call. (Dependent on pager service)

## VOICE PRIVACY

Increases security during a call.

## LOCATION

Enables the network to locate your current location through Globa Positioning System (GPS). (Refer to page 66 for more details.)

## MAKING AN EMERGENCY CALL

The 911 feature puts the phone in the Emergency Call Mode when you dial the preprogrammed emergency number, 911. It also operates in the lock mode and out of the service area.

## 911 IN LOCK MODE

The 911 call service is available even in the lock mode.
1 Enter " 911 " then press $\operatorname{G}$.
2 The call connects.
(3) The phone exits the Lock Mode for 5 minutes.

- When the call ends, the phone returns to the Lock Mode.


## 911 USING ANY AVAILABLE SYSTEM

(1) Enter "911" then press $\square$.

2 The call connects.
(3 The phone maintains the Emergency Mode for 5 minutes.

The phone retums to the Lock Mode.
While the phone is in the emergency mode for 5 minutes,
the phone can receive an incoming call from any availabl the phone can receive an incoming call from any available system. However, it can't make a call.The 911 call is not recorded in the recent call list.

## STORING A PHONE NUMBER

2 If "Create New" is selected, the phone number will appear above a list. Press the Navigation Key up or down to choose the type of number you're adding, as indicated by the icon. Press ©® [OK] to select. If "Update Existing" is selected, your contact list is displayed. Choose the entry to add the phone number to, then press © [OK]. You will then see the phone number listed about a list.
Press ©® [OK] to select.

## Enter a name.

## ENTERING LETTERS, NUMBERS \& SYMBOLS

The input mode (Alpha editor) will automatically be activated when necessary to enter letters and numbers. As shown below, there are 4 available modes ; Standard input mode (Abc), T9 input mode (T9Word), Numeric mode (123), and Symbol mode (Symbols).
The input mode indicator appears on the upper right of the display when letters and numbers are entered. To select the desired input mode among the 4 modes below, press $\rightarrow$ [MODE], then enter letters and numbers.


The following illustrates the function assigned to each key in the Alpha Editor.

## T9 INPUT MODE

The T9 input mode incorporates a built-in-dictionary to determine a word based on the entered characters. A word can be entered more quickly by pressing a key once per character.

2 Press a digit key once to enter the character you want then enter all the characters to input the word you want.

## ONE-TOUCH/TWO-TOUCH DIALING

1-9: Press and hold the corresponding memory number for more than 1 second.

## TWO-TOUCH DIALING:

10-22/97-99 : Press the first digit and second digits of the memory number short and long respectively.

## CONTACTS

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. The highes SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.35 W/Kg and when wom on the body, as described in this user guide is \(1.05 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{Kg}\). (Body-worn measurements differ among phone models, depending upon available accessories and FCC requirements). While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.

1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless
phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of radiofrequenc energy (RF) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in the stand-by mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce
health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce
heating ef-fects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological ef-fects. Some studies hav suggested that some biological ef-fects may occur, but such findings have not been confimed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for ent results.
2. What is FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical de-vices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wire-less phones are shown to emit radiofrequency energy (RF) at a level that is wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recal the phones so that the hazard no longer exists. Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regula-tory actions, FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:
Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;

- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible

- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some inter-agency working group activities, as well. FDA shares regulatory responsibitities for wireless phones wit United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. FCC relies on FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones. FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone network rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF expo-sures that people get from these base stations phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.
. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?
The term "wireless phone" refers here to hand-held wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell," "mobile," or "PCS" phones

\section*{FDA CONSUMER UPDATE}

These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable radiofrequency energy (RF) because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head guidelines that were developed with the advice of FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decrease rapidly with increasing distance from the source. \section*{4. What are the results of the research done already?}

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of radiofrequency energy (RF) exposures characteristic of other laboratories A few animal sudies rewurs ane can sugested that low lever of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. Howeve many of the studies that showed increased tumor develop-ment used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-dis-posed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we don't know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of roma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the ed the existence of any harmful health effects from wirele phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

\section*{5. What research is needed to decide whether RF expo-sure from wireles} phones poses a health risk?
A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological stud-ies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect if one exists. Epidemiological stud-ies can provide data that is directly applicable to human popu-lations, but 10 or more years' follow-up
may be needed to pro-vide answers about some health effects, such as cancer This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a can-cer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do -may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiologi-cal studies is hampered by difificulties in measuring this measurement, such as the angle at which the pho is held, or which mode of phone is used.
6. What is FDA doing DA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are codiofrequed to address impor-tant questions about the effects of exposure to Orga-nization Intemational Electromagnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inceptio in 1996. (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in govemment, industry, and academic or ganizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through con-tracts to independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad developments around the world. developments around the world
. How can I find out how much radiofrequency energy exposure I can get by
using my wireless phone? All phones sold in the United
Commission (FCC) guidelines that tites must comply with Federal Communications stablished these guidelines in consultation with and safety agencies. The FCC limit for RF exposure from wire less telephones is set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram ( \(1.6 \mathrm{~W} / \mathrm{kg}\) ). The CC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electri-cal and Electronic Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless
phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of wireless phones must report the RF expo-sure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website (http://www.fcc.gov/oet//fsafety) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your
phone's RF exposure level in the online listing.

\section*{8. What has FDA done to measure the radiofrequency en-ergy coming from} wireless phones?
The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leader-ship of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, "Recom-mended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques," sets forth the first heads of wireless phone users. The test method uses a tissue-simulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the mea-surement of the amount of energy absorbed in watts/kg (or milliwatts/g) of matter. This measurement is used to determin whether a wireless phone complies with safety guidelines.
9. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to radiofrequency energy from my wireless phone?
If there is a risk from these products-and at this point we do not know that there is-it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to
adiofrequency energy (RF). Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure.
- If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you
could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since
the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote an-tenna.

Again, the scientific data do not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. Bu you are concemed about the RF exposure from these products, you can us measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wire-less phone use.

\section*{What about children using wireless phones?}

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to radiofrequency energy (RF), the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wire-less phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF
exposure. Some groups sponsored by other national govemments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United King-dom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that us ing a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their ecommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary It was not based on scientific evi-dence that any health hazard exists.
11.What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radiofrequency energy (RF) from wireless phones can inter-act with some electronic devices. For this reason, FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure electromagnetic interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrilators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000 . This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI. FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the
institute of Electrical and Electronic Engi-neers (IEEE). This standard specifies test nstitute of Electrical and Electronic Engi-neers (IEEE). This standard specifies tes that that no interference occurs when a person uses a "com-patible" phone and a compatible" hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the EEE in 2000. FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for pos-sible occur, FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.
