



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

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#### 1.1 INTRODUCTION

The measurement procedure described in American National Standard for Methods of Measurement of Radio-Noise Emissions from Low-Voltage Electrical and Electronic Equipment in the Range of 9kHz to 40GHz (ANSI C63.4-1992) was used in determining radiated and conducted emissions emanating from PHILIPS (Model: *TSU7000*) RF Transmitter Remote Control FCC ID: PT5TSU7000.

These measurement tests were conducted at *PCTEST Engineering Laboratory, Inc.* facility in New Concept Business Park, Guilford Industrial Park, Columbia, Maryland. The site address is 6660-B Dobbin Road, Columbia, MD 21045. The test site is one of the highest points in the Columbia area with an elevation of 390 feet above mean sea level. The site coordinates are 39° 11'15" N latitude and 76° 49'38" W longitude. The facility is 1.5 miles North of the FCC laboratory, and the ambient signal and ambient signal strength are approximately equal to those of the FCC laboratory. There are no FM or TV transmitters within 15 miles of the site. The detailed description of the measurement facility was found to be in compliance with the requirements of § 2.948 according to ANSI C63.4 on October 19, 1992.

# 1.2 PCTEST Location




Figure 1. Map of the Greater Baltimore and Metropolitan Washington, D.C. area.

The map at right shows the location of the PCTEST Lab, its proximity to the FCC Lab, the Columbia vicinity area, the Baltimore-Washington International (BWI) airport, and the city of Baltimore, and the Washington, D.C. area. (see Figure 1).




Figure 1. Shielded Enclosure




Figure 2. Line Conducted




Figure 3. Wooden Table &




Figure 4. LISN Schematic Diagram

#### 3.2 Conducted Emissions (n/a - powered by batteries)




Figure 5. 3-Meter Test Site

The line-conducted facility is located inside a 16'x20'x10' shielded enclosure. It is manufactured by Ray Proof Series 81 (see Figure 2). The shielding effectiveness of the shielded room is in accordance with MIL-Std-285 or NSA 65-6. A 1m. x 1.5m. wooden table 80cm. high is placed 40cm. away from the vertical wall and 1.5m away from the side wall of the shielded room (see Figure 3). Solar Electronics and EMCO Model 3725/2 (10kHz-30MHz)  $50\Omega/50\mu H$  Line-Impedance Stabilization Networks (LISNs) are bonded to the shielded room (see Figure 4). The EUT is powered from the Solar LISN and the support equipment is powered from the EMCO LISN. Power to the LISNs are filtered by a high-current high-insertion loss Ray Proof power line filters (100dB 14kHz-10GHz). The purpose of the filter is to attenuate ambient signal interference and this filter is also bonded to the shielded enclosure. All electrical cables are shielded by braided tinned copper zipper tubing with inner diameter of 1/2". If the EUT is a DC-powered device, power will be derived from the source power supply it normally will be powered from and this supply lines will be connected to the Solar LISN. LISN schematic diagram is shown in Figure 5. All interconnecting cables more than 1 meter were shortened by noninductive bundling (serpentine fashion) to a 1-meter length. Sufficient time for the EUT, support equipment, and test equipment was allowed in order for them to warm up to their normal operating condition. The RF output of the LISN was connected to the spectrum analyzer to determine the frequency producing the maximum EME from the EUT. The spectrum was scanned from 450kHz to 30MHz with 20 msec. sweep time. The frequency producing the maximum level was reexamined using EMI/ Field Intensity Meter and Quasi-Peak adapter. The detector function was set to CISPR quasi-peak mode. bandwidth of the receiver was set to 10 kHz. The EUT, support equipment, and interconnecting cables were arranged manipulated to maximize each EME emission. Each emission was maximized by: switching power lines; varying the mode of operation or resolution; clock or data exchange speed; scrolling H pattern to the EUT and/or support equipment, and powering the monitor from the floor mounted outlet box and the computer aux AC outlet, if applicable: whichever determined the worst-case Photographs of the worst-case emission can be seen in Appendix C. Each EME reported was calibrated using the HP8640B signal generator.




Figure 6. Dimensions of Outdoor Test Site




Figure 7. Turntable and System Setup




Figure 8. Normalized Site Attenuation Curves (H&V)

### 3.3 Radiated Emissions

Preliminary measurements were made indoors at 1 meter using broadband antennas, broadband amplifier, and spectrum analyzer to determine the frequency producing the maximum EME. Appropriate precaution was taken to ensure that all EME from the EUT were maximized and investigated. The system configuration, clock speed, mode of operation or video resolution, turntable azimuth with respect to the antenna were noted for each frequency found. The spectrum was scanned from 30 to 200 MHz using biconical antenna and from 200 to 1000 MHz using log-spiral antenna. Above 1 GHz, linearly polarized double ridge horn antennas were used.

Final measurements were made outdoors at 3-meter test range using Roberts™ Dipole antennas or horn antenna (see Figure 6). The test equipment was placed on a wooden and plastic bench situated on a 1.5 x 2 meter area adjacent to the measurement area (see Figure 7). Sufficient time for the EUT, support equipment, and test equipment was allowed in order for them to warm up to their normal operating condition. Each frequency found during pre-scan measurements was re-examined and investigated using EMI/Field Intensity Meter and Quasi-Peak Adapter. The detector function was set to CISPR quasi-peak mode and the bandwidth of the receiver was set to 100kHz or 1 MHz depending on the frequency or type of signal.

The half-wave dipole antenna was tuned to the frequency found during preliminary radiated measurements. The EUT, support equipment and interconnecting cables were re-configured to the set-up producing the maximum emission for the frequency and were placed on top of a 0.8meter high non-metallic 1 x 1.5 meter table (see Figure 8). The EUT, support equipment, and interconnecting cables were re-arranged and manipulated to maximize each EME emission. The turntable containing the system was rotated; the antenna height was varied 1 to 4 meters and stopped at the azimuth or height producing the maximum emission. Each emission was maximized by: varying the mode of operation or resolution; clock or data exchange speed; scrolling H pattern to the EUT and/or support equipment; powering the monitor from the floor mounted outlet box and the computer aux AC outlet if applicable, and changing the polarity of the antenna; whichever determined the worst-case emission. Photographs of the worst-case emission can be seen in Attachment H. Each EME reported was calibrated using the HP8640B signal generator. The Theoretical Normalized Site Attenuation Curves for both horizontal and vertical polarization are shown in Figure 9 according to ANSI C63.4.

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## 4.1 §15.203 Antenna Requirement

An intentional radiator antenna shall be designed to ensure that no antenna other than that furnished by the applicant can be used with the device. The use of permanently attached antenna or of an antenna that uses a unique coupling to the intentional radiator shall be considered sufficient to comply with this requirement.

#### CONCLUSION

The PHILIPS RF Transmitter Remote Control complies with the requirement of §15.203 with a built-in looped antenna permanently attached to the transmitter.

### 5.1 Occupied Bandwidth Measurement

The bandwidth of the emission shall be no wider than 0.25% of the center frequency for devices operating above 70MHz and below 900MHz. The bandwidth is determined at the points 20 dB down from the modulated carrier.

A sample transmitter output was fed into the R&S Spectrum Analyzer and was plotted.

The bandwidth at 20 dB is 560 kHz, which is within the allowable limit of 1052 kHz at 418 MHz.




Figure 10. Spurious Radiated Limits at 3 meters




Figure 10. Spurious Radiated Limits at 3 meters
