The mobile phone described in this guide is approved for use on the GSM and GPRS networks operating on the GSM 900, 1800 (DCS/PCN) and 1900 (PCS) bands. It is approved for use in the country where it was originally sold and may be approved for use in other countries.

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Export Information

The mobile phone may be subject to export regulation of the United States and other countries. Diversion contrary to law is prohibited. Network Services

A number of features included in this guide are called Network Services. They are special services provided by wireless service providers. Standby and Talk Time Information

The mobile phone incorporates features that are new to the mobile phone world. These may include color displays and lighting, graphic games, music reproduction and browsing the Internet. The way you use the display and the features will affect the performance of the battery and how long it lasts between charge cycles. The quoted standby times and talk times show the minimum and maximum per-

formance that can be expected from the battery under normal network conditions and with the default settings as set by the factory. However, playing games (particularly with the backlight continuously switched on) and listening to music will shorten the time available for standby and to make and receive telephone calls. Operation times also vary depending on network conditions, SIM settings, charging and battery condition, how you use your phone and other factors.

Memory

The mobile phone contains an internal memory device that stores the software required to operate the mobile phone, communicate with the GSM/GPRS network and provide the user interface. Some features in the internal memory run additional devices and some additional games and utilities. The amount of memory available in the mobile phone is finite and may be insufficient to store large numbers of applications and files.

Warning!

Remember to back up your data and to do so frequently. Always back up all data and programs before sending the mobile phone in for repair.

Safety precautions

Information for parents

Please read the operating instructions and safety precautions carefully before use.

Explain the content and the hazards associated with using the phone to your children.



Remember to comply with legal requirements and local restrictions when using the phone. For example in aeroplanes, petrol stations, hospitals or while driving.



Cellular phones can interfere with the functioning of medical devices such as hearing aids or pacemakers. Keep at least 9 inches (20 cm) between phone and pacemaker. When using the cell phone hold it to the ear which is farthest from the pacemaker. For more information consult your doctor.



The ringtone, info tones and speakerphone talking are reproduced through the loudspeaker. Do not hold the phone to your ear when it rings or when you have switched on the speakerphone function. Otherwise you risk serious, permanent damage to your hearing.

Antenna care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

Phone operation

Normal position

Hold the phone as you would any other telephone with the antenna pointed up and over your shoulder.

Tips on efficient operation

For your phone to operate most efficiently:

- Extend your antenna fully (if applicable).
- Do not touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use. Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

Drivina

Laws pertaining to the use of mobile phones while driving vary significantly from state to state and sometimes even from locality to locality within states. For example, some areas may allow persons to use their mobile phones only if they employ a hands-free device, and some areas may prohibit the use of cell phones entirely. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers

- should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON;
- should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference;
- should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

Hearing aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider or your hearing aid manufacturer to discuss alternatives.

Other medical devices

If you use any other personal medical devices, consult the manufacturers of your devices to determine if they are adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Turn your phone OFF in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may be using equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

This phone, like any wireless phone, operates using radio signals, wireless and landline networks, and user-programmed functions. Because of this, connections in all conditions cannot be guaranteed. Therefore, you should never rely solely on any wireless phone for essential communications (for example, medical emergencies). Remember - to make or receive any calls, the phone must be switched on and be used in a service area that has adequate signal strength. Emergency calls might not be possible on all wireless phone networks or when certain network services or phone features are in use. Check with local service providers regarding their network features.

Always make certain that your phone is properly charged before attempting any emergency calls. If you allow your battery to discharge, you will be unable to receive or make calls, including emergency calls. You must then wait a few minutes after the charging begins to place any emergency calls.

When making an emergency call, remember to give all of the necessary information as accurately as possible. Remember that your wireless phone might be the only means of communication at the scene of an accident, therefore you should not terminate the call until given permission to do so.


Getting started Using the SIM card/battery

Your phone's display is delivered with a protective film. Remove this film before getting started. The service provider supplies you with a SIM card on which all the important data for your account is stored. If the SIM card is credit card-sized, snap out the smaller segment and trim any rough edges.

Press depression 1 to remove the cover downwards in the direction of the arrow 2.



Insert SIM card ③ and push it fully into the locating slot (make sure the angled corner is in the correct position ④).



To remove the SIM card push the card here ⑤.

Insert the battery sideways into the phone ⑥, then press downwards ⑦ until it engages.



To remove, press the retaining tab (8) then lift the battery out.

Place cover on phone and push to the upper edge, until it clicks into place **③**.



Always switch off phone before removing the battery!

Only 3-V and 1.8-V SIM cards are supported. Please contact your service provider if you have an older card.

Charge battery

The battery is not fully charged when delivered. Plug charger cable into the bottom of the phone, plug power supply unit into a mains power socket and charge for at least **two hours**. The power supply unit heats up when used for long periods. This is normal and not dangerous.



When charging is in progress ➡■ is displayed.

Charging time

An empty battery is fully charged after about 2 hours. Charging is only possible within a temperature range of +5°C to +40°C (41°F to 104°F). If the temperature rises/falls 5°C (9°F) above/below this, the charge symbol flashes a warning. The mains voltage specified on the power supply unit must not be exceeded (Operating time, p. 40).

Charge icon not visible

If the battery has been discharged fully the charge icon is not immediately visible when the power supply unit is plugged in. It will appear after up to two hours. In this case the battery is fully charged after 3-4 hours.

Only use the power supply unit provided! Display while in service

A beep sounds when the battery is nearly empty. The charge level of the battery is only displayed correctly after an uninterrupted charging/discharging cycle. You should therefore not remove the battery unnecessarily and where possible not terminate the charging process early.

Switch on/off, PIN

Switch on/off

Press and **hold** the On/Off/End key **1** to switch on or off.

Enter PIN

The SIM card can be protected with a 4- to 8-digit PIN.

Enter the PIN using the number keys. The characters **** appear to ensure nobody can read your PIN on the display. Correct errors with Clean.

Confirm your input with OK. Logging on to the network will take a few seconds.

Emergency number (SOS)

Only to be used in real emergencies!

By pressing the soft key SOS you can make an emergency call on any network without a SIM card and without entering a PIN (not available in all countries).

Switching on your phone for the first time

Time/date

Set the clock to the right time once at start-up.

Press Yes. First enter the date (day/month/year), then the time (24 hours, including seconds). Press OK. The time and date are updated.

If the battery is removed for longer than 30 seconds, the clock will be reset.

Time zones

Set the time zone for your area.

Select the required time zone from list with . Apply with Set.

Phonebook or Addressbook

You can choose whether you want to use the **Phonebook** on the SIM card or the internal **Addressbook** as standard.

You can copy the SIM card Phonebook to the Addressbook on the phone. Please do not interrupt this procedure. During this time do not accept incoming calls. Follow instructions in the display.

To copy data on the SIM card at a later time, highlight entries (see p. 15) and copy these with the function Copy into (Phonebook options menu).

You can change the default book at any time (p. 19).

Without SIM card

If you switch on the phone without a SIM card you can still use some phone functions.

Press Menu. The functions are displayed (e.g. Emergency, SOS).

Menu control

The steps needed to reach a function are shown in a **condensed form** in this user guide.

E.g. to display call list for missed calls:

Press Menu → \$□.

→ Calls missed

This comprises the following steps:

Open main menu, select . , then select the function Calls missed. You have to confirm with Select.

Standby mode

Very often function descriptions begin in standby mode.

The phone is in **standby mode** and is **ready for use** when the name of the service provider appears on the display.

Press and **hold** the On/Off/End key **t** to return to standby mode from any situation.

Security

Menu → < → Security Select function.

The phone and SIM card are protected against misuse by several security codes.

Keep these confidential numbers in a safe place where you can access them again if required.

Codes

PIN control

You can stop the PIN prompt being activated when the phone is switched on, but you then risk unauthorised use of the phone.

Press Change. Enter PIN and confirm with OK.

Change PIN

You can change the PIN to any 4- to 8-digit number you find easier to remember. Enter current PIN and confirm with OK. Enter new PIN twice and confirm each time with OK.

Change PIN2

(Display only if PIN2 is available). Proceed as with Change PIN.

Change phonecode

You define the phone code (4–8 digits) when you call up a protected function for the first time. It is then valid for all phonecode protected functions. If the wrong code is entered three times then the phone will be locked. Contact Siemens Customer Care for instructions on how to unlock your pone.

Calling

Clear SIM card barring

If the PIN is entered incorrectly three times, the SIM card is barred. Enter the PUK (MASTER PIN), provided by your service provider with the SIM card, according to instructions. If the PUK (MASTER PIN) has been lost, please contact your service provider.

Preventing accidental activation

Even if PIN control is deactivated confirmation is required to switch on the phone.

This prevents the phone from being switched on accidentally, e. g. when carried in a pocket or whilst you are on an aircraft.

Press and **hold** the On/Off/End key and confirm with **OK**. The phone switches on.

Calling

Dialling with number keys

The phone must be switched on (standby mode). Dial number (always with area code, if necessary with international dialling code). To dial international dialling code press and hold 0 until a "+" is displayed. Press Country and select country.

Short press Clear to clear the last digit, a long press clears the entire phone number. To dial press the Call key ...

End call

Press the End key **n briefly**. Press this key even if the person on the other end of the line has hung up first.

Set volume

Use navigation key ${}^{\textcircled{-}}$ to start adjusting the volume during conversation. Set volume with navigation key ${}^{\textcircled{-}}$.

If a Car Kit is used, its volume setting will not affect the usual setting on the phone.

Redial

To redial numbers that were dialled previously, press the Call Key f once, pick up the required phone number from the list with $(\hat{\gamma})$, then press f again.

If the number is busy

Press Auto dial for automatically dialling the phone number ten times at increasing time intervalls or press Call back (선) for phone ringing when the busy number is free. Press Prompt and a beep reminds you to redial the dispayed phone number after 15 minutes.

Accept call

The phone must be switched on (standby mode). An incoming call will interrupt any other use of the phone. Press Answer or ...

Please make sure you have accepted the call before holding the phone to your ear. This will avoid damage to your hearing from loud ring tones!

A phone number transmitted by the network is displayed or the corresponding name if it is contained in the Phonebook (p. 20) or Addressbook (p. 20). A picture may also appear (settings p. 20).

Reject call

Reject or 🕝 press briefly.

Handsfree

You can put the phone aside during a call. You can then hear the caller via the loudspeaker.

Activate handsfree function with Handsfr. and switch on with Yes.

Adjust the volume with . Pressing Handsfr. switches off "handsfree talking".

Swapping between 2 calls

Make a new connection during a call with menu Hold (dial a new phone number). With menu Swap you can swap back and forth between both calls.

If you are called during a phone call and you can hear the "call waiting tone" (p. 28), you can accept the waiting call with Swap ,putting the current call on hold to do so.

Swap back and forth between the calls see above or end the current call with and accept the new call with Answer.

Conference

Call up to 5 parties and link them together in a conference call. Make a new connection during a call with / menu -> Hold (dial a new phone number). The current call is set on hold. With / menu Conference you can join the held call

when the connection is established. Repeat this procedure until all participants are linked together.

All calls in the conference are ended simultaneously when the End key 🛜 is pressed.

Direct call

If this is active, only one number can be dialled.

Menu →
Negret → Security → Direct call Press () and enter phone code. The

phone code (4- to 8-digits) is set by you and entered at the first security setting. Please note this code down (see also p. 15)! Confirm code input with OK. Press. Change and enter number (press □→ to select phone number from the Adressbook p. 20 or Phonebook p. 20). Confirm "On" with OK.

To dial, press and **hold** the right soft key. To switch direct call off, press and hold #. Enter phone code and confirm with OK. Press Change and Confirm Off with OK.

Text entry

Text entry without T9

Press number key repeatedly until the required letter appears. After a brief interval the cursor will advance. Example:

- Press once briefly to type the letter a, twice to type b, etc. Press and hold to write the number.
- Ä. ä. 1-9 Umlauts and numbers are displayed after the relevant letters.
- Clear Press briefly to delete the letter before the cursor, press and hold to erase the whole word.



Your cellular phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed to meet the requirements for exposure to radio waves established by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC, USA) and by Health Canada. These requirements include safety margins designed to assure the protection of all persons, regardless of age and health. They use a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate (SAR). The SAR limit is 1.6 W/kg averaged over one gram of tissue.

U.S. FDA

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's (FDA) Center for Devices and Radiological Health Consumer Update on Mobile **Phones**

FDA has been receiving inquiries about the safety of mobile phones, including cellular phones and PCS phones. The following summarizes what is know – and what remains unknown - about whether these products can pose a hazard to health, and what can be done to minimize any potential risk. This information may be used to respond to questions.

Why the concern?

Mobile phones emit low levels of radio frequency energy (i.e., radio frequency radiation) in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of radio frequency energy (RF), considered non-significant, when in the standby mode. It is well known that high levels of RF can produce biological damage through heating effects (this is how your microwave oven is able to cook food). However, it is not known whether, to what extent, or through what mechanism, lower levels of RF might cause adverse health effects as well. Although some research has been done to address these questions, no clear picture of the biological effects of this type of radiation has emerged to date. Thus, the available science does not allow us to conclude that mobile phones are absolutely safe, or that they are unsafe. However, the available scientific evidence does not demonstrate adverse health effects associated with the use of mobile phones.

What kinds of phones are in question?

Ouestions have been raised about handheld mobile phones, the kind that have a built-in antenna that is positioned close to the user's head during normal telephone conversation. These types of mobile phones are of concern because of the short distance between the phone's antenna – the primary source of the RF – and the person's head. The exposure to RF from mobile phones in which the antenna is located at greater distances from the user (on the outside of a car, for example) is drastically lower than that from hand-held phones, because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with distance from the source. The safety of so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house and which operate at far lower power levels and frequencies, has not been auestioned.

How much evidence is there that hand-held mobile phones might be harmful?

Briefly, there is not enough evidence to know for sure, either way; however, research efforts are on-going. The existing scientific evidence is conflicting and many of the studies that have been done to date have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of RF exposures characteristic of mobile phones have yielded conflicting results. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. In one study, mice genetically altered to be predisposed to developing one type of cancer developed more than twice as many such cancers when they were exposed to RF energy compared to controls. There is much uncertainty among scientists about whether results obtained from animal studies apply to the use of mobile phones. First, it is uncertain how to apply the results obtained in rats and mice to humans. Second, many of the studies showed increased tumor

development used animals that had already been treated with cancer-causing chemicals, and other studies exposed the animals to the RF virtually continuously – up to 22 hours per day.

For the past five years in the United States, the mobile phone industry has supported research into the safety of mobile phones. This research has resulted in two findings in particular that merit additional study:

1. In a hospital-based, case-control study, researchers looked for an association between mobile phone use and either glioma (a type of brain cancer) or acoustic neuroma (a benign tumor of the nerve sheath). No statistically significant association was found between mobile phone use and acoustic neuroma. There was also no association between mobile phone use and gliomas when all types of gliomas were considered together. It should be noted that the average length of mobile phone exposure in this study was less than three years.

When 20 types of glioma were considered separately, however, an association was found between mobile phone use and one rare type of glioma, neuroepithelliomatous tumors. It is possible with multiple comparisons of the same sample that this association occurred by chance. Moreover, the risk did not increase with how often the mobile phone was used, or the length of the calls. In fact, the risk actually decreased with cumulative hours of mobile phone use. Most cancer causing agents increase risk with increased exposure. An ongoing study of brain cancers by the National Cancer Institute is expected to bear on the accuracy and repeatability of these results.1

Researchers conducted a large battery of laboratory tests to assess the effects of exposure to mobile phone RF on genetic material. These included tests for several kinds of abnormalities, including mutations, chromosomal aberrations, DNA strand breaks, and structural changes in the genetic material of blood cells called lymphocytes. None of the tests showed any effect of the RF except for the micronucleus assay, which detects structural effects on the genetic material. The cells in this assay showed changes after exposure to simulated cell phone radiation, but only after 24 hours of exposure. It is possible that exposing the test cells to radiation for this long resulted in heating. Since this assay is known to be sensitive to heating, heat alone could have caused the abnormalities to occur. The data already in the literature on the response of the micronucleus assay to RF are conflicting. Thus follow-up research is necessary. 2

FDA is currently working with government, industry, and academic groups to ensure the proper follow-up to these industry-funded research findings. Collaboration with the Cellular Telecommunications Industry Association (CTIA) in particular is expected to lead to FDA providing research recommendations and scientific oversight of new CTIA-funded research based on such recommendations.

Two other studies of interest have been reported recently in the literature:

 Two groups of 18 people were exposed to simulated mobile phone signals under laboratory conditions while they performed cognitive function tests.
 There were no changes in the subjects' ability to recall words, numbers, or pictures, or in their spatial memory, but they were able to make choices more quickly in one visual test when they were exposed to simulated mobile phone signals. This was the only change noted among more than 20 variables compared.³ In a study of 209 brain tumor cases and 425 matched controls, there was no increased risk of brain tumors associated with mobile phone use. When tumors did exist in certain locations, however, they were more likely to be on the side of the head where the mobile phone was used. Because this occurred in only a small number of cases, the increased likelihood was too small to be statistically significant.⁴

In summary, we do not have enough information at this point to assure the public that there are, or are not, any low incident health problems associated with use of mobile phones. FDA continues to work with all parties, including other federal agencies and industry, to assure that research is undertaken to provide the necessary answers to the outstanding questions about the safety of mobile phones.

What is known about cases of human cancer that have been reported in users of hand-held mobile phones?

Some people who have used mobile phones have been diagnosed with brain cancer. But it is important to understand that this type of cancer also occurs among people who have not used mobile phones. In fact, brain cancer occurs in the U.S. population at a rate of about 6 new cases per 100,000 people each year. At that rate, assuming 80 million users of mobile phones (a number increasing at a rate of about 1 million per month), about 4800 cases of brain cancer would be expected each year among those 80 million people, whether or not they used their phones. Thus it is not possible to tell whether any individual's cancer arose because of the phone, or whether it would have happened anyway. A key question is whether the risk of getting a particular form of cancer is greater among people who use mobile phones than among the rest of the population. One way to answer that question is to compare the usage of mobile phones among people with brain cancer with the use of mobile

phones among appropriately matched people without brain cancer. This is called a case-control study. The current case-control study of brain cancers by the National Cancer Institute, as well as the follow-up research to be sponsored by industry, will begin to generate this type of information.

What is FDA's role concerning the safety of mobile phones?

Under the law, FDA does not review the safety of radiation emitting consumer products such as mobile phones before marketing, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if mobile phones are shown to emit radiation at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, FDA could require the manufacturers of mobile phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists.

Although the existing scientific data do not justify FDA regulatory actions at this time, FDA has urged the mobile phone industry to take a number of steps to assure public safety. The agency has recommended that the industry:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by mobile phones;
- Design mobile phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing mobile phone users with the best possible information on what is known about possible effects of mobile phone use on human health.

At the same time, FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of mobile phone safety to

ensure a coordinated effort at the federal level. These agencies are:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- · Environmental Protection Agency
- Federal Communications Commission
 Occupational Health and Safety Admin-
- istration

 National Telecommunications and In-
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health also participates in this group.

In the absence of conclusive information about any possible risk, what can concerned individuals do?

If there is a risk from these products – and at this point we do not know that there is – it is probably very small. But if people are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, there are simple steps they can take to do so. For example, time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives. Those persons who spend long periods of time on their hand-held mobile phones could consider holding lengthy conversations on conventional phones and reserving the hand-held models for shorter conversations or for situations when other types of phones are not available.

People who must conduct extended conversations in their cars every day could switch to a type of mobile phone that places more distance between their bodies and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, they could switch to:

Your Siemens wireless phone gives you the power to communicate by voice – almost anywhere, anytime. But an important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When driving a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

Get to know your phone and its features such as speed dial and redial.

Carefully read your instruction manual and learn to take advantage of valuable features most phones offer including, automatic redial and memory dial – most phones can store up to 99 numbers in memory dial. Also, work to memorize the phone keypad so you can use the speed dial function without taking your attention off the road.

Whenavailable, useahands-freedevice.

A number of hands-free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed mounted device for your phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if they are available to you.

Position your phone within easy reach.

Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can grab it without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, let your voicemail answer it for you.

Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations.

Let the person you are speaking to know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.

Do not take notes or look up phone numbers while driving.

If you are reading an address book or business card while driving a car, or writing a "to do" list, then you are not watching where you are going. It's common sense. Don't get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.

Dial sensibly and assess the traffic.

If possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip, or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped at a stop sign, red light or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip – dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.

Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting.

Stressful or emotional conversations and driving do not mix – they are distracting and even dangerous when you are behind the wheel. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and if necessary, suspend phone conversations that have the potential to divert your attention from the road.

Use your phone to call for help.

Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools you can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations – with your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 9-1-1 in the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard, or medical emergency. Remember, it is a free call on your wireless phone.

Call roadside assistance or a special wireless non-emergency assistance number when necessary.

Certain situations you encounter while driving may require attention, but are not urgent enough to merit a call to 9-1-1. But you can still use your wireless phone to lend a hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured, or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless numbers.
