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### Safety and Use .....

We recommend that you read this chapter carefully before using your phone. The manufacturer disclaims any liability for damage, which may result as a consequence of improper use or use contrary to the instructions contained in this manual.

#### • TRAFFIC SAFETY:

Given that studies, which show that using a cellphone while driving a vehicle constitutes a real risk, even when the hands-free kit is used (headset...), drivers are requested to refrain from using their cellphone when the vehicle is not parked

When switched on, your cellphone emits electromagnetic waves that can interfere with the vehicle's electronic systems such as ABS anti-lock brakes or airbags. To ensure that there is no problem:

- do not place your phone on top of the dashboard or within an airbag deployment area.

- check with your dealer or car manufacturer to make sure that the car's electronics devices are well shielded.

#### CONDITIONS OF USE:

Your are advised to switch off your cellphone from time to time to optmise performance. Switch the phone off before boarding an aircraft to avoid prosecution.

Switch the phone off when you are in health care facilities, except in designated areas. As with many other types of equipment now in regular use, cellphones can interfere with other electrical or electronic devices, or equipment using radio frequency.

Switch the phone off when you are near gas or flammable liquids. Strictly obey all signs and instructions posted in a fuel depot, gas station, or chemical plant, or in any potentially explosive atmosphere.

Your cellphone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio-frequency (RF) energy. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. These guidelines include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health. The exposure standard for cellphones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by public authorities such as the Federal Communications Commission of the US Government (FCC) or by Industry Canada, is 1.6 W/kg averaged over 1 gram of body tissue. 



#### 2. Set-up







#### Charging the battery

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### 2.2 Switching your telephone ON

Hold down the  $_{0}$  key. A welcome animation is displayed for 2 seconds. Type your PIN code if necessary, then confirm with the left softkey.

### 2.3 Switching your telephone OFF

From the main screen, press the  $^{3}$  key (long keypress).

## Calls .....

### 3.1 Making a call

From the main screen, enter the phone number using the keypad.

Press  $\left[ \text{ to dial and } \right]^3$  or the right softkey to hang up.

To call a recently dialed/answered number, from the main screen, press ( to view numbers in "incoming call", "outgoing call" and "missed call" lists. Scroll and select the desired number or name and press ( to send the call.

#### Making an international call

Hold down the  $\bullet$ +\* key. When "+" is displayed, enter the country and area codes, then complete the number and send the call.

Calling a number from the directory

Press  $\checkmark$  in idle mode to access the directory. Select the desired phone number and press [.

In the product directory, for all contacts with more than one number, only the default number will be selected for the contact. To select a different number, press  $\forall$  or  $\blacktriangle$ .

#### **3.2** Receiving a call

- To pick up a call, press the [ key.
- To reject a call, press the <sup>3</sup> key.
- To mute a ringing tone instead of answering a call, press "Mute".
- To answer a new call during a call when the "Call Waiting" function is activated, press [. The first call is put on hold. To end the active call, press ].

If you have activated "**Call forward**", the call is diverted to a number or voicemail.

If you have selected "**Any Key Answer**", you can accept a call by pressing any key (except 3).

#### 3.3 Call handsfree

Dial the desired number then press **OK** or **"Options**", then press **"Activate h/free**", finally press **OK** or **"Select**".

If you are already on the phone, hold down the [ key to switch to handfree mode and back.

#### **3.4** Available options during the call

You can press "Options" or the OK key for some of the following functions in a call : "Activate h/free", "Record dialog", "Call list", "Directory list", etc.

Activate h/free• Use hands-free option.Mute/Unmute• Activate/deactivate the microphone.Record dialog• Record a conversation during a call.

You can adjust the sound level during a call pressing the  $\triangledown$  or navigation key.

#### **3.5** Record dialogue

To record a conversation during a call, select "**Record dialog**" and press OK. Press OK again or the left softkey to save and end recording. If you select "**Mute**" and then "**Record dialog**", only the caller's voice is recorded.

#### 3.6 Handing multiple calls (1)

#### 3.6.1 Making a second call

You can make a second call during an active call or with a call on hold.

When first call is put on and the second number is dialed, you can press **OK** to access following options:

- Switch calls

   To toggle between calls (you can also press ▼ or ▲ to switch calls).
- **Do you want to** To connect two calls. You are disconnected forward a call? when the transfer is completed.

**Conference** • To introduce the caller into a conference call.

#### 3.6.2 Answering a second call

When you receive a second call while being already in communication, the phone emits a beep alert and the screen displays "**Call waiting**". You can then press  $\begin{bmatrix} & to & answer & the call (the first one is put on hold), press & \end{bmatrix}$  to reject the call and press OK or the left softkey to open the options list.

If you select "Accept call", you'll answer the incoming call, or "End call" to end the current call, then answer the incoming call.



This service is limited to two current communications (one active and the other on hold).

#### 3.6.3 Answering a third call

If you are in a call and have one call on hold, you can also receive a third call. To do so, you must either end one of the calls or introduce the new caller to a conference.

Press  $^{3}$  to reject the call or press  $\bigcirc K$  or the left softkey to open the options list.

You can select **"Accept call**" to answer the incoming call, or **"End call**" to end the current call, then answer the incoming call. This service is limited to two current communications (one active and one on hold).

#### 3.6.4 Multi-party call

It allows you to speak with up to five people at the same time.

Make a first call with someone, then a second one.

Press **OK** or the left softkey, select "**Conference**" in option list. Repeat the process until five members are connected.

Select "**Remove party**" to disconnect a member of the conference, or select "**Private call**" to have a private call with someone only (other members are put on hold).

Press 3 to disconnect all calls at once.

If there is an incoming call during the conference call with less than five members, you can accept this new call and add it to the conference. If five members are already connected, you can answer the call, but not add it to the conference.

#### 5. Calculator

You can use this built-in calculator to perform basic calculations. Numbers are entered with the keypad and operators with the navigation keys indicated on the screen. Press and hold  $\bigcirc$ , to get the decimal point. Confirm with  $\bigcirc$ K or  $\#_{-0}$ .

#### 5.2 Money converter

You can convert a sum from one currency into another using the exchange rate of your choice.

#### 5.3 Organizer <sup>(1)</sup>

You can create, store and manage events in your organizer. When the organizer alert is "On", a beep or a sound recorded alerts you when an event is due.

The organizer shares the mobile memory capacity with other features (directory, picture album, sound, etc.). Please check the memory available in your phone.

#### 5.3.1 Creating a new event

Choose "**<New>**" in "**Events**", then the type of event to create (Meeting, To Do, Holiday).

Enter time, starting/ending date of the event and name it.

Set a reminder and a frequency: alerts will be triggered at the chosen time.



Change

Reminder only applies to Meeting and To Do events. It will be updated when changing time zones.

#### 5.3.2 Deleting old events

You can delete past events. Enter the starting date and press **OK** twice to delete all events preceding this date.

To delete all events set in your organizer, enter a starting date several years ahead (e.g. 31st of December 2010) to make sure all events preceding this date are deleted at once.

#### 5.3.3 Managing events

Select an event in the list and press  $\bigcirc K$  or the left softkey to access following options:

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#### 5.3.4 Events views

Events stored in your organizer can be displayed in "Day view", "Week view" and "Month view". Select a view format and press the left softkey, then use  $\checkmark$  or  $\blacktriangle$  to display the previous or next day, week or month.

#### 5.4 World time

You can set and display both the local clock and remote clock in the foreign time zone of your choice.

Once you choose to display the local and foreign clock on your main screen, the image you selected as wallpaper will no longer be displayed there, but will be replaced with the standard International clock wallpaper.

#### 5.4.1 World time

Press  $\triangledown$  or  $\blacktriangle$  to set the option "**On**" or "**Off**". When "**On**", you can display the zone of your choice.

#### 5.5 Voice recording

You can make recordings of up to 12 minutes in length, depending on the memory status.

Select "**New>**" to begin the recording. When finished, press the left softkey to stop and save recording. You can then either enter a name for the new sound file or accept the default name proposed by pressing OK.

Once a sound file is selected, it is played automatically in a loop. Press OK to access the options. You can "Play recording", "Rename" or "Delete", "As ringtone" or "As SMS/MMS ringer".

A flashing warning sign indicates that your recording will soon reach the maximum authorized length. If you do not stop recording, a red envelope icon informs you that your recording is too long to be sent via MMS.

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#### Alarm clock 5.6

Your mobile phone has a built-in alarm clock with a snooze feature. You can set up to three separate alarms and choose whether or not the alarm should repeat.

When the alarm rings, press any key to stop it (except if the snooze mode is on).

#### Snooze

You can set the snooze mode "On" or "Off".

When the alarm rings and the snooze mode is "On":

- Press any key (except the right softkey) to stop the ringing temporarily. The alarm will ring again around 7 minutes later.
- · Press the right softkey to stop the ringing and the alarm repetition.

The snooze mode is automatically deactivated after 9 alarm repetitions.

#### 5.7 Auto Switch On/Off

You can set your mobile phone to switch itself on or off at pre-set times. It'll extend your phone's battery life, let you not be disturbed at given times and have your phone switch back on automatically.

8.4.1 Select Profile

Select one of the available profiles, then define the connection settings for each of them.

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#### 8.4.2 Browser options

Activate or deactivate the downloading of images attached to WAP pages. Selecting "**Off**" will speed up the global down loading time of the pages browsed.

You can create, send, receive, view, edit, and organize SMS, MMS and email messages. You can also receive data, service messages and broadcast messages <sup>(1)</sup>.

#### 9. Create message

#### 9.1.1 New Email

You can send emails to one or several recipients at a time, including with an attachment such as a JPEG picture.

<Add contacts> Select the recipient(s) of your e-mail, provided that you have entered e-mail addresses for contacts saved in directory.

Add media

- Design your message. Enter the subject and text, then press left softkey to access following options:
  - Add sound or Add graphic: attach a sound or a picture to your e-mail,
  - Send now: send it to the selected recipient(s),
- Modify: redesign your e-mail.

You can only attach one picture (JPEG, GIF or BMP) or one sound at a time. If you accept an incoming call while writing an e-mail, the menu is closed and the phone goes back to main screen when you hang up.

#### 9.1.2 New SMS

To compose and send an SMS, select "**New SMS**", then enter text. You can select "**Add recipient>**" to add one recipient from the directory or enter a phone number directly. Select "**Add sound**" to attach a melody, "**Add graphic**" to attach an image or an animation, "**Input Language**" to change the language for typing.

#### 9.1.3 New MMS

When you select "**New MMS**", you are first asked to enter the contact to whom you wish to send MMS. You can select one or more existing contacts or enter a new mobile phone number or a new email address.

Then you will be asked to "**Add media**". You can add a Picture, add Text, add Sound, Send the message or access the MMS options. Use  $\checkmark$  or  $\blacktriangle$  to move from one option to the next and press  $\bigcirc K$  or the left softkey to access the menu.

You can access this menu from main screen, Camera feature, Album feature, Message function and Directory.

#### 9.2 Inbox

#### 9.2.1 Email

You can connect your mailbox and download the e-mail headers (sender and subject lines) from the server. You may then choose to retrieve the corresponding e-mails.

It includes sent and received messages.

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# **O**Settings.....

You can change the settings related to each available option (sounds, time and date, security, etc.) and customize your phone.

#### **10.1** Time and date

Set time and date after selecting your "Time zone" and activate "Daylight saving".

#### **10.2** Sounds <sup>(1)</sup>

Adjust the volume of your ringer, select a ringer tone and key tones, choose messages ringer, audio settings, animation sounds and set sounds/vibra alerts.

#### **10.3 Security**

This function allows you to access the features relating to the security of your mobile phone and data you store there.

#### **10.3.1** Change codes

Change your PIN and PIN2 codes, as well as call Barring code.

If you enter a wrong PIN2 code 3 times, your SIM card is blocked. To unblock it, request the PUK2 code from your operator or retailer. If you enter an incorrect PUK code 10 times in a row, the SIM card will be blocked and unusable. If it happens, contact your operator or retailer.

#### **10.3.2** Public names

Manage a specific names list called "**Public names**" list, and restrict calls to this list via "**Call restriction**" option.

This feature is subscription dependent and requires a PIN2 code.

#### 10.3.3 Call barring

A sound is played three seconds before the picture is taken, then again when it's actually shot.

#### **II.2** Camera menu

#### **II.2.1** My photos

When you take a picture and save it, the file is stored in your "My **photos**" folder. Use up and down navigation keys to move through the list. To view full-screen image, press  $\bigcirc K$ . Press the right softkey to access following options:

**11.2.3** Continuous shoot

You can take a "burst" of 9 photos with one press of OK or @ key.

Note that to use continuous shoot, the resolution must be set to screen size.

When the camera finishes processing the images, they are displayed on screen as thumbnails. You may then press the left softkey to access following options:

Pictures are saved automatically.

Send the selected image by MMS, Email.

Delete selected image.

**Delete all** • Delete all the images in the group.

When you save or delete an image from the group, it is removed from the thumbnail view and stored in the "**My photos**" folder.

#### **11.2.4** Picture orientation

Choose how photos are displayed in your photo album so that they can be viewed correctly.

#### 11.2.5 Frames

You can take photos with decorative frames. The Standard frames folder contains frames that were loaded on your mobile phone when you purchased it.

11.2.6 Color mode

You can apply a number of different visual effects to your images.

11.2.7 Night mode

When activated, it allows you to take pictures in low-light situations.

#### 11.2.8 Self-Timer

You can take a time-delayed picture so that you can get into the frame as well. To use Self-Timer, select "**On**" in this menu, return to the view-finder mode, frame your picture, and then press OK.

**II.2.9 Brightness** 

Adjust the exposure compensation of your mobile phone's screen.

#### **II.3** Settings

II.3.I Resolution

Choose the size of the photos you take. The options are:

- VGA (640 x 480)
- QVGA (320 x 240)
- Screen size Wallpaper (128 x 160)

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#### **11.3.2** Picture quality

You can adjust the quality of the pictures taken with your camera: Low, Medium, High.

11.3.3 Sound settings

Set Alert and Shutter sounds.

11.3.4 Default settings

Reset all camera settings to their default values.

#### II.4 Help

It provides you with on-screen help in taking pictures with your mobile phone.

# 2 Directory ......

The directory allows you to store phone numbers and names either in the SIM memory and/or the phone memory. When entering new names, they will only be added to the directory you have selected.

#### **12.1** Directory

You can manage the names, telephone numbers, and e-mail addresses of your contacts. You can also access the Names list directly from the main screen by pressing  $\checkmark$ .

Press the key for the letter that you want to be displayed. The first contact starting with this letter is selected in the list.

You may also press the  $\#_{-6}$  key then enter the first letter of the contact name you are searching and press  $\bigcirc K$  to go directly to that name.

You can also use the "<Search>" item in the directory.

Select **"Show**" to access the list of numbers or files saved in this directory and **"<New>**" to create a new file.

Files stored in the directories can be personalized with a picture and/or a sound.

This function is only available in the product directory.

Select a contact and press  $\bigcirc K$  or the left softkey. When you have a call from this contact, the telephone will display/play his/her picture and/or sound associated with this contact.

#### 12.2 Delete all

Delete all files at once. This option only applies to the product directory, not to the SIM directory.

#### 12.3 Default directory

It allows you to select the directory you want to use (SIM or product). Press  $\checkmark$  or  $\blacktriangle$  to select a directory. Files in the selected directory can then be copied into the other, using the options "**Copy to SIM card**" or "**Copy to phone**". Your phone only manages one directory at a time and will ignore all information relative to the other.

#### 12.4 Status

Display the total number of files you have saved in each directory, of the total number available.

#### 12.5 Copy

You may copy the content of your SIM card into your phone. If you cancel or abort the automatic copy of your SIM directory when you first switch on your phone, you can do it manually using this option.

Selecting this option twice will duplicate all the names.

#### **12.6** Add a contact

#### 12.6.1 Adding files in SIM directory

Select "<New>" in the list, enter the name and number of your choice, then the type of number assigned to the name (Phone, Fax or Data) and press  $\bigcirc$ K to store this file in your directory.

A number is limited to 40 digits, depending on your SIM card. Entering international prefix, country and area codes allows you to dial a number from any location.

Choose a file in your SIM directory and press OK to access the options.

#### 12.6.2 Adding files in product directory

Select "**<New>**" in the list, enter name (up to 20 Latin characters) and then select the Number type. Numeric fields can hold up to 40 digits and one "+" sign and alphanumeric fields (e-mail and note) feature up to 50 Latin characters. Each file can feature a maximum of 5 numeric fields.

Choose a file in your phone directory and press  $\mathbf{OK}$  to access the options.

#### 12.6.3 Adding picture and sound to contacts

Files stored in the product directory can be personalized with a picture and/or a sound.

Select a file and press **OK** or the left softkey **"Options**". In the list, choose **"Select picture**" to add a picture from the Picture album and **"Select melody**" to open the list of ringers and add a melody.

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# **3** Call Information ......

#### 13.1 Call times

You can track the cost and duration of your calls. Most options mentioned below are subscription dependent.

**13.1.1 Data counters** 

GPRS counter allows you to monitor the amount of data received via GPRS sessions. This feature is subscription and network dependent.

13.1.2 Call counters

It is used for keeping track of your incoming and outgoing GSM calls. Please note that GSM call counters do not include WAP connections.

#### **13.2** Call settings

Set all the options related to call: call forwarding, call waiting, etc.

13.2.1 Info at call ending

Set "**On**" or "**Off**" the systematic display of the length and/or cost of each call when hanging up.

#### 13.2.2 Call waiting

#### With GSM call

It applies to All calls, Voice calls, Fax calls and Data calls.

#### With GPRS call

Set "**On**" or "**Off**" the call waiting for voice incoming calls while a GPRS connection is ongoing.

13.2.3 Caller ID

"Show identity" or "Hide identity" to your correspondent.

#### 13.2.4 Call Forward

Divert incoming calls to your mailbox or to a number (whether in your directory or not) and apply to: **Data calls**, **Voice calls** and **Fax calls**.

# 4 Organizer 🗥 ..... 🇊

You can create, store and manage events in your organizer. When the organizer alert is "**On**", a beep or a sound recorded alerts you when an event is due.

The organizer shares the mobile memory capacity with other features (directory, picture album, sound, etc.) Please check the memory available in your phone.

#### **14.1** Creating a new event

Choose "**<New>**" in "**Events**", then the type of event to create (Meeting, To Do, Holiday).

Enter time, starting/ending date of the event and name it.

Set a reminder and a frequency: alerts will be triggered at the chosen time.

Reminder only applies to Meeting and To Do events. It will be updated when changing time zones.

#### **14.2** Deleting old events

You can delete past events. Enter the starting date and press **OK** twice to delete all events preceding this date.

To delete all events set in your organizer, enter a starting date several years ahead (e.g. 31st of December 2010) to make sure all events preceding this date are deleted at once.



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# **20** Troubleshooting.....

Before contacting the aftersales department, you are advised to follow the instructions below:

- You are advised to switch off the telephone from time to time to optimise its performance.
- You are advised to fully charge the battery (I) for optimal operation.
- Avoid storing large amounts of data in your telephone as this may affect the performance of your telephone.

and carry out the following checks:

#### My mobile phone does not switch on

- Press Juntil the screen comes on
- Check the battery charge level
- Check the battery contacts, remove and reinstall your battery, then turn your telephone back on

#### My phone does not respond since several minutes

- Press the 🤳 key
- Remove the battery and re-insert it, then switch the phone back on

#### My screen is difficult to read

- Clean your screen
- Use your mobile phone in accordance with the recommended conditions of use

#### My mobile phone turns off by itself

- Check that your keypad is locked when you are not using your mobile phone
- Check the battery charge level
- Check that the function "Auto OFF" is not activated (see page 31).

#### My mobile phone does not charge properly

- Make sure that your battery is not completely discharged; the battery charge indicator can take several minutes and may be accompanied by a quiet hissing sound.
- Make sure charging is carried out under normal conditions (0°C +40°C)
- Make sure your battery is inserted. It must be inserted <u>before</u> plugging in the charger
- Make sure you are using an Alcatel battery and charger
- When abroad, check that the electrical current is compatible

#### My mobile phone does not connect to a network

#### My callers are unable to leave messages on my voicemail

· Contact your network operator to check service availability

#### I can't access my voicemail
