Safety and use

We recommend that you read this chapter carefully before using your phone. The manufacturer disclaims any liability for damage, which may result as a consequence of improper use or use contrary to the instructions contained herein.

• TRAFFIC SAFETY:

Recent studies show that using a cellphone while driving a vehicle constitutes a real risk, even when the hands-free kit is used (headset...), drivers are requested to refrain from using their cellphone when the vehicle is not parked.

Check the laws and regulations on the use of wireless telephones and their accessories in the areas where you drive. Always obey them. The use of these devices may be prohibited or restricted in certain areas. Do not use your phone's stereo or music feature with a headphone. Using a headphone can be dangerous and forbidden in some areas.

When switched on, your phone emits electromagnetic waves that can interfere with the vehicle's electronic systems such as ABS anti-lock brakes or airbags. To ensure that there is no problem: - do not place your phone on top of the dashboard or within an airbag deployment area,

a check with your car dealer or the car manufacturer to make sure that the car's electronic devices are shielded from cellphone RF energy.

CONDITIONS OF USE:

You are advised to switch off the telephone from time to time to optimize its performance. Switch the phone off before boarding an aircraft.

Switch the phone off when you are in health care facilities, except in designated areas. As with many other types of equipment now in regular use, cellphones can interfere with other electrical or electronic devices, or equipment using radio frequency.

Switch the phone off when you are near gas or flammable liquids. Strictly obey all signs and instructions posted in a fuel depot, gas station, or chemical plant, or in any potentially explosive atmosphere.

When the phone is switched on, it should be kept at least 15 cm from any medical device such as a pacemaker, a hearing aid or insulin pump. In particular when using the phone you should hold it against the ear on the opposite side to the device, if any.

To avoid hearing impairment, press to answer the call before holding your cellphone to your ear. Also move the handset away from your ear while using the "hands-free" option because the amplified volume might cause hearing damage.

Do not let small children use your cellphone without supervision.

When replacing the cover please note that your phone may contain substances that could create an allergic reaction.

Always handle your phone with care and keep it in a clean and dust-free place.

Do not allow your phone to be exposed to adverse weather or environmental conditions (moisture, humidity, rain, infiltration of liquids, dust, sea air, etc.). The manufacturer's recommended operating temperature range is -10°C to +55°C (the max value depends on product ie. housing or paint). Over 55°C the legibility of the phone's display may be impaired, though this is temporary and not serious.

Emergency call numbers may not be reachable on all cellular networks. You should never rely only on your phone for emergency calls.

Do not open, dismantle or attempt to repair your cellphone yourself.

Do not drop, throw or try to bend your cellphone.

Do not paint it.

Use only batteries, battery chargers, and accessories which are recommended by TCT Mobile Limited and its affiliates and are compatible with your phone model (see Accessories List page 80). TCT Mobile Limited and its affiliates disclaim any liability for damage caused by the use of other chargers or batteries.

Your phone should not be disposed of in a municipal waste. Please check local regulations for disposal of electronic products.

Remember to make back-up copies or keep a written record of all important information stored in your phone.

Some people may suffer epileptic seizures or blackouts when exposed to flashing lights, or when playing video games. These seizures or blackouts may occur even if a person never had a previous seizure or blackout. If you have experienced seizures or blackouts, or if you have a family history of such occurrences, please consult your doctor before playing video games on your phone or enabling a flashing-lights feature on your phone. Parents should monitor their children's use of video games or other features that incorporate flashing lights on the phones. RADIO WAVES:

THIS CELLPHONE MEETS THE GOVERNMENT'S REQUIREMENTS FOR EXPOSURE TO RADIO WAVES.

Your cellphone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radio-frequency (RF) energy. These limits are part of comprehensive guidelines and establish permitted levels of RF energy for the general population. The guidelines are based on standards that were developed by independent scientific organizations through periodic and thorough evaluation of scientific studies. These guidelines include a substantial safety margin designed to ensure the safety of all persons, regardless of age and health.

The exposure standard for cellphones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR limit set by public authorities such as the Federal Communications Commission of the US Government (FCC), or by Industry Canada, is 1.6 W/kg averaged over I gram of body tissue. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions with the cellphone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands.

Although the SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the cellphone while operating can be well below the maximum value. This is because the cellphone is designed to operate at multiple power levels so as to use only the power required to reach the network. In general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output of the cellphone Before a cellphone model is available for sale to the public, compliance with national regulations and standards must be shown.

The highest SAR value for this model cellphone when tested for use at the ear is 0.86 W/Kg and for use close to the body is $1.05\,W/Kg$

While there may be differences between the SAR levels of various cellphones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for RF exposure. For body-worn operation, the cellphone meets FCC RF exposure guidelines provided that it is used with a non-metallic accessory with the handset at least 1.5 cm from the body. Use of other accessories may not ensure compliance with FCC RF exposure guidelines.

The World Health Organization (WHO) considers that present scientific information does not indicate the need for any special precautions for use of cellphones. If individuals are concerned, they might choose to limit their own or their children's RF exposure by limiting the length of calls, or using "hands-free" devices to keep cellphones away from the head and body. 



2 Getting started

2.I Set-up


Inserting and removing the SIM card (1)

You must insert your SIM card to make phone calls.



Place the SIM card with the chip facing downwards and slide it into its housing. Make sure that it is correctly inserted. To remove the card, press it and slide it out.

Installing the battery




Insert and click the battery into place, then close the telephone cover.



Unclip the cover, then remove the battery.

Charging the battery



Connect the battery charger

- The charging may take about 20 minutes to start if the battery is flat.
- Be careful not to force the plug into the socket.
- Make sure the battery is correctly inserted before connecting the charger.
- The mains socket must be near to the phone and easily accessible (avoid electric extension cables).
- When using your telephone for the first time, charge the battery fully (approximately 3 hours). You are advised to fully charge the battery (III)).





The charge is complete when the animation stops. Only use Alcatel chargers.

2.2 Power on your phone

Hold down the \bigcirc key until the telephone powers on, type in your PIN code if necessary and then confirm with the OK key. The main screen is displayed.

If you don't know your PIN code or if you have forgotten it, contact your network operator. Do not leave your PIN code near your telephone and store your card in a safe place when not in use.

If cell broadcast messages are displayed, use the OK key to browse through them in full or press the right softkey to return to the main screen.

While the phone is searching for a network, "Searching/Emergency" will be displayed.

In the power on screen, you also have access to "Media album", "Camera & Video" and "Music" functions even if no SIM card inside.

2.3 Power off your phone

Hold down the \bigcirc key from the main screen.



3 Calls

3.1 Making a call

Dial the desired number then press the \bigcirc key to place the call. If you make a mistake, you can delete the incorrect digits by pressing the right softkey.

To hang up the call, press the \mathbf{O} key.



To enter characters "+", "W" (for tonewait) or "P" (used to store a number with extension number), hold down the O^+ key (the following characters will scroll by: 0, +, P, W).

Making an emergency call

If your phone is covered by the network, dial **112** and press the \bigcirc key to make an emergency call (or any other number provided by your operator). This works even without a SIM card and without typing the PIN code or unlocking the keypad.

3.2 Calling your voicemail ⁽¹⁾

Your voicemail is provided by your network to avoid missing calls. It works like an answering machine that you can consult at any time. To access your voicemail, hold down the $1^{\sigma\sigma}$ key.

If the access number for your operator's voicemail service does not work, dial the number that you were given. To change this number at a later date, refer to "**My Numbers**" (see page 28).



To use your voicemail service from abroad, contact your network operator before leaving.

3.3 Receiving a call

When you receive an incoming call, press the \bigcirc key to talk and then hang up using the \bigcirc key.

If the \bigotimes icon is displayed, the vibrator is activated and there is no ringtone. If the \bigotimes icon is displayed, the phone neither rings nor vibrates.



The caller's number is displayed if it is transmitted by the network (contact your network operator to check service availability).

Muting the ringtone

Press the right softkey once while the telephone is ringing. Answer the call by pressing the \bigcirc key.

Rejecting a call

Press the $\boldsymbol{\odot}$ key once or the right softkey twice.

3.4 During the call

Available functions

During a call, you can use your directory, your diary, short messages, etc. without losing your correspondent by pressing the •• key.

3.5 Conference calls ⁽¹⁾

Your phone allows you to talk to several people at the same time (up to 5). If you are on a double call, press "**Options**" and select "**Conference**" then confirm with the OK key. If a third call comes in, answer it by pressing the \checkmark key and speak with your new correspondent.

This correspondent becomes a member of the conference if you press "**Options**" and select "**Joint conf.**", and then confirm by pressing **OK**. Pressing O disconnects the current call.

To end the conference call, press "Options" and select "End conference".

3.6 Line switching (ALS) ⁽¹⁾

Your SIM card can contain two distinct telephone numbers. Under "**Call register**", choose "**Line switching**" and then select a default line; all your outgoing calls will be made from this number. Incoming calls, however, will continue to use the two lines.



The services programmed on the default line do not impact those selected on the other line.

You can access your call memory by pressing the \bigcirc key from the main screen. Choose the icon of the desired list:

- ___^ Unanswered calls
- Outgoing calls (Redial)
- **.**... Answered calls

Select a number of the call memory and press the "Options" softkey to View call details, Create text/multimedia message, Save or Delete the selected number or clear the entire list (Delete all).

Type in or modify your telephone number or the number to access your voicemail and confirm by pressing OK. Your telephone number is usually written on your SIM card.
