I. Executive Summary



A. Purpose of Test

An EMC evaluation was performed to determine compliance of the Meru Networks, Inc. Mission Peak (AP822eV2), with the requirements of Part 15, §15.407. All references are to the most current version of Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations in effect. In accordance with §2.1033, the following data is presented in support of the Certification of the Mission Peak (AP822eV2). Meru Networks, Inc. should retain a copy of this document which should be kept on file for at least two years after the manufacturing of the Mission Peak (AP822eV2), has been **permanently** discontinued.

B. Executive Summary

C. Test Site

All testing was performed at MET Laboratories, Inc., 3162 Belick St., Santa Clara, CA 95054. All equipment used in making physical determinations is accurate and bears recent traceability to the National Institute of Standards and Technology.

Radiated Emissions measurements were performed in a 3 meter semi-anechoic chamber (equivalent to an Open Area Test Site). In accordance with §2.948(a)(3), a complete site description is contained at MET Laboratories.

D. Description of Test Sample

The Meru Networks, Inc. Mission Peak (AP822eV2), Equipment Under Test (EUT), is an 802.11AC wireless access point (WAP) that allows wireless devices to connect to a wired network using Wi-Fi, standard. The WAP usually connects to a router (via a wired network), and can relay data between the wireless devices (such as computers or printers) and wired devices on the network.






Figure 1. Block Diagram of Test Configuration

Electromagnetic Compatibility Criteria

§ 15.107 Conducted Emissions Limits

Test Requirement(s):

15.107 (a) Except for Class A digital devices, for equipment that is designed to be connected to the public utility (AC) power line, the radio frequency voltage that is conducted back onto the AC power line on any frequency or frequencies within the band 150 kHz to 30 MHz shall not exceed the limits in Table 8. Compliance with this provision shall be based on the measurement of the radio frequency voltage between each power line and ground at the power terminals.

15.107 (b) For a Class A digital device that is designed to be connected to the public utility (AC) power line, the radio frequency voltage that is conducted back onto the AC power line on any frequency or frequencies within the band 150 kHz to 30 MHz shall not exceed the limits in Table 8. Compliance with this provision shall be based on the measurement of the radio frequency voltage between each power line and ground at the power terminals. The lower limit applies at the band edges.

Test Procedures:

The EUT was placed on a non-metallic table, 80 cm above the ground plane inside a semi-anechoic chamber. The method of testing, test conditions, and test procedures of ANSI C63.4 were used. The EUT was powered through a $50\Omega/50\mu H$ LISN. An EMI receiver, connected to the measurement port of the LISN, scanned the frequency range from 150 kHz to 30 MHz in order to find the peak conducted emissions. All peak emissions within 6 dB of the limit were re-measured using a quasi-peak and/or average detector as appropriate.


Plot 2. Conducted Emissions, Neutral Line, PoE

Test Procedures:

The EUT was placed on a non-metallic table, 80 cm above the ground plane inside a semi-anechoic chamber. The method of testing and test conditions of ANSI C63.4 were used. An antenna was located 3 m from the EUT on an adjustable mast. A pre-scan was first performed in order to find prominent radiated emissions. For final emissions measurements at each frequency of interest, the EUT was rotated and the antenna height was varied between 1 m and 4 m in order to maximize the emission. Measurements in both horizontal and vertical polarities were made and the data was recorded. Unless otherwise specified, measurements were made using a quasi-peak detector with a 120 kHz bandwidth.

The EUT was compliant with the Class B requirement(s) of this section. Measured emissions were below applicable limits.






Plot 5. Radiated Emissions, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, PoE


Plot 6. Radiated Emissions, 1 GHz – 2 GHz, PoE




Plot 7. Radiated Emissions, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, AC/DC

§ 15.203 Antenna Requirement

Test Requirement:

§ 15.203: An intentional radiator shall be designed to ensure that no antenna other than that furnished by the responsible party shall be used with the device. The use of a permanently attached antenna or of an antenna that uses a unique coupling to the intentional radiator shall be considered sufficient to comply with the provisions of this section. The manufacturer may design the unit so that a broken antenna can be replaced by the user, but the use of a standard antenna jack or electrical connector is prohibited.

The structure and application of the EUT were analyzed to determine compliance with Section 15.203 of the Rules. Section 15.203 states that the subject device must meet at least one of the following criteria:

- a.) Antenna must be permanently attached to the unit.
- b.) Antenna must use a unique type of connector to attach to the EUT.
- c.) Unit must be professionally installed. Installer shall be responsible for verifying that the correct antenna is employed with the unit.

Results: The EUT as tested is compliant the criteria of §15.203 as the unit is professionally installed.

§ 15.207 (a): For an intentional radiator that is designed to be connected to the public utility (AC) power line, the radio frequency voltage that is conducted back onto the AC power line on any frequency or frequencies, within the band 150 kHz to 30MHz, shall not exceed the limits in the following table, as measured using a 50 μ H/50 Σ line impedance stabilization network (LISN). Test Procedure:

The EUT was placed on a 0.8 m-high wooden table inside a screen room. The EUT was situated such that the back of the EUT was 0.4 m from one wall of the vertical ground plane, and the remaining sides of the EUT were no closer than 0.8 m from any other conductive surface. The EUT was powered from a 50 $\Omega/50~\mu H$ Line Impedance Stabilization Network (LISN). The EMC receiver scanned the frequency range from 150 kHz to 30 MHz. Conducted Emissions measurements were made in accordance with ANSI C63.4-2003 "Methods and Measurements of Radio-Noise Emissions from Low-Voltage Electrical and Electronic Equipment in the Range of 9kHz to 40 GHz". The measurements were performed over the frequency range of 0.15 MHz to 30 MHz using a 50 $\Omega/50~\mu H$ LISN as the input transducer to an EMC/field intensity meter. For the purpose of this testing, the transmitter was turned on. Scans were performed with the transmitter on.


Plot 10. Conducted Emissions, 15.207(a), Neutral Line, PoE

§ 15. 403(i) 26dB Bandwidth

Test Requirements:

§ 15.403 (i): For purposes of this subpart the emission bandwidth shall be determined by measuring the width of the signal between two points, one below the carrier center frequency and one above the carrier center frequency, that are 26 dB down relative to the maximum level of the modulated carrier. Determination of the emissions bandwidth is based on the use of measurement instrumentation employing a peak detector function with an instrument resolution bandwidth approximately equal to 1.0 percent of the emission bandwidth of the device under measurement.

Test Procedure:

The transmitter was set to low, mid, and high operating frequencies at the highest output power and connected to the spectrum analyzer through an attenuator. The bandwidth of the fundamental frequency was measured with the spectrum analyzer using a RBW approximately equal to 1% of the total emission bandwidth, VBW > RBW. The 26 dB Bandwidth was measured and recorded.

Test Results

The 26 dB Bandwidth was compliant with the requirements of this section and was determined from the plots on the following pages.




Figure 2. Occupied Bandwidth, Test Setup





Plot 13. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11a, 5180 MHz




Plot 14. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11a, 5190 MHz




Plot 15. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11a, 5200 MHz






Plot 16. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11a, 5230 MHz




Plot 17. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11a, 5240 MHz




26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 1



Plot 18. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 1, 5180 MHz




Plot 19. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 1, 5190 MHz




Plot 20. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 1, 5200 MHz






Plot 21. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 1, 5230 MHz




Plot 22. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 1, 5240 MHz





Plot 23. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 2, 5180 MHz




Plot 24. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 2, 5190 MHz




Plot 25. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 2, 5200 MHz






Plot 26. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 2, 5230 MHz




Plot 27. 26 dB Occupied Bandwidth, 802.11n, Port 2, 5240 MHz

§ 15. 407(a)(1)(ii) RF Power Output

Test Requirements: §15.407(a)(1)(ii): For an indoor access point operating in the band 5.15-5.25 GHz, the

maximum conducted output power over the frequency band of operation shall not exceed 1 W

provided the maximum antenna gain does not exceed 6 dBi.

Test Procedure: The EUT was connected to a spectrum analyzer through an attenuator and set to transmit

continuously on the low, mid, and high channels. Its power was measured according to measurement method SA-1, as described in 789033 D02 General UNII Test Procedures v01. Plots were corrected for attenuator and cable loss. Power levels shown in table below can be used with any antenna shown in 15.203. Patch antennas have dual elements that are crosspolarized and therefore they do not add. The Array gain is the gain shown in the tables in

15.203.




Figure 3. Power Output Test Setup

§ 15.407(a)(1)(ii) Peak Power Spectral Density

Test Requirements: § 15.407(a)(1)(ii): In addition, the maximum power spectral density shall not exceed 17 dBm

in any 1 megahertz band. If transmitting antennas of directional gain greater than 6 dBi are used, both the maximum conducted output power and the maximum power spectral density shall be

reduced by the amount in dB that the directional gain of the antenna exceeds 6 dBi.




Figure 4. Power Spectral Density Test Setup

§ 15.407(b)(1), (6), (7) Undesirable Emissions

Test Requirements: § 15.407(b)(1), (6), (7); §15.205: Emissions outside the frequency band.

§ 15.407(b)(1): For transmitters operating in the 5.15–5.25 GHz band: all emissions outside of the 5.15–5.35 GHz band shall not exceed an EIRP of –27 dBm/MHz.

§ 15.407(b)(6): Unwanted emissions below 1 GHz must comply with the general field strength limits set forth in Section 15.209. Further, any U-NII devices using an AC power line are required to comply also with the conducted limits set forth in Section 15.207.

§ 15.407(b)(7): The provisions of Section 15.205 of this part apply to intentional radiators operating under this section.

Test Procedure:

The transmitter was placed on an 80cm wooden table inside in a semi-anechoic chamber. Measurements were performed with the EUT rotated 360 degrees and varying the adjustable antenna mast height to determine worst case orientation for maximum emissions. A preamp was used in the range from 7-18GHz to improve noise floor. Plots were corrected for cable loss, antenna, and preamp gain.

For frequencies from 30 MHz to 1 GHz, measurements were made using a quasi-peak detector with a 120 kHz bandwidth. The procedure was used for average.

For measurements above 1 GHz, measurements were made with a Peak detector with 1 MHz resolution bandwidth. A notch filter was use to filter out the transmitting channel. Where the spurious emissions fell into a restricted band, measurements were also made with an average detector to make sure they complied with 15.209 limits. Only noise floor was seen above 18 GHz. Worst case emissions shown by antenna.






Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 31. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Low Channel, 1 GHz – 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 32. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Low Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna






Plot 33. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Low Channel, 7 GHz - 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna
















Plot 39. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Mid Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 40. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Mid Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 41. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, Mid Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna






Plot 43. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, High Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 44. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, High Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna






Plot 45. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, High Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna










Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 51. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Low Channel, 1 GHz – 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 52. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Low Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna






Plot 53. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Low Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna
















Plot 59. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Mid Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 60. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Mid Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 61. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, Mid Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna






Plot 63. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, High Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 64. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, High Channel, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna






Plot 65. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, High Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna










Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, Ceiling Antenna



Plot 70. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Ceiling Antenna




Plot 71. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 1 GHz – 7 GHz, Average, Ceiling Antenna



Plot 72. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna







Plot 73. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Ceiling Antenna





Plot 74. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 76. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 7 GHz - 18 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 77. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 79. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Omni Antenna












Plot 83. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 85. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 86. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 88. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Omni Antenna





Plot 89. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 91. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 7 GHz - 18 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 92. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 94. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Omni Antenna












Plot 98. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 100. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 101. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Omni Antenna






Plot 103. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Omni Antenna





Plot 104. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Omni Antenna




Plot 105. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Average, Omni Antenna




Plot 106. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 7 GHz - 18 GHz, Omni Antenna





Plot 107. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Patch Antenna










Plot 111. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Patch Antenna




















Plot 119. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, Patch Antenna










Plot 123. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Patch Antenna









Plot 127. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, Patch Antenna










Plot 131. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Patch Antenna




















Plot 139. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Patch Antenna










Plot 143. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 30 MHz – 1 GHz, Patch Antenna







Plot 147. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, 30 MHz - 1 GHz, Patch Antenna




Plot 148. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 1 GHz – 7 GHz, Average, Patch Antenna



Plot 149. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 1 GHz - 7 GHz, Peak, Patch Antenna







Plot 150. Radiated Spurious Emissions, 802.11ac, 7 GHz – 18 GHz, Peak, Patch Antenna




Plot 151. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 152. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 153. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 154. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 155. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 156. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 157. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 158. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average




Plot 159. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 160. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 161. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 162. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 163. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 164. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 165. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 166. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average




Plot 167. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 168. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, Low Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average






Plot 169. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Peak




Plot 170. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, High Channel, 6 dBi Omni Outdoor Antenna, Average




Plot 171. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 172. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 173. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 174. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 175. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 176. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 177. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 178. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average




Plot 179. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 180. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 181. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 182. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 183. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 184. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 185. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 186. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average




Plot 187. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 188. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, Low Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 189. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 190. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, High Channel, 4 dBi Antenna, Average




Plot 191. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 192. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 193. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 194. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 195. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 196. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 20 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 197. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 198. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11a, 40 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average




Plot 199. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 200. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 201. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 202. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 203. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 204. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 20 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average






Plot 205. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 206. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11n, 40 MHz, High Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average




Plot 207. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Peak




Plot 208. Radiated Band Edge, 802.11ac, 80 MHz, Low Channel, 7 dBi Antenna, Average

Electromagnetic Compatibility Criteria for Intentional Radiators Co-location

Test Requirements:

Devices designed to transmit simultaneously in multiple channels in single or multiple frequency bands or those using new "carrier aggregation techniques", excluding cellular base stations or where specific guidance has been proved.

All devices that are capable of transmitting simultaneously in more than one Part-15 band between 5 and 6 GHz (*i.e.*, in two or more of the four U-NII bands or in the 5.8 GHz 15.247 band and at least one U-NII band) are subject to Permit But Ask provisions. This includes devices marketed as IEEE Std 802.11acc "pre-standard" IEEE Std 802.11ac.

Test Procedure:

The transmitter was placed on an 80cm wooden table inside in a semi-anechoic chamber. Measurements were performed with the EUT rotated 360 degrees and varying the adjustable antenna mast height to determine worst case orientation for maximum emissions. A preamp was used in the range from 7-18GHz to improve noise floor. Plots were corrected for cable loss, antenna, and preamp gain.


For frequencies from 30 MHz to 1 GHz, measurements were made using a quasi-peak detector with a 120 kHz bandwidth.

For measurements above 1 GHz, measurements were made with a Peak detector with 1 MHz resolution bandwidth. Where the spurious emissions fell into a restricted band, measurements were also made with an average detector to make sure they complied with 15.209 limits. Only noise floor was seen above 18 GHz.























































































































































































































































































































Plot 371. Frequency Stability, 5150 – 5350 MHz, -40°C, 120 V




Plot 372. Frequency Stability, 5150 – 5350 MHz, -30°C, 120 V




Plot 373. Frequency Stability, 5150 – 5350 MHz, -20°C, 120 V







Plot 374. Frequency Stability, 5150 - 5350 MHz, -10° C, 120 V




Plot 375. Frequency Stability, 5150 - 5350 MHz, 0° C, 120 V




Plot 376. Frequency Stability, 5150 - 5350 MHz, 10° C, 120 V



Plot 377. Frequency Stability, 5150 – 5350 MHz, 20°C, 120 V




Plot 378. Frequency Stability, 5150 - 5350 MHz, 30° C, 120 V




Plot 379. Frequency Stability, 5150 - 5350 MHz, 40°C , 120 V

L. Certification Information

The following is extracted from Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 2, Subpart I — Marketing of Radio frequency devices:

§ 2.801 Radio-frequency device defined.

As used in this part, a radio-frequency device is any device which in its operation is capable of Emitting radio-frequency energy by radiation, conduction, or other means. Radio-frequency devices include, but are not limited to:

- (a) The various types of radio communication transmitting devices described throughout this chapter.
- (b) The incidental, unintentional and intentional radiators defined in Part 15 of this chapter.
- (c) The industrial, scientific, and medical equipment described in Part 18 of this chapter.
- (d) Any part or component thereof which in use emits radio-frequency energy by radiation, conduction, or other means.

§ 2.803 Marketing of radio frequency devices prior to equipment authorization.

- (a) Except as provided elsewhere in this chapter, no person shall sell or lease, or offer for sale or lease (including advertising for sale or lease), or import, ship or distribute for the purpose of selling or leasing or offering for sale or lease, any radio frequency device unless:
 - (1) In the case of a device subject to certification, such device has been authorized by the Commission in accordance with the rules in this chapter and is properly identified and labeled as required by §2.925 and other relevant sections in this chapter; or
 - (2) In the case of a device that is not required to have a grant of equipment authorization issued by the Commission, but which must comply with the specified technical standards prior to use, such device also complies with all applicable administrative (including verification of the equipment or authorization under a Declaration of Conformity, where required), technical, labeling and identification requirements specified in this chapter.
- (d) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section, the offer for sale solely to business, commercial, industrial, scientific or medical users (but not an offer for sale to other parties or to end users located in a residential environment) of a radio frequency device that is in the conceptual, developmental, design or preproduction stage is permitted prior to equipment authorization or, for devices not subject to the equipment authorization requirements, prior to a determination of compliance with the applicable technical requirements provided that the prospective buyer is advised in writing at the time of the offer for sale that the equipment is subject to the FCC rules and that the equipment will comply with the appropriate rules before delivery to the buyer or to centers of distribution.



- (e)(1) Notwithstanding the provisions of paragraph (a) of this section, prior to equipment authorization or determination of compliance with the applicable technical requirements any radio frequency device may be operated, but not marketed, for the following purposes and under the following conditions:
 - (i) Compliance testing;
 - (ii) Demonstrations at a trade show provided the notice contained in paragraph (c) of this section is displayed in a conspicuous location on, or immediately adjacent to, the device;
 - (iii) Demonstrations at an exhibition conducted at a business, commercial, industrial, scientific or medical location, but excluding locations in a residential environment, provided the notice contained in paragraphs (c) or (d) of this section, as appropriate, is displayed in a conspicuous location on, or immediately adjacent to, the device;
 - (iv) Evaluation of product performance and determination of customer acceptability, provided such operation takes place at the manufacturer's facilities during developmental, design or pre-production states; or
 - (v) Evaluation of product performance and determination of customer acceptability where customer acceptability of a radio frequency device cannot be determined at the manufacturer's facilities because of size or unique capability of the device, provided the device is operated at a business, commercial, industrial, scientific or medical user's site, but not at a residential site, during the development, design or pre-production stages.
- (e)(2) For the purpose of paragraphs (e)(1)(iv) and (e)(1)(v) of this section, the term *manufacturer's facilities* includes the facilities of the party responsible for compliance with the regulations and the manufacturer's premises, as well as the facilities of other entities working under the authorization of the responsible party in connection with the development and manufacture, but not the marketing, of the equipment.
- (f) For radio frequency devices subject to verification and sold solely to business, commercial, industrial, scientific and medical users (excluding products sold to other parties or for operation in a residential environment), parties responsible for verification of the devices shall have the option of ensuring compliance with the applicable technical specifications of this chapter at each end user's location after installation, provided that the purchase or lease agreement includes a proviso that such a determination of compliance be made and is the responsibility of the party responsible for verification of the equipment.



The following is extracted from Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 2, Subpart J — Equipment Authorization Procedures:

§ 2.901 Basis and Purpose

- (a) In order to carry out its responsibilities under the Communications Act and the various treaties and international regulations, and in order to promote efficient use of the radio spectrum, the Commission has developed technical standards for radio frequency equipment and parts or components thereof. The technical standards applicable to individual types of equipment are found in that part of the rules governing the service wherein the equipment is to be operated. In addition to the technical standards provided, the rules governing the service may require that such equipment be verified by the manufacturer or importer, be authorized under a Declaration of Conformity, or receive an equipment authorization from the Commission by one of the following procedures: certification or registration.
- (b) The following sections describe the verification procedure, the procedure for a Declaration of Conformity, and the procedures to be followed in obtaining certification from the Commission and the conditions attendant to such a grant.

§ 2.907 Certification.

(a) Certification is an equipment authorization issued by the Commission, based on representation and test data submitted by the applicant.

(b) Certification attaches to all units subsequently marketed by the grantee which are identical (see Section 2.908) to the sample tested except for permissive changes or other variations authorized by the Commission pursuant to Section 2.1043.

¹ In this case, the equipment is subject to the rules of Part 15. More specifically, the equipment falls under Subpart B (of Part 15), which deals with unintentional radiators.



§ 2.948 Description of measurement facilities.

- (a) Each party making measurements of equipment that is subject to an equipment authorization under Part 15 or Part 18 of this chapter, regardless of whether the measurements are filed with the Commission or kept on file by the party responsible for compliance of equipment marketed within the U.S. or its possessions, shall compile a description of the measurement facilities employed.
 - (1) If the measured equipment is subject to the verification procedure, the description of the measurement facilities shall be retained by the party responsible for verification of the equipment.
 - (i) If the equipment is verified through measurements performed by an independent laboratory, it is acceptable for the party responsible for verification of the equipment to rely upon the description of the measurement facilities retained by or placed on file with the Commission by that laboratory. In this situation, the party responsible for the verification of the equipment is not required to retain a duplicate copy of the description of the measurement facilities.
 - (ii) If the equipment is verified based on measurements performed at the installation site of the equipment, no specific site calibration data is required. It is acceptable to retain the description of the measurement facilities at the site at which the measurements were performed.
 - (2) If the equipment is to be authorized by the Commission under the certification procedure, the description of the measurement facilities shall be filed with the Commission's Laboratory in Columbia, Maryland. The data describing the measurement facilities need only be filed once but must be updated as changes are made to the measurement facilities or as otherwise described in this section. At least every three years, the organization responsible for filing the data with the Commission shall certify that the data on file is current.



Label and User's Manual Information

The following is extracted from Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 15, Subpart A — General:

§ 15.19 Labeling requirements.

- (a) In addition to the requirements in Part 2 of this chapter, a device subject to certification or verification shall be labeled as follows:
 - (1) Receivers associated with the operation of a licensed radio service, e.g., FM broadcast under Part 73 of this chapter, land mobile operation under Part 90, etc., shall bear the following statement in a conspicuous location on the device:

This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the condition that this device does not cause harmful interference.

(2) A stand-alone cable input selector switch, shall bear the following statement in a conspicuous location on the device:

This device is verified to comply with Part 15 of the FCC Rules for use with cable television service.

(3) All other devices shall bear the following statement in a conspicuous location on the device:

This device complies with Part 15 of the FCC Rules. Operation is subject to the following two conditions: (1) This device may not cause harmful interference, and (2) this device must accept any interference received, including interference that may cause undesired operation.

- (4) Where a device is constructed in two or more sections connected by wires and marketed together, the statement specified under paragraph (a) of this section is required to be affixed only to the main control unit.
- (5) When the device is so small or for such use that it is not practicable to place the statement specified under paragraph (a) of this section on it, the information required by this paragraph shall be placed in a prominent location in the instruction manual or pamphlet supplied to the user or, alternatively, shall be placed on the container in which the device is marketed. However, the FCC identifier or the unique identifier, as appropriate, must be displayed on the device.

§ 15.21 Information to user.

The users manual or instruction manual for an intentional or unintentional radiator shall caution the user that changes or modifications not expressly approved by the party responsible for compliance could void the user's authority to operate the equipment.



The following is extracted from Title 47 of the Code of Federal Regulations, Part 15, Subpart B — Unintentional Radiators:

§ 15.105 Information to the user.

(a) For a Class A digital device or peripheral, the instructions furnished the user shall include the following or similar statement, placed in a prominent location in the text of the manual:

Note: This equipment has been tested and found to comply with the limits for a Class A digital device, pursuant to Part 15 of the FCC Rules. These limits are designed to provide reasonable protection against harmful interference when the equipment is operated in a commercial environment. This equipment generates, uses, and can radiate radio frequency energy and, if not installed and used in accordance with the instruction manual, may cause harmful interference to radio communications. Operation of this equipment in a residential area is likely to cause harmful interference in which case the user will be required to correct the interference at own expense.

(b) For a Class B digital device or peripheral, the instructions furnished the user shall include the following or similar statement, placed in a prominent location in the text of the manual:

Note: This equipment has been tested and found to comply with the limits for a Class B digital device, pursuant to Part 15 of the FCC Rules. These limits are designed to provide reasonable protection against harmful interference when the equipment is operated in a residential environment. This equipment generates, uses, and can radiate radio frequency energy and, if not installed and used in accordance with the instruction manual, may cause harmful interference to radio communications. However, there is no guarantee that interference will not occur in a particular installation. If this equipment does cause harmful interference to radio or television reception, which can be determined by turning the equipment off and on, the user is encouraged to try to correct the interference by one or more of the following measures:

- Reorient or relocate the receiving antenna.
- Increase the separation between the equipment and receiver.
- Connect the equipment into an outlet on a circuit different from that to which the receiver is connected.
- Consult the dealer or an experienced radio/TV technician for help.
