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1 GETTING STARTED

WARNING

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture, and low temperature.
- Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.

HANDSET RANGE

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

SIGNAL STRENGTH

When out of range of the base, the screen shows OUT OF RANGE. If you are on a call, the line will hang up. Move back within range of the base. The handset will automatically re-connect to the base.


Setting up IMPORTANT

The base must be plugged into an electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord into the telephone wall jack until the handset is fully charged. Use only the adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

WHICH POWER ADAPTER

The power adapter with the smaller DC plug is for the base unit and the power adapter with the larger DC plug is for the charger unit (only in multi-handset packs).


1.1 Connecting the base



- 1. Insert the DC plug of the power adapter and the telephone line cord into the base, as shown above. The power adapter with the larger DC plug is for the charger (only in multi-handset packs).
- 2. Insert the other end of the power adapter into a power outlet and the telephone line cord into a telephone wall jack.
- 3. Use only the supplied power adapter.

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1.2 Installing and charging the handset battery pack




- 1. Slide off the battery compartment cover to remove it. Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, and insert the plug of the battery pack into the socket, as shown above.
- 2. Slide the battery compartment cover back on.
- 3. Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 24 hours. Once charging completed, the <Battery full icon> will indicate that the handset is fully charged.

IMPORTANT

Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided with the product.

1.3 Installing and charging the battery pack of speaker pod



- 1. Slide off the battery compartment cover to remove it. Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, and insert the plug of the battery pack into the socket, as shown above.
- 2. Slide the battery compartment cover back on.
- 3. Put the speaker pod on the charging cradle for charging. When the speaker pod is properly placed on the charging cradle, the light on the speaker pod will turn on red steadily.

NOTE

With the clip on the back of speaker pod, you can wear it for convenient use when necessary.

IMPORTANT

Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided with the product.

1.4 Setting the display language

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP HS.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select LANGUAGE.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the desired language.
- 4. Press <MENU> to save the setting.

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1.5 Setting date and time

- 1. Press <MENU> to select DATE & TIME.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then use the keypad to edit the year and the date.
- 3. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> or <PHONEBOOK> or <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to move between the input fields YEAR and DATE.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then use the keypad to edit the time in 12 HR format.

 Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to toggle AM/PM settings. And use <PHONEBOOK> or <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to move the cursor to the target input field.
- 5. Press <MENU> to save the settings.

NOTE


If you have subscribed to your network provider's Caller ID service, date and time will be automatically set when a call is received.





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3 USING THE PHONE

3.1 Introducing Bluetooth

Your new telephone system with Bluetooth wireless technology has the following features:

- Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone with the telephone base. Up to two Bluetooth enabled mobile phones can be paired up and connected.
- Connecting a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone to make and receive CELLULAR calls. Up to two mobile phones can be connected but only one of them can be used at a time.
- Making and receiving calls using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone plan while benefiting from the ease and comfort of your home telephone system.

Glossary of terms

Below are some terms used in this User's Guide to help you become familiar with using your Bluetooth devices and your new telephone system.

Bluetooth mobile phone - Refers to a Bluetooth enabled mobile telephone.

CELLULAR line - The communications service provided through your Bluetooth enabled mobile telephone. **HOME** line - Your conventional telephone land line.

Pairing - This refers to the process of two Bluetooth devices registering device information with each other. The telephone base must be paired with a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone before the Bluetooth device can be used.

IMPORTANT INFORMATION

- Refer to the User's Guide of your mobile phone for more information about its Bluetooth function.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is between one to twelve feet away from the telephone base in order to maintain a clear and consistent connection among your Bluetooth mobile phone, telephone base and cell tower.
- Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has sufficient signal strength. You may need to move the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone and telephone base to a location where the cellular signal may be stronger.
- Charge your Bluetooth mobile phone while it is connected to the telephone base because your mobile phone's battery will discharge faster while it is connected wirelessly to the telephone base.
- Monitor your mobile phone's usage because airtime is deducted from your cellular plan for the duration of the CELLULAR calls.

3.2 Bluetooth Setup

3.2.1 Setup Cellular

To pair and connect a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone:

- Place your mobile phone near the handset and base unit.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select BLUETOOTH.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP CELLULAR.
- Press <MENU> and display will show CELLULAR READY?
- Press <MENU> and display will show DISCOVERABLE MODE. The Bluetooth feature will be activated.
- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, turn on the Bluetooth feature and search for a new device.
- Once your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has found the Motorola S701BT / S702BT / S703BT / S704BT / S705BT telephone, select it.
- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, enter the PIN code of the telephone (the default PIN code is 0000) to continue the pairing process.
- Pairing will be confirmed when you hear a tone and the Bluetooth icon appears on the handset. The handset displays COMPLETED.

Refer to the User's Guide of your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone to learn how to search for or add new Bluetooth devices.

NOTE

- Paired device(s) will be connected automatically and stored into the paired devices list.
- When a device is successfully connected, the corresponding <device #1 icon> or <#2 icon> will be displayed.

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• If you would like to pair up another Bluetooth device, please repeat the steps as above.

3.2.2 Replacing a paired device

If you have already paired up two Bluetooth enabled mobile devices, you will need to replace one of them if you would like to pair up another device. Follow the steps below to replace and pair up a new device.

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select BLUTOOTH.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP CELLULAR.
- Display will show the two cellular names of the paired devices.
- Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the cellular device you would like to replace.
- Press <MENU> to confirm. Display will show REPLACE THE CELLULAR?
- Press <MENU> to confirm. Display will show CELLULAR READY?
- Refer to section 3.2.1 to proceed with the next steps.

NOTE

When pairing a new cellular, the connected cellular will be disabled temporarily.

3.2.3 Paired devices

The cellular(s) paired up will be displayed in the paired devices list, no matter whether it(they) is(are) connected or not. You can choose to connect, or remove the cellular from this menu.

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select BLUETOOTH.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select PAIRED LIST.
- Press <MENU> and then display will show the Cellular name(s) of paired device(s).

NOTE

Display will show NO PAIRED DEVICE if there is no device paired up.

4. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the desired cellular device.

For the connected cellular device:

- Press <MENU> to remove the cellular device. Display will show REMOVE THE CELLULAR?
- 6. Press <MENU> to confirm.

For the cellular device that is not connected:

- 5. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select CONNECT or REMOVE CELLULAR.
- 6. Press <MENU> to confirm. If you select REMOVE CELLULAR, press <MENU> again to confirm.

NOTE

- When the connected cellular is removed, the corresponding <device #1 icon> or <#2 icon> will be off.
- When the disconnected cellular is connected, the corresponding <device #1 icon> or <#2 icon> will be on.
- When the cellular is removed, the device name will be removed and EMPTY will be displayed instead in the paired devices list.

3.3 Making a home call using your landline

1. Enter the phone number and press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the phone number.

3.4 Making a cellular call using your cordless DECT handset

If there is only one Bluetooth enabled mobile phone paired up and connected,

1. Enter the phone number, and then press <CELLULAR> to dial out.

If there are two Bluetooth enabled mobile phones paired up and connected,

- Enter the phone number, press <CELLULAR> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the desired cellular device.
- 2. Press <MENU> or <CELLULAR> to dial out.

NOTE

If the cellular device is paired up but not connected, you should connect the cellular device before making an external cellular call.

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3.5 Speed dial calling

1. In idle mode, press and hold a key from <1> to <9> until the number is displayed and dialed.

3.6 Answering a home call

Through the handset:

1. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to answer the incoming home call.

Through the speaker pod:

- 1. If the speaker pod is off the charging cradle, press <TALK ON/OFF> to answer the incoming home call. OR
- If the speaker pod is on the charging cradle, lift the speaker pod from the cradle to answer the incoming home call.

3.7 Answering a cellular call

1. Press <CELLULAR> or <SPEAKER> to answer the incoming cellular call.

NOTE

The speaker pod cannot be used to answer the cellular call.

3.8 Receiving a cellular call while on a home call

A short beep during a HOME call indicates that there is an incoming CELLULAR call and the screen will display the caller ID.

To answer the incoming cellular call:

• Press <CELLULAR> on the handset. The home call will be placed on hold automatically and <HOME LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To swap the line to a home call:

While talking on a cellular call, press <HOME> on the handset to swap to the home call. The cellular call will be
placed on hold automatically and <CELLULAR LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To end the cellular call:

• Press <CELLULAR> on the handset. The home call will be resumed automatically.

3.9 Receiving a home call while on a cellular call

A short beep during a CELLULAR call indicates that there is an incoming HOME call and the screen will display the caller ID.

To answer the incoming home call:

 Press <HOME> on the handset. The cellular line call will be placed on hold automatically and <CELLULAR LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To swap the line to a cellular call:

• While talking on a home call, press <CELLULAR> on the handset to swap to the cellular call. The home call will be placed on hold automatically and <HOME LINE ICON> will start flashing.

To end the home call:

• Press <HOME> on the handset. The cellular call will be resumed automatically.

3.10 Ending a home call

Through the handset:

1. During a home call, press <HOME> or put the handset on the base.

Through the speaker pod:

1. During a home call, press <TALK ON/OFF> or put the speaker pod on the charging cradle.

3.11 Ending a cellular call

1. During a cellular call, press <CELLULAR> or put the handset on the base.

3.12 Adjusting volume

Through the handset:

1. During a call, press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to adjust the volume.

Through the speaker pod:

1. During a call, press <VOL+> or <VOL-/FLASH> to adjust the speaker volume.

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3.13 Muting a call

- 1. During a call, press <MUTE> to mute the microphone and "*MUTED*" will be displayed on the screen. You can talk to someone else in the room without your caller hearing you.
- 2. Press <MUTE> again to resume the microphone.

3.14 Dialing from the redial list

- 1. Press <REDIAL/VOL-> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll and select the entry you want to redial.
- 2. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the number from the home line.

2. Press <CELLULAR> to dial the number from the cellular line.

3.15 Dialing from the calls list

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
- Press <#/ABC/PAUSE/FORMAT> to toggle the format of the dialing number.
- Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the number from the home line.

OR

3. Press <CELLULAR> to dial the number from the cellular line.

3.16 Adding an entry to the phonebook

- 1. Press <PHONEBOOK>.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll and select ADD.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then enter the name.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then enter the number.
- 5. Press <MENU> to save the entry.

NOTE

Numbers can be up to 24 digits long and names up to 16 characters long. Entries are stored in alphabetical order.

3.17 Storing a phonebook entry as a one touch number

- 1. Press <PHONEBOOK>.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SPEED DIAL.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the speed dial key from <KEY 1> to <KEY 9>.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll to the entry you want.
- 5. Press <MENU> to save the setting.

3.18 Dialing from the phonebook

- 1. Press <PHONEBOOK> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
- 2. Press <HOME> or <SPEAKER> to dial the number from the home line.

OR

2. Press <CELLULAR> to dial the number from the cellular line.

TIPS

Instead of scrolling to browse the phonebook entries, press the numeric key corresponding to the first letter of the entry you wish to locate. For example, pressing <KEY 2> will show the entries starting with A. Pressing <KEY 2> again will show the entries starting with B, etc.

3.19 Caller ID

If you have subscribed to Caller ID service, and provided the identity of the caller is not withheld, the number of the caller will be displayed together with the date and time of the call (if provided by the network).

NOTE

- If the telephone number is not available for incoming calls, the handset will display UNAVAILABLE.
- If the incoming call is from a withheld telephone number, the handset will display PRIVATE.
- Information about incoming calls will vary by country and network operator. Some operators may charge the subscription for their Caller ID service.

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3.19.1 Calls List

The calls list contains details of missed and received calls. Details include the date and time of the call. Entries are displayed in chronological order with the most recent call at the top of the list.

NOTE

- When the calls list is full, a new call will replace the oldest one in the list.
- Details of up to 30 calls may be stored.
- If you receive more than one call from the same number, only the most recent call is stored in the calls list.

 When you have missed calls (incoming calls that you have not answered), the <NEW icon> will be displayed on the screen of all handsets registered to the base. If one handset is used to view the calls list, the <NEW icon> on other handsets will still remain on (For multi-pack use only).

3.19.2 Viewing the calls list

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to browse the calls list.

NOTE

 When reviewing an entry from the calls list, press <#/ ABC/PAUSE/FORMAT> repeatedly to display the number in different formats.

For example, if a caller number is displayed as 888-331-3383, the various formats will be:

331-3383

1-331-3383

888-331-3383

1-888-331-3383

You may choose the desired number format for local or long distance numbers before dialing or saving it into the phonebook.

• The <NEW icon> is removed once the new call has been viewed.

3.19.3 Saving a number from the calls list to the phonebook

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the entry you want.
- 3. Press <MENU> to select SAVE TO PB.
- 4. Press <MENU> and then enter the name if desired.
- 5. Press <MENU> and then edit the number if desired.
- 6. Press <MENU> to save the entry.

3.19.4 Deleting a calls list entry

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll to the entry you want.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select DELETE.
- 4. Press <MENU> to confirm and the entry will be deleted.

3.19.5 Deleting the entire calls list

- 1. Press <RIGHT/CALLS LIST> to enter the calls list.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select DELETE ALL.
- 3. Press <MENU> and DELETE ALL CALL LOG ENTRIES? will be displayed.
- 4. Press <MENU> to confirm. All entries will be deleted.

NOTE

You need to review a call before you delete the record from the calls list.

- 2. Press <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to scroll through the menu.
- 3. Press <MENU> to open sub-menus and/or save settings.

Press <MUTE/CLEAR/BACK/X> to go back to previous menu level or cancel an action.

If you do not press any button on the handset for 30 seconds, the display will automatically return to standby. It will also return to standby when the handset is placed on the base or charger.

3.21 Intercom

This feature is only available when there are at least two registered handsets or a handset and a speaker pod. It allows you to make internal calls, transfer external home calls from one handset to another handset or the speaker pod, and use the conference option.

NOTE

Cellular call cannot be transferred.

3.21.1 Calling another handset or the speaker pod or all handsets

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select INTERCOM.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the handset or the speaker pod you want to call or select ALL HANDSETS.
- 3. Press <MENU> to make the call.
- 4. Press <HOME> to hang up.

NOTE

If the handset is not within the valid operation range, this function may not be available.

During an intercom call, you will hear an alert tone if there is an incoming external call. You need to press <HOME> to hang up the intercom call before answering the incoming external call.

3.21.2 Transferring an external home call to another handset or the speaker pod

- 1. During an external home call, press <MENU>.-Your call will be put on hold.
- 2. Press < VOL+> or < REDIAL/VOL-> to select the handset or the speaker pod you want to call.
- 3. Press <MENU> to call the handset or the speaker pod.
- 4. When the other handset answers by pressing <HOME> or <SPEAKER> or the speaker pod answers by pressing <TALK ON/OFF>, press <HOME> on the calling handset to transfer the call. If the other handset or the speaker pod does not answer, press <MUTE/CLEAR/BACK/X> to talk to your caller again.

NOTE

- You are not allowed to use the speaker pod to initiate an intercom call.
- To transfer the call from handset to speaker pod, you can also press <TALK ON/OFF> on the speaker pod to join the call, and then hang up the call on handset.

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3.21.3 Three-party conference call

- 1. During an external home call, press <MENU>. -Your call will be put on hold.

- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select AREA CODE.
- 3. Press <MENU> and enter the area code.
- 4. Press <MENU> to save the setting.

3.25 Registration

3.25.1 Registering a handset

Up to 5 handsets or speaker pods can be registered to one base. The original handset is pre-registered to use. Additional handsets must be registered to the base before you can use them.

To register an additional handset,

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SETUP HS.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select REGISTRATION.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select YES or NO.
- 4. Select YES and press <MENU> to enter the registration procedure as follows:
 - 1) Press and hold <FIND> for around 4 seconds on the base, release once **IN USE LED** is flashing.
 - 2) Place the unregistered handset on the base or charger.
 - 3) A confirmation tone is generated if registration is successful. Handset X is displayed where X denotes the number of handsets, and then the phone returns to idle.

To register an originally unregistered handset, follow steps 1) through 3) above.

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3.25.2 Registering a speaker pod

The speaker pod is pre-registered at the factory. If the speaker pod is unregistered, the light on it will turn on purple and start flashing slowly.

To register a speaker pod,

- Press and hold <FIND> for around 4 seconds on the base, release once IN USE LED is flashing.
- Press and hold <VOL+> together with <VOL-/FLASH> until the light on the speaker pod start toggling between red and blue.
- If the registration is successful, the light on the speaker pod will turn on blue and remain steadily on for 3 seconds.

3.26 Resetting all settings

When you are on either a cellular call or a home call, the answering system will not answer the second incoming call.

3.28.2 Turning on or off the answering machine

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWERER ON or ANSWERER OFF. If the answering machine is turned on originally, ANSWERER OFF will be displayed. If the answering machine is turned off originally, ANSWERER ON will be displayed.
- 3. Press <MENU> to confirm the setting.

3.28.3 Setting the announcement mode

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWERER MODE.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the announcement modes:
 - ANNC & RECORD invites your callers to leave a message.
 - ANNOUNCE ONLY lets callers hear your announcement but they cannot leave a message.
- 4. Press <MENU> to save the setting.

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3.28.4 Setting the rings to answer

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select RINGS TO ANSWER.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the rings to answer. (4 options are available: TOLL SAVER, 3, 4, or 5 RINGS).
- 4. Press <MENU> to save the setting.

NOTE

If Toll Saver setting is selected, the answering machine will pick up after two rings if there are new messages, and after four rings if there is no message.

3.28.5 Announcement

This is the message your callers hear on the answering machine. There are two pre-recorded outgoing messages, or you can record your own message.

3.28.5.1 Recording the announcement

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANNOUNCEMENT.

- 5. Press <MENU> to start recording after the beep.
- 6. Press <MENU> again to stop recording and save the message. The just saved message is played automatically.

NOTE

When playing the recorded message, press <MUTE/CLEAR/BACK/X> to delete it and the pre-recorded message will be set automatically.

3.28.5.2 Playing the announcement

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANNOUNCEMENT.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select PLAY.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select the answer mode ANNC & RECORD or ANNOUNCE ONLY.
- 5. Press <MENU> and the message will be played.

3.28.6 Recording a memo

You can record a memo which is stored in your answering machine and played back like a normal message.

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select RECORD MEMO.
- 3. Press <MENU> to start recording.
- 4. Press <MENU> again to stop recording and save the message. The just saved message is played automatically.

NOTE

When playing the message, press <MUTE/CLEAR/BACK/X> to delete it.

3.28.7 Call screening on/off

Call screening allows you to hear the message being recorded, and if you want, you may interrupt the message recording and take the call.

- 1. When the answering machine is recording, the handset displays SCREENING?.
- 2. Press <MENU> to listen to the caller through the handset earpiece, the handset displays CALL SCREENING.
- 3. Press <SPEAKER> to listen with the handset loudspeaker.
- Press <MUTE/CLEAR/BACK/X> to stop screening and leave the answering machine to record the message.
- 5. Press <HOME> to talk to the caller and stop recording.

3.28.8 Deleting all old messages

When the answering machine is full, <TAM Icon> will flash if there are new messages. ERASE SOME ANSWERER MSG will toggle within 2 seconds with MEMORY FULL. At this point, delete some messages to free up the memory.

3.28.9 Remote access

Remote access allows you to operate your answering machine and listen to your messages by calling from external line.

To turn the remote access on/off,

- Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select REMOTE ACCESS.

This is used to change the remote access PIN if necessary.

- 1. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select ANSWER MACHINE.
- 2. Press <MENU> and then <VOL+> or <REDIAL/VOL-> to select SECURITY CODE.
- 3. Press <MENU> and then enter the 4-digit security code.
- 4. Press <MENU> to save the setting.

4 HELP

I cannot pair my mobile phone to the telephone base

- Make sure the Bluetooth function of your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is turned on. See the User's Guide of your mobile phone for more information.
- Make sure the handset, base unit and mobile phone are located near each other.
- Remove the Motorola S701BT / S702BT / S703BT / S704BT / S705BT from your mobile phone's Bluetooth device history list (see the User's Guide of your mobile phone for more information).
- Carefully follow the pairing instructions in the User's Guide, make sure that your mobile phone is not connected to any other Bluetooth device(s).
- Turn off your mobile phone, and then turn it on again.
- Reset the telephone base. Unplug the unit's electrical power. Wait for approximately 15 seconds, and then plug it back in. Repeat the above suggestions.

The <Battery> icon is not scrolling when the handset is placed on the base

- Handset not properly seated on the base cradle –readjust the handset on the base.
- Dirty contact clean the charge contacts by wiping with an alcohol moistened cloth.
- Battery is full –charging is not necessary at this time.

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No dial tone

- If there is no base power, check the connections. Reset the phone by unplugging then plugging it back into an electrical outlet.
- If the handset batteries are empty, recharge the battery pack for at least 24 hours.
- Move the handset closer to the base.
- Be sure to use only the provided telephone cords.

Poor audio quality

• If the base is too close to electrical appliances, reinforced concrete walls, or metal door frames, move the base from these areas.

No ring tone

- The ringer may be off.
- The volume may need to be increased.

Caller ID does not work

- Check your subscription with your network operator.
- If you subscribe to high-speed internet service (Digital Subscriber Line DSL) through your telephone lines, you
 must install a DSL filter between the telephone base and the telephone wall jack. The filter will prevent noise
 and caller ID problems caused by DSL interference. Please contact your DSL service provider for more
 information about DSL filters.

A phonebook entry cannot be stored

• The phonebook is full. Delete an entry to free memory.

No display

- Try recharging or replacing the rechargeable battery pack.
- Reset the base. Unplug the unit's electrical, then plug it back in.
- If the LED is not lit up, then try to unplug the unit's electrical power, and then plug it back in.

If the handset/speaker pod disconnects from the base during a phone call

- Check that the power cord is connected properly into the base.
- Check that the power adapter is connected properly into the electrical outlet.
- Move the handset/speaker pod closer to the base. It may be out of range.
- Reset the base by unplugging the unit's electrical power. Reset the handset by unplugging and re-plugging its battery pack. Wait for around 15 seconds and re-plug the power again. Allow up to one minute for the handset/speaker pod to synchronize with the registered base again.

Noise interference on your radio or television
