Before you make your first call you will need to set up your phone. Follow the simple instructions in 'Getting Started', on the next few pages.

Only use the telephone line cord supplied.

This equipment is not designed to make emergency telephone calls during power failures. Alternative arrangements should be made for access to emergency services.

In multi-handset packs, you will find one or more additional handsets, chargers with power adapter units, additional rechargeable battery packs and battery doors.



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1. Getting started

WARNING

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid areas.

Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture and low temperature.
- Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- · Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals, unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.

HANDSET RANGE

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

SIGNAL STRENGTH

When out of range of the corded base, the screen shows OUT OF RANGE. If you are on a call, the line will hang up. Move back within in range. The cordless handset will automatically re-connect to the corded base.

Setting up

IMPORTANT

The base must be plugged into an electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord into the telephone wall jack until the handset is fully charged. Only use the adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

WHICH POWER ADAPTER?

The power adapter with the smaller pin is for the base unit and the power adapter with the larger pin is for the charger unit (only for multi-handset packs).

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1.1 Connecting the base



- Plug the power adapter and the telephone line cord into the base. The power adapter with the larger pin is for the charger (only in multi-handset packs).
- Plug the other end of the power adapter into a power outlet and the telephone line cord into a telephone wall jack. If you have DSL high speed internet service, a DSL filter (not included) is required.
- 3. Use only the provided power adapter.

1.2 Connecting the charger




- 1. Plug the power cable into the charger base.
- Plug the other end into a power wall socket not controlled by a wall switch.

1.3 Installing and charging the handset battery pack



- Slide off the battery compartment cover to remove it. Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, with the battery connector plugged in, as shown.
- 2. Slide the battery compartment cover back on.
- Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 24 hours. Once charged, the will indicate that the handset is fully charged.

IMPORTANT

Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided with the product.

1.4 Setting the display language

- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select SETUP HS.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select LANGUAGE.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the desired language.
- 4. Press MENU to save.

1.5 Setting the date and time

- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DATE&TIME. If you're a subscriber to your network's Caller ID service, the date and time is automatically set when a call is received.
- Press MENU and then use the keypad to edit the year and the date.

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


- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- or ☐ or CID to move between the input fields YEAR and DATE.
- Press MENU and then use the keypad to edit the time in 12 HR format. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to toggle AM/PM settings.
- 5. Press **MENU** to save the settings.

Your phone is now ready for use.

2. Getting to know your phone

2.1 Overview of your handset





Get acquainted with the following 14 buttons on your handset and their multi-function tasks.

1. Scroll up / Volume up

- a) In menu mode: Press to scroll up.
- b) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the left.
- c) During a call: Press to increase the volume.
- d) Calls list / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to scroll up the list.

2. Menu / Select

- a) In idle mode: Press to access menu list.
- b) In menu / editing mode: Press to confirm and save the settings.
- c) In calls list entry: Press to save the entry to the phonebook.
- **d)** In phonebook entry: Press to go to submenus of phonebook.

3. Right / Calls list

- a) In idle mode / during a call: Press to access calls list.
- b) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the right.

4. Talk off / Back

- a) In menu / editing mode: Press to exit to previous level.
- b) In pre-dial mode / phonebook / calls list / redial list entry: Press to exit to idle.
- c) During ringing: Press to silence the incoming ringer temporarily.
- d) During a call: Press to end a call.

5. Alphanumeric keypad

- a) In idle / pre-dial / editing mode / during a call: Press to enter characters / numbers.
- b) In idle mode: Press and hold to activate speed dial.

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6. #/Pause / ABC / Format

- a) In idle / pre-dial / number editing mode / during a call: Press to insert a "#", press and hold to insert a pause (P).
- b) In name editing mode: Toggle ABC/abc. Press and hold to insert a space.
- c) In calls list entry: Press to toggle Caller ID display format between 7, 8, 10 and 11 digits when returning calls from Caller ID list.
- d) In phonebook list entry: If the number is more than 16 digits, press to view the next page of remaining digits.
- 7. Cellular call
 - a) In idle mode: Press to redial the last dialed cellular call.
 - b) During a cellular call: Press to end the call.
- 8. Microphone
- 9. Speaker

- a) In idle / pre-dial mode: Press to make a call with the speakerphone.
- **b) During a call:** Press to toggle between the speakerphone and the earpiece.
- c) Calls List / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to make a call with the speakerphone.
- d) During ringing: Press to answer a call with thespeakerphone.

10. */Tone

- a) In idle / pre-dial / editing mode: Press to insert a *.
- b) During a call: Press to switch from pulse to tone dialing temporarily if pulse mode was selected before. After the call has ended, the dial mode will change back to pulse.
- c) In phonebook list entry: If the number is more than 16 digits, press to view the previous page of remaining digits.



11. Scroll Down / Volume Down / Redial List

- a) In idle mode: Press to access the redial list.
- b) In menu mode: Press to scroll down.
- c) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the right.
- d) During a call: Press to decrease the volume.
- e) Calls list / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to scroll down the list.

12. Talk On / Flash

- a) In idle / pre-dial mode: Press to make a call.
- b) Calls List / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to make a call to the selected entry.
- c) During a call: Press to switch another call.
- d) During an incoming call: Press to answer a call.

13. Left / Phonebook


- a) In idle mode / during a call: Press to access the phonebook.
- b) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the left.

14. Mute / Clear / Back / X

- a) In menu / phonebook entry mode: Press to exit to the previous level.
- b) In pre-dial / editing mode: Press to delete one character / digit. Press and hold to delete all characters / digits.
- c) During a call: Press to mute / unmute the call.





3. Using the phone

3.1 Introducing Bluetooth

Your new telephone system with Bluetooth wireless technology has the following features:

- Pairing a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone with the telephone base. One Bluetooth enabled mobile phone can be paired up and connected.
- Connecting a Bluetooth enabled telephone to make and receive MOBILE calls. Only one mobile phones can be connected and be used at a time.
- Making and receiving calls using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone plan while benefiting from the ease and comfort of your home telephone system.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION

Refer to your mobile phone user's guide for more information about its Bluetooth function.

Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is between one to twelve feet away from the telephone base in order to maintain a clear and consistent connection between your Bluetooth mobile phone, telephone base and cell tower.

Make sure that your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has sufficient signal strength. You may need to move the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone and telephone base to a location where the mobile signal may be stronger.

Charge your Bluetooth mobile phone while it is connected to the telephone base because your mobile phone's battery will discharge faster while it is connected wirelessly to the telephone base.

Monitor your mobile phone's usage because airtime is deducted from your mobile plan for the duration of the MOBILE calls.

3.2 Bluetooth setup

To use a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone with your telephone, you must first pair and connect your Bluetooth mobile phone with the telephone base. All handsets can be used to make or answer calls on the mobile phone line.

3.2.1 Add a mobile phone

To pair and connect a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone:

- Place your mobile phone near the handset and base unit.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select PAIR CELLULAR.
- Press MENU and the screen will display " CELLULAR READY?".
- Press MENU and the screen will display "DISCOVERABLE MODE". The Bluetooth feature of system is activated.

- Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, turn on the Bluetooth feature and search for a new device.
- Once your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone has found the Motorola L60XBT telephone, select it and continue the pairing process.
- When the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is successfully paired, the screen will display "COMPLETED" with a tone and the Bluetooth icon appears on the handset.

Refer to the user's manual of your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone to learn how to search for or add new Bluetooth devices.

NOTES

- Paired mobile phone will be connected automatically and stored.
- When a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is successfully connected, the icon will be displayed on screen.

3.2.2 Replace a paired mobile phone

If you have already paired up a Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, you will need to remove it if you would like to pair up another device. Follow the below steps to replace and pair up a new device.

- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select REMOVE.
- Press MENU and the screen will display "REMOVE THE CELLULAR READY?"
- Press MENU to confirm and the screen will display "REMOVING...".
- When the device is removed, you will hear a confirmation tone and "REMOVED" will be displayed on the screen.
- Refer to section 3.2.1 add a mobile phone to proceed with the next steps to replace a new Bluetooth enabled mobile phone.



3.2.3 Connect the paired mobile phone

The **3** icon will be display on the handset screen when a mobile has been paired up, no matter it is connected or not. You can connect the paired mobile phone from the menu

- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select PAIR CELLULAR.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select CONNECT. The screen will display "CONNECTING...".
- 3. Using your Bluetooth enabled mobile phone, turn on the Bluetooth feature.
- When the Bluetooth enabled mobile phone is successfully connected, there will be a confirmation tone and the screen will display "CONNECTED".

NOTE

The screen will show "FAILED" if the Bluetooth of the mobile phone is turn off.

3.3 Making a call

3.3.1 Preparatory dialing

Enter the phone number and then press **\/FLASH** or **□***/**SPEAKER** to dial the phone number.

3.3.2 Making a cellular call

- In idle mode, press . The screen will display "REDIAL THE LAST CELLULAR NUMBER."
- Press or MENU to dial out the last dialed cellular number.

NOTE

If there is no Bluetooth enabled mobile phone paired up and connected, when pressing \Box , the screen will display "NO CONNECTED CELLULAR PHONE."

3.3.3 Dialing from the phonebook

- Press
 and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
- Press \FLASH or \₹/SPEAKER to dial the number.

3.3.4 Dialing from the redial list

- Press REDIAL/VOL- and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL to scroll and select an entry you want to redial.
- Press VFLASH or
 SPEAKER to dial the number.

3.3.5 Dialing from the calls list

- Press CID and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the entry you want to dial.
- Toggle the #/AEG/PAUSE/FORMAT key to format the dialing number.
- Press VFLASH or
 SPEAKER to dial the number
- 3.3.6 Dialing from the speed dial location
 In idle mode, <u>press and hold</u> a key from <u>▶</u>/1 to
 WXYZ/9 until the number is displayed and dialed.

3.4 Muting a call

- During a call, press MUTE to mute the microphone, so that you can talk to someone else in the room without your caller hearing you.
- 2. Press MUTE again to unmute.

3.5 Answering a call

Press V/FLASH or 4:/SPEAKER to answer the incoming call.

To answer a cellular call:

Press **.**

3.6 Ending a call

During a call, press **ACK** or put the handset on the base.

To end a cellular call:

Press or **MBACK**.



3.7 Adjusting volume

During a call, press **VOL+** or **REDIAL/VOL-** to adjust the volume.

3.8 Call waiting

If you subscribe to call waiting service from your telephone service provider, you hear a tone if someone calls when you are already on a call.

During home line call:

Press **FLASH** to put your current call on hold and take the new call.

Press **FLASH** at any time to switch back and forth between calls.

During cellular call:

Press \(\bar{a} \) to put your current call on hold and take the new call.

Press \(\begin{aligned} \text{at any time to switch back and forth between cellular line calls.} \)

To receive a cellular call while on a home line call:

Press to put your current home line call on hold and swap to the cellular call.

Press **HOME** at any time to switch back and forth between home line calls.

To receive a home line call while on a cellular call: Press **HOME** to put your current call on hold and take the new home line call

Press \(\begin{aligned} \text{at any time to switch back and forth between cellular line calls.} \)

3.9 Redial the last number

You can redial up to 5 of the last numbers called. Each number can have a maximum of 32 digits. If the redial number exceeds 15 digits, the telephone will only display the first 15 digits for the number. If you have stored a name in the directory to match with the number, the name will be displayed instead. The most recent last number will display at the top of the redial list

3.9.1 Redialing a number from the redial list

- In idle mode, press REDIAL/VOL- to access the redial list.
- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to the desired redial number.
- Press VFLASH or ⊄5/SPEAKER to dial to the displayed redial number.

3.9.2 Storing a redial number into the phonebook

- Follow the steps 1 to 2 in the section Redialing a number from the redial list.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select MENU.
- 3. Press MENU to enter the name.
- 4. Press **MENU** to enter the number.
- 5. Press **MENU** to confirm. The screen will display "**SAVED**" with a confirmation tone.

3.9.3 Deleting a redial number

1. Follow the steps 1 to 2 in the section Redialing a

- number from the redial list.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DELETE.
- Press MENU. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

3.9.4 Deleting the entire redial list

- In idle mode, press REDIAL/VOL- to access the redial list.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DELETE ALL.
- Press MENU. The screen will display "DELETE ALL?".
- Press MENU to confirm. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

3.10 Phonebook

You phone can store up to 30 entries with name and numbers. Each phonebook entry can have a maximum of 24 digits for the phone number and



16 characters for the name. Phonebook entries are stored alphabetically by name.

3.10.1 Reviewing an entry to the phonebook

1. Press Q.

OR

Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select.

Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to review the name and number.

NOTE

If a number is more than 15 digits, press TONE/* or #/ABG/PAUSE/FORMAT to review the remaining digits.

3.10.2 Adding an entry to the phonebook

1. Press

OR

Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select.

- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll and select ADD.
- 3. Press MENU and then enter the name.
- 4. Press MENU and then enter the number.
- 5. Press MENU to save.

NOTES

- Numbers can be up to 24 digits long and names up to 16 characters long. Entries are stored in alphabetical order.
- If there is no entry in the phonebook, the screen will display "LIST EMPTY" when pressing ____, then back to phone book menu.

3.10.3 Storing a phonebook entry as a one touch number

Press ...

OR

Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select.

- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select SPEED DIAL.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the speed dial key from __/1 to WXYZ/9.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to the entry you want.
- 5. Press MENU to save.

3.10.4 Dialing from the phonebook

1. Press III.

OR

Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.

 Press VFLASH or □/SPEAKER to dial the number.

TIPS

Instead of scrolling to browse the phonebook entries, press

the numeric key corresponding to the first letter of the entry you wish to locate. For example, pressing 2 will show the entries starting with A. Pressing 2 again will show the entries starting with B, etc.

3.11 Speed dial

You can store up to 9 numbers in the speed dial locations. Each speed dial location can have a maximum of 24 digits for number and 16 characters for name. This feature makes convenient when you want to dial a certain number more quickly.

3.11.1 Reviewing the entry in a speed dial location

- 1. Press MENU.
- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select PHONEBOOK. The first entry will be displayed on the screen.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select SPEED DIAL.



- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the desired speed dial key from 1/1 to WXYZ/9.
- Press MENU. The screen will show the speed dial entry in the selected speed dial location.

3.11.2 Storing an entry to a speed dial location

- 1. Follow the steps 1 to 4 in the section Reviewing the entry in a speed dial location.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to the entry you want.
- 3. Press MENU to save.

NOTE

If the desired location has stored a speed dial number, when pressing MENU in the step 2, the screen will display the stored number. If you want to replace it, press MENU to select ADD, then press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to the desired number, press MENU again to confirm, the screen will display "SAVED" with a confirmation tone.

3.11.3 Deleting an entry in a speed dial location

- Follow the steps 1 to 4 in the section Reviewing the entry in a speed dial location.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DELETE.
- Press MENU. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

3.12 Caller ID

If you have subscribed to Caller ID service, and provided the identity of the caller is not withheld, the number of the caller will be displayed together with the date and time of the call (if provided by the network).

NOTES

- If the telephone number is not available for incoming calls, the handset will display UNAVAILABLE.
- If the incoming call is from a withheld telephone

number, the handset will display **PRIVATE**.

 Information about incoming calls will vary by country and network operator. Some operators may charge a subscription for their Caller ID service.

3.12.1 Calls List

The calls list contains details of missed and received calls. Details include the date and time of the call. Entries are displayed in chronological order with the most recent call at the top of the list.

NOTES

- When the calls list is full, a new call replaces the oldest one in the list.
- · Details of up to 30 calls may be stored.
- If you receive more than one call from the same number, only the most recent call is kept in the calls list. When you have missed calls (incoming calls that you haven't answered) the icon will be

displayed in the display on all handsets registered to the base. If one handset is used to view the calls log, the icon on the other handsets remains on (for multi-pack use only).

3.12.2 Viewing the calls list

- 1. Press CID to enter the calls list.
- Scroll VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to browse the calls list.

NOTES

 When reviewing an entry from the calls list, press #/ABC/PAUSE/FORMAT repeatedly to display the number in different format.

For example, if a caller number is displayed as 888-331-3383, the various formats will be:

331-3383

1-331-3383

888-331-3383

1-888-331-3383



You may choose the desired number format for local and long distance numbers before dialing or saving it into the phonebook.

 The NEW icon is removed once the new call has been viewed.

3.12.3 Saving a number from the calls list to the phonebook

- 1. Press CID to enter the calls list.
- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the entry you want.
- Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select SAVE TO PB.
- 4. Press MENU and then enter the name if desired.
- 5. Press MENU and then edit the number if desired.
- 6. Press MENU to save.

3.12.4 Deleting a calls list entry

1. Press CID to enter the calls list.

- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to the entry you want.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to DELETE.
- Press MENU. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

3.12.5 Deleting the entire calls list

- Press CID to enter the calls list.
- Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to DELETE ALL.
- Press MENU. The screen will display "DELETE ALL CALL LOG ENTRIES?"
- Press MENU to confirm. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone. All entries will be deleted.

NOTE

You need to review a call before you delete the record from the call list.



3.13 Personal settings

- 1 Press MENU
- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll through the menu.
- Press MENU for opening sub-menus and/or saving.

Press **MUTE** to go back to the previous menu level or cancel an action.

If you do not press any button on the handset for 30 seconds, the display will automatically return to standby. It will also return to standby when the handset is placed on the base or charger.

3.14 Intercom

This feature is only available when there are at least two registered handsets. It allows you to make internal calls, transfer external calls from one handset to another handset, and use the conference option.

3.14.1 Calling another handset

- Press \FLASH then MENU. Except for the originating handset, all registered handsets will be displayed in the list.
- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the handset you want to call.
- 3. Press MENU to call the handset.
- 4. Press —/BACK to hang up.

NOTE

If the handset is not within the valid operation range, this function may not be available. During an intercom call, you will hear an alert tone if there is an incoming external call. You need to press —/BACK to hang

up the intercom call before answering the incoming external call.

3.14.2 Transferring a call to another handset

- During an external call, press \/FLASH then MENU. All registered handsets will be displayed in the list.
 - Your call is put on hold.
