## 1. Getting started

## WARNING

Do not place your phone in the bathroom or other humid area.

## Location

When choosing a location for your new phone, here are some important guidelines you should consider:

- Avoid sources of noise and heat, such as motors, fluorescent lighting, microwave ovens, heating appliances and direct sunlight.
- Avoid areas of excessive dust, moisture and low temperature.
- Avoid other cordless telephones or personal computers.
- Never install telephone wiring during a lightning storm.
- Never install telephone jacks in wet locations unless the jack is specifically designed for wet locations.
- Never touch non-insulated telephone wires or terminals, unless the telephone line has been disconnected at the network interface.
- Use caution when installing or modifying telephone lines.


## HANDSET RANGE

Optimal range is reached when there are no other electrical appliances working within the range area. Any obstruction between the base and handset will also reduce the range significantly.

## SIGNAL STRENGTH

When out of range of the corded base, the screen shows OUT OF RANGE. If you are on a call, the line will hang up. Move back within range. The cordless handset will automatically re-connect to the corded base.

## Setting up

IMPORTANT
The base must be plugged into an electrical outlet at all times. Do not connect the telephone line cord to the telephone wall jack until the handset is fully charged. Only use the adapter and telephone line cord supplied with the product.

## WHICH POWER ADAPTER?

The power adapter with the smaller pin is for the base unit and the power adapter with the larger pin is for the charger unit (only for multi-handset packs).

### 1.1 Connecting the base



1. Plug the power adapter and the telephone line cord into the base. The power adapter with the larger pin is for the charger (only in multi-handset packs).
2. Plug the other end of the power adapter into a power outlet and the telephone line cord into a telephone wall jack. If you have DSL high speed internet service, a DSL filter (not included) is required.
3. Use only the provided power adapter.

### 1.2 Connecting the charger



1. Plug the larger end of the power cable into a power wall socket not controlled by a wall switch.

### 1.3 Installing and charging the handset battery pack



1. Slide off the battery compartment cover to remove it. Place the supplied rechargeable battery pack in the battery compartment, with the battery connector plugged in, as shown.
2. Slide the battery compartment cover back on.
3. Put the handset on the base to charge for at least 24 hours. Once charged, the will indicate that the handset is fully charged.

## IMPORTANT

Use only the rechargeable battery pack provided with the product.

### 1.4 Setting the display language

1. Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select SETUP HS.
2. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select LANGUAGE.
3. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select the desired language.
4. Press SELECT to save.

### 1.5 Setting the date and time

1. Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DATE\&TIME. If you're a subscriber to your network's Caller ID service, the date and time is automatically set when a call is received.
2. Press SELECT and then use the keypad to edit the year and the date.
3. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- or $\mathbb{1}$ or CID to move between the input fields YEAR and DATE.
4. Press SELECT and then use the keypad to edit the time in 12 HR format. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to toggle AM/PM settings.
5. Press SELECT to save the settings.

Your phone is now ready for use.

## 2. Getting to know your phone

### 2.1 Overview of your handset



Get acquainted with the following 14 buttons on your handset and their multi-function tasks.

1. M1/M2/M3
a) In idle mode: Press and hold to edit or store a number into the memory key. Press to dial the stored number.
2. Scroll up / Volume up
a) In menu mode: Press to scroll up.
b) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the left.
c) During a call: Press to increase the volume.
d) Calls list / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to scroll up the list.
3. MENU / SELECT
a) In idle mode: Press to access the menu list.
b) In menu / editing mode: Press to confirm and save the settings.
c) In calls list entry: Press to save the entry to the phonebook.
d) In phonebook entry: Press to go to phonebook sub- menus.
4. Right / Calls list
a) In idle mode / during a call: Press to access the calls list.
b) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the right.
5. Talk off / Back
a) In menu / editing mode: Press to exit to the previous level.
b) In pre-dial mode / phonebook / calls list / redial list entry: Press to exit to idle.
c) During ringing: Press to silence the incoming ringer temporarily.
d) During a call: Press to end a call.
6. Alphanumeric keypad
a) In idle / pre-dial / editing mode / during a call: Press to enter characters / numbers.
b) In idle mode: Press and hold to activate speed dial.
7. \#/Pause / ABC / Format
a) In idle / pre-dial / number editing mode / during a call: Press to insert a "\#", press and hold to insert a pause ( $\mathbf{P}$ ).
b) In name editing mode: Toggle $A B C / a b c$. Press and hold to insert a space.
c) In a calls list entry: Press to toggle Caller ID display format between $7,8,10$ and 11 digits when returning calls from Caller ID list.
d) In a phonebook list entry: If the number is more than 16 digits, press to view the next page of remaining digits.

## 8. INTERCOM

a) In idle mode: Press to make an internal call.
b) During a call: Press to transfer the call to another handset.
9. Microphone
10. Speaker
a) In idle / pre-dial mode: Press to make a call with the speakerphone.
b) During a call: Press to toggle between the speakerphone and the earpiece.
c) Calls list / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to make a call with the speakerphone.
d) During ringing: Press to answer a call with thespeakerphone.
11. */Tone
a) In idle / pre-dial / editing mode: Press to insert a*.

b) During a call: Press to switch from pulse to tone dialing temporarily if pulse mode was selected before. After the call has ended, the dial mode will change back to pulse.
c) In a phonebook list entry: If the number is more than 16 digits, press to view the previous page of remaining digits.
12. Scroll Down / Volume Down / Redial List
a) In idle mode: Press to access the redial list.
b) In menu mode: Press to scroll down.
c) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the right.
d) During a call: Press to decrease the volume.
e) Calls list / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to scroll down the list.

## 13. Talk On / Flash

a) In idle / pre-dial mode: Press to make a call.
b) Calls list / phonebook / redial list entry: Press to make a call to the selected entry.
c) During a call: Press to switch to another call.
d) During an incoming call: Press to answer a call.

## 14.Left / Phonebook

a) In idle mode / during a call: Press to access the phonebook.
b) In editing mode: Press to move the cursor to the left.
15. MUTE / Clear / Back / X
a) In menu / phonebook entry mode: Press to exit to the previous level.
b) In pre-dial / editing mode: Press to delete one character / digit. Press and hold to delete all characters / digits.
c) During a call: Press to mute / unmute the call.

### 2.3 Overview of the base



1. Fin Find

Press to find/page all registered handsets. Press the button again, or any key on the handset, to turn off page signal.
2. $4 \times$ VOL+

Increase speaker volume during message playback or increase the base ringer volume when there is an incoming external call.
3. Von VOL-

Decrease speaker volume during message playback or decrease the base ringer volume when there is an incoming external call.
4. $=$ SKIP

Press to skip the current message and play the next message.
5. $\because$ PLAY/STOP

Press to play the message.
Press to stop the message playback.
6. LIGHT

On when the phone is in use.
7. $=$ REPEAT

Press to repeat the current message from the beginning. Press twice to repeat the previous message.
8. $\because$ ANS ON/OFF

Press to turn on the answering machine. Press again to turn off the answering machine.

## 3. Using the phone

### 3.1 Making a call

### 3.1.1 Preparatory dialing

Enter the phone number and then press $6 /$ FLASH or पI/SPEAKER to dial the phone number.

### 3.1.2 Direct dialing

Press 6/FLASH or 1 I/SPEAKER to get a line and enter the phone number.
3.1.3 Dialing from the phonebook

1. Press $[D$ and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
2. Press $\mathbf{6} /$ FLASH or $\square / /$ SPEAKER to dial the number.
3.1.4 Dialing from the redial list
3. Press REDIAL/VOL- and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL to scroll and select an entry you want to redial.
4. Press $\mathbf{W} /$ FLASH or $\square \equiv /$ SPEAKER to dial the number.

### 3.1.5 Dialing from the calls list

1. Press CID and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select the entry you want to dial.
2. Toggle the \#/ABC/PAUSE/FORMAT key to format the dialed number.
3. Press $W /$ FLASH or $\square / /$ SPEAKER to dial the number.

### 3.1.6 Dialing from the speed dial location

 In idle mode, press and hold a key (1-9) until the speed dial number is displayed and dialed.
### 3.2 Muting a call

1. During a call, press MUTE to mute the microphone, so that you can talk to someone else in the room without your caller hearing you.
2. Press MUTE again to unmute.

### 3.3 Answering a call

Press $\mathbf{W} /$ FLASH or $\downarrow$ :/SPEAKER to answer an the incoming call.

### 3.4 Ending a call

During a call, press /BACK or put the handset on the base.

### 3.5 Adjusting the volume

During a call, press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to adjust the volume.

### 3.6 Call waiting

If you subscribe to call waiting service from your telephone service provider, you hear a tone if someone calls when you are already on a call. Press FLASH to put your current call on hold and take the new call.
Press FLASH at any time to switch back and forth between calls.

### 3.7 Redialing the last number

You can redial up to 5 of the last numbers called. Each number can have a maximum of 32 digits. If the redial number exceeds 15 digits, the telephone will only display the first 15 digits of the number. If you have stored a name in the directory to match the number, the name will be displayed instead. The most recent last number will display at the top of the redial list.

### 3.7.1 Redialing a number from the redial list

1. In idle mode, press REDIAL/VOL- to access the redial list.
2. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to the desired redial number.
3. Press $6 / F L A S H$ or $1 / /$ SPEAKER to dial to the displayed redial number.

### 3.7.2 Storing a redial number into the phonebook

1. Follow steps 1 to 2 in the section Redialing a number from the redial list.
2. Press MENU then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select PHONEBOOK.
3. Press SELECT to enter the name.
4. Press SELECT to enter the number.
5. Press SELECT to confirm. The screen will display "SAVED" with a confirmation tone.

### 3.7.3 Deleting a redial number

1. Follow steps 1 to 2 in the section Redialing a number from the redial list.
2. Press SELECT then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DELETE.
3. Press SELECT. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

### 3.7.4 Deleting the entire redial list

1. In idle mode, press REDIAL/VOL- to access the redial list.
2. Press SELECT then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select DELETE ALL.
3. Press SELECT. The screen will display "DELETE ALL?".
4. Press SELECT to confirm. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

### 3.10 Phonebook

You phone can store up to 30 entries with names and numbers. Each phonebook entry can have a maximum of 24 digits for the phone number and 16 characters for the name. Phonebook entries are stored alphabetically by name.

### 3.10.1 Reviewing an entry in the phonebook

1. Press $\square$.

OR
Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select.
2. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to review the name and number.

## NOTE

If a number is more than 15 digits, press * or \# to review the remaining digits.
3.10.2 Adding an entry to the phonebook

1. Press [D.

OR
Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select.
2. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto scroll and select ADD.
3. Press SELECT and then enter the name.
4. Press SELECT and then enter the number.
5. Press SELECT to save.

## NOTES

- Numbers can be up to 24 digits long and names up to 16 characters long. Entries are stored in alphabetical order.
- If there is no entry in the phonebook, the screen will display "LIST EMPTY" when pressing $[\square$, then go back to phone book menu.
3.10.3 Storing a phonebook entry to a speed dial location

1. Press $\square$.

OR
Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press MENU to select.
2. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select SPEED DIAL.
3. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select the speed dial key from key (1-9).
4. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto scroll to the desired entry..
5. Press SELECT to save.

### 3.10.4 Dialing from the phonebook

1. Press $\square$.

OR
Press MENU and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to PHONEBOOK. Press SELECT to select. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll and select the entry you want to dial.
2. Press $6 /$ FLASH or $1 / /$ SPEAKER to dial the number.

## TIP

Instead of scrolling to browse phonebook entries, press the numeric key corresponding to the first letter of the entry you wish to locate. For example, pressing 2 will show the entries starting with $A$. Pressing 2 again will show the entries starting with $B$, etc.

### 3.11 Speed dial

You can store up to 9 numbers in the speed dial locations. Each speed dial location can have a maximum of 24 digits for the number and 16 characters for the name. This feature makes it convenient when you want to dial a certain number more quickly.

### 3.11.1 Reviewing the entry in a speed dial location

1. Press MENU.
2. Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select PHONEBOOK. Press SELECT, and the first entry will be displayed on the screen.
3. Press SELECT then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to select SPEED DIAL.
4. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select the desired speed dial key from key (1-9).
5. Press SELECT. The screen will show the speed dial entry in the selected speed dial location.

### 3.11.2 Storing an entry to a speed dial location

1. Follow steps 1 to 4 in the section Reviewing the entry in a speed dial location.
2. Press SELECT then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to scroll to the desired entry.
3. Press SELECT to save.

## NOTE

If the desired location has stored a speed dial number, when pressing SELECT in step 2, the screen will display the stored number. If you want to replace it, press SELECT to select ADD, then press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to the desired number, press SELECT again to confirm, and the screen will display "SAVED" with a confirmation tone.
3.11.3 Dialing the entry from a speed dial location

1. Press $6 / F L A S H$ or $1 / / S P E A K E R$.
2. Press and hold the desired speed dial key location (1-9) to dial the speed dial number.

### 3.11.4 Deleting an entry in a speed dial location

1. Follow steps 1 to 4 in the section Reviewing the entry in a speed dial location.
2. Press SELECT and then VOL+ or REDIAL/VOLto select DELETE.
3. Press SELECT. The screen will display "DELETED" with a confirmation tone.

### 3.12 Memory

You can store up to 3 numbers in the memory locations (M1. M2, M3). Each memory location can have a maximum of 24 digits for the number and 15 characters for the name. This feature makes it convenient when you want to dial a certain number more quickly. All direct access memory records will remain after resetting.

### 3.12.1 Storing a memory number

1. In idle mode, use the dialing keys (0-9) to enter the number you want to store in the memory location.
2. Press and hold the desired memory location that does not store any number. The screen will display "ENTER NUMBER" and will show the number.
3. Press SELECT to save.

## NOTES

- Press CLEAR to delete a digit.
- Press VOL+ or REDIAL/VOL- to move the cursor to the left or right.


## NOTE

If the number you entered exceeds 24 , you will hear an error tone.

### 3.12.2 Reviewing a memory number

1. Press and hold the desired memory location, and the screen will display the number stored in there.

The K70X is equipped with a telephone answering machine that records unanswered calls when it is switched on. The screen message counter (two digits) seven segment display on the base will show the number of the messages when the answering machine is on. The answering machine can store up to 59 messages within the maximum recording time of approximately 15 minutes. Besides recording incoming messages, you can record memos for other users of your phone.
If the answering machine memory is full, "F" will display on the message counter on the base and "MEMORY FULL" will display on the handset screen.

## NOTE

Your answering machine is designed to answer calls after 10 rings when it is switched off. This is to enable you to operate the remote access functions of your answering machine in the event your answering machine is switched off.

### 4.1 Turning the answering machine on/off

You can turn the answering machine on or off through the base or handset. When the answering machine is set to ON, calls will be answered after the set answer delay and the caller can then leave you a message. When the answering machine is set to OFF, calls will be answered after 10 rings and the answer only message will be played to your callers. They will not be able to leave you a message.

5. Press SELECT to start recording your personalized OGM and RECORDING is displayed on the screen with the announcement, "Recording announcement for recorded message mode after the mode."
6. Press SELECT to stop and save your personalized OGM. Your newly saved OGM will playback automatically. Alternatively, press to return to the previous screen without saving the personalized OGM.

If the pre-set OGM is playing, you are not able to delete the pre-set OGM and thus OK will not display. Only $\mathbf{C}$ will display.

- The handset not properly seated on the base cradle - readjust the handset on the base.
- Dirty contact - clean the charge contacts by wiping with an alcohol moistened cloth.
- Battery is full - charging is not necessary at this time.


## No dial tone

- If there is no base power, check the connections. Reset the phone by unplugging and plugging it back into an electrical outlet.
- If the handset batteries are empty, recharge the battery pack for at least 24 hours.
- Move the handset closer to the base.
- Be sure to use only the provided telephone cords.


## Poor audio quality

- If the base is too close to electrical appliances, reinforced concrete walls, or metal door frames, move the base from these areas.


## No ring tone

- The ringer may be off.
- The volume may need to be increased.


## Caller ID does not work

- Check your subscription with your network operator.
