

## Your Phone at a Glance

The following illustration outlines your device's primary external features and buttons.



## Set Up Your Device

You must first install and charge the battery to begin setting up your device.

- 1. Install the battery.
  - Remove the battery from its packaging.
  - Insert the battery into the opening in the back of the device, making sure the connectors align (see step 1 in the following illustration). Gently press down to secure the battery (see step 2 in the following illustration).
  - Position the back cover over the battery compartment and press down until you hear a click (see step 3 in the following illustration). Press and hold the Power/Lock Button located on the top right to turn the device on.



## Activate Your Device

Depending on your account or how and where you purchased your device, it may be ready to use or you may need to activate it on your Sprint account.

- If you purchased your device at a Sprint Store, it is probably activated and ready to use.
- If you received your device in the mail and it is for a new Sprint account or a new line of service, it is designed to activate automatically. To confirm your activation, make a phone call.
- If you received your device in the mail and you are activating a new phone for an existing number on your account (you're swapping phones), you can activate on your computer online or directly on your phone.
  - Activate on your computer:
    - Go to sprint.com/activate and follow the instructions.
  - Activate on your device:

**Note:** For security reasons, you will need your Sprint phone number and PIN to use this activation method.

- 1. Turn on your new phone. (Make sure the old one is turned off.) Your device will automatically attempt Hands-Free Activation.
- 2. Tap **Activate** to override auto-activation and start the manual activation wizard.

**Note:** If you don't override Hands-Free Activation, your device will attempt to auto activate five times. Wait for **Retry** to appear on your screen. Tap **Retry** and then tap **Activate**.

- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to complete the activation process.
- 4. After you have completed the wizard, make a phone call to confirm your activation.

If your phone is still not activated or you do not have access to the Internet, contact Sprint Customer Service at **1-888-211-4727** for assistance.

**Tip**: Do not press the Power/Lock Button while the phone is being activated. Pressing Power/Lock Button cancels the activation process.

**Note**: If you are having difficulty with activation, contact Sprint Customer Service by dialing **1-888-211-4727** from any other phone.

## Complete the Setup Application

Once your device has been turned on and activated, you will see a Welcome message. You can then complete the setup application.

- 1. Touch the Android icon to get started.
- 2. Set up your Google account. Tap Create or Sign in.
- 3. Follow the instructions to complete the steps to create or sign in to your Google account.
- 4. Select the backup and restore options.
  - Checkmark to select your backup and restore options and tap Next.
- 5. The device will set up your services and you will be directed to the Home screen after completion.

**Note:** You do not need to sign up for a Google account to use your device. However, to download applications from Google Play, you must link your device to a Google account.

## Make Your First Call

Once your device is activated, you can make phone calls.

- 1. Tap > . (Tap the **Dial** tab, if the screen is not already on the dial screen.)
- 2. Use the dialpad to enter a phone number.

- If you enter a wrong number, tap to erase digits one by one.
- To erase the entire number, touch and hold
- 3. Tap to dial the number.

**Note:** Your device's battery should have enough charge for your device to turn on and find a signal, set up your voicemail, and make a call. You should fully charge your battery as soon as possible.

## Set Up Your Voicemail

Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. You should set up your Sprint voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated. Always use a password to protect against unauthorized access.

- 1. Tap > . (Tap the **Dial** tab, if the screen is not already on the dial screen.)
- 2. Touch and hold 1 °.
- 3. Follow the system prompts to:
  - Create your password.
  - Record your name announcement.
  - Record your greeting.

**Note:** Sprint strongly recommends that you create a password when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a password, anyone who has access to your phone is able to access your voicemail messages.

If you are not the account owner (if someone else receives the bill for your Sprint service), you can get a subaccount password at www.sprint.com.

#### **Data Services Password**

With your Sprint phone, you may elect to set up an optional data services password to control access and authorize Premium Service purchases.

Tip: Phone Software Upgrades – Updates to your device's software may become available from time to time. Sprint will automatically upload critical updates to your device. You can also use the menu to check for and download updates. Tap > System settings > General tab > System updates.

## Your Device Overview

The illustrations and descriptions below outline your phone's basic layout.



#### Front View

- 1. **Power/Lock Button** locks the screen. Press and hold to open the Phone options menu for the following options: **Power off, Power off and restart**, and **Airplane mode**. You can also quickly switch to Silent mode, Vibration mode or Sound mode.
- 2. **Front-Facing Camera Lens** allows you to take pictures and video of yourself. Also lets you participate in video chats.
- 3. **Earpiece** lets you hear the caller and automated prompts.
- 4. **Proximity Sensor** sense proximity towards other objects (such as your head) so that touch commands are not accidentally activated during a call.

**Note:** Please be careful not to cover the sensors with a protective film, pouch, or a protective case not authorized by LG.

- 5. **Touchscreen** displays all the information needed to operate your device, such as the applications, call status, the Contacts list, the date and time, and the signal and battery strength.
- 6. **Back Key** returns to the previous screen. It also closes pop-up display items such as menus and dialog boxes.
- 7. **Home Key** returns to the Home screen. If you're already viewing one of extension panes, it opens the central Home screen. Press and hold to display recently used applications.

- 8. Menu Key allows you to access your device's main functions menu from the Home screen: Add to home screen, Theme, Home screen settings, Lock screen settings, App settings, System settings. While using an application, press to open a list of options available.
- 9. **Microphone** allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.

#### 10. QWERTY Keyboard

#### Rear View



- 3.5mm Headset Jack allows you to plug in a headset for convenient, hands-free conversations. CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the device.
- 2. 13 Mega Pixel Camera Lens lets you take pictures and record videos.
- 3. Flash helps you take pictures and video in dim lighting.
- 4. Camera Key
- 5. Fingertip Cutout allows you to lift and remove the device's back cover.
- 6. **Speaker** lets you hear the different ringers and sounds. The speaker also lets you hear the caller's voice in speakerphone mode.
- Charger/Accessory Jack allows you to connect the device charger or an optional USB cable (included). CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the device.

- 8. **Volume Buttons** allow you to adjust the ringer and media volumes, or to adjust the incall volume during a call. When you press and hold the volume button, the phone switches to the Sound-off mode.
- 9. **microSD Slot** accommodates the pre-installed microSD™ card (expandable up to 32GB).

## View the Display Screen

The Status Bar appears at the top of the screen. It displays icons indicating that you've received notifications (on the left) and icons indicating the device's status (on the right), along with the current time.



If you have more notifications than can fit in the Status Bar, a plus icon prompts you to open the Status Bar to view them all. (See Notifications Panel.)

### Turn Your Device On and Off

Turn your device on and off and wake-up the screen by using the Power/Lock Button ......

#### Turn Your Device On

Press and hold the Power/Lock Button \_\_\_\_\_.

Once your phone is on, it may display "Searching for Service." When your phone finds a signal, it enters standby mode – the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for Sprint service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

**Tip**: The Power Save feature conserves your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

#### Turn Your Device Off

- 1. Press and hold the Power/Lock Button for two seconds until you see the powering-down animation on the display screen.
- 2. Tap **Power off** and then tap **Yes** to power off the device.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

#### Wake Up the Screen

If you don't use the device for a while, the screen and backlight will shut off to conserve battery power.

- Press the Power/Lock Button . Your lock screen will appear. See Set Up Screen Lock.
- 2. Swipe the screen to any direction to unlock it. The last screen you were working on opens. (This is the default lock screen.)

### Lock and Unlock Your Device

You can prevent accidental screen touches from activating phone functions by locking your device.

#### Lock Your Device

When your device is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 911.

Press the Power/Lock Button \_\_\_\_\_.

#### Unlock Your Device

- 1. Press the Power/Lock Button to wake up the phone. (See above).
- 2. Swipe the screen to any direction to unlock it.



**Note**: The default Lock screen simply locks the screen to prevent unintentional actions. For more security to guard against unauthorized use, you can set an unlock requirement (such as a pattern, PIN, password, or face recognition) that will need to be entered to unlock it.

## Battery and Charger

Sprint-approved or LG-approved batteries and accessories can be found at Sprint Stores or through LG; or call 1-866-866-7509 to order. They're also available at www.sprint.com.

**WARNING**: Use only Sprint-approved or LG-approved batteries and chargers with your device. The failure to use a Sprint-approved or LG-approved battery and charger may increase the risk that your phone will overheat, catch fire, or explode, resulting in serious bodily injury, death, or property.

#### **Battery Capacity**

Your device is equipped with a Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides up to 7.0 hours of continuous digital talk time.

When the battery reaches 5% of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately two minutes of talk time left, the device can sound an audible alert and then turn off.

**Note**: Long backlight settings, searching for service, using vibrate mode, browser use, and other variables may reduce the battery's talk and standby times.

**Tip**: Watch your device's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

#### Install the Battery

► See Set Up Your Device.

#### Remove the Battery

- 1. Make sure the power is turned off so that you don't lose any unsaved items.
- 2. Lift the back cover using the fingertip cutout located at the bottom of the cover and remove it.
- 3. Lift the battery using the fingertip cutout and remove it from the device.

**WARNING**: Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-lon battery as you can be burned.



#### Charge the Battery

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your device automatically turns off and you will lose any information you were just working on.

Always use a Sprint-approved or LG-approved desktop charger, travel charger, or vehicle power adapter to charge your battery.

1. Connect the charging adapter and USB cable as shown; the LG logo on the charging adapter should face toward you.



2. Plug one end of the USB cable into the device's Charger/Accessory Port and the other end into an electrical outlet. The charge time varies depending upon the battery level.

With the Sprint-approved Li-lon battery, you can recharge the battery before it becomes completely rundown.

#### **Battery Temperature Protection**

Though extremely rare, if the battery becomes overheated, the phone will automatically turn off.

#### Charge with USB

You can use your computer to charge your device. To be able to charge with the USB cable, you need to install the necessary USB drivers on your computer first. Connect one end of the USB cable to the Charger/Accessory Port on your device and connect the other end to a USB port on your computer. It is best to use the rear USB port when connecting to a desktop computer. The USB hub should be powered by an external power source.

**Note**: Low-power USB ports are not supported, such as the USB port on your keyboard or buspowered USB hub.

LG USB Driver is downloadable from the following site: http://www.lg.com/us/ > Select **Mobile** > **Drivers & Downloads**. Under the Download Drivers/ Phone Updates section, click on **Click here to download your mobile driver**.

Always unplug the charger from the wall socket after the phone is fully charged to save unnecessary power consumption of the charger.

### Extend Your Battery Life

You can extend your battery's life between charges by turning off features that run in the background. You can also monitor how applications and system resources consume battery power.

- Reduce your Backlight On time. (See Backlight Time Length.)
- Turn Bluetooth off when not in use. (See Turn Bluetooth On and Off.)
- Turn Wi-Fi off when not in use. (See Turn Wi-Fi On and Connect to a Network.)
- Deactivate the GPS when not needed. Most applications using this function will periodically query the GPS satellites for your current location; each query drains your battery. (See Activate Location Mode.)
- Do not wait until your battery is completely depleted before charging your device.
   Repeating this process of a complete discharge and recharge can over time reduce the storage capacity of any battery.
- Turn off Automatic application sync. (See Synchronize Accounts.)

- Use the Power Control Widget to deactivate hardware functions such as Wi-Fi, Bluetooth, GPS, Synchronization, or LCD brightness setting. (See Add and Remove Widgets.)
- Check the Running Services and close any unnecessary applications.

#### **Battery Charge Level**

Tap > System settings > Power saver > Battery use.

The battery status (charging or discharging) and level (as a percentage of fully charged) are displayed at the top of the screen.

#### Monitor and Control Battery Use

The **Battery use** screen shows which applications consume the most battery power. You can also use it to turn off applications that you've downloaded, if they are consuming too much power.

Tap > System settings > General tab > Power saver > Battery use.

Tap any of the listed items for more options.

The LS860 comes equipped with four main function keys that can be used on any screen to access added functions.

## Menu Key

The **Menu Key** activates an available menu function for the current screen or application. When on the Home screen, tap to view the following options:

- Add to home screen lets you add one of the following functions to a selected screen: Apps, Downloads, Widgets, and Wallpapers.
- Theme allows you to change the theme.
- Home screen settings provides direct access to the device's Home screen settings menu. (See Home screen.)

- Lock screen settings provides direct access to the device's lock screen settings menu. (See Lock screen.)
- App settings provides direct access to the Applications settings menu. (See Applications.)
- System settins provides quick access to the device's Settings menu. (See Settings.)

### Work with Menus

There are two Android menu types: Options menus and Context menus.

#### Options menus

Options menus contain tools that apply to the activities of the current screen or application, not to any specific item on the screen. To open the available options menu, tap


Not all applications have Options menus; if you tap a on a screen that has no Options menu, nothing will happen.

Some applications have more Options menu items than can fit in the options menu; tap More to open the additional items.



#### Context menus

Context menus contain options that apply to a specific item on the screen. To open a Context menu, touch and hold an item on the screen. Not all items have Context menus. If you touch and hold an item that has no Context menu, nothing will happen.



#### Select Menu Items

To select a menu or option, simply tap it. If there are more menus/options than can fit in a screen, slide the screen up to display more menus/options.

For example, to set the phone to play tones when dialing numbers on the dial pad:

- 1. Tap -> =.
- 2. Tap **System settings**.
- 3. Tap **Sound** tab.
- 4. Slide the screen up to display more menus.
- 5. Tap Touch feedback & system.
- 6. Tap **Dial pad touch tones** to checkmark it.

For the purposes of this guide, the above steps condense into:

► Tap > System settings > Sound tab > Touch feedback & system > Dial pad touch tones.

#### Back Up Within a Menu

- ► Tap to back up within a menu.
- ► Tap to return to the Home screen.

### Notifications Panel

Notification icons report the arrival of new messages, calendar events, alarms, as well as ongoing events, such as when you are on a call.

When you receive a notification, text appears briefly and the notification icon will be displayed in the Status Bar. For descriptions of the various notification icons, see View the Display Screen.

You can open the Notifications Panel to view a list of all recent notifications. Depending on your settings, you may hear a notification sound and the device may vibrate.

**Note**: Adjusting sound volume and other general notifications settings is described in Sound Settings.

Applications whose activities produce notifications, such as Gmail<sup>™</sup> and Google Talk, have their own settings, which you can use to configure whether, and how, they send notifications. See the sections on those applications for details.

#### **Open Notifications**

► Touch and drag the Status Bar to the bottom of the screen.

The Notifications Panel displays your wireless provider and a list of your current notifications, organized into ongoing and event-based notifications.

#### Respond to Notifications

- 1. Open the Notifications Panel. Your current notifications are listed in the panel, each with a brief description.
- 2. Tap a notification to view it. The Notifications Panel will close and the application that corresponds to your response will open.

For example, new voicemail notifications dial your voicemail box, and network disconnect notifications open the list of configured networks so you can reconnect.

#### Clear Notifications

- 1. Open the Notifications Panel.
- 2. Tap at the top right of the panel.

All event-based notifications will be cleared; ongoing notifications will remain in the list.

#### Close Notifications

• Touch and drag the tab at the bottom of the Notifications Panel to the top of the screen.

– or –

• Tap . (The panel will also close when you touch a notification.)

### Home Key

The **Home Key** takes you back to your main Home screen (of the 7 total available screens). Press to access your main Home screen.

### Back Key

The **Back Key** returns you to the previously active screen. If the on-screen keyboard is currently open, the **Back Key** closes the keyboard.

## Touchscreen Navigation

The LS860 is a touch-sensitive device which allows you to select an on-screen option with a single touch and to easily scroll through long lists. Simply slide up and down through the display with your fingertip.

Your touchscreen provides an excellent way to interact with and use your Android phone. With the touch of your finger, you can access available applications, make menu selections, and access data saved to your device. The following terms are used for describing the different available actions using the touchscreen:

- **Tap**: A single finger tap selects items, links, shortcuts and letters on the on-screen keyboard.
- **Touch and hold**: Touch and hold an item on the screen by touching it and not lifting your finger until an action occurs. For example, to open a contact's available options, touch and hold the contact in the Contacts list until the context menu opens.
- Drag: Touch and hold an item for a moment and then, without lifting your finger, move
  your finger on the screen until you reach the target position. You can drag items on the
  Home screen to reposition them, as described in Change the Device's Wallpaper, or
  drag the Notifications Panel open, as described in Notifications Panel.
- **Swipe or slide**: To swipe or slide, quickly move your finger across the surface of the screen, without pausing when you first touch it (so you don't drag an item instead). For example, you can slide the screen up or down to scroll through a list, or browse through the different Home screens by swiping from left to right (and vice versa).
- Double-tap: Double-tap to zoom on a Web page or a map. For example, quickly double-tap a section of a Web page to adjust that section to fit the width of the screen. You can also double-tap to zoom in and out when taking a picture (using the Camera), and when using Maps.
- **Pinch-to-Zoom**: Use your index finger and thumb in a pinch or spread motion to zoom in or out when using the Browser, Maps, or browsing pictures.

• Rotate the screen: From many applications and menus, the orientation of the screen adjusts to the device's physical orientation. (See Change the Screen Orientation.)



Rotate the device counter-clockwise for landscape orientation.

Rotate the device clockwise for portrait orientation.

## Your Home Screen

The Home screen is the starting point for many applications and functions, and it allows you to add items like application shortcuts, folders, or Google widgets to give you instant access to information and applications. This is the default page and accessible from any menu by tapping



### Extended Home Screens

The operating system provides multiple Home screens to provide more space for adding icons, widgets, and more.

➤ Slide your finger left or right across the Home screen. The main screen is in the center with two extension screens on either side of it. (For more information on sliding, see Touchscreen Navigation.)



Location Indicator

The bar indicates which Home screen you are viewing.

## Use the Applications Key

All of your device's applications are located within the Applications screen. This key accesses shortcuts to your currently available applications.


Note: This screen houses all default and downloaded applications (installed from Google Play).

- 1. Tap > iiii to open the screen.
  - To close the Applications screen, tap
- 2. Scroll though the list and tap an icon to launch the associated application.

## Applications: How to View, Open and Switch

All of the applications on your device, including any applications that you downloaded and installed from Google Play™ or other sources, are grouped together on one Applications screen that you access from your Home screen. If you have more applications than you can currently see on the Applications screen, slide the screen up or down to view more.

The Applications screen contains all of the device's applications (though not downloaded widgets and other downloaded material that isn't an application), including the Clock, Browser, Calculator, Camera, Play Store, NASCAR Sprint Cup Mobile, Sprint Navigation, Sprint TV & Movies, YouTube, Voice Search, and much more.



#### Open the Applications Screen

#### Close the Applications Screen

▶ Tap

**Note**: The Applications screen closes automatically when you tap an icon to open its Application. Dragging an icon onto your Home screen also closes the Applications screen automatically.

#### Open and Switch Applications

Multi-tasking is easy with Android™. Opened applications can keep running in the background when you open another application. There's no need to quit an application before opening another. You can easily switch among several open applications. Android manages each application, pausing and starting them as needed to ensure that unused applications don't waste your device's resources.

To open an application:

Simply tap its icon on the screen.

**Tip:** You can customize your Home screen with shortcuts to the applications you use most often. Applications are located on the Applications screen, but you can add an application shortcut to your Home screen for faster access. No matter where the icon is, on the Applications screen or your Home screen, just touch it to open and use it. See Add Application Icons to the Home screen for more information.

To open multiple applications:

- 1. Tap an application icon to open it.
- 2. Tap 🔼.
- 3. Tap and tap the icon for the other application you want to open.

- or -

Simply tap the icon if the application you want is already on your Home screen.

To switch between multiple applications:

- 1. Touch and hold . A small window opens with icons of applications that you've used recently.
- 2. Tap the application icon you want to open.

- or -

Tap **to** return to the current application.

### Add Application Icons to the Home Screen

Customize your Home screen with shortcuts to the applications you use most often.

- 2. Touch and hold the application icon you want to add to your Home screen.
- 3. Lift your finger to place the app on your Home screen, or drag the icon to where you want it on the screen, then lift your finger.

## Customize Your Home Screen

You can customize your Home screen when you do the following:

- Create Shortcuts
- Add Widgets
- Create Contact shortcuts
- Create Folders
- Change the Background (Wallpaper)
- Customize Apppications Icons

### **Create Shortcuts**

Shortcuts are different from the Home screen Widgets. Shortcuts can access a specific contact, activate a feature, action, or launch an application.

To add a shortcut from the Application tab:

- 1. Tap to access the Home screen.
- 2. Select a location (screen) for your new shortcut by scrolling across your available screens until you reach the desired one. (See Home Screen.)
- 3. Tap to reveal all your current applications. By default, the applications are listed in a grid view.
- 4. Scroll down through the list and locate your desired application.
- 5. Touch and hold the on-screen icon. This creates an immediate shortcut of the selected icon and closes the Applications screen. The new shortcut then appears to hover over the Home screen.

**Note**: The same shortcut can be added to any of the available screens (Home or Extended). The application you add to the screen will still appear within the Applications screen.

6. While holding the on-screen icon, position it on the current screen. Once complete, release the screen to lock the shortcut into its new position.

To add a shortcut via the Home screen:

- 1. Tap to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold on an empty area of the screen.
- 3. From the Add to Home screen window, tap Shortcuts.
- 4. Tap a selection from the list.
- 5. Select the item you want to add the new shortcut to your current Home screen.

#### To delete a shortcut:

- Tap to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold the desired shortcut. This unlocks it from its location on the current screen.
- 3. Drag the icon over the **Trash** and release it.

### Add and Remove Widgets

Widgets are self-contained applications that can be accessed through your Applications Key or on the Home or Extended screens. Unlike a shortcut, this Widget appears as an on-screen application.

### To add a Widget:

- 1. Tap to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold on an empty area of the screen.
- 3. From the Add to Home screen window, tap Widgets.
- 4. Tap an available Widget to place it on your current screen.

### To remove a Widget:

- 1. Go to the Home screen on which the widget is located.
- 2. Touch and hold the widget. This unlocks it from its location on the current screen.
- 3. Drag the widget over the **Trash** and release it.
  - This action does not delete the Widget. It just removes it from the current screen.

### To place a Widget onto a different screen:

- 1. Touch and hold the widget you want to move.
- 2. Drag the widget to the edge of the screen (the left side if moving to a screen located on the left, right side if moving to a screen located on the right).
- 3. After about one second, the current screen will change. Repeat until you get to the desired screen.

### Create and Manage Folders

Folders can be located on any of the available screens and can contain multiple Shortcuts or different Contact entries

#### To create a folder on-screen:

- 1. Tap to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold on an empty area of the screen.
- 3. From the Add to Home screen window, tap **Folders**.
- 4. Tap an available folder type to place it on your current screen.

**Note**: Starred contacts are those Contact entries you have tagged as very important.

### Change the Device's Wallpaper

1. From the Home screen, tap **Solution** > **Wallpaper**.

– or –

Touch and hold an empty spot on the Home screen, then tap Wallpapers.

- 2. Tap Gallery, ID wallpapers, LG wallpapers, Live wallpapers, or Wallpapers.
  - **Gallery** to use a picture saved on your device as a wallpaper. You can crop the picture before setting it as a wallpaper.
  - ID wallpapers to open the available wallpapers that were included in your Sprint ID pack.
  - LG wallpapers to open available LG wallpapers.
  - Live wallpapers to open a list of animated wallpapers installed on your device. Live wallpapers can be animated or even interactive. More Live wallpapers are available on Google Play.
  - **Wallpapers** to open a screen of wallpaper images saved on your device. Slide the thumbnail images left and right to view the available images.
- 3. Tap **Set wallpaper** or **Save**.

### Customize Applications Icons on Home screen

You can customize each application icons on the Home screen.

1. Touch and hold an application icon until it's unlocked from its current position. Then drop it on the screen. The editing icon will appear in the upper right corner of the application.



2. Tap the application icon again and select the a desired icon design.

- or -

Tap Create **photo icon** to take a new picture or select a picture from the Gallery.



## Access Recently-Used Applications

Your device keeps a running list of your eight most recently used applications.

- 1. Touch and hold to open the recently-used applications window.
- 2. Tap an icon to open the related application.

**Note**: You can see the wallpaper without items on the Home screen by pinching out. Pinch in or tap to see applications and widgets again.





## Change the Screen Orientation

This device is capable of changing the orientation of screen content when the orientation of the device itself has changed. The device's built-in accelerometer senses movement and changes its angle/orientation. Note that some of the screens, applications and widgets do not support orientation changes.

The automatic screen orientation feature can be manually enabled to change the orientation for all enabled screens when rotation is detected.

**Note**: An example of a screen that automatically re-orients by moving the device is the Messaging screen. This only requires you turn the device to a horizontal position.


- 1. Tap > Settings > Display tab.
- 2. Tap **Auto-rotate screen** to enable (a green checkmark displays) or disable the screen auto-rotation.

## Enter Text With the On-screen Keyboard


The on-screen keyboard displays automatically when you tap a text entry field. To manually display the keyboard, simply touch a text field where you want to enter text.

- To configure Android keyboard settings, tap and then Android keyboard settings.
  - Vibrate on keypress allows you to activate a vibration sensation as you enter text using the keypad.
  - Sound on keypress allows you to activate a sound sensation as you enter text using the keypad.
  - **Popup on keypress** displays the larger image of each key you tap.
  - Touch to correct words underlines a word in a text field; tap the word to reveal other words you may have intended.
  - Auto-capitalization allows you to automatically capitalize the first letter of a sentence.
  - Show settings key allows you to set whether to display the Settings Key or always hide it.
  - **Voice input** allows you to set on which on-screen keyboard you want the voice-input Microphone Key to appear.
  - **Input languages** allows you to select the current text input language. The default language depends on the language set when you first activated the phone.
  - Quick fixes allows you to correct some common misspellings as you type.
  - **Show suggestions** shows you suggested words in a strip above the on-screen keyboard as you type.
  - **Auto-complete** allows you to automatically enter a suggested word (highlighted in the strip above the keyboard) when you enter a space or punctuation.
  - Rotate the screen to a horizontal position to use the larger keyboard.

**Note**: If you do not want the screen to change orientations automatically, uncheck the Autorotate screen. Tap > **System settings** > **Display** tab and deselect **Autorotate screen**.

3. When you have finished typing, tap **to** close the keyboard.

## Search Your Device and the Web

You can search for information on your phone and on the web using the Search application. Some applications, such as Gmail, Contacts, and Browser have the ability to search contents within those specific applications.


You can conduct the search by typing in the search terms or saying what you're looking for. Typing can be useful because the search application can provide suggestions so you don't necessarily have to type out your full request.

## Device and Web Search Using Text Entry


1. From the Home screen, touch and hold . The Quick Search Box will open automatically.

– or –

From the Home screen, tap the Search Widget (For information on how to add widget, see Add and Remove Widgets.)



2. Enter the text you're searching for in the Quick Search Box.



You can use the Search preferences to configure some aspects of Google Web search (for example, whether it makes suggestions below the Quick Search Box as you type), and what device features you want to include in searches.

To access these settings, tap **Settings**.

- 3. Tap to search for the entered text.
  - or -

If what you want to search for appears in the suggestions list, tap that item to conduct the search.

4. If the devices asks you to select which browser to use, tap your preference. Then, tap **Always** to keep this preference setting.

## Device and Web Search Using Voice Command

- ► Touch and hold ■. Then, tap Q.
  - or –

Tap from the Search Widget.

When you stop speaking, Google Search by Voice analyzes your speech and displays the results of your search.

The available Voice Commands are:

• Say "**Directions to,**" followed by an address, name, business name, type of business, or other destination, to get directions to that location from Google Maps™.

- Say "Navigate to," followed by an address, name, business name, type of business, or other destination to get spoken, turn-by-turn directions to that destination.
- Say "Map of," followed by an address, name, business name, type of business, or other location, to view that location on Google Maps.
- For additional commands, tap **Help**.

For more information on Google Search, tap => Help, from the Google search screen.

## Make Phone Calls

There are several convenient ways to place calls from your device.

## Call Using the Phone Dialer

The most "traditional" way to place a call is by using the phone's dialer screen.

- 1. Tap -> .
- 2. Enter a phone number using the on-screen dialpad and tap ...
  - If you enter a wrong number, tap to erase digits one by one.
  - To erase the entire number, touch and hold



- You can open other applications during a call. The will appear in the Status Bar while the call is underway.
- Press the Up/Down Volume Buttons to adjust the call volume.
- Use the on-screen buttons to add another call, put a call on hold, to use the speakerphone, and for other options, as described in In-Call Options.
- 3. Tap to end the call.

**Tip**: To redial your last outgoing call, follow step 1 to access the Dialer, tap the **Call log** tab, locate the call entry and tap .

You can also make calls from your Contacts list, from the Call log, and using Voice Dialer.

### **Dialing Options**

After entering numbers with the dialpad, you can use the following dialing options.

Tap **to** view the following options:

- Add to contacts: Tap to add the entered number as a new contact or to an existing contact entry. (See Save a Phone Number.)
- Speed dials: Tap to access the speed dials list. (See Set Up Speed Dialing.)
- Add 2-sec pause: Enter digits and select this option to introduce a two-second pause before the following sequence of digits is dialed by the phone. (See Dial and Save Phone Numbers With Pauses.)
- Add wait: Enter digits and select this option to have the phone dial the preceding set of digits first, and then dial the following sequence of digits when you tap Yes on the popup screen. (See Dial and Save Phone Numbers With Pauses.)
- Call settings: Tap to access the Call settings screen. (See Call Settings.)

### Missed Call Notification

A missed call icon displays when you do not answer a call. When you do not answer an incoming call, is displayed in the Status Bar.

- 1. Touch and drag the Status Bar to the bottom of the screen to open the Notification Panel.
- 2. Tap the missed call notification. The **Call log** screen will be displayed. To dial the phone number, tap ...

## Call Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 911 even if the device's screen is locked or your account is restricted.

**Note**: When you place an emergency call, your phone automatically enters Emergency mode.

To call the 911 emergency number when the device's screen is locked with a screen lock:

- 1. Unlock the screen. For more information, see Wake Up the Screen.
- 2. Touch **Emergency call** on the screen.
- 3. Touch 9 wvz 1 00 1 00 C

To call the 911 emergency number normally or when your account is restricted:

- 1. Unlock the screen. For more information, see Wake Up the Screen.
- 2. Tap 🔼 > 📞
- 3. Touch 9 xxx 1 00 1 00 ...

### Enhanced 911 (E911) Information

This phone features an embedded Global Positioning System (GPS) chip necessary for utilizing E911 emergency location services where available. When you place an emergency 911 call, the GPS feature of your phone seeks information to calculate your approximate location. Depending on several variables, including availability and access to satellite signals, it may take up to 30 seconds or more to determine and report your approximate location.

Important:

Always report your location to the 911 operator when placing an emergency call. Some designated emergency call takers, known as Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) may not be equipped to receive GPS location information from your phone.

## In-Call Options

Once you initiate a call, you will see these on-screen options:

- Add call to initiate a 3-way call.
- End to end the call.
- Dialpad to display the dialpad.
- **Bluetooth** (Only available when a Bluetooth headset is connected to your phone) to conduct the call via the Bluetooth headset for hands-free conversation. For details about pairing the phone with a Bluetooth headset, see Pairing Bluetooth Devices.

**Note**: When using the Bluetooth headset during a call, the Ongoing Call notification icon is blue in the Status Bar.

- Mute to mute the microphone during a call. The Mute button lights up and <sup>▼x</sup> is displayed on the Status Bar to indicate the microphone is muted. To unmute the microphone, tap Mute again.
- **Speaker** to turn the speakerphone on or off. The Speaker button lights up and is displayed on the Status Bar to indicate that the speakerphone is on.

**WARNING**: Because of higher volume levels, do not place the device near your ear while using the speakerphone.

### Dial and Save Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your device:

• 2-Second Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.

• Hard Pause (Wait) sends the next set of numbers when you tap Yes on the pop-up.

**Note**: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine two-second and hard pauses.

To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- 1. Enter the phone number.
- 2. Tap > Add 2-sec pause or Add wait.
- 3. Enter the additional numbers.
- 4. Tap to dial the number.
  - or –
  - Tap = > Add to **contacts** to save the number in your Contacts.

**Note**: When dialing a number with a hard pause (Wait), tap **Yes** on the pop-up to send the next set of numbers.

### Dial From the Contacts List

You can dial directly from your Contacts list.

- - or -
  - Tap > | Contacts.
- 2. Find a contact to call and tap it to open its entry, then tap .
  - or -

Touch and hold the contact. When a context menu opens, tap Call contact.

## Use Direct Dialing

With Direct Dialing, you are able to directly save a contact to your Home screen.

- 1. Tap > > Add > Shortcuts > Direct dial.
- 2. Tap a contact from your Contacts List. The contact will appear on your Home screen.

To use Direct Dial:

▶ Simply tap the contact on the Home screen.

## Plus (+) Code Dialing

When placing international calls, Plus Code Dialing automatically enters the international access code for your location (for example, 011 for international calls made from the U.S.).

- 1. In the Dial screen, touch and hold 0 + until you see a "+" on the display screen.
- 2. Dial the country code and phone number and then tap \_\_\_\_. The phone automatically prepends the access code for international dialing, followed by the country code and phone number.

### Receive Phone Calls

When you receive a phone call, the Incoming Call screen opens with the caller ID and any other available information (such as the caller's name, if saved in the Contact's list). The most recent incoming calls are recorded in the Call log. (See Call Log.)

### Answer an Incoming Call

► Touch and drag to the right.

If you were already on a call, the first call is placed on hold while you answer the new call. To silence the ringer of an incoming call, press the down Volume Key.

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

### Reject an Incoming Call

► Touch and drag to the left.

The caller is sent directly to your voicemail box to leave a message.

#### Answer a Roam Call With Call Guard Enabled

Call Guard is an option that helps you manage your roaming charges when making or receiving calls while outside the Nationwide Sprint Network. Please see Roaming Settings for more information about roaming.

► Tap **Yes** to answer the call. (See Call Guard for additional information.)

**Note**: When your phone is off, calls go directly to voicemail.

#### End a Call



- or -

If you opened other applications while on a call:

- 1. Open the Notifications Panel.
  - Touch and drag the Status Bar to the bottom of the screen.
- 2. Tap **Current call** to redisplay the **Phone** application.
- 3. Tap ...

## Visual Voicemail

Visual Voicemail gives you a quick and easy way to access your voicemail. Now you can find exactly the message you are looking for without having to listen to every voicemail message first. This new feature periodically goes out to your voicemail, and gathers the caller information from all of the current voicemails. It then populates a list with the caller name and number, along with the length of time and priority level of the voicemail message.

## Set Up Visual Voicemail

Setting up Visual Voicemail follows many of the same procedures as setting up traditional Sprint voicemail. You should set up your Sprint voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated. Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off.

**Note:** To set up your traditional voicemail box, see Set Up Voicemail.

- 1. Touch > | Voicemail.
- 2. Touch **Personalize now** and follow the system prompts to:
  - Create a password (part of standard voicemail).
  - Record your name announcement.
  - Record your greeting.
- 3. When prompted to enter information, tap **Dialpad** to bring up the onscreen dialpad to enter your numeric responses.

**Important:** Voicemail Password – Sprint strongly recommends that you create a password when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a password, anyone who has access to your device is able to access your voicemail messages.

- 4. Once you have completed the setup process, return to the voicemail page (see step 1).
- 5. Tap the **Welcome to Voicemail** message on the screen to play a brief explanation of the voicemail services.

### Review Visual Voicemail

Visual Voicemail lets you easily access and select which messages you want to review.

- 1. Tap -> | Voicemail.
- 2. Tap a message to review it. The following is a description of the features available while reviewing a voicemail message.

**Note:** Tap **\( \)** > **Lock** to prevent the message from accidentally being deleted.

- **Timeline** provides a visual timeline for the current message. Touch and drag this bar to scrub through the message to different points.
  - Tap to pause the playback, tap to resume.
  - Speaker Off/On to turn the speakerphone on or off during playback. If the speakerphone feature was enabled within the Voicemail Settings menu, the speakerphone will always be automatically enabled during voicemail playback.
- Trash to move the current voice message to the trash folder.
- Call to call the person who left the voicemail message.

- Share to share the selected message using your favorite services like Email, Text, and direct to Voicemail.
- Reply to reply to the message. You can then reply to the sender or forward it to anyone with either an email or phone number. This allows you to send this voicemail message to several recipients at the same time. You can tag the reply message for both Urgency and Privacy.
  - Touch **Send** to deliver the new message.
- Move to SD Card to move the current voicemail message to the microSD card.

## Listen to Multiple Voicemail Messages

When you are done listening to a voicemail message you can easily access other voicemail messages without returning to the main voicemail screen.

- 1. Listen to the current voicemail message.
- 2. Swipe your finger left or right to display the next or previous message. It will begin playing automatically.

You can navigate through voicemail messages as frequently as you'd like. You can even move to the next or previous message before you're finished listening to the current one.

## Configure Visual Voicemail Options

Use the Menu button to access and configure your Visual Voicemail options.

- 1. Tap > | Voicemail.
- 2. From this initial screen, you can:
  - Tap to compose a new voicemail message.
  - Tap Inbox to view the voicemail mesages in other folder: Inbox, Trash, SD card.
  - Tap to search a voicemail message.
  - Tap to configures your voicemail application settings.

To access a voicemail message's options:

- 1. Tap > Wisual Voicemail.
- 2. Tap a voicemail message and tap and select from the following:
  - Lock/Unlock to prevent deletion of the selected voicemail message.

- Text message to create and deliver a new text message to the sender's phone number.
- Reply to reply to the voicemail. You can then reply to the sender or forward it to anyone with either an email or phone number. This allows you to send this voicemail message to several recipients at the same time.
- Forward to forward the voicemail to another recipient.
- Add to contacts to add the sender's phone number to your Contacts list.

## Configure Visual Voicemail Settings

The Visual Voicemail settings menu lets you access settings for notifications, pictures, greetings, and more.

- 1. Tap > Wisual Voicemail.
- 2. Tap > Settings. From this menu, you can:
  - Manage subscription to verify Voicemail-to-Text account information. This may take a minute.
  - Auto forward to email to send a copy of new messages to an email address of your choice.
  - Personalize voicemail to change your voicemail greeting for incoming calls and update password.
  - Notifications to determine how your are notified of new voicemails. Set the notification sound and vibrate option.
  - Delete messages to set Visual Voicemail to permanently delete messages from the
     Trash folder after a specific number of days.
  - Display name to enter a name to identify yourself to people when replying or forwarding messages.
  - View quick tips tutorial to view a visual tutorial about Visual Voicemail.
  - Help to see the Sprint visual voicemail help.
  - Send feedback to send some feedbacks to the Voicemail Feedback team by Gmail or Email.
  - Check for update to search for an upgrade to your Visual message software.
  - About Voicemail to view build information about the current visual voicemail application.

## Automatically Enable the Speakerphone

Every time you access a selected message from your Visual Voicemail list, you can configure the phone to automatically launch the built-in speakerphone so that you can clearly hear the message.

- 1. Tap > | Voicemail.
- 2. Tap > More > Settings to configure your settings.
- 3. Tap **Speakerphone** to activate the feature. You will see a green checkmark on the right.
- 4. Tap **Speakerphone** again to deactivate the speakerphone. The checkmark will be removed.

## Change Your Main Greeting via the Voicemail Menu

Your main greeting can be changed directly via the Visual Voicemail system. This direct access saves you from having to navigate within the voicemail menu.

- 1. Tap > | Voicemail.
- 2. Tap = > Settings > Personalize voicemail.
- 3. Tap **OK** to connect to the Sprint voicemail system. Follow the prompts to change your current greeting.

### Edit the From Name via the Voicemail Menu

From your Visual Voicemail menu, you can quickly change the name attached to your voice messages.

- 1. Tap > | Voicemail.
- 2. Tap Settings > Display name.
- 3. Tap the field and enter a new identifying name (used to identify you to recipients of your voice messages).
- 4. Tap **OK** to save your information.

## Voicemail(Traditional)

In addition to Visual Voicemail, your phone and Sprint service always offer traditional voicemail service accessed through the Phone application.

## Set Up Voicemail

You should set up your Sprint Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your device is activated. Always use a password to protect against unauthorized access. Your device automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your device is in use or turned off.

- 1. Tap and touch .
- 2. Touch and hold 1 or to dial your voicemail number.
- 3. Follow the system prompts to:
  - Create your password.
  - Record your name announcement.
  - Record your greeting.

**Important:** Voicemail Password – Sprint strongly recommends that you create a password when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a password, anyone who has access to your device is able to access your voicemail messages.

### Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your device alerts you to a new voicemail message.

- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By displaying within the Notifications area of the Status Bar when a single new unheard voicemail message is received.
- By displaying within the Notifications area of the Status Bar when multiple new unheard voicemail messages have been received.

Note: When you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. Sprint recommends that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing 1 + area code + your wireless phone number. When your voicemail answers, touch \* and enter your password. Roaming rates apply when you access voicemail while roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network.

**Note:** Your device accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, your device notifies you of new messages only when it is turned on and you are in a Sprint service area.

## Retrieve Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your wireless phone (using either traditional voicemail) or Visual Voicemail) or from any other touch-tone phone.

### Use Traditional Voicemail to Access Your Messages

- 1. Tap -> .
- 2. Tap and hold 1 °. If prompted, enter your voicemail password.
- 3. Follow the voice prompts to listen to and manage your voicemail messages.

### Use Visual Voicemail to Access Your Messages

- 1. Tap -> | Voicemail.
- 2. Tap an entry to listen to the message.

**Note**: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your wireless phone.

### Use Another Phone to Access Messages

- 1. Dial your wireless phone number.
- 2. When your voicemail answers, press the asterisk key on the phone ( \* ).
- 3. Enter your password.

### Use Visual Voicemail to Delete Your Messages

- 1. Tap > | Voicemail.
- 2. Touch and hold a voicemail entry from the list and, select the messages to delete and tap .

Open a message and touch =.

### Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, follow these steps.

- 3. Tap > (Tap the **Dial** tab if necessary).
- 4. Tap \* 6 MNO 7 PORS.
- 5. Enter a phone number and tap ...

To permanently block your number, call Sprint Customer Service.

## Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding a beep instead of a ring. Your device's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

- ▶ Before accepting the incoming call, tap and drag one of the following on-screen options:
  - Answer to answer the new call. The first caller is placed on hold.
  - Decline to send the call to your voicemail box.

To switch back to the first caller:

From the In-Call options screen, tap **Swap calls**.

**Tip**: For those calls where you don't want to be interrupted, you can temporarily disable Call Waiting by pressing \* 7 --- 2 \* before placing your call. Call Waiting is automatically reactivated once you end the call.

### 3-way Calling

With 3-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

1. Tap -> (Tap the **Dial** tab if necessary).

- 2. Make your call to the first recipient.
- 3. Once you have established the connection, tap **Add call**.
- 4. Enter the second caller's phone number and tap or select a number from your **Contacts**. (Your first call is automatically put on hold.)
- 5. When you're connected to the second party, tap **Merge calls** to combine both calls into a single 3-way call. If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all callers are disconnected.

## Call Forwarding

Call Forwarding lets you forward all your incoming calls to another phone number – even when your phone is turned off. You can continue to make calls from your device when you have activated Call Forwarding.

### **Activate Call Forwarding**

- 1. Tap > (Tap the **Dial** tab if necessary).
- 2. Tap \* 7 PORS 2 ABC.
- 3. Enter the area code and phone number to which you want your calls forwarded.
- 4. Tap You will hear a tone to confirm the activation of Call Forwarding and the call will end.


### Deactivate Call Forwarding

- 1. Tap > (Tap the **Dial** tab if necessary).
- 2. Tap \* 7 ros 2 x 0 + . You will hear a tone to confirm the deactivation and the call will end.

**Note**: You are charged a higher rate for calls you have forwarded.

### In-call Options

While you're on a call, you will see a number of onscreen options. Tap an option to select it.



- Add call to initiate a 3-way call.
- End to end the current call.
- Dialpad to display the dialpad to enter additional numbers, for example, an extension or access code.
  - For example: When you call your bank's 800 number, use your dialpad to enter your account number and PIN.
- **Speaker** to route the phone's audio through the speaker (On) or through the earpiece (Off).
  - Activate Speaker to route the phone's audio through the speaker. (You can adjust the speaker volume using the volume buttons.)
  - Deactivate Speaker to use the phone's earpiece.

**Warning**: Because of higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

Mute to mute the microphone during an active call. Tap again to unmute the microphone.

**Note**: If Mute is activated, the speaker mode is deactivated.

 Bluetooth (Only available when a Bluetooth headset is connected to your phone) to route the phone's audio through a connected Bluetooth headset (On) or through the

speaker (Off). For details about pairing the phone with a Bluetooth headset, see Pairing Bluetooth Devices.

• When the call is routed to a Bluetooth headset, the current call area shows the Bluetooth call icon ( ).

**Note**: The Headset button is activated to show the current call is routed to the connected Bluetooth headset.

- To route the current call back to the phone, tap **Bluetooth** to temporarily use the phone. Tap it again to route the call back to the connected Bluetooth headset.
- When Bluetooth or the Bluetooth headset is turned off, the call is routed through either the earpiece or speaker and shows ( ).

Tap during a call to display a list of additional in-call features. Tap an option to select it.

- Contacts: Display your contacts list.
- Memo: Create a new memo while remaining on the call.
- Messaging: Opens the Messaging screen.

## Set Up Speed Dialing

Your phone can store up to 99 phone numbers in speed dial locations.

To assign a speed dial number to a contact:

- 2. Touch and hold the contact whose phone number you want to store speed dial locations.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Tap 🐫.
- 5. Tap a desired speed dial location number from 2 to 99.
- 6. Tap Save.

**Note**: If you assign a number to an already in-use speed dial location, the new phone number will automatically replace the previous speed dial assignment.

## Call Logs

The Call Logs tab of the Phone application lists all recent incoming, outgoing, and missed calls. It offers a convenient way to redial a number, return a call, or add a number to your Contacts.

### Open the Call Logs

Calls are listed in the Call logs tab, the most recent calls are located at the top of the list. Scroll down to see older entries.


**Note**: Call logs record only calls that occur while the device is turned on. If a call is received while your device is turned off, it will not be included in the call logs. If you return a call from the voicemail menu, it will not be included in your phone's Call logs.

### Call Logs Options

Tap an entry to view the date and time of the call and call duration. The following options are available:

- to make a call.
- For to send a text message.
- to add an entry's number to your Contacts.
- Let to view the contact entry.

If several calls were made to one number or received by one number, the calls are displayed as one entry. When you tap this entry, the individual call logs are opened.



You can also touch and hold the entry to open a menu with more options, to communicate with that contact in other ways.

- Add to Contacts (for entries not saved in Contacts) to save the number to Contacts.
- View contact (for entries saved in Contacts) to view contact information.
- Edit number before call to edit a number before you redial.
- Copy call number to copy the call number.
- Delete call logs to delete all the call logs.
- **Delete all logs of this number** to delete all the logs of this number only.

### Make a Call From the Call Logs

► From the Call logs, tap at the right of the entry.

### Save a Number From the Call Logs

- 1. Touch and hold an entry and tap **Add to contacts**.
- 2. Tap Create new contact.

- or -

Search for an existing contact name and tap an existing contact to add the new number to that existing contact.

3. Enter as much information as you want. (For more information about creating and editing contacts, see Contacts.).

**Note**: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Contacts or from calls identified as **No ID** or **Restricted**.

### Prepend a Number From the Call Logs

If you need to make a call from the Call logs and you are outside your local area code, you can add the appropriate prefix by prepending the number.

- 1. Touch and hold an entry and tap **Edit number before call**.
- 2. Tap the area immediately to the left of the phone number and enter the prefix.
- 3. Tap to call the number.

- or -

Tap = > Add to **contacts** to save the amended number in your Contacts.

### Clear the Call Logs

- 1. From the Call logs, tap = > Delete all.
- 2. If you are certain you want to clear the Call logs, tap Yes.

- or -

Tap No.

## Save a Phone Number

You can store phone numbers and contact entries in your phone. You can also synchronize them with your Google<sup>TM</sup> Account, Microsoft Exchange account, or other accounts that support syncing contacts. (For more information, see Contacts.)

- 1. Tap 🔼 > 🔽.
- 2. Enter a phone number and tap Add to Contacts or > Add to Contacts.
- 3. Tap Create new contact.

– or –

Search for an existing contact name and tap an existing contact to add the new number to that existing contact.

For more information about creating and editing contacts, see Contacts.

### Find a Phone Number

Your contacts are displayed alphabetically in a list. It is easy to search for a contact by name.

- Scroll and search for the contact or start entering the name of the contact you're searching for. As you type, contacts with matching names will appear above the keyboard.
- 3. Tap a matching contact in the list to open its entry. To dial a number, tap

## Voice Dialer

You can use your device's automatic speech recognition (ASR) software, called Voice Dialer, to dial a phone number in your Contacts or to launch device functions without having to go through

the phone menus. All you have to do is to talk into the phone, and ASR will recognize your voice and complete tasks by itself.

**Note**: The **Voice Control** (Speech-to-Action) feature will not launch if you are currently in an active menu.

#### **Activate Voice Dialer**

► Tap > |||| > Voice Dialer.

The screen displays "Listening" and the phone prompts you to say the name of the command you want to use. To complete your task, simply follow the voice prompts or touch an on-screen option.

Available ASR commands include:

- Call <Name> to call an entry in your Contact List. (See Make a Voice Call With Voice Dialer.)
- **Dial** <#> to call a spoken phone number.
- Redial to call back the last Contact you dialed.
- Open <Menu> to jump directly to menu items or applications. (See Open Menus With Voice Dialer.)

Tip: Use Voice Dialer in a quiet environment so it can accurately recognize your commands

#### Make a Voice Call With Voice Dialer

- 1. Tap S Voice Dialer.
- 2. When you see "Listening," say "Call" followed by the name and the label for the phone number you wish to call. For example, say "Call John Smith Mobile." The device dials the number stored for the contact "John Smith" with the label "Mobile."
  - If the location is not recognized or the name does not have a phone number stored in Contacts, your device will display a list of possible options.
  - If a name has only a single number, or if you know the name but are not sure which number to call, say "Call" followed by the name only. For example, say "Call John." If the name is recognized and there is only one phone number for the name, your device immediately places the call.

### Call a Phone Number with Voice Dialer

1. Tap > | Voice Dialer.

- 2. When you see "Listening," say "Dial" followed immediately by a phone number; for example, say "Dial 555 555 5555."
- 3. Speak naturally and clearly and remember to speak one digit at a time (1-800 should be pronounced "One Eight Zero Zero.")

### Open Menus With Voice Dialer

The Voice Dialer application allows you to directly open many menu items or applications by saying voice commands.

- 1. Tap > | Voice Dialer.
- 2. When you see "Listening," say "Open" followed by a menu or application.
- 3. If a list of valid actions is displayed, tap an action, the device opens the selected menu.

## Voice Search

Voice Search uses built-in voice recognition software to listen to your spoken words, convert those to text, then launch a Google search using that text.

- 1. Tap > | Voice Search.
- 2. Speak clearly into the microphone. If an error occurs, tap **Speak again**.
- 3. You can then touch a matching entry from the Google search page to direct you to the item you are searching.

## Text-to-Speech

The text-to-speech feature allows the device to provide a verbal readout of on-screen data such as messages and incoming caller information (based on Caller ID).

### Text-to-Speech Settings

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Language & input > Text-to-speech output.
- 2. Configure any of the following Text-to-Speech settings:
  - **Listen to an example**: Plays a short example of what the text-to-speech feature will sound like on your device when activated.
  - Always use my settings: Allows you to override the application settings with those configured within this menu.
  - Default Engine: Sets the speech synthesis engine to be used for spoken text.
  - Install voice data: Installs the voice data required for speech synthesis.

- Speech rate: Allows you to adjust the rate at which the displayed text is spoken by the device. Choose from: Very slow, Slow, Normal, Fast, and Very fast.
- Language: Allows you to assign the language used by the verbal readout. Choose from German (Germany), English (United Kingdom), English (United States),
   Spanish (Spain), French (France), or Italian (Italy).

• Pico TTS: Allows you to configure the Pico TTS language settings.

### Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode (Flight mode) allows you to use many of your device's features, such as games, and music, when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When you set your device to Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online data.

#### Activate Airplane Mode

- 1. Press and hold the **Power/Lock Button** to reveal the Phone options.
- 2. Tap Airplane mode.

- or -

- 1. Tap > System settings > Networks tab.
- 2. Tap **Airplane mode**. (A green checkmark appears.) While in Airplane Mode, your device's Status Bar will display ...

#### Deactivate Airplane Mode

- 1. Press and hold the **Power/Lock Button** to reveal the Phone options.
- 2. Tap Airplane mode.

– or –

- 1. Tap > System settings > Networks tab.
- 2. Tap Airplane mode to remove the checkmark.

### Wi-Fi Settings

Your device lets you take advantage of Wi-Fi hotspots for high-speed data access using available computer networks. For details on your device's Wi-Fi features and settings, see Connnect Wi-Fi.

### Data networks

You can check the current data usage, set to enable/disable mobile data, or set the mobile data limit.

### Bluetooth Settings

Your device's Bluetooth capabilities let you use wireless headsets, send and receive pictures and files, and more. For details on your device's Bluetooth settings, see Bluetooth Settings Menu.

### Tethering & portable hotspot settings

You can share your device's data connection with a computer by turning on the USB tethering. You can also share your device's data connection with up to eight devices at once, by turning your phone into a portable Wi-Fi hotspot. ### **VPN Settings**

# NFC Settings

  - Tap Contacts to share contact information to another device from detailed view.

#### Bluetooth Pairing

- 1. Tap > System settings > Wireless & networks.
- 2. Tap NFC settings > Easy Bluetooth Pairing.

3. Follow the on-screen instructions to pair with a Bluetooth device via NFC.

### Mobile networks settings

You can choose whether to turn on or off the LTE radio band. You can also set whether to enable or disable data access on your device.

#### **Network Mode**

- Tap > System settings > Wireless & networks > Mobile networks > Network settings > Network Mode.
- 2. Choose from the following two options:
  - Tap CDMA + LTE/EvDo auto to turn on the LTE radio band.

#### TTY mode

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone) is a telecommunications device that allows people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate by telephone. Your device is compatible with select TTY devices. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY device to ensure that it is compatible with digital cell phones. Your phone and TTY device will connect via a special cable that plugs into your device's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY device, contact your TTY device manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

#### Turn TTY Mode On or Off

- 1. Tap > System settings > Call settings > TTY mode.
- 2. Tap TTY Off to turn TTY mode off or tap TTY FULL, TTY HCO or TTY VCO.

To access the state Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS) for assistance with TTY calls:

**Note**: In TTY Mode, your device will display the TTY access icon. When enabled, TTY mode may impair the audio quality of non-TTY devices connected to the headset jack.

#### WARNING:

911 Emergency Calling Sprint recommends that TTY users make emergency calls by other means, including Telecommunications Relay Services (TRS), analog cellular, and landline communications. Wireless TTY calls to 911 may be corrupted when received by public safety answering points (PSAPs), rendering some communications unintelligible. The problem encountered appears related to software used by PSAPs. This matter has been brought to the attention of the FCC, and the wireless industry and the PSAP community are currently working to resolve this.

### **Proximity Sensor**

You can access the LS860 proximity sensor through the Call Settings menu.

To enable the Proximity Sensor:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Call settings.
- 2. Tap **Proximity Sensor** to enable it. (A green checkmark will appear.)

#### Roaming Icon

Your display screen always lets you know when you're off the Nationwide Sprint Network.

Anytime you are roaming, the device displays the roaming icon (). If you are roaming on a digital system, you will see the roaming icon along with the text **– Digital Roam –**.

#### Roam on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming on digital networks, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on the Nationwide Sprint Network. However, you may not be able to access certain features, such as data services, depending on the available network.

**Note**: If you're on a call when you leave the Nationwide Sprint Network, your call will be dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think Sprint service is available, turn your phone off and on again to reconnect to the network.

#### Check for Voicemail Messages While Roaming

When you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network, you may not receive a notification of new voicemail messages on your phone. Callers can still leave messages, but you will need to periodically check your voicemail for new messages if you are in a roaming service area for an extended period of time.

- 1. Dial your 10-digit wireless phone number.
- 2. When you hear your voicemail greeting, tap #.
- 3. Enter your passcode at the prompt and follow the voice prompts.

When you return to the Nationwide Sprint Network, voicemail notification will resume as normal.

#### Set Roam Mode

Your phone allows you to control your roaming capabilities. By using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

Choose from three different settings on your dual-band device to control your roaming experience.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Roaming.
- 2. Tap **Domestic Data**, **International Data** or both to place a checkmark and connect to data service while roaming. (Requires **Domestic Voice** or **International Voice**.)

**Note**: With Data roaming unchecked, you can still transmit data with a Wi-Fi connection. See Connect Wi-Fi.

- 3. Tap **System select** to change the CDMA roaming mode.
  - Sprint only to access only the home area mobile network, which is the Nationwide Sprint Network. This option also prevents roaming on other networks.
  - **Include roaming** to seek service off the Nationwide Sprint Network. When Sprint service is unavailable, the device searches for an alternate system.

#### Call Guard

Call Guard makes it easy to manage your roaming by requiring confirmation before placing or answering a roaming call.

To turn Call Guard on or off:

- 1. Tap > Settings > Roaming > Roaming Guards.
- 2. Tap **Voice(Domestic)**, **Voice(International)** or both to activate or deactivate this function. When active, an extra key press is required for dialing when in a roaming area.

**Note**: Call Guard is turned on by default on your phone. Voice dialing and speed dialing are not available when you are roaming with Call Guard enabled.

To place roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- 1. Tap > (Tap the **Dial** tab if necessary).
- 2. Enter 1 + area code + the seven-digit number and tap \_\_\_\_.
- 3. Tap Yes.

To answer incoming roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- 1. Touch and drag the right. A message will be displayed notifying you that roaming charges will apply.
- 2. Tap Yes.

#### Data Roam Guard

Depending on service availability and roaming agreements, your phone may be able to access data services while roaming on certain digital systems. You can set your device to alert you when you are roaming off the Nationwide Sprint Network and try to use data services such as messaging.

**Note**: Data Roam Guard is turned on by default on your phone.

To set your Data Roam Guard notification:

- 1. Tap > =
- 2. Tap System settings > Roaming > Roaming Guards.
- 3. Tap **Data(Domestic)**, **Data(International)** or both to place a checkmark and activate the function.

To use data services when Data Roam Guard is active:

▶ When a pop-up notification appears informing you that data roam charges may apply, tap Connect or Always Connect to connect.

In the Sound settings menu, you can configure call and notification ringtones, audio volumes, as well as some related settings.

### General Sound Settings

Use the following settings for such features as silent mode, vibrate, and overall device volume.

#### Vibrate and Silent Mode

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Sound > Vibrate.
- 2. Tap one of the four options.

To set your device to always vibrate:

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Sound > Vibrate.
- 2. Tap Always.

To switch to silent mode:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Sound.
- 2. Tap **Silent mode**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

– or –

Press the down Volume Button until you see on the screen.

– or –

On the default lock screen, drag (1) to the left.



#### Volume

Adjust your device's volume settings to suit your needs and your environment.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Sound > Volume.
- 2. Adjust each volume level.
  - Ringtone: Changes the volume of your call ringtones (if applicable).
  - Media: Changes the volume of your music, videos and other media.
  - Alarm: Changes the volume of your alarms.
  - **Notification**: Allows you to set this volume level. This is the volume of the ringtone when you receive a notification.
  - System: Changes the volume for system.

3. Tap **OK**.

**Tip:** You can adjust the ringer volume on the Home screen or Applications screen, or almost any screen by using the Volume Buttons on the left side of your device. In other applications such as Music, YouTube, spoken directions, and other audio, the Volume Buttons control the volume of the application.

# Incoming Calls

You can select and assign ringtones for your incoming calls.

#### Phone Ringtone

The phone ringtones alert you of incoming calls.

To select a ringtone for voice calls:

To use a song as a ringtone:

You can use a song as your phone ringtone, in place of one of the ringtones that come with the phone.

- 2. Touch and hold a song in your collection. In the context menu, tap **Use as ringtone**.

– or –

On the Playback screen, tap > Use as ringtone.

For details about using the Music Player application, see Music.

#### **Notifications**

Use the settings menus to assign specific ringtones for notifications.

#### Notification Ringtone

When you receive a notification such as the arrival of new messages, calendar events, or alarms, the device sounds a ringtone.

1. Tap > System settings > Sound > Notification ringtone.

2. Tap a ringtone to select it and to hear it. If you want to set the ringtone, tap **OK**. If not, select another ringtone or tap **Cancel**.

#### Vibrate Types

To set a vibrate type for a contact:

- 1. Tap > > Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap **> Options**.
- 4. Tap Vibrate Type and tap a vibrate type to select it.
- 5. Tap **OK**.

### Sound Feedback Settings

The Feedback settings menu lets you select whether you hear tones when touching numbers on the dialpad, selecting on-screen options, and more.

To hear tones when you use the dialpad to dial a number:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Sound.
- 2. Tap **Audible touch tones**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

To hear sound when you tap buttons, icons, and other on-screen items:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Sound.
- 2. Tap **Audible selection**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

To hear sound when the screen is locked or unlocked:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Sound.
- 2. Tap **Screen lock sounds**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

To set your device to vibrate when touching buttons and keys:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Sound.
- 2. Tap **Haptic feedback**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

To set how the phone reacts when you make an emergency call:

1. Tap > System settings > Sound.

- 2. Tap Emergency tone.
- 3. Tap Off, Alert, or Vibrate.

# Display Settings

Adjusting your device's display settings not only helps you see what you want, it can also help increase battery life.

#### **Brightness**

Adjust your screen's contrast (brightness) to suit your surroundings.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Display > Brightness.
- 2. Use the slider to set a brightness level.

**Note**: For the best battery performance, use the dimmer levels.

#### Auto-Rotate Screen

Choose whether the device automatically switches the orientation of the screen as you turn it sideways or even upside down.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Display.
- 2. Tap **Auto-rotate screen** to automatically rotate the screen (a green checkmark will appear).

– or –

To disable the auto-rotate feature, tap Auto-rotate screen so that the checkmark is removed.

**Note**: Some applications on your device do not support the Auto-rotate feature.

#### Backlight Time Length

Select how long the display screen remains backlit after you touch the screen or press a key before the screen darkens.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Display > Screen timeout.
- 2. Tap 15 seconds, 30 seconds, 1 minute, 2 minutes, 10 minutes, or 30 minutes.

**Note**: Long backlight settings reduce the battery's talk and standby times. For the best battery performance, use the shortest convenient timeout.

#### **Animation Display Options**

Choose whether you want to enjoy animated transitions for some effects (such as when opening menus), for all supported effects (such as when navigating from one screen to another), or to remove all animated transitions (this setting does not affect transitions in non-native applications).

- 1. Tap > System settings > Display > Animation.
- 2. Tap No animations, Some animations, or All animations.

# Location & Security Settings

Your Location settings menu lets you select how your device determines its location (using the wireless network, GPS satellites, both, or neither). The Security settings menus let you set device security, lock codes, passwords, administrator settings, and more.

The Location feature allows the network to detect your position. Turning Location off will hide your location from everyone except 911.

#### **Credential Storage Settings**

**Note**: Turning Location on will allow the network to detect your position using GPS technology making some Sprint applications and services easier to use. Turning Location off will disable the GPS location function for all purposes except 911, but will not hide your general location based on the cell site serving your call. No application or service may use your location without your request or permission. GPS-enhanced 911 is not available in all areas.

#### Wireless Networks

You can use information from Sprint networks to determine your approximate location, for use in GPS applications, when you search, and so on. To use information about your location when navigating and searching in GPS applications (see GPS Navigation) you must turn on location services.

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Location & security.
- 2. Tap **Use wireless networks**. (A green checkmark will appear.)
- 3. When you check this option, you're asked whether you consent to sharing your location anonymously with Google's location service.

4. Read the disclaimer and tap Agree.

#### GPS Satellites

You can use your device's global positioning system (GPS) satellite receiver to pinpoint your location to within accuracy as close as several meters (street level). Actual GPS accuracy depends on a clear view of the sky and other factors.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Location & security.
- 2. Tap **Use GPS satellites**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

**Note**: Uncheck this option when you do not use Maps to conserve battery.

### Set Up Screen Lock

You can increase your device's security by creating a screen unlock pattern (disabled by default), by creating a PIN, or by choosing a password. When these features are enabled, you must draw the correct unlock pattern, enter the PIN, or enter the password on the screen to unlock and regain access to the device.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Location & security.
- 2. Tap Set up screen lock.
- 3. Select Pattern, PIN, or Password.
  - Pattern: The first time you set unlock pattern, you will see a tutorial with instructions on how to create it. Read the tutorial and tap Next (twice). Draw your pattern and tap Continue. Then redraw the pattern and tap Confirm. (Connect at least four dots.)
  - PIN: Enter a PIN (at least of four digits) and tap Continue. Then re-enter your PIN and tap OK.
  - Password: Enter a Password (at least of four characters) and tap Continue. Then re-enter your Password and tap OK.

From then on, any time you wish to turn the phone on or unlock the screen, you must draw your unlock pattern or enter the PIN or password to unlock the screen.

If you have set up Unlock PIN or Unlock Password, enter the Unlock PIN or Unlock Password. After entering it, tap **OK**. The last screen you were working on opens.

**Note**: You have five opportunities to enter your unlock Pattern, PIN or Password. If you've entered the wrong information five times, you must wait 30 seconds before you can attempt again.

- If you've set up a Google account on the device, tap the Forgot pattern? button. You will be able to unlock the device with your Google account username and password.
- If you haven't created a Google account on the device, you must perform a factory reset.

# **CAUTION!** If you perform a factory reset, all user applications and user data will be deleted. Please remember to back up any important data before performing a factory reset.

- When you can't recall your unlock Pattern, PIN or Password:
  - 1. Turn the power off.
  - 2. Press and hold the following keys for over 10 seconds: Down Volume Button + Power/Lock Button .
  - 3. When the power turns on, release these keys and follow the instructions on the screen.

If you can't recall your unlock PIN or Password: Call Sprint Customer Service at 1-888-211-4727.

#### Change the Lock Code

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Location & security > Change screen lock.
- 2. Confirm the saved pattern, or your PIN or Password.
- 3. Select Pattern, PIN, or Password.

#### Disable the Lock Feature

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Location & security > Change screen lock.
- 2. Confirm the saved pattern, or your PIN or Password.
- 3. Tap None.

#### Call in Lock Mode

Even if the screen is locked, you will still be able to place emergency calls. Tap the **Emergency Call** icon.

To call an emergency number, tap the **Emergency call** button, enter the phone number and tap ...

#### Silence Your Device from the Lock Screen

If you are in a place where your device's sounds may disturb others, you can quickly silence your device from the lock screen.

Drag to the left. To turn the phone sounds back on, drag to the left.

# Credential Storage Settings

You use credential storage to establish some kinds of VPN and Wi-Fi connections. You can allow applications to access your device's encrypted store of secure certificates and related passwords and other credentials.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Location & security.
- 2. Slide the screen up until you see **Use secure credentials**.
- 3. Tap **Use secure credentials**. (A green checkmark will appear.)

To install a secure certificate from a microSD card:

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Location & security > Install from SD card.
- 2. Tap the file name of the certificate to install. Only the names of certificates that you have not already installed on your device are displayed.
- 3. If prompted, enter the certificate's password and tap **OK**.
- 4. Enter a name for the certificate and tap **OK**. You can now use the certificate that you installed when connecting to a secure network. For security purposes, the certificate will be deleted from the microSD card.
  - If you have not already set a password for your device's credential storage, you will be prompted to enter a password for it twice, then tap OK.

To set or change the password for your secure credential storage:

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Location & security > Set password.
- 2. Enter the current password, a new password, and confirm the new password. (Please note that your password must have at least 8 characters.)

To delete all secure certificates and related credentials and reset its password:

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Location & security > Clear storage.
- 2. Tap **OK** in the confirmation dialog box..

#### **Activate Location Mode**

Before using any of the location-based services, you must turn on your device's location mode.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Location & security.
- 2. Tap **Use GPS satellites** to place a checkmark and activate your GPS.

#### **Activate Using Wireless Networks**

This additional location feature uses mobile network connections to assist in providing additional location accuracy.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Location & security.
- 2. Tap **Use wireless networks** to place a checkmark and activate this feature. (A green checkmark appears.)
  - Since this feature is based on Google's location service, you will need to agree to allow Google to collect anonymous information.
- 3. Tap Agree to accept the terms of service.

You can add multiple Google<sup>™</sup> Accounts and Exchange accounts. You may also be able to add other kinds of accounts, depending on the applications downloaded and installed on your device.

When you add an account, the Contacts application compares any new contacts with your existing contacts and will join contact entries if matches are found. This does not join the contact entries on the accounts themselves; they are only displayed as a single contact on your device.

(See Configure Account Sync and Display Options to learn how to separate contact information that was joined incorrectly.)

#### Add an Account

**Note**: To add some accounts, you must contact a network administrator for account setup information. For example, you may need to know the account's domain or server address.

- Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync. The Accounts & sync settings screen displays your current sync settings and accounts. (For more information, see Configure Account Sync and Display Options.)
- 2. Tap Add account.
- 3. Tap the type of account you want to add.
- 4. Follow the on-screen steps to enter the required (and optional) account information.

**Note**: Many accounts require only a user name and password, but some accounts will require more information.

5. Configure the account.

Depending on the kind of account, you may be asked to configure the types of data you want to sync to the device, name of the account, and other details. When you're finished, the account will be added to the list in the **Accounts & sync** settings screen.

#### Remove an Account

You can remove an account to delete all information associated with it from your device, including email, contacts, settings, etc.

Some accounts cannot be removed, such the first Google Account you set up on the device. That account can only be removed by resetting your device entirely.

1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.


- 2. Tap the account you want to delete.
- 3. Tap Remove account.
- 4. Tap **Remove account** again to confirm that you want to remove the account.


# Configure Account Sync and Display Options

You can configure background data and synchronization options for the applications on your device. You can also configure synchronization options for each individual account. Some applications, such as Gmail<sup>TM</sup> and Calendar, have their own synchronization settings. Some applications, such as Contacts and Gmail, can sync data for multiple accounts. Others, such as Calendar, sync data only from the first Google Account you set up with your device, or from an account associated specifically with that application.

For some accounts, syncing is two-directional; changes that you make to the information on your device are synchronized with the accounts on the Web or computer. Your Google Account synchronizes in a two-directional manner. Other accounts support only one-way sync; the information changed on your phone is only changed on your phone.

1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.





- Indicates that some, or all, of an account's information is configured to sync automatically with your device.
- Indicates that none of an account's information is configured to sync automatically with your device.
- 2. Tap **Background data** to enable or disable whether applications can use your data connection to synchronize data while the applications run in the background.

If you disable this option, the Gmail and Calendar applications will not automatically receive updates until they are manually refreshed (using their respective options menu).

- 3. Tap **Auto-sync** to enable or disable whether changes you make to information on the device or on the web are automatically synced with each other.
  - For example, when this option is enabled, changes that you make in the Contacts application on your device are automatically made to your web-based Google Contacts™.
  - If you uncheck this option, you may be able to use an application's tools to sync data manually.

To Sync Information Manually:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap the account whose data you want to sync.
- 3. Tap **Sync now**.

To Change Sync Settings:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap the account whose data you want to change.
  - The Data and synchronization screen will open, displaying a list of the types of data the account can sync.
- 3. Tap the items you want to sync. (A green checkmark indicates that synchronization has been enabled.)
  - By disabling synchronization for an item, it will not remove the previously synchronized data from your device, it will simply stop future synching. To remove the information previously synced for the account, you must remove the account.

#### Configure Data Synchronization Settings

This feature allows you to determine which current applications are synchronized with the external server and at what intervals.

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Accounts & sync. These settings can affect data minute usage, please refer to your current data plan for more details.
- 2. Tap any of the following options:
  - Background data: Allows data synchronization to occur as a background function and does not affect any current use of the device.
  - Auto-sync: Requires the device to maintain synchronized with the remote server providing data to your selected applications.

3. Tap to return to the Home screen.

# Privacy Settings

The privacy settings on your device allow you to back-up your data, automatically restore data, and erase all the data on your phone.

#### **Factory Data Reset**

Resetting the device restores all the factory defaults, including personal data from internal device storage, information about your Google Account, any other accounts, your system and application settings, and any downloaded applications. Resetting the device does not erase any system software updates you've downloaded or any files on your microSD card, such as music, pictures, or applications. After resetting the device, the next time you turn on the device, you're prompted to reenter the same kind of information as when you first started the device. See Activate Your Device.

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Privacy > Factory data reset.
- 2. If you are certain that you would like to restore all factory settings, tap **Reset phone**.
- 3. Enter your unlock Pattern, PIN, or Password if you have configured one.
- 4. Tap **Erase everything** to confirm.

# Storage Settings

The Storage settings menu lets you manage internal storage on your device and provides options for your microSD card.

# Language & Keyboard Settings

Your device's Language settings let you select a language for the devices screens and menus, as well as manage a personal user dictionary. The Keyboard settings let you select a preferred input method, control keyboard settings, and more.

#### Display Language

You can choose to display your device's on-screen menus in multiple languages.

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Language & keyboard > Select language.
- 2. Tap **English**, **Español**, **한국어**, 文中(**)**, or 文中(繁體).

# Date & Time Settings

Set your preferences for how dates and time are displayed. You can also use these settings to set your own time and time zone, rather than obtaining the current time from the mobile network.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Date & time.
- 2. Tap **Use 24-hour format** to display the time using 24-hour time format—for example, 13:00 rather than 1:00 pm.
- 3. Tap **Select date format** to open a dialog to select the format for displaying dates.

# Display Your Phone Number

Display your phone number and other information about your phone and account.

► Tap > System settings > About phone > Status.

# **Contacts**

The Contacts application lets you store and manage contacts from a variety of sources, including contacts you enter and save directly in your device as well as contacts synchronized with your Google account, your PC, compatible email programs (including Exchange Server), and your Facebook friends.

## Get Started With Contacts

Use the Contacts application to add, view, and communicate with your family, friends and acquaintances.

#### **Access Contacts**

All of your contacts are displayed alphabetically in a list. If you have a new phone and haven't added any contacts yet, the Contacts application will display hints on how to start adding contacts to your phone.

- ► Tap > |||| > **Contacts** tab.
- To add contacts shortcut to the home screen, touch and hold an empty spot on one of the home screens, and then tap Widgets. Swipe the widgets left or right until you find Contact or Favorite contacts widgets.

#### The Contacts List

Learn how to view and navigate through your phone's Contacts list.

Scroll through the list to view all your contacts. To see a specific entry, scroll to it and touch it.

**Tip**: If you have a lot of contacts stored, you'll see a slider on the right when you're flicking up or down the list. To go directly to a letter, touch and hold the slider and drag it to a letter.

#### **Contacts List Options**

From the Contacts list, press to display the main contacts list options.

- Search
- New Contact
- Display options
- Accounts
- Import/Export


### Add a Contact

You can add contacts on your phone and synchronize them with the contacts in your Google™ Account, Microsoft Exchange account, or other accounts that support syncing contacts.

The Contacts application tries to join new addresses with existing contacts, to create a single entry. You can also manage that process manually.

- 1. Tap  $\longrightarrow$  > Contacts tab.
- 2. Tap to add a contact.
- 3. Tap a destination type (**Phone**, **Google**, or **SIM**), if applicable.
- 4. Tap the Picture Frame icon to select a picture to display next to the name in your list of contacts and in the Caller ID.
- 5. Tap the Name field and enter a name for the new entry.
- 6. Tap the phone number field and enter a phone number.
- Tap the label button (to the right of the Phone number field) to select one of the following categories: MOBILE, WORK, HOME, MAIN, WORK FAX, HOME FAX, PAGER, OTHER, CUSTOM.
- 8. Tap Email field and enter an Email address and select the label from **HOME**, **WORK**, **OTHER**, **CUSTOM**.
- 9. Tap the Group name field and select one of the default groups or tap **New group** to create a new group.
- 10. Tap the ringtone field and select the desired ringtone.

11. Enter information as much as you want and when you're finished, tap **Done**.



## Add a Contact to Your Favorites

Favorites contains a short list of the contacts you communicate with most often.

- 1. Tap -> | Contacts.
- 2. Tap a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap the star to the right of the contact's name. (A gold star appears.)

To remove a contact from your favorites list:

- 2. Tap a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap the gold star to the right of the contact's name. The star will turn gray, meaning it has been removed from your Favorites.

# Edit a Contacts Entry

You can change or add details saved in your contact entries, such as setting specific ringtones to specific contacts or setting calls from specific contacts to divert to your voicemail. Some contact entries contain information from multiple sources: information that you added manually, information joined from multiple accounts to consolidate duplicates, etc.

If you find duplicate entries in Contacts, you can join them into a single entry. If you find that unrelated contacts were joined in error, you can separate them.

Changes made to information from one source do not automatically change the information on the other sources. For example, if you have information about a contact from a Google Account

and an Exchange account and both are configured to sync contacts, changes to the contact from the Google Account are synced to that account on the Web, but the information from the Exchange account will remain unchanged.

For more information about working with multiple accounts, see Accounts.

#### **Edit Contact**

- 2. Touch and hold the contact whose details you want to edit.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Edit the desired contact information.
- 5. Tap **Done**.

#### Change a Contact's Phone Number

The default phone number is used when you initiate a call or send a text message using the context menu (by touching and holding a contact).

- 1. Tap -> | Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact to view its details.
- 3. Touch and hold the phone number you want to set as the contact's default phone number.
- 4. Tap Make default number. (A checkmark will appear next to the default phone number.)

#### Divert Calls From a Contact to Voicemail

- 2. Tap the name of a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap **> Options**.
- 4. Tap **Incoming calls**. (A green checkmark will appear.)
- 5. Tap 🔄.

When this contact calls you, your phone will not ring and the caller will be forwarded directly to your voicemail.

#### Select a Ringtone for a Contact

- 1. Tap > | Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap  **> Options**.
- 4. Tap Ringtone and tap a ringtone to select it.
- 5. Tap **OK**.

#### **Delete Contacts**

- 1. Tap -> | > | Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact.
- 3. Tap **Delete contact**.
  - If the contact contains information from a read-only account, you will not be able to delete it; you will only be able to change the sync settings for that account or delete the account itself.
  - If the contact contains information joined from a read-only account, a dialog box will inform you that you must separate the contact entry into individual contacts to delete the contact.
- 4. Tap **OK** to confirm that you want to delete the contact.

#### Add a Number to a Contact's Entry

- 1. Tap > | Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Edit contact in the menu that opens.
- 4. Tap the Phone category's plus button.
- 5. Tap the label button to the left of the phone number field and select the relevant label.
  - To create your own label, tap Custom.
- 6. Enter a phone number and tap **Done**.

#### Edit a Contact's Entry Number

1. Tap -> | Contacts.

- 2. Touch and hold a contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Tap a phone number to edit.
- 5. Re-enter or edit the number and tap **Done**.

#### **Assign Direct Dialing Numbers**

Besides Speed dialing, you are also able to directly save a contact to your Home screen.

- 2. Touch and hold a contact's entry.
- 3. Tap **Add to home screen > Direct dial**. The contact will be shown on the Home screen.

**Note**: If there is no available space on a particular Home screen pane, Add will not be available; you must delete or remove an item before you can add another item. In this case, you have the option of switching to another Home screen pane.

To use direct dial:

Simply tap the contact on the Home screen.

#### Assign a Picture to an Entry

Assign a picture to display each time a certain contact calls you.

- 1. Tap > |||| > Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact's entry.
- 3. Tap **Edit contact**.
- 4. Tap the Picture Frame icon.
- 5. Tap **Take photo** to take a new picture. The camera will launch.

- or -

Tap **Select photo from Gallery** to select a picture from the Gallery.

6. After cropping the picture as you want, (see Gallery Options) tap Save.

#### Find Contacts by Name

1. Tap > |||| > Contacts.

2. Tap Search contacts.

**Shortcut**: From the Home screen, tap **Search contacts** to display the Search feature.

- 3. Start entering the name of the contact you're searching for. As you type, contacts with matching names will appear below the search box.
- 4. Tap a matching contact in the list to open its entry.

#### **Contact Display Options**

You can hide contacts that don't have phone numbers. You can also configure which groups of contacts you want to display in the Contacts List.

To set whether contacts without phone numbers are displayed:

- 1. Tap > | Contacts.
- 2. Tap  **> Display Options**.
- 3. Tap **Only contacts with phones**. (A green checkmark will appear.)
- 4. Tap Done.


# Communicate with Your Contacts

From the Contacts or Favorites tab, you can quickly call or send a text (SMS) or multimedia message (MMS) to a contact's default phone number. You can also open a menu to access different methods of communicating with that contact.

The **Contacts** application shares your contacts with many other applications, such as Gmail™ (see Gmail) and messaging (see Text and Multimedia Messaging).

To connect by using Quick Contact for Android™:

1. Tap a contact's picture to open Quick Contact for Android.



2. Tap the icon corresponding to the type of communication you want to start.

Depending on the contact information saved, the available actions will be displayed above the name. (For more information, see Communicate with Your Contacts.)

To communicate with a contact:

- 1. Tap > | Contacts.
- 2. Tap the contact's entry.
- 3. In the contact's details screen, tap the method you wish to communicate with the contact.
  - Tap next to the number you want to call to directly.
  - Tap P next to the number you want to message.

**Note**: Anytime you see the green Call Key next to a number, such as in your Favorites or Call logs, just tap it to call that number.

To call a contact's default number:

- 1. Tap -> | Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Call contact.

(For more information about placing phone calls, see Make Phone Calls.)

To send a text or multimedia message to a contact's default number:

1. Tap > | Contacts.

- 2. Touch and hold the contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Text contact.

For more information about sending text and multimedia messages, see Text and Multimedia Messaging.

# Import, Export, and Share Contacts

If you have contacts stored in vCard format on a microSD card you can import them into your Contacts application on your device. You can also export contacts in vCard format onto a microSD card. Export your contacts to back them up to a computer or another device.

# Import contacts from your microSD card

You can import contacts from your microSD card directly to your device.

**Note**: See Connect Your Device to Your Computer for details about copying files to a microSD card from your computer.

- 1. Insert the microSD card (that contains the vCard files) into your device.
- 2. Tap -> | > Contacts.
- 3. Tap > Import/Export > Import from SD card.
- 4. If you have more than one account on your phone, tap the account into which you want to import the contacts.
- 5. Tap the importing option and then tap **OK**.

# Export contacts to your microSD card

You can export all of the contacts on your phone to your microSD card, as vCard files. You can then copy this file to a computer or another device that is compatible with this format, such as an address book application. (See Connect Your Device to Your Computer.)

- 1. Tap -> | Contacts.
- 2. Tap > Import/Export.
- 3. Tap Export to SD card.
- Tap **OK** to confirm your selection and to begin exporting your Contact List to the microSD card.

# Share a contact

You can share a contact with someone by sending it to the person as a vCard file.

- 1. Tap -> | Contacts.
- 2. Open the contact you want to share.
- 3. Tap **Share**.
- 4. Choose the method for sending.

# **Gmail**

This email client is Google's web-based email service. (See Synchronize Your Google Account.)

From a computer, launch your preferred Web browser and navigate to www.gmail.com. Depending on your synchronization settings, Gmail (along with calendar events, phone numbers and other contact information) on your device is automatically synchronized between your device and your Gmail account on the Web.

### Create a Google Account

You must create and/or sign into a Google Account to use Gmail<sup>TM</sup>, Google Talk<sup>TM</sup>, Google Calendar<sup>TM</sup>, and other Google Apps. Signing into a Google Account is also necessary to download applications from the Google Play<sup>TM</sup>, to sync your data (if applicable) with the Google servers, and to take advantage of any other available Google services on your device.

If you don't have a Google Account, you will be prompted to create one. If you have an enterprise account through your company or other organization, your IT department may have special instructions on how to sign into that account.

- 1. From a computer, or from your device's Browser, navigate to www.google.com.
- 2. On the main page, select **Sign In > Sign Up**.
- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to create your free account.

4. Log into your provided email address, locate the email from Google, and respond to the new email to both confirm and activate your new account.

# Sign into Your Google Account

If you have a Google account but have not yet signed in with your device, follow these instructions to sign in to your Google account.

- 1. Launch an application that requires a Google account (such as Google Play or Gmail).
- 2. Click **Next** > **Sign in**.

**Note**: If you do not already have a Google account, tap **Create** and follow the on-screen prompts to create your new account.

- 3. Touch the **Username** and **Password** fields and enter your information.
- 4. Tap **Sign in**. Your device then communicates with the Google servers to confirm your information.

#### Important:

Some applications, such as Calendar, work only with the primary Google account (the first Google account set up with your device). If you plan to use more than one Google Account with your device, be sure to sign into the one you want to use with such applications first. When you sign in, your contacts, Gmail messages, Calendar events, and other information from these applications and services on the Web can be synchronized with your device. You will be prompted to sign in or to create a Google Account the first time you start an application that requires one, such as Gmail or Google Play.


#### Access Gmail

Access your personal Gmail account directly on your device.

When you open the Gmail application, the most recent conversations are displayed in your Inbox.



All of your conversations are displayed in your Inbox unless you delete, archive, or filter them. Conversations with new messages are displayed with bold subject lines. To read a message in a conversation, tap the conversation. (See Read Your Messages.)



#### Open Your Gmail Inbox

► When reading a message, tap = > Go to inbox.

- or -

When viewing a list of labeled conversations, tap = > More > Go to inbox.

#### Switch Between Accounts

Gmail displays conversations and messages from one Google Account at a time. If you have more than one account, you can open the Accounts screen to view how many unread messages you have in each account and switch accounts.

1. From your Inbox, tap == > Accounts.

- or -


Tap your account name at the top right corner of the Inbox screen.

2. Tap the account that contains the email you want to read.

#### Read Your Messages

► Tap a conversation that contains the message you want to read.

When you open a conversation, the first unread or starred message is displayed.




The Google Talk online status will appear next to the name of the sender of each message if the sender has a Google account. If you want to contact the sender, touch the Contact's picture ID to open Quick Contact. (See Communicate with Your Contacts.) When reading messages in a conversation, you can use the buttons at the bottom of the screen to archive the entire conversation (see Archive Conversations) or delete it. After you delete a conversation, you can touch **Undo** in the green bar that appears at the top of the Inbox screen to return the message to the Inbox. You can scroll to the bottom of a message to access buttons for replying to or forwarding the message, as described in Replying to or Forwarding a Message.


#### To reread a message:

When you open a conversation, messages that you've already read are minimized into a tab that indicates the number of hidden messages.

- 2. Tap the conversation you want to view, then touch the tab indicating minimized messages.



3. Tap the contact name to open that message.



When reading a message or when its tab is selected, you can tap **=** > **Mark unread** to return a read message to the unread state. For example, to remind yourself to read it again later.

### Send a Gmail Message

You can compose and send a message to people or groups with Gmail addresses or other email addresses.

- 1. Tap -> | > | Gmail.
- 2. Tap  **> Compose**.
- Enter a recipient's address. As you enter text, matching addresses are displayed from your Contact list. You can tap a suggested address or continue entering text to enter a new one.

- 4. Tap > Add Cc/Bcc to copy recipients, if necessary.
- 5. Enter a subject for the message in the **Subject** field.
- 6. Continue into the next field to compose your email message.
- 7. Tap > Attach to add an attachment to the email.
- 8. Tap to send the email.

- or -

If you're not ready to send the message, tap instead. You can read your drafts by opening messages with the Drafts label. (See View Conversations by Label.)

– or –

Tap > Discard to erase the message (including any saved drafts).

**Note**: If you aren't connected to a network - for example, if you're working in Airplane mode - the messages that you send are stored on your device, with the Outbox label until you connect to a network again.

# Read and Reply to Gmail Messages

You can continue an email conversation by replying to a message or by forwarding it.

1. Tap to view the reply options.




- 2. Tap Reply, Reply all, or Forward.
  - Replying to or forwarding messages without changing the subject adds your reply to the current conversation. Changing the subject starts a new conversation.
  - The message will open in a new screen where you can add or remove addresses, edit the subject, and add or remove text or attachments.
  - You can add one or more people to an ongoing conversation by replying to all and then adding the new person's address(es) to the message.
  - All of the messages in the conversation are included in the new message; any messages that follow the message you forward are omitted.

3. Tap to send the email.

#### Work with Conversations in Batches

With Gmail, you can archive, label, delete, or perform other actions on a batch of conversations at once.

- 1. From the Inbox or another label, tap the checkmark box to the left of each message for all the messages you want to include in the batch.
  - When you checkmark a conversation, the Archive, Delete, and Labels buttons appear at the bottom of the screen.



- Tap Archive, Delete, or Labels. You can also tap > Add star, Report spam, Mute, Mark read/Mark unread, Not important/Mark important, or More (Deselect all, Help, About).
  - The chosen action affects the selected batch of messages. If you accidentally delete a batch of conversations, you can tap **Undo** in the green bar (that appears briefly after the action) at the top of the Inbox screen to return the messages to the Inbox or appropriate label. You can also use **Undo** after muting, archiving, and reporting spam. If you never work with batches of messages, you can hide the check boxes to leave more room for the subjects of conversations. (See Change Gmail Settings.)

#### Label a Conversation

As mentioned previously, conversations are organized by labels. Gmail has several default labels, but you can also add your own through Gmail on the Web.

- 1. When viewing a conversation, tap **E** > **Change labels**.
- 2. In the dialog box that opens, check the labels you want to assign to the conversation and tap **OK**.

To label a batch of conversations at once:

You can assign or change the labels of one or more conversations at once.

- 1. From your Inbox or another label, checkmark the conversations to select a batch. (See Work with Conversations in Batches.)
- 2. Tap **Labels** at the bottom of the screen.
- 3. In the dialog box that opens, check the labels you want to assign to the conversation.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

### Starred Messages

You can star an important message or conversation to make it easy to locate again. To view just conversations with starred messages, see View Conversations by Label and view the Starred label.

To star a message:

• When reading a message, tap the star in its header.

- or -

When viewing the list of conversations, tap a conversation's star to start the newest message in the conversation.


To unstar a message:

Tap its star again.

#### View Conversations by Label

You can view a list of the conversations that have the same label, including conversations with starred messages. (See Label a Conversation or Starred Messages for information about assigning labels and stars.)

1. When viewing your Inbox or another label, tap = > Go to labels.



2. Tap a label to view a list of conversations with that label.

**Note**: The conversation list will resemble your Inbox. Most of the options available while using your Inbox will also be available while viewing these lists of labeled messages.

### Report Spam

The Gmail webmail service is quite effective at preventing spam (junk mail) from reaching your Inbox. When you do receive spam you can help improve the Gmail service by reporting the conversation as spam.

► When reading the email, tap = > More > Report spam.

– or –

From the Inbox, tap the checkmark to select a batch of messages, then tap **=** > **Report spam**.

When you report a conversation as spam, the conversation (and all its messages) are removed from your Inbox. You can view the messages you've marked as spam by switching to the Spam label. (See View Conversations by Label.)

# Search for Messages

With the Gmail application, it is very easy to search and find specific emails. When you search for emails, all of the emails in your Google account on the web are included in your search (except those labeled Trash or Spam), not just those that you've synchronized onto your device. You can also use the advanced search options as described on the Gmail website.

1. From the Inbox, tap **Search**.

– or –

From the Inbox, press Q.



2. Enter the word or words to search for, then tap the Search icon to the right of the text field. A list of results will appear, displaying all of the conversations with emails that contain the word(s) you searched for.

#### **Archive Conversations**

You can archive conversations, to move them out of your Inbox without deleting them. Archived conversations are assigned the All Mail label, and also retain any other labels you've assigned to them. Archived conversations are also included in search results. If someone replies to a message that you've archived, its conversation will be restored to your Inbox.

From your Inbox, touch and hold a conversation and then tap **Archive** in the menu that opens.

– or –

Checkmark one or a batch of conversations in your Inbox, then tap the **Archive** button. (See Work with Conversations in Batches.)

- or -

When reading a message, tap the **Archive** button at the bottom of the screen.

## Synchronize Conversations

The Gmail webmail service has the resources to store all the messages you've ever sent or received; your device does not. To save space, Gmail downloads only some of your messages to your device. Use the Settings application to control how and when applications synchronize their data. (See Synchronize Accounts.)

- 1. Tap -> | > Gmail.
- 2. Tap > More > Settings > tap an account > Sync inboxes and labels. The Synchronization settings screen opens, displaying a list of your Gmail labels. Below each label is its current synchronization setting: Sync all, Sync last 4 days, or with no label. (Conversations with no label are not synchronized.)
- 3. Tap a conversation label whose synchronization settings you want to change. Choose from the following options:
  - Sync none: Don't download any conversations that only have this label.
  - Sync last 4 days: Download the previous four days (or number of days you set) of conversations.

• Sync all: Download all conversations with this label.

To set how many days of conversations to synchronize:

- 2. Tap > More > Settings > tap an account > Sync inboxes and labels.
- 3. Tap Amount of mail to sync.
- 4. Enter the number of days, then tap the **OK** button.

## Append a Signature to Your Messages

You can add a signature to every email you send, such as your name, contact information, or any personal message.

- 2. Tap > More > Settings > tap an account > Signature.
- 3. Enter a signature or other information.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

## **Change Gmail Settings**

You can change a number of settings for Gmail. Each Google account has its own settings, so your changes affect only the current account. (See Switch between accounts).

Notification volumes and some synchronization settings can also be changed in the Settings application.

- 2. Tap > More > Settings. Then touch the desired account.

### **General settings**:

- Priority Inbox: When checkmarked, this feature makes Priority Inbox your default inbox for your account.
- **Signature**: To add a signature or other information to outgoing email. (See Append a Signature to Your Messages.)
- **Confirm actions**: If checkmarked, this feature will display a dialogue asking you to confirm whenever you want to archive, delete, or send a message.
- Reply all: Make 'Reply all' the default for responding to messages

- Auto-advance: Allows you to choose what screen to display after you delete or archive conversation.
- Message text size: Allows you choose the size of the text in a message for easier viewing.
- Batch operations: When checkmarked, this feature allows you to perform various operations on multiple conversations at once
- Sync inboxes and labels: Allows you to manage which conversations are synchronized and how often.

#### Notification settings:

- Email notifications: When checkmarked, the phone will notify you whenever you receive new email. (See Notifications Panel.)
- Labels to notify: Set notification preferences for synced labels.

# Email

Your device's Email application lets you access and manage multiple email accounts simultaneously in one convenient location.

Although there is a separate Gmail application, the main email application can manage both Internet based email services (Gmail™ and Yahoo!™) and Corporate Work Email (Outlook®). The device can also be manually configured to connect to other email systems.

**Note**: If you have multiple email accounts, you must configure each account with its own settings.

If you want to send and receive email messages through an ISP (Internet Service Provider) account (such as Outlook), you will first need to set up an IMAP or POP account.

- Internet Message Access Protocol (IMAP) This mail retrieval protocol is frequently used in large networks and commercial and institutional settings. IMAP4 is the current standard.
- Post Office Protocol (POP) This protocol is supported by most ISPs and is currently more common among consumer applications. POP3 is the current standard.

**Note**: For more information, review your email carrier's support documents or contact your IT administrator.

# Set Up other Email accounts via the Device

The **Email** application only reveals all currently added Email accounts. To view additional email accounts within the main Email screen, they must first be added.

- 1. Tap -> | > | Email.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions to setup an Email account.
  - Tap Manual setup to configure your connection settings manually (POP3, IMAP, or Exchange). Follow the on-screen prompts and enter the information specific to your carrier.

# Corporate Email (Outlook)

The main Email application also provides access to your Outlook Exchange server via your device. If your company uses Microsoft Exchange Server 2003, 2007 and 2010 as the corporate email system, you can use this email application to wirelessly synchronize your email, Contacts and directly with your company's Exchange server.

Important:

This Outlook application does not utilize Microsoft® ActiveSync to synchronize the device to your remote Exchange Server. This synchronization is done wirelessly over the air (OTA) and not via a direct connection.

## Set Up a Corporate Email

- 1. Tap -> | Email.
- 2. Tap > Accounts.
- 3. Tap > Add account.
- 4. Tap **Exchange** (from the add new email account screen).
- 5. Enter your **Email address** and **Password** information, then tap **Next**. Consult your Network Administrator for further details.
  - Email address: Your Outlook work email address.
  - Password: Typically your network access password (case-sensitive).

- 6. Enter a Server address, domain and tap Next.
  - **Server**: Your exchange server remote email address. Typically starts with mail.XXX.com. Obtain this information from your company network administrator.
  - Domain: Enter your network domain\login username.
  - If your network requires SSL encryption, tap the Use secure connection (SSL) box to place a checkmark and activate this additional level of security.
  - If your exchange server requires this feature, leaving this field unchecked can prevent connection.

**Note**: Signal interruptions or incorrect username or password information can cause completion issues.

- 7. Read the on-screen activation disclaimer and, if prompted, tap **Next**.
- 8. Configure your **Inbox Update schedule**, **Days to sync email** (days to synchronize between your device and server), and activate any other email settings, then tap **Next**.
- 9. Identify your new account with a unique name and provide the outgoing name, then tap **Done**.

Important: You can synchronize over the air (not directly) with an Exchange Server running Microsoft Exchange Server 2003 Service Pack 2 (SP2) or Microsoft Exchange Server 2010.

Note: You can have multiple Work Email (Microsoft Exchange) accounts active on your device.

## Open Corporate Email

- 2. Tap a message to read, manage, or reply to.
  - From your Inbox screen, tap to select options, such as Refresh, Compose, Folders, Accounts, or Account settings.
  - While in a message, tap to select messaging options, such as Delete, Forward, Reply, Reply all, or Mark as unread.

#### Create and Send Email

- 1. From the Inbox, tap  **> Compose**.
- 2. Enter the recipient's email address in the **To** field.

- If you are sending the email to several recipients, separate the email addresses with a comma.
- You can add as many message recipients as you want.

**Note**: To send an additional carbon copy (Cc) or a blind carbon copy (Bcc) of the current email to other recipients, tap > Add Cc/Bcc.

- 3. Tap the **Subject** field and enter the email subject.
- 4. Tap the **Body** field and compose your email.
  - To add a picture attachment, tap > Add attachment.
  - You can access the internal microSD card and navigate to the file you wish to attach.
  - Tap the file you wish to attach.

To reply to an email message:

- 1. From the Inbox, tap an email message to view it.
- 2. With the email message displayed, tap either Reply or Reply all.

– or –

With the email message displayed, tap **respond** icon (compose icon).

- If you select Forward, you must specify the message's recipients.
- 3. Enter a new message body and tap **Send**.

To delete an email message:

► Touch and hold an email (from your inbox list) and tap **Delete** from the pop-up context menu.

– or –

With the email message displayed, tap **Delete**.

# Configure and Sync Corporate Email Settings

You can sync and configure various settings for your corporate email and create a corporate email signature.

## Sync Your Accounts

1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.

- 2. Tap the Corporate account to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- 3. Place a checkmark next to each option if you want the device to automatically synchronize. If you want to manually synchronize, tap **Sync now**.

## Configure Corporate Email

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap the Corporate account field to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- 3. Tap Account settings.
  - Account name: Displays the name used by the device to track the account.
  - **Signature**: To add a signature or other information to outgoing email.
  - Period to synchronize calendar: Configures how many days worth of calendar events the device and server should synchronize. Choose from: Two weeks, One month, Three months, Six months, or All.
  - Period to synchronize email: Configures how many days worth of emails the device and server should synchronize. Choose from: One day, Three days, One week,
     Two weeks, or All.
  - Sync schedule: Allows you to set the Peak sync schedule, Off-peak sync schedule, Peak start time, Peak end time, and Peak days.
  - Message size limit: Allows you to set the message size limit to Header Only, 5KB, 10KB, 20KB, 50KB, or No limit.
  - Inbox Sort by: Allows you to sort Inbox by date, subject, sender, or size.
  - Roaming: Allows you to retrieve email automatically while roaming.
  - Default account: Assigns this account as the default account used when sending out new emails.
  - Ask before deleting: Allows you to set whether to ask before deleting.
  - **Email notifications**: Allows the phone to notify you when you receive new emails.
  - Select ringtone: Allows you to assign a ringtone to notify you of new email.
  - **Vibrate**: Allows you to set the phone to vibrate when new email is received.
  - Vibrate Type: Allows you to set the type of vibrate for new messages.
  - Incoming settings: Allows you to view and modify your incoming server settings.

- **Sync contacts**: Synchronizes the contacts between your device and the remote exchange server. A checkmark indicates the feature is enabled.
- Sync calendar: Synchronizes your exchange calendar entries between your device and the remote exchange server. A checkmark indicates the feature is enabled.
- Out Of Office: Allows you to configure your Out of Office settings.
- 4. Tap to return to the previous screen.

For more detailed Corporate email information, see Corporate Email (Outlook). For more information on Corporate Calendar synchronizing, see Synchronize Your Corporate Account.

## Create a Corporate Email Signature

This signature can differ from any current Email signature on your local Outlook client. This signature is applied to any outgoing emails originating on your device.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap the Corporate account to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- 3. Tap Account settings.
- 4. Tap Signature.
- 5. Tap New signature and enter your new email signature.
- 6. Tap **OK** to store the new signature.

# Text and Multimedia Messaging

With text messaging (SMS), you can send and receive instant text messages between your wireless phone and another messaging-ready phone. When you receive a new message, you will be notified by your device.

#### Text and Multimedia Message Options

Messaging is available via the Messaging application in your Applications screen. The icon appears in Status Bar when a new text message is received.

**Note**: See your service plan for applicable charges for text messaging.

# Compose Text Messages

Quickly compose and send text messages on your device.

- 2. Tap the **To** field and enter the recipient's phone number or email information using the on-screen keyboard.
  - Contacts: As you enter either a phone number or email address, if the information
    matches a current contact's entry information, you will see a match. When you see a
    match, tap the associated name to complete the addressing.
  - Mobile: Tap 1232 to use the keypad to enter a wireless phone number directly.
  - **Email**: You can also enter the recipient's email address.
- 3. Tap a matching entry from the on-screen dropdown list. This list is populated by matches found from your managed accounts.
- 4. Tap the text field and enter your message.
- 5. Insert an Emoticon or a Smiley.
  - To enter an emoticon, touch and hold on the Swype keyboard.
  - To enter a smiley from the menu options, tap > Insert smiley. Make a selection from the list to insert it into your current message.
- 6. Review your message and tap Send.

# Read and Reply to Text Messages

When you receive a text message, your phone will notify you. You can access the message by:

- ▶ Opening the Notification Panel and tapping the text message notification.
- ► Tapping > > Messaging and selecting the new message.

#### Reply to a Text Message

- 1. While viewing a message, tap the **text field**.
- 2. Compose your reply or use the preset messages or icons.
  - To enter a message, use your on-screen keyboard. (See Enter Text With the On-screen Keyboard.)
- 3. Insert an emoticon or a Smiley.

- To enter an emoticon, touch and hold on the Swype keyboard.
- To enter a smiley from the menu options, tap > Insert smiley. Make a selection from the list to insert it into the message.
- 4. You may select additional messaging options by tapping
  - Options include: Call, Add subject, Attach, Set priority, Insert smiley or More [Preset message, Delete thread, All threads, and Add to contact].
- 5. Review your reply and tap **Send**.

# Send a Multimedia Message (MMS)

With multimedia messaging (MMS), you can send and receive instant multimedia messages that contain text, pictures, audio, recorded voice, or a picture slideshow. Messaging is available via the Messaging application in your Applications screen.

**Note**: See your service plan for applicable charges for multimedia messaging.

### Compose Multimedia Messages

- 2. Tap the **To** field and enter the recipient's phone number or email information. As you enter the phone number or email address, matching contacts appear on-screen. Tap an available matching recipient or continue entering the phone number or email address.
- 3. Tap the text field and enter your message.
- 4. Tap = > Attach.
- 5. Select a multimedia attachment type:
  - **Pictures**: Opens the Gallery application. Use the on-screen navigation to select the picture you wish to send with the outgoing message.
  - Capture picture: Opens the Camera application. Take a picture, and then tap OK to use this image in your message. (See Take Pictures.)
  - Videos: Opens the Gallery application. Use the on-screen navigation to select a video and attach it to your outgoing message.
  - Capture video: Opens the Camcorder application. Record a video, then tap OK to use this video in your message. (See Record Videos.)
  - Audio: Opens a menu that allows you to choose between Choose music track and Select music track. Use the on-screen navigation with the Choose music track or Select music track option to select an audio file and tap OK.

- Record audio: Opens the message recorder.
  - Record Duration: Displays the length of the recorded voice message.
  - **Record**: Starts recording your message.
  - Play: Plays back the current recording.
  - **Stop**: Stops the recording. Once stopped, tap either **Use this recording** (attach it to your message) or **Discard** (delete the current recording and re-record).
- Slideshow: Opens the Edit slideshow menu.
  - Tap Add slide to create a new slide.
  - Tap the created slide (example, Slide 1), tap **Add picture**, and then select the picture you want to add to the slide.
  - Tap the text field below the image to enter a caption for the picture.
  - When finished, tap **Done** to attach the slideshow to your message.
- Contact(vCard): Opens your Contacts list and allow you to select a picture of a Contact to send.

**Note**: To remove or replace a picture or an audio attachment, on the Compose screen, tap the **Remove** or **Replace** button next to the attachment.

6. When you are finished creating your new MMS message, tap **Send MMS**.

## View and Play Multimedia Messages

- 1. Tap Simple > Messaging.
- 2. From the message list, tap a multimedia message to open its contents.
- 3. While viewing a message, tap the play icon (on the video file) to playback the file or tap the image to view the picture.

**Tip**: The file attachment on the MMS message can be saved to the microSD card. To save the attachment, touch and hold the file and tap **Save attachment** from the Message options context menu.

#### Reply to a Multimedia Message

- 1. Tap -> | Messaging.
- 2. From the message list, tap a multimedia message to open its contents.
- 3. While viewing a message, tap the text field and type your reply message.

4. Once completed, tap **Send**.

Note: When replying to an SMS message with an MMS message, first open the text message, tap and tap Attach. The original text message is then automatically converted into a multimedia message.

# Text and Multimedia Message Options

The messages settings menu lets you control options for your text and MMS messages including message limits, size settings, and notifications.

- 1. Tap -> | Messaging.
- 2. From within the Messaging screen, tap = and tap Settings.
- 3. Adjust the following settings according to your needs:
  - Conversation skin:
  - Delete old messages: Enable this option to delete older text messages when the limit for maximum number of text messages is exceeded.
  - Text message limit: Sets the maximum number of text messages that can be stored on the device (per conversation).
  - Multimedia message limit: Sets the maximum number of multimedia messages that can be stored on the device (per conversation).
  - **Signature**: Tap this to automatically add signature (green checkmark displays).
  - Callback number: Check this to automatically add callback number (green checkmark displays).
  - Set priority: Select Normal or Urgent.
  - Message reassembly: Enable this option (green checkmark displays) so that multisegment messages can be reassembled and shown as a single message. Each segment will still count toward your usage.
  - Preset message: Select a preset message, such as "Call me" or "Where are you?"
  - Auto-retrieve: Enable this option to automatically retrieve the entire content of your MMS message. When checked, the MMS message header, message body, and any attachments will automatically download to your device.
    - If you disable this option, only the MMS message header will be retrieved and displayed.
  - Quick messages:

- Auto-retrieve:
- Roaming auto-retrieve.: Disable this option if you only desire the MMS message headers to download while roaming. Enable this option to automatically download your complete multimedia messages even while roaming.
- Set priority: Select Low, Normal, or High.
- **Notifications**: Enable this option if you wish to receive a notification in the Status Bar when a new text or multimedia message arrives.
- Select ringtone: Allows you to select a ringer to sound when a new message is received. Tap this option, and then select a ringtone that is specific to new text and multimedia messages. A sample will briefly be played upon selection.
- **Vibrate**: Enable this option if you want the device to vibrate when a new text or multimedia message is received.
- **Vibrate type**: Choose what type of vibration you wish to apply to new messages.

#### Delete Old Text Messages

Delete messages or message threads you have read whenever you like, or have your device delete them automatically for you. A thread is a series of text conversations between two people. Deleting a thread will delete the sent and received messages in the conversation

To delete a specific message thread:

- 1. Tap -> IIII > Messaging.
- 2. Tap a thread to view the contents of that thread.
- 3. Tap > More > Delete thread.

To delete all stored messages:

- 1. Tap -> | Messaging.
- 2. Tap **=** > **Delete threads**.

# Synchronize Accounts

Your device is able to synchronize data from a variety of different sources or sites. These accounts can range from Google, a Corporate Exchange Server, and other social sites, including Facebook, Twitter, and MySpace.

Synchronize Your Google Account

## Enable Auto-Sync

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap **Auto-sync**. A checkmark indicates the feature is enabled.
  - Tap an account you've already set up to choose the type of data you want to synchronize. For example, you can choose to sync your Google Calendar and/or Gmail data.

# Synchronize Your Google Account

By default, there are no accounts managed by the device. These must be added manually.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap Add account > Google.
- 3. Tap Next > Sign in.

**Note**: If you do not already have a Google account, tap **Create** (instead of Sign in) follow the on-screen prompts to create your new account.

4. Tap the **Username** and **Password** fields and enter your information.

- 5. Tap **Sign in**. Your device communicates with the Google servers to confirm your information. Your existing Gmail account appears within the Manage accounts area of the screen.
  - If Auto-sync is selected, changes or updates to your Gmail account are then automatically updated to your device.

## Configure Google Sync Settings

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap the Google account to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- Tap the type of data you wish to synchronize (Sync Wallet, Sync Instant Upload, Sync Books, Sync Contacts, Sync Gmail, Sync Picasa Web Albums, and Sync Calendar).
   Note that Auto-sync must be selected (in the previous screen) for these options to become available.
- 4. Tap to return to the previous screen.

# Synchronize Your Corporate Account

Your device is capable of synchronizing with your company's Exchange Servers.

To add a new Corporate account:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap Add account > Microsoft Exchange.
- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to create your new Corporate email account. (See Corporate Email (Outlook.)
  - If Auto-sync is selected, changes or updates to your Corporate/Outlook account are synchronized to your device.

To configure the Corporate account settings:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap the Corporate account and then tap **Account settings**.
- 3. Tap the options you wish to configure:
  - Account settings allows you to configure:
    - Account name: displays the name used by the device to track the account.
    - **Signature**: allows you to create an outgoing email signature attached to new emails sent from your device.

- Period to synchronize calendar: to select how many days worth of calendar events the device and server should synchronize. Choose from: Two weeks,
   One month, Three month, Six month, or All.
- Period to synchronize email to select the how many days of data you want to sync. Choose from: One day, Three days, One week, Two weeks, or All.
- **Sync schedule**: Allows you to set the Peak sync schedule, Off-peak sync schedule, Peak start time, Peak end time, and Peak days.
- Message size limit: Allows you to set the message size limit to Header Only,
   5KB, 10KB, 20KB, 50KB, or No limit.
- Inbox Sort by: to sort Inbox by date, subject, sender, or size.
- Roaming: Allows you to retrieve email automatically while roaming.
- Default account: assigns this account as the default used when sending out new emails.
- Ask before deleting: to set whether to ask before deleting.
- **Email notifications**: enable the device to display icon in the Status Bar when new emails have been received.
- **Select ringtone**: assigns an audible ringtone when a new or upcoming event is pending.
- Vibrate: assigns a vibration when a new or upcoming event is pending.
- Vibrate Type: Allows you to set the type of vibrate for new messages.
- **Incoming settings**: provides access to the Domain, password, and exchange server parameter fields.
- **Sync contacts**: synchronizes the contacts between your device and the remote exchange server. A checkmark indicates the feature is enabled.
- Sync calendar: synchronizes your exchange calendar entries between your device and the remote exchange server. A checkmark indicates the feature is enabled.
- Out Of Office: allows you to configure your Out of Office settings.

# Google Play™

Google Play provides direct access to Android applications and games to download and install on your device.

## Access the Play Store

- 1. Tap > | Play Store.
- 2. If not already logged in with your Google account, tap **Next**.
- 3. Tap **Sign in** and enter your Google account information.
- 4. Touch **Accept** to agree to the Google Play terms of service.

**Note**: Google Play options may vary depending on the version installed in your device. Your Google Play application will update automatically when available.

## Select and Install a Google Application

- 1. Tap > | Play Store.
- 2. Browse for an application. Once you have decided on one, tap it to view its details.
- 3. Read the application descriptions and comments.
- 4. Tap Install (for free applications) or the Price button (for paid applications).

**Note**: Use caution with applications which request access to any personal data, functions, or significant amounts of data usage times.

- 5. Tap **Accept & download** (for free applications) or follow the on-screen instructions to pay for the application and tap **Accept & buy**.
- 6. Check the progress of the current download by opening the Notifications Panel.
- 7. You will be notified when the item is downloaded and installed on your device.
- 8. On the Google Play screen, tap > My Apps, tap the installed application in the list, and then tap Open.

## Reinstall a Google Application

If the Android Operating System is ever updated, any data contained on the device will be erased. The only data stored on the device are Google applications available via Google Play.

# My Wallet

My Wallet is an app that will make your phone your wallet. It stores virtual versions of your existing plastic cards on your phone, along with your coupons, and loyalty and gift cards. For more information on Google Wallet visit sprint.com/googlewallet.

## Activate and Set Up Google Wallet

Your My Wallet is quick and easy to setup. You may first be prompted to activate your device's NFC (Near Field Communication) setting which enables your device to exchange data with other NFC enabled devices or read information from smart tags embedded in posters, stickers, and other products.

- 1. Tap -> | > Wallet.
- 2. Tap **Get started**. (If prompted, follow the on-screen instructions to activate NFC on your device.)
- 3. Read the **Terms of Service Agreement** and tap **I agree** to continue.
- 4. On the Select an account screen, tap the account you want to permanently link to your payment information. Your account will activate.
- 5. Enter a PIN on the **Set Your PIN** screen. You will be prompted to re-enter the PIN.

### How to Make a My Wallet Purchase

When you are ready to make a purchase with My Wallet you simply wake up your phone screen, tap and pay. It is not necessary to open the My Wallet app on your device.

- 1. Press **Power/Lock Button** to wake up your LS860 display screen.
- 2. If prompted at checkout, always select the "pay with credit" option on the cashier.
- To tap and pay, hold the back of the phone against the terminal where you see the contactless symbol. Your default card will be used unless you select another card manually.
- 4. If necessary, enter your Google Wallet PIN on the phone and tap the terminal again.
- 5. Remove the phone when the information is sent. Look for confirmation from the cashier.

# Sprint ID

ID Packs are bundles of applications, ringtones, wallpapers, settings, and more. ID Packs are installed using an application called Sprint ID.

You can have up to five ID Packs installed at any one time and you can easily switch from one ID Pack to another without losing any applications already installed. For example, when you install the **Sprint** ID Pack, Sprint applications such as Sprint TV, TeleNav™ GPS Navigator, NASCAR Sprint Cup Mobile, and Sprint Football Live will remain in your applications.

#### Install Your First ID Pack

**Note**: Your device must be activated, your battery should be fully charged, and you should be in a network coverage area before you install an ID Pack.

- 1. Tap from the Home screen.
  - If your device is in Power Save mode, press the Power/Lock Button to reactivate the screen.
  - If the lock screen appears, unlock it by dragging the Unlock icon to the right side of the screen.

**Note**: You also have the ability to place an emergency call directly from the Welcome to Sprint ID screen.

2. Tap **Get New ID Packs** in the **Choose your ID** screen.

Note: The Sprint ID pack comes with wallpapers, ringtones, and applications such as Sprint TV & Movies, GPS TeleNavigator, Sprint Music Plus, Sprint Football Live, and NASCAR Sprint Cup Mobile.

- 3. Browse the ID packs and tap the desired one.
- 4. Read the information screen for a description of the ID Pack and touch **Install**.
- 5. Touch Agree to accept the Terms & Conditions of the ID Pack.
- If prompted, touch Continue on any following screens until you see the Downloading icon <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> in the Status Bar.

**Note**: While the ID Pack is downloading in the background, you can begin to explore the features of your new device from the Home screen.

When the download is complete, you will see the Download finished icon in the Status Bar.

### **WARNING**: DO NOT interrupt the download process.

7. Tap > More > Notifications. If the download is complete, tap ID ready to install to install the ID Pack.

#### Switch ID Packs

- 1. Tap > (Sprint ID).
- 2. Tap an ID Pack to replace your current pack.

Tap Get New ID Packs to install a new ID Pack and follow steps 2–7 of link.

# Sprint Applications

You can access a wide variety of Sprint applications in many different categories with your phone and data service. Currently, various applications, such as NASCAR, Sprint Football Live, TeleNav GPS Navigator, Sprint Music Plus, and Sprint TV are available when you download and install the **Sprint** ID pack.

**Note**: Some Sprint data applications may not work with a Wi-Fi connection present. If prompted, disable your device's Wi-Fi feature while using these applications.

## Download the Sprint ID Pack

► Tap > . On the Choose your ID screen, tap Get New ID Packs > Sprint Pack. Follow the on-screen prompts to install the Sprint ID Pack.

Note: Once you download and install the Sprint pack, Sprint applications such as NASCAR Sprint Cup Mobile, Sprint Football Live, Sprint Music Plus, and TeleNav™GPS Navigator will appear on your Applications screen. When you switch from the Sprint pack to another ID pack, or choose a new ID pack, the Sprint applications will remain installed and visible on your Applications screen.

To download and install Sprint apps:

- 2. Follow the instructions to customize your application (such as selecting a favorite team or driver) or tap to explore your options.

Note: Important Privacy Message – Sprint's policies often do not apply to third-party applications. Third-party applications may access your personal information or require Sprint to disclose your customer information to the third-party application provider. - 3. Tap a topic link to continue to that page.

# NASCAR Sprint Cup Mobile

Now you have the ability to get every bit of NASCAR coverage, news, and stats right on your device.

- 1. Tap > > > > NASCAR.
- 2. If prompted, read the disclaimer, make a selection and tap **OK**. Follow the on-screen instructions until you reach the main NASCAR Sprint Cup Mobile page.
- 3. Navigate the main page using your finger.
- 4. Tap an on-screen option to activate features that include:
  - Home is the main NASCAR homepage where you can view stats on a current race, choose to follow a specific driver, view special NASCAR promotions and other NASCAR-specific multimedia content.
    - Tap and tap **Home** to return to the main NASCAR page. This applies to each of these options.
  - Race Recap provides overviews of the current races, pictures, commentary, additional photos and race stats.
  - Speed to view the Speed Schedule and Videos.
  - All-Star to view the latest information on the All-Star race.
  - My Driver to customize your NASCAR experience by following specific drivers.
     Information includes driver-specific stats and NASCAR RSS feeds. You can also get additional stats, review other driver info, or change drivers.
  - Stats & Schedule lets you track race information such as: NSCS Recap, NNS Recap, Point Standings, Season Stats, and Schedule.
  - Miss Sprint Cup is your insider to NASCAR by providing news, information, blogs and twitter updates to the goings-on within NASCAR.

- Videos displays a list of selectable multimedia content. Other features include streaming multimedia content from NASCAR radio stations or other racing radio shows.
- News & Alerts provides you with quick access to NASCAR-specific news, photos, and driver stats. You can also customize alerts for new information such as ALL NASCAR News, Sprint Cup News, etc.
- Twitter allows you to view the latest Twitter updates.
- Fantasy lets you take part in online fantasy racing, access Games, News, Videos, take part in Polls, and access other Special Promotions.

    - League Pass: Allows you access to your League Pass subscription.

#### Watch TV

- 1. Tap > Sprint TV & Movies. Depending on your settings, your device may prompt you to accept a data connection.
- 2. Select **Live TV**, **On Demand**, or **Movies** to display channel options.
- 3. Tap an entry to select a channel from the Sprint TV listings or to select an available category.

**Note**: The first time you access a channel, the system will prompt you to purchase access (unless the channel doesn't have a monthly fee). Tap **Subscribe** to purchase access.

4. If applicable, tap a desired clip to view the program. The clip will automatically load and begin playing.

**Tip**: Scroll through the channels to view more selections. Once you find a channel that you want to watch or listen to, simply touch it and wait approximately three seconds, and the channel begins loading.

# Music

You can play audio files that are stored on your device's microSD card. Copy audio files from your computer onto the microSD card before you open the Music application. The Music Player application supports audio files in numerous formats, including MP3, WMA, M4A (DRM-free AAC files, from iTunes®), AMR, MIDI, and OGG Vorbis.

- 2. You can select music tracks from the following tabs:
  - Artists: To display your music library sorted by artist.
  - Albums: To display your music library sorted by album.
  - Songs: To browse through your downloaded music library.
  - Playlists: To select a customized playlist you've created.
- 3. Once you've displayed a list of songs, you can browse through your available titles.
  - To listen to a song or playlist, tap it to begin playing.

### Create a Playlist

- 2. Touch and hold a song you'd like to add to a playlist. A context menu is displayed.
- 3. Tap Add to playlist and select either Current playlist or New (to create a new playlist).
  - If you select **New**, delete the current default name, enter a name for your new playlist, then tap **OK**.

#### Assign a Song as a Ringtone

- Touch and hold a song you'd like to use as your new ringtone. A context menu is displayed.
- 3. Tap **Use as ringtone** to set the selected song as your new default ringtone.

- 4. Confirm the song has been successfully assigned by navigating to your Phone ringtone menu.

# Back Up Your Downloaded Music Files

Sprint recommends that you back up your downloaded music files to your computer. Although the downloaded files can only be played on your device and on your account, backing them up to your computer lets you access the files in case your microSD card is lost or damaged, or if you install a new microSD card. (See Connect Your Device to Your Computer.)

- 1. Connect your device to your PC using a USB cable or the built-in connection on Bluetooth -enabled phones.
- 2. Use your computer to navigate to the microSD card's **Music** folder.
- 3. Select and copy the music files to a folder on your computer's hard drive.

The **Sprint Music Plus** store lets you purchase and download digital music files to play on your device or computer.

- 1. Tap > Sprint Music Plus. Depending on your settings, your device may prompt you to accept a data connection.
- 2. If prompted, follow the on-screen instructions to download the application.
- 3. Tap > Notifications. Tap the Download complete field for the Sprint Music app and tap Install.

# Purchase and Download Music from Sprint Music Plus

- 1. Tap > Sprint Music Plus.
- 2. Tap My Library, Downloads, Music Store, Ringtone Store, or Ringback Tone Store to begin your music selection.
  - My Library allows you to access your music library.
  - Downloads allows you to view any pending downloads.
  - Music Store provides access to various menus to download music.
  - Ringtone Store provides access to various menus to download ringtones.
  - Ringback Tone Store provides access to various menus to download ringback tones.

# YouTube™

YouTube™ is a video sharing website on which users can upload and share videos. The site is used to display a wide variety of user-generated video content, including movie clips, TV clips, and music videos, aswell as video content such as video blogging, informational shorts and other original videos.

**Note**: YouTube is a data-intensive feature. Sprint recommends that you upgrade to an unlimited data plan to avoid additional data charges.

- 1. Tap > | > | YouTube.
- 2. To search for videos, tap Q.
- 3. Enter the text to search for or tap to search by voice.
- 4. If entering text, tap a suggestion below the search box or tap 2 to search.
- 5. Scroll through the search results and tap a video to watch it.
- 6. Tap **t** to return to the previous page.

**Note**: It is not necessary to sign in to the YouTube site to view content. However, if you wish to sign in to access additional options, tap > My Channel. Then enter your username and password and tap Sign in or select your account from the list.

# GPS Navigation

Your device's built-in GPS capability gives you access to a number of location-based services, including **Maps**, **Navigation**, and **TeleNav™ GPS Navigator**.

# Google Maps™

You can use Google Maps to find your current location; to view real-time traffic conditions; to get detailed directions by foot, public transportation, bicycle, or car; and to navigate by using spoken, turn-by-turn driving instructions using the Google Maps Navigation (beta) service. You can search on a street map or a satellite image to locate an address or a landmark, and you can view some locations as if you were strolling down the street. If you join Google Latitude, you can view your friends locations on your maps and share your location and other information with them. There are some locations that Maps does not have information about.

## Launch Google Maps

- 1. Tap -> | Maps
- 2. Tap . The map centers on a blue arrow that indicates your location. A blue circle around the arrow indicates that your actual location is with in the circle.



To get an address and additional information for a location:

- ► Touch and hold a location on the map. A balloon with the address and a thumbnail from Street View (if available) opens over the location.
- ▶ Tap the balloon to access additional options.

To utilize Google Maps:

- 1. Tap -> | Maps
  - If prompted, read the What's new message and tap OK.
- 2. Tap the magnification icons to zoom in or out of the current map view.
  - or -

Tap **t** o utilize other Google Map features.

Choose from: Search, Directions, Clear Map, More, Settings, and Help.



#### To search for a location:

- 1. While viewing a map, tap **Search**.
- 2. In the search box, enter the place you're looking for.
  - You can enter an address, a city, or a type of business or establishment. For example, "theater in New York".
- 3. Tap . Markers with letter labels indicate search matches on the map.
- 4. Tap a marker to open a balloon that contains a label. Tap the balloon to open a screen with more information about the location, as well as options for obtaining directions.

#### To get directions:

- 1. While viewing a map, tap > Directions.
- 2. Enter a starting point in the **My Location** field, or leave as is to allow GPS to find your location, and your destination in the **End point** field.
  - Tap to open a menu with options for selecting an address from your Contacts or a point that you touch on a map.
  - To reverse directions, tap > Reverse Start & End.
- 3. Tap the icon for car, public transit, bicycling, or walking directions.
- 4. Tap **Get directions**. The directions to your destination appear as a route.
- 5. You can choose the directions format:
  - Read directions as text by tapping

- Tap > See map to see the directions on a map.
- Tap > Directions to get spoken, turn-by-turn directions from Google Maps Navigation.
- When you're finished, tap > Clear Map to clear the map.

TeleNav GPS Navigator gives you turn-by-turn directions on-screen and over speakerphone.

**Note**: Depending on your service plan, TeleNav may require a monthly subscription. Contact Sprint for information and pricing.

Before you can use the TeleNav GPS Navigator, your device and service must be registered.

- 2. Read the disclaimer and touch **Accept** to acknowledge the terms of use.
- 3. Tap each of the on-screen registration fields and enter the required information.
  - First Name, Last Name, and Email (optional).
  - If using the on-screen keyboard, tap Next to store your information.
- 4. Tap **Continue** to register your information.
- 5. Tap **Yes** to take a brief tour of the Navigation features, or **No**, **Skip Tour** to continue to the main navigation screen.

# Use TeleNav GPS Navigator

- 1. Tap > | > TeleNav GPS Navigator.
- 2. Select an option and follow the on-screen instructions to take advantage of TeleNav's full suite of features.
  - Drive To lets you get driving directions from wherever you are to wherever you're going. Choices include:

- My Favorites: user-defined favorite locations.
- Recents: recently entered locations.
- Address: manually entered street addresses.
- Contacts: those local addresses assigned to previously entered Contacts.
- Airport: local airports based on current GPS location.
- Places lets you search for locations from dozens of names or category options such as Food/Coffee, Gas Stations, Gas by Price, Banks/ATMs, WiFi Spots, Parking Lots, Hotels & Motels, Movie Theaters, etc.
- Maps provides access to a 2D map of your current location, and other additional features.
- Extras allows you to access apps, set voice settings, and car icons.

**Note**: For more information about Sprint Navigation powered by TeleNav, visit www.sprint.com/navigation.

#### **Get Driving Directions**

The GPS hardware (when enabled) allows you to get driving directions to selected locations or establishments based on your current location.

- 1. Tap > TeleNav GPS Navigator > Drive To > Address.
- 2. Manually enter the new address and receive driving directions from the GPS network.
- 3. The route will be displayed on the screen. Tap **Navigate** to use the navigation feature or **Directions** to display the directions on a 2D map.
- 4. Follow both the on-screen and audio directions.

To receive turn-by-turn directions (2D):

1. Tap > TeleNav GPS Navigator > Drive To > Address.

**Note**: A 2D map is a flat representation of your projected driving directions. A 3D map represents the driving directions with a representation of depth.

- 2. Enter the physical address information and tap Go.
- 3. Tap **Directions** to receive a detailed turn-by-turn description for navigating to your desired location. You can also select **Map** or **Traffic views**.

To search nearby locations based on type:

- 1. Tap > III > TeleNav GPS Navigator > Places.
- 2. Select a category from the list that displays. A list of nearby businesses under that category will display.

## Use a Local Business Category

The LS860 can also cross-reference your current location with local business and points of interest, such as Grocery Stores, Gas Stations, Wi-Fi Spots, Malls, Hospitals, etc.

- 1. Tap > == > TeleNav GPS Navigator > Places.
- 2. Tap one of the available categories: Food/Coffee, Gas, ATM, WiFi, etc.

- or -

Enter a location into the search field to begin retrieving matches. Once you see a matching business name, touch the entry.

- Entries with more than one available category or subcategory) appear with an adjacent gray arrow. These entries can be expanded and then closed.
- 3. Tap **Search** to store your information and begin the search.
- 4. Tap a matching entry based on star ratings and distances.

To search for the nearest gas station in your area:

- 1. Tap > III > TeleNav GPS Navigator > Places > Gas.
- 2. Select By Price (Regular), By Price (Plus), By Price (Premium), By Price (Diesel).
- 3. Tap an entry from the list to display a new route to the selected gas station.

#### Configure Your Navigation Preferences

- 1. Tap > IIII > TeleNav GPS Navigator > III > Settings.
- 2. Touch an entry to change its current setting:
  - Profile: allows you to alter the current first and last name registered with the service, as well as email address.
  - General: allows you to change general settings, including:
    - · Region: displays your current region.

- Language: allows you to assign a current language. Default is English(US).
- Distance Units: allows you to alter the descriptions used for distances:
   Km/Meters or Miles/Feet.
- Navigation: lets you change navigation settings, including:
  - Route Settings: allows you to choose the method which is used to provide you directions from Point A to Point B. The default is Fastest.
  - Map Color: allows you to select Auto. Daytime. or Nighttime.
  - Map Style: allows you to setup a preferred traffic display view. Choose from 2D Moving Maps or 3D Moving Maps (default).
  - Backlight: allows you to assign the backlight settings. Choose from Always On,
     On at Turns, or Device Default.
  - Traffic Incident Alert: allows you to set the traffic incident alert to notify you of any accidents in your route.
- Audio: lets you change the audio readout given during your navigation session.
- Audio Guidance: allows you to set when you want to play audio for guidance.
- Audio During Call: allows you to set whether you want audio to be played during a call or suspend it.
- Home Address: allows you to enter your home address.
- Work Address: allows you to enter your work address.

# Navigation

Another Google Maps navigation application is available on your device. It uses your current location (provided by GPS communication to your device) to provide various location-based services.

- 1. Tap > |||| > | Navigation.
- 2. Read the on-screen disclaimer and tap **Accept**.
- 3. Choose from the following on-screen options:
  - Speak Destination to use the voice recognition feature to search for matching locations in your area.
  - Type Destination to manually enter a destination address.

- Contacts to receive turn-by-turn directions to the address stored for a selected Contacts entry.
- Starred Places to obtain directions to locations that have been starred within Google maps (maps.google.com)

# Web and Data

Your device's data capabilities let you wirelessly access the Internet or your corporate network through a variety of connections, including Wi-Fi, Sprint 4G, Data Services (Sprint 3G Network), and Virtual Private Networks (VPN).

This section addresses your device's data connections and the built-in Web browser. Additional data-related features can be found in Accounts and Messaging, Applications and Entertainment, and Tools and Calendar.

# Connect Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that can provide Internet access at distances of up to 100 meters, depending on the Wi-Fi router and your surroundings.

To use Wi-Fi on your device, you must connect to a wireless access point, or hotspot. Some access points are open and you can simply connect to them without entering any information. Others are hidden or implement other security features, so you must configure your device to connect to them.

Turn off Wi-Fi when you're not using it to extend the life of your battery.

When you connect to a Wi-Fi network, the device obtains a network address and other information it needs from the network, using the DHCP protocol. To configure the device with a static IP address and other advanced settings, tap > Advanced from the Wi-Fi settings menu.

#### Turn Wi-Fi On and Connect to a Network

Use the Wireless & networks setting menu to enable your device's Wi-Fi radio and connect to an available Wi-Fi network.

- 1. Tap > =.
- 2. Tap System settings > Wireless & networks > Wi-Fi settings.
- 3. Tap Wi-Fi to turn Wi-Fi on and scan for available Wi-Fi networks.

- A list of available Wi-Fi networks will be displayed. Secured networks are indicated by a lock icon.
- If the device finds a network that you have connected to previously, it automatically connects to it.
- 4. Tap a network to connect to it.
  - If the network is open, you will be prompted to confirm that you want to connect to that network by touching **Connect**.
  - If the network is secured, you will be prompted to enter a password. (Ask your network administrator for details.)
  - When you're connected to a network, you can tap the network name in the Wi-Fi settings screen for details about the speed, security, address, and related settings.

To receive notifications when open or secured networks are in range:

By default, when Wi-Fi is on, you receive notifications in the Status Bar when your device detects an open Wi-Fi network.

- 1. Turn on Wi-Fi, if it's not already on.
- 2. From the Wi-Fi settings screen, tap **Network notification** and select "**Open networks**" or "**Any Wi-Fi networks**". Select "**OFF**" if you want to stop receiving notifications.

#### Add a Wi-Fi Network

You can add a Wi-Fi network manually if it does not broadcast its name (SSID) or if you want to add a Wi-Fi network when you are out of its range.

To add a secured network, you need to contact the network's administrator to obtain the password or other required security credentials.

- 1. Turn on Wi-Fi, if it's not already on.
- 2. From the Wi-Fi settings screen, tap **Add Wi-Fi network**.
- 3. Enter the Network SSID (name) of the network. If the network is secured, tap the **Security** drop-down menu and tap the type of security used for the network.
- 4. Enter the required passwords and security credentials.
- 5. Tap Save.

The device will connect to the wireless network. Any credentials that you entered are saved, so you are connected automatically the next time you come within range of this network.

To forget a Wi-Fi network:

You can also make the device forget about the details of a Wi-Fi network that you have added. For example, if you don't want the device to connect to it automatically or if it is a network that you no longer use.

- 1. Turn on Wi-Fi, if it's not already on.
- 2. In the Wi-Fi settings screen, touch and hold the name of the network.
- 3. Tap Forget network.

# Wi-Fi Protected Setup

Wi-Fi Protected Setup (WPS) is for the one-touch setup option to connect with the access points which supply WPS.

To connect with Wi-Fi networks with WPS:

- 1. Locate your device near the access point that can be scanned.
- 2. From the Wi-Fi settings screen, tap **Wi-Fi Protected Setup**. It will start WPS and Progress bar will be display.
- 3. Press WPS button of the access point or set up the WPS on the access point configuration menu within 2 minutes. The access point will recognize the device and add it to the network.

### Wi-Fi Direct

Wi-Fi Direct supports a direct connection between Wi-Fi enabled devices without an access point. Due to the high battery usage of Wi-Fi direct, it is recommended that you plug your phone into a power outlet while using the Wi-Fi Direct feature.

To turn on Wi-Fi Direct:

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Wireless & network > Wi-Fi Direct settings.
- 2. Tap Wi-Fi Direct. (A green checkmark will appear.)
- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to set up and use Wi-Fi Direct.

### Data Services

With your Sprint service, you are ready to start enjoying the advantages of data services. This section will help you learn the basics of using your data services, including managing your user name, launching a data connection, and navigating the Web with your device.

Important:

Certain data services requests may require additional time to process. While your device is loading the requested service, the touchscreen or QWERTY keyboard may appear unresponsive when in fact they are functioning properly. Allow the device some time to process your data usage request.

### Your User Name

When you buy your device and sign up for service, you're automatically assigned a user name, which is typically based on your name and a number, followed by "@sprintpcs.com." (For example, the third John Smith to sign up for Sprint data services might have jsmith003@sprintpcs.com as his user name.)

When you use data services, your user name is submitted to identify you to the Nationwide Sprint Network. Your user name will be automatically programmed into your device. You don't have to enter it.

#### **Update Your User Name**

If you choose to change your user name and select a new one online, you must then update the user name on your device.

- ► Tap > Settings > System updates > Update profile.
  - Your profile will be automatically updated by the network.

#### Launch a Web Connection

Launching a Web connection is as simple as opening the browser on your device.



Note: You can connect to the Internet via Mobile network or via Wi-Fi (access by tapping > Settings > Wireless & networks).

Once the Browser loads, you are directed to the home page.

**Tip**: To change the default home page, tap > More > Settings > Set home page.

**Note**: The Browser automatically launches when a Web link is touched from within an email or text message.

### Data Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone notifies you of the current status of your data connection through status icons in the Status Bar. The following symbols can be displayed:



Your device is connected to the high-speed 4G Sprint Mobile Broadband Network. When the signal bands are animated, your device is scanning and connecting. During data transfer, the animated icon is not used (for example, when you are opening a Web page). When the signal bands are gray, your device is connected to the network, signal is weak.

When both the bands and the 4G icon are gray, there is no coverage and you are disconnected from the 4G network.



Your device is connected to the high-speed Sprint Mobile Broadband Network(3G/1x). When the arrows are animated, your device is transferring data. When the arrows are gray, your device is connected to the network but is not currently transferring data. In either state, you can receive incoming calls.

If you do not see an indicator, your device does not have a current data connection. To launch a connection, see Launch a Web Connection.

# Virtual Private Networks (VPN)

From your device, you can add, set up, and manage virtual private networks (VPNs) that allow you to connect and access resources inside a secured local network, such as your corporate network.

# Prepare Your Device for VPN Connection

Depending on the type of VPN you are using at work, you may be required to enter your login credentials or install security certificates before you can connect to your company's local network. You can get this information from your network administrator. Before you can initiate a VPN connection, your device must first establish a Wi-Fi or data connection. For information about setting up and using these connections on your device, see Launch a Web Connection and Turn Wi-Fi On and Connect to a Network.

## Set Up Secure Credential Storage

If your network administrator instructs you to download and install security certificates, you must first set up the device's secure credential storage.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Location & security > Set password.
- 2. Enter a new password (at least eight characters without any spaces) for the credential storage, scroll down and confirm the password, and then tap **OK**.
- 3. Select the **Use secure credentials** check box.

You can then download and install the certificates needed to access your local network. Your network administrator can tell you how to do this.

### Add a VPN Connection

Use the Wireless & networks settings menu to add a VPN connection to your device.

- 1. Tap > System settings > Networks tab > Connectivity > VPN.
- 2. Tap Add VPN network and then tap the type of VPN you want to add.
- 3. Tap **VPN settings** and set them up according to the security details you have obtained from your network administrator.
- 4. When finished, tap **Save**.

The VPN is then added to the VPNs section of the VPN settings screen.

### Connect to or Disconnect From a VPN

Once you have set up a VPN connection, use the Wireless & networks settings menu to connect to or disconnect from the VPN.

#### Connect to a VPN

- 1. Tap > System settings > Networks tab > Connectivity > VPN.
- 2. In the VPNs section, tap the VPN that you want to connect to.
- 3. When prompted, enter your login credentials, and then tap **Connect**. When you are connected, the VPN connected icon appears in the notification area of the Status Bar.
- 4. Open the Web browser to access resources such as intranet sites on your corporate network.

#### Disconnect From a VPN

- 1. Touch and drag down the Status Bar to open the Notifications Panel.
- 2. Tap the VPN connection to return to the VPN settings screen, and then tap the VPN connection to disconnect from it.

When your device has disconnected from the VPN, the VPN disconnected icon is displayed in the notification area of the Status Bar.

### Browser

Your device's Web browser gives you full access to both mobile and traditional websites on the go, using 3G, 4G, or Wi-Fi data connections.

# Learn to Navigate the Browser

Navigating through menus and websites during a data session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

**Note**: Prior to gaining access to Sprint's Powerdeck Web page, you may be asked to enter your 10-digit PCS phone number and tap **Ok**. Entering your phone number is not required for access to other Web pages.

#### Scrolling

As with other menus on your phone, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some websites.

To scroll a Web page:

▶ Slide your finger on the screen in the direction you wish to scroll.

### Selecting

Once you've learned how to scroll, you can start navigating the Web.

To select items or links:

Simply tap a link or an item.

Links, which are displayed as underlined text, direct you to Web pages, select special functions, or even place calls.

#### Go Back

To go back one page:

► Tap on your device. Repeat this process to keep going back through your recently visited pages.

#### Find and Copy Text on a Web Page

To find text on a Web page:

1. Tap > More > Find on page.

- 2. Enter the text you're looking for.
  - As you type, the first word with matching characters is highlighted on the screen and subsequent matches are boxed.
- 3. Tap the left or right arrow to jump to and highlight the previous or next matching word.

To copy text from Web page:

- 1. Open a Web page and scroll to the beginning of the text you want to copy
- 2. Tap > More > Select text.
- 3. Use your finger to drag across the text you want to copy. The selected text is highlighted in orange, with a tab at each end of the selection.
- 4. Drag either selection tab to expand or reduce the range of selected text.
  - To cancel the selection, simply tap unselected text or empty area.
- 5. Tap the selected text. The text you selected is copied to the clipboard. You can now use the techniques described in Enter Text With the On-screen Keyboard to paste the copied text into a text field.

# Go to a Specific Website

Follow the instructions to go to a particular website by entering a URL (website address).

- 1. Tap the URL field (top of the Browser window) and enter a new Web address.
  - As you enter the address, possible matches are displayed. Tap an entry to launch the desired website.
- 2. Tap to launch the new page.

### Browser Menu

The Browser menu offers additional options to expand your use of the Web on your device.

### Open the Browser Menu

The Browser menu may be opened anytime you have an active data session, from any page you are viewing.

▶ From any open Web page, tap ■.

Options available within the Browser menu include:

• **New window**: Launches a new Browser window while maintaining the current Web page active.

- Bookmarks: Allows you to access and manage your Bookmarks.
- Windows: Displays the currently active Browser windows as a list. Tap a window entry to launch that window.
- Refresh: Reloads the current Web page and displays the most current information.
- **Forward**: Forwards you to a previously viewed page.
- **More**: Provides the following additional Browser options:
  - Add bookmark: Allows you to assign the current Web page as a new bookmark.
  - Find on page: Allows you to search the current Web page for a word.
  - **Select text**: Allows you to select text from the current Web page and copies it to the clipboard.
  - Page info: Displays the Name and URL (website address) of the Web page you're currently viewing.
  - Share page: Allows you to send a URL via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, and Messaging.
  - Downloads: Displays your download history.
  - **Settings**: Allows you to configure and manage your Browser settings.

# Adjust Browser Page Content Settings

You can change the page settings for your browser, including default zoom level, pop-up blocking, display options, setting your home page, and more.

- 1. Tap **t**o open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap More > Settings.
- 3. In the **Page content settings** area, select from one of the following Web page settings:
  - Text size: Allows you to increase or decrease the size of the text that the Browser uses when displaying Web pages. Options include: Tiny, Small, Normal, Large, or Huge.
  - Default zoom: Allows you to increase or decrease the magnification level that the Browser uses when first opening a Web page. Choose from: Far, Medium, or Close.
  - Open pages in overview: When checkmarked, Webpages are displayed in an overview. If the checkmark is removed, the Web page is displayed at 100% size.
  - Text encoding: Allows you to change the character-encoding standard that the Browser uses when displaying text on a Web page.

- Block pop-up windows: When checkmarked, this feature allows the device to block pop-up windows and prevent websites from opening windows unless you request it.
- Load images: When checkmarked, this feature allows the Browser to load images when displaying a Web page. Remove the checkmark to allow the Browser to omit images when displaying a Web page.
- Auto-fit pages: When checkmarked, the Browser optimizes the presentation text
  and other elements of Web pages to fit your device's screen. If the checkmark is
  removed, Web pages can be viewed as designed for a computer screen.
- Landscape-only display: When checkmarked, this feature allows your device to display pages in landscape (horizontal) orientation on your screen, regardless of how you are holding the device.
- **Enable JavaScript**: When checkmarked, the Browser allows JavaScript to run. Remove the checkmark to prevent JavaScript from running.
- **Enable plug-ins**: When checkmarked, plug-ins are enabled on Web pages. Remove the checkmark to disable plug-ins from Web pages.
- Open in background: When checkmarked, links opened in a new window will open in the background. If the checkmark is removed, new windows will open in place of the current window.
- Set home page: Allows you to enter a URL to set as your Home page. (See Setting the Browser Home Page)
- Invert color: Displays pages in inverted color.
- 4. Tap **t**o return to the Browser.

# Adjust Browser Privacy Settings

You can change your browser's privacy settings, including history, cache, and other data settings.

- 1. Tap **t**o open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap More > Settings.
- 3. Navigate to the **Privacy settings** area and select from one of the following privacy settings:
  - Clear cache: Clears all currently cached content and databases. Tap OK to complete the process.
  - Clear history: Clears the Browser navigation history. Tap OK to complete the process.

- Accept cookies: When checkmarked, your device allows Web pages to store cookies. Remove the checkmark to prevent Web pages from storing cookies on your device.
- Clear all cookie data: Clears all current Browser cookie files.
- Remember form data: When checkmarked, the Browser remembers what you
  entered in a form on a site and displays matching entries when entering text in a
  form. Remove the checkmark to disable this feature.
- Clear form data: Deletes all the information the Browser remembers about what you've entered informs. Tap **OK** to complete the process.
- Enable location: When checkmarked, you permit websites with location-specific
  content to ask whether you want to share your location, using your device's GPS. To
  provide a website with your location, you must also have location sharing enabled in
  the Settings application.
- Clear location access: Allows you to clear the permissions to access your location that you've granted to websites in the past. If those websites want permission to access your location again, you must grant it again.
- 4. Tap **t**o return to the Browser.

### Adjust Browser Security Settings

You can adjust your browser's security settings such as whether or not to save passwords or show security warnings.

- 1. Press to open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap More > Settings.
- 3. Navigate to the **Security settings** area and select from one of the following security settings:
  - Remember passwords: The Browser can remember your usernames and passwords for some Web pages that require you to log in to make it quicker to access those pages on repeat visits. Remove the checkmark to prevent the Browser from storing usernames and passwords.
  - Clear passwords: Deletes all saved passwords that the Browser has stored. Tap
     OK to complete the process.
  - Show security warnings: When checkmarked, you will be notified if there is a security issue with the current website. Remove the checkmark to disable this function.

4. Tap **t** to return to the Browser.

### Set the Browser Home Page

Customize your Web experience by setting your browser's home page.

- 1. Tap **t**o open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap More > Settings > Set home page.
- 3. Delete the current address and enter a new URL. If you are viewing the Web page you want to set as the Home page, tap **Use current page** instead.
- 4. Tap **OK** to complete the process.

#### Reset the Browser to Default

- 1. Tap **t**o open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap More > Settings > Reset to default.
- 3. Tap **OK** to complete the process.

# Create Website Settings

You can create settings for individual websites.

- 1. Tap **t**o open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap **More** > **Settings** > **Website settings**. These advanced settings that can be configured for individual sites (ex: Clear location access).
- 3. Tap **OK** to complete the process.

### Create Bookmarks

Make browsing easier by setting up and using custom bookmarks.

You can bookmark Web pages so that you can quickly return to them.

- 1. From any open Web page, tap to open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap Bookmarks. Three tabs are revealed:

Shortcut: From any open Web page, tap (located next to the URL).

- Bookmarks: Displays a list of your current bookmarks.
- Most visited: Displays a list of your most frequently visited websites.

- History: Displays a record of your browsing history. These records are organized into folders such as: Today, Yesterday, 5 days ago, and 1 month ago.
- 3. In the Bookmarks tab, tap Add.
- 4. Enter a descriptive name and URL for the new bookmark
- 5. Tap **OK** to store the new entry to your Bookmarks list.

#### Create Bookmarks from Other Tabs

1. From any open Web page, tap **Bookmarks**.

- or -

From any open Web page, tap .

- 2. Tap either the **Most visited** or **History** tab.
- 3. Tap the star icon adjacent to a Web page entry. The star now turns gold. This adds the "starred" website to your current Bookmarks list.

- or -

Touch and hold an entry from the list to display a context menu. Then, tap Add bookmark to add the selected entry to your current list of bookmarks.

### Create a New Home Page

1. From any open Web page, tap **Bookmarks**.

- or -

From any open Web page, tap

- 2. Tap either the **Most visited** or **History** tab.
- 3. Touch and hold an entry from the list to display a context menu.
- 4. Tap **Set as homepage** to assign the selected entry as your new homepage.

#### Add Bookmarks to Your Home Screen

1. From any open Web page, tap > Bookmarks.

- or -

From any open Web page, tap .

- 2. Touch and hold an existing entry from the list to display a context menu.
- 3. Tap **Add shortcut to Home** to add the selected entry to your Home screen.

# Tethering and Portable Hotspot

You can share your device's data connection with up to five devices at once, by turning your phone into a portable Wi-Fi hotspot.

When your device is sharing its data connection, appears in the Status Bar. For the latest information about portable hotspots, including supported operating systems and other details, please visit http://www.android.com/tether#wifi.

To share your device's data connection via USB cable:

- 1. Tap > > Settings > Networks tab > PC connection.
- 2. Connect your device to your computer with a USB cable.
- 3. Tap **USB tethering** to activate it. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

**Note**: You cannot access your phone's microSD card on your computer when using USB tethering.

To share your device's data connection as a portable Wi-Fi hotspot:

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Networks tab > Connectivity.
- 2. Tap **Portable Wi-Fi hotspot** to activate it. (A blue checkmark will appear.) After a moment, the phone starts broadcasting its Wi-Fi network name (SSID), so you can connect it with up to 8 computers or other devices.
- 3. To change the network name (SSID) or secure its Wi-Fi network, tap **Configure Wi-Fi** hotspot.
- 4. In the dialog box, configure the options.
  - Tap the Network SSID field and enter a new network SSID (name) that other computers see when scanning for Wi-Fi networks.
  - To secure the Wi-Fi network, tap the Security menu and select WPAP2 PSK (Wi-Fi Protected Access 2 with a Preshared Key). When a password field is added to the dialog box, enter a password. You will need to enter this password when you connect the device's hotspot with a computer or other device.
  - If you uncheck Enable DHCP Server, you need to set a static IP for connection. This setup option cannot be changed while USB Tethering or Wi-Fi Hotspot is in progress.

- When Enable DHCP Server is checked, you can set the range of IP assigned to the connected device. Tap the Starting IP and End IP field and enter the range. This setup option cannot be changed while USB Tethering or Wi-Fi Hotspot is in progress.
- To limit the number of devices to share your device's data connection, tap Max users and select the number of the devices to limit.
- 5. Tap **Save**.

# Camera and Video

You can use the camera or camcorder to take and share pictures and videos. Your device comes with a 5 megapixel camera with an autofocus feature that lets you capture sharp pictures and videos.


You can take pictures and record videos using the Camera application. You can also view your pictures and videos with the Gallery application.

**Note**: Pictures and videos are stored in a microSD card. Please make sure that the device has a microSD card inserted before taking pictures or recording video.

Be sure to clean the protective lens cover with a microfiber cloth before taking pictures. A lens cover with smudges from fingers can cause blurry pictures with a "halo" effect.

# Take Pictures

Taking pictures with your device's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button.



#### To take a picture:

- 1. Tap S > IIII > Camera to activate camera mode. (Additional camera options are available through the camera settings page. See Camera Settings for more information.)
- 2. Frame your subject on the screen.

3. Tap until the shutter sounds. The camera brings the image into focus. When the image is in focus, the focus indicators in each corner turn green and the camera takes a picture. (Your device automatically saves the picture to the microSD card.)

# Camera Settings

From the camera mode, tap each icon to adjust the following camera settings.

- Swap camera to switch between the camera's two views.
- Cheese shutter

  - Brightness
  - Focus to bring the image into focus.
  - **Image size** to set the size of your picture.

  - White balance to select how the camera adjusts colors in different kinds of light in order to achieve the most natural-looking colors for your pictures. Choose from Auto, Incandescent, Sunny, Fluorescent, or Cloudy.
  - Color effect to apply different color effects to your pictures. Choose from None,
     Mono, Sepia, or Negative.
  - **Timer** to set your camera's timer.
  - Geotagging
  - Shutter sound to adjust the sound the shutter makes when taking a picture.
  - Auto review to set whether to view the picture that was just taken. Choose from Off, On, 2 sec (default), or 5 sec.
  - Storage

- Reset
- · Camera help guide

### View Your Pictures

The Gallery is where you can access the Gallery of stored camera images. You can view them in a slideshow, share them with your friends, and delete and edit them.

- 2. Select a location and tap an image to view your picture.
  - Tap an image to open it and tap for options, such as Share, Delete, and More.
  - Tap to return to the previous screen.

# **Gallery Options**

The Gallery application presents the pictures and videos on your microSD card, including those you've taken with the Camera application and those you downloaded from the Web or other locations.

If you have one of your device's Google™ Accounts, you'll also see your Picasa Web albums in Gallery.

- - Drag left or right to view more albums.
- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap a picture in an album to view it.



- Tap at the top left of the screen to return to the main Gallery screen at any time.
- Tap to access the following options:
  - Share to share the picture via Bluetooth, Email, Gmail, Google+, Memo, Messaging, Picasa, Social+, or any other installed application that supports sharing.
  - **Delete** to delete the picture.
  - More to access options such as Copy, Set image as, Move, Rename, Rotate left, Rotate tight, Crop, Edit, Sildeshow, or Details.

# Assign Pictures

After taking a picture, assign it as a picture ID for a Contacts entry or as the Home screen background image (wallpaper).

- 2. Tap an album and tap an image to view it.
- 3. With the picture displayed, tap = > More > Set as.
- 4. Select an option.
  - Contact icon to assign the picture to a Contact entry as a picture ID. Tap an entry from Contacts, crop the image and tap **Save** to assign the picture.
  - Wallpaper to assign the picture as a background image, crop the image and tap
     Save to assign the picture.

# Record Videos

In addition to taking pictures, you can record, view, and send videos with your device's built-in video camera.

- 1. Tap > IIII > Camera and drag the camera mode control to the Video position
- 2. Select MMS to record a short video for email or messaging or Long Video.
- 3. Point the lens to frame the scene where you want to start.
- 4. Tap to start recording the video. The length of the recording is displayed on the bottom left part of the screen.

5. Tap to stop recording. Your video will be automatically saved to the Gallery.

## Video Settings

From video mode, tap each icon to adjust the following camcorder settings.

- Swap camera to switch the camcorder's view.
- **Zoom** to zoom in on the subject of your video.
- Brightness to choose a brightness setting compatible with the environment.
- Live effect

  - Flash
  - Video size to select the size of your video.
  - White balance to select how the camcorder adjusts colors in different kinds of light in order to achieve the most natural-looking colors for your videos. Choose from Auto, Incandescent, Sunny, Fluorescent, or Cloudy.
  - Color effect to apply different color effects to your videos. Choose from None,
     Mono, Sepia, or Negative.
  - Geotagging
  - Audio recording to apply audio recording settings for your video.
  - Auto review to enable auto review of your video.
  - Storage
  - Reset
  - Video help guide

### Video Gallery Options

The Gallery is where you can access the Gallery of stored video images. You can view them, share them with your friends, and delete and edit them.

- 1. Tap S > IIII > Gallery to view the videos stored on the microSD card.
  - Scroll left or right to view more albums.

- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap then tap a video to place a checkmark and access the following options:
  - Tap Share to share the video via Messaging, YouTube, Bluetooth, Gmail,
     SmartShare, or any other installed application that supports sharing.
  - Tap **Delete** to delete the video.
  - Tap More to view the details of the video.


#### Play a Video

- - Scroll left or right to view more albums.
- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap a video in an album to play.
  - Tap the video to view the playback controls.

# Video Wiz

You can make your own movie using your images/video and music.

- 1. Tap -> | Video Wiz.
- 2. After seeing the brief introduction on the Steps, tap **OK**.



- 3. Tap to add images and/or video to your movie.
- 4. Tap the desired images and/or videos, then tap 

  ...

- To remove images or videos, tap and select **Delete selected** or **Delete all files**
- To rearrange them, touch and hold an image/video, drag and drop it to the desired position.
- 5. Tap **Add style** to select the desired movie style.
  - Scroll through and select the style you want. As you scroll through the styles, a preview is displayed.
- 6. Tap **Add music** to set the background music.
- 7. Tap to play your movie.
- 8. Tap to edit the video clip using Overlay Text, Overlay Image, or Trim Video.
- 9. Tap to save the video.
- 10. Tap 20 to view the help information on using this feature.

# QuickMemo<sup>TM</sup>

The QuickMemoTM feature allows you to create memos and capture screen shots. You can use QuickMemo to easily and efficiently create memos during a call, with a saved picture or on the current device screen.

 While viewing the screen you want to capture and create a memo on, press and hold the Up and Down Volume Buttons at the same time for one second to access the QuickMemo feature.



While viewing the screen you want to capture and create a memo on, slide the Status Bar down and tap .



- 2. Create a memo using the following options:
  - Tap to select whether to use the background screen.
  - Tap to undo the most recent action.
  - Tap to redo the most recently deleted action.
  - Tap to select the pen type and color.
  - Tap to use the eraser to erase the memo that you created.
  - Tap to share the memo with others via any of the available applications.
  - Tap to save the memo you've created.

Note: Please use a fingertip while using the QuickMemo feature. Do not use your fingernail.

- 1. Tap You can also crop the screen to capture using the triangles in each corner.

  Touch and drag to the desired part of the screen.
- 2. Tap to show the Edit menu and tap to save the current memo with the current screen.
- 3. Tap **Notebook** or **Gallery** to select where to save the QuickMemo.

Discard QuickMemos:

#### View the Saved QuickMemo

Your QuickMemos can be saved in the Notebook application or in the Gallery application.

To view QuickMemos saved in one of your notebooks:

► Tap > > Wotebook and select the QuickMemo note.

### **FileShare**

FileShare application allows you to share multimedia files and documents to other devices via Wi-Fi Direct.

- 1. Tap -> | FileShare.
- 2. Choose the types of content you would like to share. Tap **Images**, **Videos**, **Music**, or **Documents**.
- 3. Tap in the upper right corner of the screen, then checkmark the file(s) you want to share.
- 4. Tap **Send** to begin scanning for available devices, then select the device you want from the list.

# **SmartShare**

The SmartShare application uses DLNA (Digital Living Network Alliance) technology to share digital content through a wireless network. Both devices must be DLNA certified to support this feature. A separate accessory purchase of an MHL(Mobile High-definition Link) adapter is needed to perform this function.

#### To turn SmartShare on and allow content sharing

- 1. Tap -> | > | SmartShare.
- Tap > Settings.
- 3. Tap **Discoverable** to checkmark it which enables your device to be detected by other devices.

- Checkmark Always accept request to automatically accept sharing requests from other devices.
- Checkmark Receive files to allow other devices to upload media files to your phone.
- 4. Under the MY SHARED CONTENTS section, tap to checkmark the types of content you would like to share: **Pictures**, **Videos**, **Music**.
- 5. **SmartShare** is now activated and ready to share the available content type(s) you selected for sharing.

### To control your renderer devices

Let your renderer device (e.g., TV) play multimedia contents from your remote content library (e.g., PC).

**Note**: Make sure that the DLNA functionality of your devices is properly configured (e.g., TV and PC).

- 2. Tap the **To** device icon in the upper right of the screen, then tap the device you want to use from the renderer device list.
- 3. Tap the **From** device icon at the top left of the screen, then tap the device that has your remote content library.
- 4. You can browse through the content library to find the content(s) you want.
- 5. Touch and hold a content thumbnail and tap **Play** or tap **=** > **Play**.

### To download contents from the remote content library

- 1. Tap -> | > SmartShare.
- 2. Tap the **From** device icon in the upper left of the screen, then tap the device that has your remote content library.
- 3. You can browse through the content library to find the content(s) you want.
- 4. Touch and hold a content thumbnail, then tap **Download** in the context menu.

**Note**: Some content types are not supported.

#### To upload contents from the remote content library

1. Tap -> | > | SmartShare.

- 2. Tap the **From** device icon at the top left of the screen, then select **My phone**.
- 3. You can browse through the local content library to find the content(s) you want.
- 4. Touch and hold a content thumbnail, then tap **Upload** in the context menu.
- 5. Select the device of the remote content library to be uploaded.

**Note**: Some DLNA enabled devices do not support the DMS upload functionality and will not upload files. Some content types are not supported.





### View Event Details

You can view more information about an event in a number of ways, depending on the current view.

- ▶ In Agenda, Day, or Week view, tap an event to view its details.
- ▶ In **Month** view, tap a day to switch to **Day** view. Then tap an event to open the event summary.



### Create an Event

You can use the Calendar tool on your device to create events that appear on your device and in your Google Calendar on the Web.

1. Open the Calendar, and tap -> More > New event.

- You can also touch and hold a spot in Day, Week, or Month view. In the menu that
  opens, tap New event to open the new event screen with that day and time already
  entered.
- 2. Add details about the event.
  - Enter a name, and other optional details about the event, just as you would on Google Calendar (on the web). If you have more than one calendar, you can choose the calendar to which to add the event. Tap the **Plus** button to add more reminders.(See Set an Event Reminder.)
- 3. Invite guests to the event.
  - In the Guests field, enter the email addresses of everyone you want to invite to the event. Separate multiple addresses with commas (, ). If the people to whom you send invitations use Google Calendar, they'll receive an invitation through their Google Calendar and by email.
- 4. Tap **Show extra options** to add additional event details.
- 5. Scroll to the bottom of the screen and tap **Done**.
  - The event will be added to your Calendar. You can also access and configure the event from Google Calendar on the Web.

### Edit or Delete an Event

You can edit or delete an event that you created on the device or on the Web. You can also edit or delete events created by others, if they have given you permission.

#### Edit an Event

- 1. Open Calendar and tap the event to open it. (See View Event Details.)
- 2. Tap **Edit event**. (For information on how to create or change event information, see Create an Event.)

**Note**: Tap the > Show extra options to add or edit additional event details.

- 3. Make your changes to the event.
- 4. Tap Done.

#### Delete an Event

► From Agenda, Day, or Week view, tap an event to view the event details. Then, tap
 ► Delete event. Tap OK to confirm.

- ► From **Day** or **Week** view, touch and hold the event then tap **Delete event** in the menu that opens. Tap **OK** to confirm.
- ▶ When editing an event, tap the **Delete** button at the bottom of the screen. Then tap **OK** to confirm.

### Set an Event Reminder

You can set one or more reminders for an event, whether or not you created the event or have permission to edit its other details.

- 1. Open Calendar and touch the event to open it. (See View Event Details.)
- 2. Tap **Add reminder** to add a reminder.
- 3. Tap the reminder time to display a popup menu and choose your desired setting.
  - At the designated time, you will receive a notification to remind you about the event. (See Respond to an Event Reminder.)You can also use Google Calendar (on the Web) to configure additional reminders.

#### Delete an Event Reminder

- 1. Open Calendar and tap the event to open it.
- 2. Tap Sto remove a reminder.

# Respond to an Event Reminder

If you set a reminder for an event, the reminder notification appears in the Status Bar when the reminder time arrives. (See Notifications Panel.)

- ▶ If you receive notifications in the Status Bar, drag the Notifications Panel down to your notifications. Tap the event notification to open the list of Calendar notifications.
- ▶ Tap an event in the Calendar Notifications list to view more information about that event.
- ► Tap **Snooze** all in the Calendar Notifications list to receive the reminder again 5 minutes later.
- ▶ Tap **Dismiss all** in the Calendar Notifications list to delete all reminders in the list.
- ► Tap when viewing the Calendar Notifications list to keep the reminders. The reminders will remain in the Status Bar.

# Display and Synchronize Calendars

Initially, all calendars that you create or subscribe to through Google Calendar on the Web are also displayed in the Calendar application on your device. You can select which calendars to show or hide on the device, and which to keep synchronized.

You can also control whether any data is synchronized to your device by using the General sync settings in **Settings** > **Accounts & sync**.

(For more information, see Configure Account Sync and Display Options.)

Only the calendars that you've created or subscribed to on the Web are shown in the **Calendars** list.

To show or hide calendars:

- 1. Tap > More > Calendars.
- 2. Tap the button to the right of each calendar to show or hide it. If is displayed, the calendar is visible. If is not displayed, the calendar is hidden. The status of the calendar is also displayed in text under the calendar's name.

To stop syncing calendars to your device:

- 1. Tap > More > Calendars.
- 2. Tap the button to the right of each calendar stop syncing. If sis not displayed, the calendar will not sync. The status of the calendar is also displayed in text under the calendar's name.

To synchronize calendars to your device:

- 1. Tap > More > Calendars.
- 2. Tap the button to the right of each calendar to sync it. If is displayed, the calendar will sync. The status of the calendar is also displayed in text under the calendar's name.

# Change Calendar Settings

You can change the settings for how the Calendar application displays events and how it notifies you of upcoming events.

- ► Open the Calendar, and tap = > More> Settings.
  - Hide declined events: When checkmarked, declined events so that they are not displayed in your calendar views. Tap to remove the checkmark and display all events in your calendar views.
  - **Use home time zone**: When checkmarked, the device displays calendars and event times in your home time zone when traveling.

- Home time zone: Opens a dialog where you can set the time zone to use in Calendar when you're traveling, if you have the Use home time zone setting checked.
- Set alerts & notifications: Opens a dialog box to configure event reminders. You
  can select to be alerted, to be notified in the Notification panel, or to turn off
  notifications. (See Set an Event Reminder and Respond to an Event Reminder.)
- **Select ringtone**: Allows you to select which ringtone is used for the Calendar event reminders.
- Vibrate: Allows you to set event reminders to vibrate.
- **Vibrate** Type: Allows you to select a vibrate type.
- Default reminder time: Allows you to select the default time set for event reminders.

# **Folders**

Folders allow you to organize other Home screen shortcuts and icons, or folders that contain all your contacts, contacts with phone numbers, or starred contacts. Your folder's contents are kept up to date automatically. Organizing in folders can create space to add more shortcuts, widgets, or applications on the Home screen.

#### Add a Folder

- 1. Go to the Home screen pane where you want to add a folder. (Swipe the Home screen from left to right or vice versa.)
- 2. Touch and hold an empty spot on the Home screen pane.
- 3. Tap **Folders** and select from the available options.

#### Rename a Folder

- 1. Tap the folder icon to open it.
- 2. Touch and hold the folder window's title bar.
- 3. Enter the new folder name and tap **OK**.

#### Organize Items in a Folder

▶ Just drag a shortcut, an icon, or a folder and drop in a folder.


# Alarm/Clock

You can use Clock application to monitor several types of information at once, in addition to the current date and time.

#### Open the Alarm

The Clock application also allows you to set alarms.

1. Tap 
at the bottom of the Clock screen.



- Tap an existing alarm to change its time and other attributes or tap Add alarm to add a new one.
- 3. Tap **Time** to set the time of the alarm. You can change the time by taping the + or buttons and the AM or PM buttons or tap the hour and minutes fields to enter the time with the keyboard.
- 4. Tap **Repeat** to set the days when you want the alarm to sound. (If you don't set a repeat, the alarm will only sound on the assigned day.)
- 5. Tap **Ringtone** to select a ringtone for the alarm. The ringtone plays briefly when you select it.
- 6. Tap **Vibrate** to have the device vibrate, in addition to playing the ringtone.
- 7. Tap **Label** to enter a name for the alarm.
- 8. When you're finished, tap **Done**.
- 9. Tap to return to the main Clock screen.

#### Change Clock Alarm Settings

- 1. Tap at the bottom of the Clock screen.
- Tap > Settings.
- 3. You can set the following options:

- Alarm in silent mode: Tap to place a checkmark and allow your device to play alarms even when it is in Silent mode.
- Alarm volume: Allows you to set the volume of alarms.
- Snooze duration: Allows you to set how long the Clock waits before playing an alarm again.
- **Side button behavior**: Allows you to set the desired behavior of the Volume Buttons and Camera Buttons when pressed during an alarm.
- Vibrate type: Allows you to set the vibrate type.



# Calculator

You can use the Calculator application to solve math problems.

1. Tap > | Calculator.



- 2. Enter numbers and arithmetic operators on the basic panel.
- 3. Drag the basic panel to the left to open the advanced panel.
- 4. Touch and hold the Calculator's display to open a menu where you can copy what you've entered and access other tools.
- 5. Tap **Clear** to delete the last number or operator you entered. Touch and hold Clear to delete all of the entered information.

### Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth devices, such as headsets and hands-free car kits, Bluetooth-enabled handhelds, computers, printers, and wireless phones. The Bluetooth communication range is usually up to approximately 30 feet.

#### Turn Bluetooth On and Off

By default, your device's Bluetooth feature is set to Off. Turning Bluetooth on makes your device "discoverable" by other in-range Bluetooth devices.

**Note**: Activating Bluetooth can drain your battery faster and reduce your available usage times. To conserve your device's battery, turn off Bluetooth when not in use. Always turn off your Bluetooth when you are in locations that prohibit its use.

#### Turn Bluetooth On

- 1. Tap > System settings > Wireless & networks.
- 2. Tap **Bluetooth** to place a checkmark and activate the feature. When active, \*\* appears within the Status Bar.

#### Turn Bluetooth Off

- 1. Tap > System settings > Wireless & networks.
- 2. Tap Bluetooth to uncheck and deactivate Bluetooth.

#### **Bluetooth Status Indicators**

The following icons show your Bluetooth connection status at a glance:

- ♣ Bluetooth is active
- Bluetooth is connected to a Bluetooth device

## Bluetooth Settings Menu

The **Bluetooth settings** menu allows you to set up many of the characteristics of your device's Bluetooth service, including:

- Entering or changing the name your device uses for Bluetooth communication
- Setting your device's visibility (or "discoverability") for other Bluetooth devices

To access the Bluetooth Settings menu:

- 1. Tap > System settings > Networks tab.
- 2. Tap the Bluetooth switch to turn on. activate the feature. When active, appears within the Status Bar.
- 3. Tap **Bluetooth**.
- 4. Set the following Bluetooth options:
  - **LG-LS860** (by default): Tap to rename your device's Bluetooth name.
  - Make phone visible: Tap to place a checkmark and make your device visible to other devices for pairing and communication. Tap again to uncheck and make your device invisible.

**Note**: Your device is visible for up to 2 minutes. This value appears as a countdown within this field. You can change the visibility timeout. From the Bluetooth settings screen, tap > **Visibility timeout**, then tap your preference.

- Device type to be searched: Tap to select the type of devices you want to search for. The default settings is All devices.
- 5. Tap **Search for devices** at the bottom of the screen to search for in-range Bluetooth-compatible devices. Make sure the target device is set to be discoverable.

### Pairing Bluetooth Devices

The Bluetooth pairing process allows you to establish trusted connections between your device and another Bluetooth device. When you pair devices, they share a passkey, allowing for fast, secure connections while bypassing the discovery and authentication process.

#### Pair Your Phone

- 1. Verify your Bluetooth is active.
- 2. From the Bluetooth settings page, tap **Make phone visible** to make your device visible. Your device must be visible to successfully pair with an external device.

- 3. Tap **Search for devices**. (Your device will display a list of discovered in-range Bluetooth devices.)
- 4. Tap a device from the list to initiate pairing.
- 5. Depending on the device, you might have to tap **Pair** to accept the passkey (if they match on both devices), confirm matching passkeys, or enter the passkey or PIN Code.
- 6. Tap **Done** > **OK** if you entered a passkey or PIN code or passkey.
- 7. The external device will then have to accept the connection and enter your device's PIN code.
  - Once successfully paired to an external device, 

    appears within the Status Bar.

**Note**: Due to different specifications and features of other Bluetooth-compatible devices, display and operations may be different, and functions such as transfer or exchange may not be possible with all Bluetooth compatible devices.

Pairing between two Bluetooth devices is a one-time process. Once a pairing has been created, the devices will continue to recognize their partnership and exchange information without having to re-enter a passcode again.

#### Disconnect a Paired Device

Disconnecting a paired device breaks the connection between the device and your LS860, but retains the pairing. At a later point when you wish to reconnect the device, there is no need to setup the connection information again.

- 1. Verify your Bluetooth is active.
- 2. From the Bluetooth settings page, tap next to the previously paired device (under the PAIRED DEVICES section).
- 3. Tap Unpair.

**Note**: Disconnections are manually done but often occur automatically if the paired device goes out of range of your LS860 or if it is powered off.

#### Send Items via Bluetooth

Depending on your paired device's settings and capabilities, you may be able to send pictures, videos, Contacts information, or other items using a Bluetooth connection.

**Note**: Prior to using this feature, Bluetooth must first be enabled, and the recipient's device must be visible. If no devices are detected, tap **Search for devices** to begin a new search.

#### Send Contact Information

- 1. Tap > | Contacts.
- 2. Tap an entry to open its details page.
- 3. Tap **Share** > **Bluetooth**.
- 4. Tap a paired device.
  - The external Bluetooth device must be visible and communicating for the pairing to be successful.

#### Send Pictures and/or Videos

- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap , then checkmark pictures and/or videos to share.
- 4. Tap **Share**> **Bluetooth**.
- 5. Tap a paired device.
  - The external Bluetooth device must be visible and communicating for the pairing to be successful.

## Disconnect Bluetooth Connection During an Active Call

You can manually disconnect or unpair from a Bluetooth device through the Bluetooth settings menu.

- ▶ During an active call, where the audio is being routed through a connected Bluetooth device (headset or hands-free connection), tap Bluetooth to route the device's audio through the connected Bluetooth headset (On) or through the speaker (Off).
  - When the call is routed to a Bluetooth headset, the current call area is surrounded by a blue box, the **Bluetooth** button indicates it's on, and the **Bluetooth** call icon is displayed in the Status Bar.
  - When Bluetooth is turned off, the call is routed through either the earpiece or speaker, the call area is surrounded by a green box, the **Bluetooth** button indicates it's off, and the **Call** icon is displayed in the Status Bar.

**Note**: Communication can be toggled between the Bluetooth headset and the device earpiece or speaker by tapping the Bluetooth button On or Off.

### microSD Card

Your device is equipped with a preinstalled microSD™ (Secure Digital) memory card to expand the device's available memory space. It allows you to store images, videos, music, and voice data in your device.

#### Remove the microSD Card

To safely remove the microSD card from your device, first you need to unmount the microSD card.

#### WARNING:

On the Android OS 2.3, you can download applications from Google Play and store them on a microSD card as well as on the device. Due to this feature, if you skip the unmount procedure, it can cause an error because information between the microSD card and the device is not accorded properly. In the worst case, the microSD card can be corrupted or damaged.

- 1. Tap Settings > Storage > Unmount SD card. Confirm your selection by tapping OK. Now you can safely remove the microSD card.
- 2. Lift off the back cover using the fingertip cutout at the bottom of the cover.
- 3. Carefully remove the microSD card from the slot.

**Note**: You can easily damage the microSD card by improper operation. Please be careful when inserting, removing, or handling it.

#### Insert the microSD Card

Remove the battery cover and battery to insert a compatible microSD card into your device.





- 1. Lift off the back cover using the fingertip cutout at the bottom of the cover.
- 2. Position the microSD card with the label side facing up and slide it into place until it is fully inserted and locked in place.

Note: Be sure to use only recommended microSD cards (up to 32GB). Using nonrecommended microSD cards could cause data loss and damage your device.

#### microSD Icon Indicators

The following icons show your microSD card connection status at a glance:



- microSD card has been unmounted from the device and is safe to remove.



- microSD card is being prepared for use and for mounting.

Note: DO NOT remove a microSD card while files are being accessed or transferred. Doing so will result in loss or damage of data. Make sure your battery is fully charged before using the microSD card. Your data may become damaged or unusable if the battery runs out while using the microSD card.

# microSD Adapter

The microSD adapter allows you to use microSD cards in other SD-compatible devices, like computers, cameras, and printers. Before using the microSD card with an SD-compatible device, you will need to insert the microSD card into the microSD adapter.

**Note**: You can purchase the microSD Adapter and microSD card separately.

To insert the microSD card into the microSD adapter:

► With the label side of the microSD card facing up, insert the card into the supplied microSD adapter, and gently slide the card until it is fully inserted.

To remove the microSD card from the microSD adapter:

► Hold the front edge of the microSD card, and gently pull it out to remove it from the adapter.

#### Write Protection

The microSD adapter has a built-in Write Protection lock to prevent accidental overwriting or removal of your data when the microSD card and adapter are inserted in another device.

▶ Slide the Write Protection lock tab down into the —Lock|| position to prevent overwriting of data. To allow data to be added or removed from the microSD card, slide the Write Protection lock tab up into the normal position.

# View Memory in the microSD Card

The Storage settings menu gives you access to your microSD card memory information.

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Storage.
- 2. Review the available information.
  - The storage capacity page is divided into two sections: SD card and Internal phone storage.

#### Format the microSD Card

Formatting a microSD card permanently removes all files stored on the card.

- 1. Tap > > System settings > Storage.
- 2. Tap **Unmount SD card** and confirm your selection by tapping **OK** to release the microSD card from its use by the device. The icon appears in the Status Bar to indicate an unmounted microSD card.
- 3. Once unmounted, tap Erase SD card > Erase SD card > Erase everything.
  - Once completely formatted, you will have to remount the microSD card in order to use it.

**Note**: The formatting procedure erases all the data on the microSD card, after which the files CANNOT be retrieved. To prevent the loss of important data, please check the contents before you format the card.

### Connect Your Device to Your Computer

Before using your device's mass storage capabilities, you need to prepare your device's data services to synchronize with your desktop or laptop computer. Once you have connected the device to the computer, you can transfer your data to or from the microSD card.

#### Connect via USB

1. Use the USB cable that came with your phone to connect the phone to a USB port on your computer.

- 2. Open the Notifications Panel and tap **USB connected**.
- 3. Select **Mass storage** and tap **Done** and **OK** in the dialog box that opens to confirm that you want to transfer files.
  - When the device is connected as USB storage, you receive a notification on your computer.
  - You device's microSD card is mounted as a removable drive on your computer. You can now copy files to and from the microSD card. For more information, see the documentation for your computer.
  - During this time, you will not be able to access the microSD card in your device, so you can't use applications that rely on the microSD card, such as Camera, Gallery, and Music.

#### **Disconnect Your Device**

**WARNING**: Carefully follow your computer's instructions to unmount, remove, or disconnect any removable USB devices or disks, to avoid losing information on the microSD card when disconnecting your phone from your computer.

- 1. On your computer, complete the process to safely Stop, or Remove, the USB device (in this case, the phone). For example, use the Safely Remove Hardware option to Stop the USB Mass Storage Device on Windows® XP.
- 2. Open the Notifications Panel (on your device) and tap **USB connected** and select **Charge only** to unmount the microSD card.

#### Important Connection Information

- To avoid loss of data, DO NOT remove the USB cable, the microSD card, or the battery while accessing or transferring files.
- DO NOT use your computer to change or edit folder or file names on the microSD card, and do not attempt to transfer large amounts of data from the computer to the microSD card. Doing so may cause the microSD card to fail.
- DO NOT turn off or restart your computer, or put it into standby mode, while using a mass storage device. Doing so will result in loss or damage of data.
- The microSD card can only be mounted for use by either the device or a connected computer. Prior to accessing the card via a different method, it must first be unmounted from its current device (phone or computer-USB).

**Important**: The microSD card can only share a connection with one device at a time, either your device or your computer (via its USB connection), not both. You cannot

browse the contents of the card via your device if they are currently being browsed via your computer.

# Update Your Device

From time to time, updates may become available for your device. You can download and apply updates through the Settings > menu.

# Update Your Android Operating System

This option allows you to update the Android Operating System (OS) on your device via an over-the-air connection. There are two components: Sprint User-Interface (UI) firmware and device Google OS.

- 1. Tap > Settings > System updates > Update Firmware and Update LG Software.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions.

## **Update Your Profile**

This option allows you to automatically update your online user profile information. If you choose to change your user name and select a new one online, you must then update the user name on your device.

- 1. Tap > System settings > System updates > Update profile.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions.

## Update Your PRL

This option allows you to download and update the PRL (Preferred Roaming List) automatically.

- 1. Tap > Settings > System updates > Update PRL.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions.

Your wireless phone, which contains a radio transmitter and receiver, emits radio frequency energy during use. The following consumer information addresses commonly asked questions about the health effects of wireless phones.

Are wireless phones safe?

Scientific research on the subject of wireless phones and radio frequency ("RF") energy has been conducted worldwide for many years, and continues. In the United States, the Food and Drug Administration ("FDA") and the Federal Communications Commission ("FCC") set policies and procedures for wireless phones. The FDA issued a website publication on health issues

related to cell phone usage where it states, "The scientific community at large ...believes that the weight of scientific evidence does not show an association between exposure to radiofrequency (RF) from cell phones and adverse health outcomes. Still the scientific community does recommend conducting additional research to address gaps in knowledge. That research is being conducted around the world and FDA continues to monitor developments in this field. You can access the joint FDA/FCC website at http://www.fda.gov (under "c" in the subject index, select Cell Phones > Research). You can also contact the FDA toll-free at (888) 463-6332 or (888) INFO-FDA. In June 2000, the FDA entered into a cooperative research and development agreement through which additional scientific research is being conducted. The FCC issued its own website publication stating that "there is no scientific evidence that proves that wireless phone usage can lead to cancer or a variety of other problems, including headaches, dizziness or memory loss." This publication is available at http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/cellular.html or through the FCC at (888) 225-5322 or (888) CALL-FCC.

#### What does "SAR" mean?

In 1996, the FCC, working with the FDA, the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, and other agencies, established RF exposure safety guidelines for wireless phones in the United States. Before a wireless phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested by the manufacturer and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed limits established by the FCC. One of these limits is expressed as a Specific Absorption Rate, or "SAR." SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy in the body. Tests for SAR are conducted with the phone transmitting at its highest power level in all tested frequency bands. Since 1996, the FCC has required that the SAR of handheld wireless phones not exceed 1.6 watts per kilogram, averaged over one gram of tissue. Although the SAR is determined at the highest power level, the actual SAR value of a wireless phone while operating can be less than the reported SAR value. This is because the SAR value may vary from call to call, depending on factors such as proximity to a cell site, the proximity of the phone to the body while in use, and the use of hands-free devices. #### Can I minimize my RF exposure?

If you are concerned about RF, there are several simple steps you can take to minimize your RF exposure. You can, of course, reduce your talk time. You can place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, as the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. The FDA/FCC website states that "hands-free kits can be used with wireless phones for convenience and comfort. These systems reduce the absorption of RF energy in the head because the phone, which is the source of the RF emissions, will not be placed against the head. On the other hand, if the phone is mounted against the waist or other part of the body during use, then that part of the body will absorb more RF energy. Wireless phones marketed in the U.S. are required to meet safety requirements regardless of whether they are used against

the head or against the body. Either configuration should result in compliance with the safety limit." Also, if you use your wireless phone while in a car, you can use a phone with an antenna on the outside of the vehicle. You should also read and follow your wireless phone manufacturer's instructions for the safe operation of your phone.

#### Do wireless phones pose any special risks to children?

The FDA/FCC website states that "the scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless communication devices, including children." The FDA/FCC website further states that "some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all". For example, the Stewart Report from the United Kingdom ["UK"] made such a recommendation in December 2000. In this report a group of independent experts noted that no evidence exists that using a cell phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. [The UK's] recommendation to limit cell phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists. ### Consumer Information on SAR

(Specific Absorption Rate) This model phone meets the Government's requirements for exposure to radio waves. Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radiofrequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. Because the phone is designed to operate at

multiple power levels to use only the power required to reach the network, in general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines.

The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at the ear is 1.19 W/kg and when worn on the body, as described in this user's manual, is 1.13 W/kg. While there may be differences between SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.

SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of http://www.fcc.gov/oet/ea/fccid/ after searching on FCC ID ZNFLS860.

To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone.

# FCC Hearing-Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

On July 10, 2003, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Report and Order in WT Docket 01-309 modified the exception of wireless phones under the Hearing Aid Compatibility Act of 1988 (HAC Act) to require digital wireless phones be compatible with hearing-aids. The intent of the HAC Act is to ensure reasonable access to telecommunications services for persons with hearing disabilities.

While some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.

The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless phones, to assist hearing device users to find phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to be more usable with a hearing device's telecoil ("T Switch" or "Telephone Switch") than unrated phones. (T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings. Note that not all hearing devices have telecoils in them.)

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless phone rating values are then added together. A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for best use.

In the example to the left, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless phone meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equal M5. This should provide the hearing aid user with "normal usage" while using their hearing aid with the particular wireless phone. "Normal usage" in this context is defined as a signal quality that's acceptable for normal operation.

The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be synonymous with the UT mark. The M and T marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules. The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard.

When you're talking on a cell phone, it's recommended that you turn the BT (Bluetooth) or WLAN mode off for HAC.

# Caution: Avoid potential hearing loss.

Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cellular telephones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds and Bluetooth® or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound and distorted hearing. Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and other potential hearing problems varies.

The amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device, the device settings and the headphones. You should follow some commonsense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental noise.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before your hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears, hear muffled speech or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

# TIA Safety Information

The following is the complete TIA Safety Information for wireless handheld phones.

#### Exposure to Radio Frequency Signal

Your wireless handheld portable phone is a low power radio transmitter and receiver. When ON, it receives and sends out Radio Frequency (RF) signals.

In August, 1996, the Federal Communications Commissions (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for handheld wireless phones. Those guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies:

- 4. NCRP Report 86 (1986)
- 5. ICNIRP (1996)
- 6. \*American National Standards Institute; National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements; International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection

Those standards were based on comprehensive and periodic evaluations of the relevant scientific literature. For example, over 120 scientists, engineers, and physicians from universities, government health agencies, and industry reviewed the available body of research to develop the ANSI Standard (C95.1).

The design of your phone complies with the FCC guidelines (and those standards).

#### Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

#### Tips on Efficient Operation

For your phone to operate most efficiently:

Don't touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use. Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

#### **Electronic Devices**

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from RF signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded against the RF signals from your wireless phone.

#### **Pacemakers**

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of six (6) inches be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference;

• Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.

#### Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider (or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives).

#### Other Medical Devices

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

#### **Health Care Facilities**

Turn your phone OFF in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may use equipment that could be sensitive to external RF energy.

#### Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

#### **Posted Facilities**

Turn your phone OFF in any facility where posted notices so require.

#### Aircraft

FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while in the air. Switch OFF your phone before boarding an aircraft.

#### **Blasting Areas**

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone OFF when in a "blasting area" or in areas posted: "Turn off two-way radio". Obey all signs and instructions.

#### Potentially Explosive Atmosphere

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always marked clearly. Potential areas may include: fueling areas (such as gasoline stations); below deck on boats; fuel

- The charger and adapter are intended for indoor use only.

- Never use and unapproved battery since this could damage the phone and/or battery
  and could cause the battery to explode. Only use the batteries and chargers provided by
  LG. The warranty will not be applied to products provided by other suppliers. Only
  authorized personnel should service the phone and its accessories. Faulty installation or
  service may result in accidents and consequently invalidate the warranty.

#### Explosion, Shock, and Fire Hazards

Check the laws and regulations on the use of wireless phones in the areas where you drive and always obey them. Also, if using your phone while driving, please observe the following:

- Do not put your phone in a place subject to excessive dust and keep the minimum required distance between the power cord and heat sources.
- Unplug the power cord prior to cleaning your phone, and clean the power plug pin when it's dirty.
- When using the power plug, ensure that it's firmly connected. If not, it may cause excessive heat or fire.
- If you put your phone in a pocket or bag without covering the receptacle of the phone (power plug pin), metallic articles (such as a coin, paperclip or pen) may short-circuit the phone and may cause an 37 explosion. Always cover the receptacle when not in use.
- Don't short-circuit the battery. Metallic articles such as a coin, paperclip or pen in your
  pocket or bag or contact with sharp objects including animal bites may short-circuit the +
  and terminals of the battery (metal strips on the battery) upon moving. Short-circuit of
  the terminal may damage the battery and cause an explosion.

#### **General Notice**

- Using a damaged battery or placing a battery in your mouth or animal's mouth may cause serious injury including a fire or explosion.
- Do not place items containing magnetic components such as a credit card, phone card, bank book, or subway ticket near your phone. The magnetism of the phone may damage the data stored in the magnetic strip.

# FDA Consumer Update

The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Center for Devices and Radiological Health Consumer Update on Mobile Phones:

#### 1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in standby mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

#### 2. What is the FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, the FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit Radio Frequency (RF) energy at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, the FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace, or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists. Although the existing scientific data does not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones:
- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

The FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well.

The FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. The FCC relies on the FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

The FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

#### 3. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term "wireless phone" refers here to handheld wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called "cell", "mobile", or "PCS" phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable Radio Frequency (RF) energy because of the short distance between the phone and the user's head.

These RF exposures are limited by FCC safety guidelines that were developed with the advice of the FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person's RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called "cordless phones," which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures far below the FCC safety limits.

#### 4. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have

suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be predisposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we do not know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

# 5. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect, if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop - if they do - may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.

# 6. What is the FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

The FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy.

The FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electro Magnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

The FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research And Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. The FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through

contracts with independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

# 7. How can I find out how much Radio Frequency energy exposure I can get by using my wireless phone?

All phones sold in the United States must comply with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) guidelines that limit Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures. The FCC established these guidelines in consultation with the FDA and the other federal health and safety agencies. The FCC limit for RF exposure from wireless phones is set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of wireless phones must report the RF exposure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website (http://www.fcc.gov/cgb/cellular.html) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your phone's RF exposure level in the online listing.

# 8. What has the FDA done to measure the Radio Frequency energy coming from wireless phones?

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical standard for measuring the Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposure from wireless phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leadership of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, "Recommended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques", sets forth the first consistent test methodology for measuring the rate at which RF is deposited in the heads of wireless phone users. The test method uses a tissue-simulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the measurement of the amount of energy absorbed in tissue, either by the whole body or a small part of the body. It is measured in watts/kg (or milliwatts/g) of matter. This measurement is used to determine whether a wireless phone complies with safety guidelines.

# 9. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to Radio Frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products - and at this point we do not know that there is - it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few simple steps to minimize your exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure. If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could

use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna. Again, the scientific data does not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

#### 10. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy, the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure. Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

#### 11. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio Frequency (RF) energy from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, the FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure Electro Magnetic Interference (EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical Instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by the FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI.

The FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a "compatible" phone and a "compatible" hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

The FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful interference be found to occur, the FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

# **Driving**

- Give full attention to driving driving safely is your first responsibility;
- Use hands-free operation, if available;
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions or the law require it.

# 10 Driver Safety Tips

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice almost anywhere, anytime. An important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When operating a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

- 7. Get to know your wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. Carefully read your instruction manual and learn to take advantage of valuable features most phones offer, including automatic redial and memory. Also, work to memorize the phone keypad so you can use the speed dial function without taking your attention off the road.
- 8. When available, use a hands-free device. A number of hands-free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed mounted device for your wireless phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if available to you.
- 9. Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can reach it without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your voicemail answer it for you.
- 10. Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy

- traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.
- 11. Don't take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. If you are reading an address book or business card, or writing a "to-do" list while driving a car, you are not watching where you are going. It is common sense. Do not get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.
- 12. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped at a stop sign, red light, or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
- 13. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Stressful or emotional conversations and driving do not mix; they are distracting and even dangerous when you are behind the wheel of a car. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and if necessary, suspend conversations which have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
- 14. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools you can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations -- with your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard, or medical emergency. Remember, it's a free call on your wireless phone!
- 15. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. Your wireless phone provides you a perfect opportunity to be a "Good Samaritan" in your community. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
- 16. Call roadside assistance or a special wireless non-emergency assistance number when necessary. Certain situations you encounter while driving may require attention, but are not urgent enough to merit a call for emergency services. But you can still use your wireless phone to lend a hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.
- 17. The above tips are meant as general guidelines. Before deciding to use your mobile device while operating a vehicle, it is recommended that you consult your applicable jurisdiction's local laws or other regulations regarding such use. Such laws or other regulations may prohibit or otherwise restrict the manner in which a driver may use his or her phone while operating a vehicle.

# Limited Warranty Statement
