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Get Started

This section gives you all the information you need to set up your phone and USC service for the first time.

Your Phone at a Glance

The following illustration outlines your phone's primary external features and buttons.

Set Up Your Phone

You must first install and charge the battery to begin setting up your phone.

- 1. Install the battery.
 - Insert your fingernail into the slot located on the lower left of the back cover and lift the cover up gently.
 - Insert the battery, contacts end first, and gently press the battery into place.
 - Replace the back cover, making sure all the tabs are secure and there are no gaps around the cover.

Note: When you insert the battery, your phone may power on automatically.

- 2. Charge your battery.
 - Plug the USB connector into the charger/accessory port at the bottom of your phone.

 Plug the AC adapter into an electrical outlet. Fully charging a battery may take up to three hours.

Note: Your phone's battery should have enough charge for the phone to turn on and find a signal, run the setup application, set up voicemail, and make a call. You should fully charge the battery as soon as possible.

- 3. Press and hold the **Power/Lock** Button O to turn the phone on.
 - If your phone is activated, it will turn on, search for USC service, and begin the setup process.
 - If your phone is not yet activated, see Activate Your Phone for more information.

Activate Your Phone

Follow the instructions below to activate your phone if it has not already been activated. Depending on your account or how and where you purchased your phone, it may be ready to use or you may need to activate it on your USC account.

- If you purchased your phone at a USC Store, it is probably activated and ready to use.
- If you received your phone in the mail and it is for a new USC account or a new line of service, it is designed to activate automatically.
 - When you turn the phone on for the first time, you should see a Hands Free Activation screen, which may be followed by a PRL Update screen and a Firmware Update screen. Follow the onscreen instructions to continue.
- If you received your phone in the mail and you are activating a new phone for an existing number on your account (you're swapping phones), you can activate on your computer online or directly on your phone.
 - Activate on your computer:
 - Go to USC.com/activate and complete the online instructions to activate your phone.
 - Activate on your phone:

- Turn on your new phone. (Make sure the old one is turned off.) Your phone will automatically attempt Hands-Free Activation.
- Touch Activate to override auto-activation and start the manual activation wizard.
- Follow the on-screen prompts to complete the activation process.

To confirm activation, make a phone call. If your phone is still not activated, visit USC.com/support for assistance. If you do not have access to the Internet, call USC Customer Service at **1-888-211-4727** from another phone.

Tip: Do not press the **Power/Lock** Button O while the phone is being activated. Pressing the **Power/Lock** Button O cancels the activation process.

Note: If you are having any difficulty with activation, visit USC.com/support.

Complete the Setup Screens

The setup screens help you set up certain features and preferences on your phone. Once your phone has been turned on, you will see a Accessibility message. You can then complete the setup process.

Note: You may be able to complete the setup screens before your phone has been activated on your USC account.

Note: During or after setup, you may see a **Connections Optimizer** notice. Read the notice and touch **I Agree** to allow your phone to connect automatically to the best available data network, including Wi-Fi.

To turn Connections Optimizer off at any time, from home, tap \bigcirc > Settings > More... > Mobile networks > Connections Optimizer and uncheck the box. See Connections Optimizer for details.

- 1. On the configuration screen, touch **Next** to get started.
- 2. Follow the onscreen instructions to complete each section. For each topic, you will have the option to skip it and continue to the next screen.
 - Got Google? Touch Yes and complete the steps to sign in to your current Google Account, or touch No and then touch Get an account (to set up a new Google Account) or Not now to skip Google setup. The following options may apply depending on your selection:
 - **Sign in** Enter your Gmail address and password and touch **Sign in** to sign in to your current Google Account.
 - Get an account Follow the instructions to sign up for a new Google Account. There will be screens to enter your first and last names, create an email address (Gmail), create a password, enter recovery information (including a backup email address and recovery question), an option to join Google+, and an option to enable purchases from the Google Play Store app. Touch Next between each screen.
 - Use Google location Select your Google location options and then touch Next.
 - **This phone belongs to...** If applicable, enter your first and last name and touch **Next**. This information is used by the phone to personalize certain apps.

- **Useful settings** Set your phone information for your convenience.
- Knock Code Set Knock Code for your security.
- Home touch button combination Select the desired home touch button combination.
- 3. Tap **Done**. Your setup is now complete. Follow the onscreen instructions to learn about basic touch menu navigation, view tutorials, or just get started.

Note: You do not need to sign up for a Google Account to use your phone. However, to download apps from the Google Play Store app, you must link your phone to a Google Account.

Make Your First Call

Once your phone is activated, you can make phone calls.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🔽.
- 2. Use the dialpad to enter a phone number.
 - If you enter a wrong number, tap to erase digits one by one.
 - To erase the entire number, touch and hold
- 3. Tap **t** to dial the number.

Note: Your phone's battery should have enough charge for your phone to turn on and find a signal, set up your voicemail, and make a call. You should fully charge your battery as soon as possible.

Set Up Your Voicemail

Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off. You should set up your USC voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated. Always use a password to protect against unauthorized access.



- 2. Touch and hold $1 \ \infty$.
- 3. Follow the system prompts to:
 - Create your password.
 - Record your name announcement.
 - Record your greeting.

Note: USC strongly recommends that you create a password when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a password, anyone who has access to your phone is able to access your voicemail messages.

For more information about voicemail, see Voicemail or Visual Voicemail.

USC Account Information and Help

Find out about account passwords and information about managing your account and finding help.

USC Account Passwords

As a USC customer, you enjoy unlimited access to your personal account information, your voicemail account, and your data services account. To ensure that no one else has access to your information, you will need to create passwords to protect your privacy.

Account User Name and Password

If you are the account owner, you will create an account username and password when you sign on to USC.com/myUSC. (Click Sign in/Register > Sign up now! to get started.) If you are not the account owner (if someone else receives the bill for your USC service), you can get a sub-account password at USC.com/myUSC.

Voicemail Password

You'll create your voicemail password (or passcode) when you set up your voicemail. See Set Up Your Voicemail for more information on your voicemail password.

Data Services Password

With your USC phone, you may elect to set up an optional data services password to control access and authorize Premium Service purchases.

For more information, or to change your passwords, sign on to USC.com/myUSC.

Manage Your Account

Manage your USC account from your computer, your USC phone, or any other phone.

- From the dial screen, tap * 4 . to check minute usage and account balance.

USC Support Services

USC 411 and USC Operator Services let you easily access information and calling assistance from your USC phone.

USC 411

USC 411 gives you access to a variety of services and information, including residential, business, and government listings; movie listings or showtimes; driving directions, restaurant reservations, and major local event information. You can get up to three pieces of information per call, and the operator can automatically connect your call at no additional charge.

There is a per-call charge to use USC 411, and you will be billed for airtime.

USC Operator Services

USC Operator Services provides assistance when you place collect calls or when you place calls billed to a local telephone calling card or third party.

Phone Basics

Your phone is packed with features that simplify your life and expand your ability to stay connected to the people and information that are important to you. The topics in this section will introduce the basic functions and features of your phone.

Tip: Phone Software Upgrades – Updates to your phone's software may become available from time to time. USC will automatically upload critical updates to your phone. You can also use the menu to check for and download updates. Tap \bigcirc Settings > System updates.

Your Phone's Layout

The illustrations and descriptions below outline your phone's basic layout.

Key Functions

- Front-Facing Camera Lens allows you to take pictures and video of yourself. Also lets you participate in video chats.
- **Notification LED** flashes front notification LED when you receive notifications, such as an incoming call, if you enable this feature.
- **Touchscreen** displays all the information needed to operate your phone, such as the applications, call status, the Contacts list, the date and time, and the signal and battery strength.
- **Back Key** returns to the previous screen. It also closes pop-up display items such as menus and dialog boxes. Touch and hold to access the Dual window feature.
- **3.5mm Headset Jack** allows you to plug in a headset for convenient, hands-free conversations.

CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the phone.

- **Microphone** transmits your voice for phone calls or records your voice or ambient sounds for voice recordings and videos.
- **Recent Apps Key** allows you to access recently-used apps. Touch and hold to access the available options.
- **Home Key** returns to the Home screen. If you're already viewing one of extension canvases, it opens the central Home screen. Touch and hold to access Google Now.
- **Proximity Sensor** senses proximity towards other objects (such as your head) so that touch commands are not accidentally activated during a call.

Note: Please be careful not to cover the sensors with a protective film, pouch, or a protective case not authorized by LG.

- **Earpiece** lets you hear the caller and automated prompts.
- **Laser Detection Auto-focus** Long and short distance focus are quickly and accurately aligned when shooting with the back-facing camera.
- Power/Lock Button locks the screen. Press and hold to open the phone options menu for the following options: Power off, Power off and restart, and Turn on/off Airplane mode. You can also quickly switch to Silent mode , Vibration mode , Vibration mode).
- **Speaker** lets you hear the different ringers and sounds. The speaker also lets you hear the caller's voice in speakerphone mode.
- Charger/Accessory Port allows you to connect the phone charger or an optional USB cable.

CAUTION! Inserting an accessory into the incorrect jack may damage the phone.

- **NFC Touch Point** tap the back of your phone to an NFC tag or another NFC compatible device in this location.
- Volume Buttons allow you to adjust the ringer and media volumes, or to adjust the in-call volume during a call.
- Flash helps you take pictures and video in dim lighting.
- Back-Facing Camera Lens lets you take pictures and record videos.
- IR (Infrared) LED uses infrared to communicate with devices using the QuickRemote app.

Turn Your Phone On and Off

Turn your phone on and off and wake-up the screen by using the **Power/Lock** Button O.

Turn Your Phone On

Press and hold the Power/Lock Button O.

Once your phone is on, it may display "Searching for Service." When your phone finds a signal, it enters standby mode – the phone's idle state. At this point, you are ready to begin making and receiving calls.

If your phone is unable to find a signal after 15 minutes of searching, a Power Save feature is automatically activated. When a signal is found, your phone automatically returns to standby mode.

In Power Save mode, your phone searches for a signal periodically without your intervention. You can also initiate a search for USC service by pressing any key (when your phone is turned on).

Tip: The Power Save feature conserves your battery power when you are in an area where there is no signal.

Turn Your Phone Off

- 1. Press and hold the **Power/Lock** Button O for two seconds until you see the Phone options on the display screen.
- 2. Tap **Power off** and then tap **OK** to power off the phone.

Your screen remains blank while your phone is off (unless the battery is charging).

Wake Up the Screen

If you don't use the phone for a while, the screen and backlight will shut off to conserve battery power.

- 1. Press the **Power/Lock** Button O. Your lock screen will appear. See Lock Screen.
- 2. Swipe the screen to any direction to unlock it. The last screen you were working on opens. (This is the default lock screen.)

Note: When turning the screen on, make sure you do not cover the proximity sensor. Doing so will not allow you to turn the screen on.

Screen On/Off

The KnockON feature allows you to double-tap the screen to easily turn it on or off.

To Turn the Screen On

- 1. Double-tap the center of the Lock screen to turn the screen on.
- 2. Unlock the screen or access any of the available shortcuts or widgets.

To Turn the Screen Off

- 1. Double-tap an empty area of the Home screen or the Status Bar.
- 2. The screen will turn off.

Lock and Unlock Your Phone

You can prevent accidental screen touches from activating phone functions by locking your phone.

Lock Your Phone

When your phone is locked, you can only receive incoming calls or make calls to 9-1-1.

Press the Power/Lock Button O.

Unlock Your Phone

- 1. Press the **Power/Lock** Button O to wake up the phone.
- 2. Swipe the screen to any direction to unlock it.

Note: The default Lock screen simply locks the screen to prevent unintentional actions. For more security to guard against unauthorized use, you can set an unlock requirement (such as a pattern, PIN, or password) that will need to be entered to unlock it.

Unlock Your Screen Using the Knock Code Feature

The Knock Code feature allows you to create your own unlock code using a combination of knocks (or taps) on the screen.

To activate the Knock Code feature:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗰 > 🏵 Settings.
- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap Lock screen.
- 3. Tap Select screen lock and tap Knock Code.
- 4. Use the 2x2 grid to create a sequence of knocks (or taps) to set your knock code.

Note: You have to create a Backup PIN as a safety measure in case you forget your unlock sequence.

To unlock the phone using Knock Code:

 While the screen is off, tap the same sequence you established anywhere on the screen. The Home screen will be accessed directly.

Guest Mode

Use Guest mode when you let someone else use your phone. They will only be able to use the applications that you've selected. Once you set it up, you can easily put your phone in Guest mode by drawing the guest pattern on the Lock screen that you set, which is different from your normal unlock pattern.

Note: Guests can also use applications that your selected applications link to.

Set Up Guest Mode

Follow the steps below to set up Guest mode and begin using it.

- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Guest mode.
- 2. Tap **Lock screen type**, then set the screen lock you want to use to put your device in Guest mode.
 - Set the screen lock for the Lock screen, then set the Guest mode screen lock.
- 3. Tap Allowed app to view which apps can be accessed in Guest mode.
 - Checkmark the apps that can be accessed.
 - Remove checkmarks from the apps that you don't want to be accessed.
- 4. Tap the switch to **ON** next to Guest mode.

Note: If your unlock sequence is already set to one of Knock Code, Pattern, PIN or password, you will need to enter it to be able set the guest mode unlock method.

Use Guest Mode

After you've set up and enabled Guest mode, lock the screen so that you can enter your Guest mode pattern. The Guest mode Home screen is displayed with only the apps you've selected for guest access. To exit Guest mode, enter your normal unlock pattern on the Lock screen.

Note: The **Guest mode** switch will be automatically turned off if your lock sequence is changed. Otherwise, manually disable it if you no longer want to allow guest access.

Hardware Key Control Mode

If your phone display is damaged or broken, you can answer an incoming call, end a call, or turn off an alarm using the hardware keys.

- 1. Turn your phone off.
- 2. Press and hold the **Power/Lock** Button O and the **Volume Buttons** O at the same time for more than 6 seconds to enter the Hardware key control mode.
- 3. Press the **Volume Buttons** to scroll to the desired option, then press the **Power/Lock** Button to confirm.
 - Answer call: Press both Volume Buttons at the same time.
 - Stop alarm: When an alarm rings, press and hold the Volume Up Button to stop the alarm.

Note: If you use your phone with a broken display glass, your phone can break even more or you can be injured. Make sure to visit the LG authorized service center to get your phone repaired.

Battery and Charger

USC-approved or LG-approved batteries and accessories can be found at USC Stores or through LG, or call 1-866-866-7509 to order. They're also available at www.USC.com.

Battery Capacity

Your phone is equipped with a Li-Ion battery. It allows you to recharge your battery before it is fully drained. The battery provides up to 24 hours of continuous digital talk time.

When the battery reaches 2% of its capacity, the battery icon blinks. When there are approximately two minutes of talk time left, the phone can sound an audible alert and then turn off.


Note: Long backlight settings, searching for service, using vibrate mode, browser use, and other variable may reduce the battery's talk and standby times.

Tip: Watch your phone's battery level indicator and charge the battery before it runs out of power.

Charge the Battery

Keeping track of your battery's charge is important. If your battery level becomes too low, your phone automatically turns off and you will lose any information you were just working on.

1. Connect the charging adapter and USB cable as shown; the LG logo on the charging adapter should face toward you.



2. Plug one end of the USB cable into the phone's Charger/Accessory Port and the other end into an electrical outlet. The charge time varies depending upon the battery level.

Battery Temperature Protection

Though extremely rare, if the battery becomes overheated, the phone will automatically turn off.

Charge with USB

You can use your computer to charge your phone. To be able to charge with the USB cable, you need to install the necessary USB drivers on your computer first. Connect one end of the USB cable to the Charger/Accessory Port on your phone and connect the other end to a USB port on your computer. It is best to use the rear USB port when connecting to a desktop computer. The USB hub should be powered by an external power source.

Note: Low-power USB ports are not supported, such as the USB port on your keyboard or bus-powered USB hub.

The LG USB Driver is downloadable from the following site: http://www.lg.com/us/ > Select **SUPPORT**. In the Search box next to SEARCH PRODUCT SUPPORT, enter the model name or name and click **SEARCH**. Click the model. On the PRODUCT SUPPORT page, click on **Software Update & Drivers**. Always unplug the charger from the wall socket after the phone is fully charged to save unnecessary power consumption of the charger.

Extend Your Battery Life

You can extend your battery's life between charges by turning off features that run in the background. You can also monitor how applications and system resources consume battery power.

- Reduce the amount of time your backlight is on.
- Turn Bluetooth off when not in use.
- Turn Wi-Fi off when not in use.
- Deactivate the GPS when not needed. Most applications using this function will periodically query the GPS satellites for your current location; each query drains your battery.
- Do not wait until your battery is completely depleted before charging your phone. Repeating this process of a complete discharge and recharge can over time reduce the storage capacity of any battery.
- Turn off Automatic application sync.
- Check the Running Services and close any unnecessary applications.

Note: If you accidently press the Power/Lock Button while the device is in your pocket, the screen will turn off automatically in order to save battery power.

Battery Charge Level

■ Tap → > . Settings > About phone > Battery.

The battery status (charging or discharging) and level (as a percentage of fully charged) are displayed.

Monitor and Control Battery Use

The Battery use screen shows which applications consume the most battery power. You can also use it to turn off applications that you've downloaded, if they are consuming too much power.

■ Tap → Settings > About phone > Battery > Battery use.

Tap any of the listed items for more options.

Phone Function Keys

Your phone comes equipped with three main function buttons that can be used on any screen to access added functions.

Recent Apps Key

The Recent Apps Key allows you to view your most recently-used apps and also displays an available menu function for the current screen or application. When on the Home screen, touch and hold row view the following options:

• Add apps & widgets allow you to add apps and widgets to the Home screen.

- Home screen settings provides direct access to the phone's Home screen settings menu. (See Home Screen.)
- Lock screen settings provides direct access to the phone's lock screen settings menu. (See Lock Screen.)
- System settings provides quick access to the phone's Settings menu. (See Settings.)

Work with Menus

There are two Android menu types, Options menus and Context menus.

Options Menus

Options menus contain tools that apply to the activities of the current screen or application, not to any specific item on the screen. To open the available options menu, touch and hold or tap

Note: Not all applications have Options menus; if you touch and hold **O** on a screen that has no Options menu, nothing will happen.

Context Menus

Context menus contain options that apply to a specific item on the screen. To open a Context menu, touch and hold an item on the screen. Not all items have Context menus. If you touch and hold an item that has no Context menu, nothing will happen.

Select Menu Items

To select a menu or option, simply tap it. If there are more menus/options than can fit in a screen, slide the screen up to display more menus/options.

For example, to set the phone to play tones when dialing numbers on the dial pad:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🏵 Settings.
- 2. Tap **Sound**.
- 3. Slide the screen up to display more menus.
- 4. Tap Sound effects.

Notifications Panel

Notification icons report the arrival of new messages, calendar events, alarms, as well as ongoing events, such as when you are on a call.

When you receive a notification, text appears briefly and the notification icon will be displayed in the Status Bar. For descriptions of the various notification icons, see Status Bar.

You can open the Notifications Panel to view a list of all recent notifications. Depending on your settings, you may hear a notification sound and the phone may vibrate.

Note: Adjusting sound volume and other general notifications settings is described in Sound Settings.

Applications whose activities produce notifications, such as Gmail and Google Hangouts[™], have their own settings, which you can use to configure whether, and how, they send notifications. See the sections on those applications for details.

Open Notifications

• Touch and drag the Status Bar to the bottom of the screen.

The Notifications Panel displays the Quick Settings and a list of your current notifications, organized into ongoing and event-based notifications.

Respond to Notifications

- 1. Open the Notifications Panel. Your current notifications are listed in the panel, each with a brief description.
- 2. Tap a notification to view it. The Notifications Panel will close and the application that corresponds to your response will open.

For example, new voicemail notifications dial your voicemail box, and network disconnect notifications open the list of configured networks so you can reconnect.

Clear Notifications

- 1. Open the Notifications Panel.
- 2. Tap CLEAR at the top right of the panel.

All event-based notifications will be cleared; ongoing notifications will remain in the list.

Close Notifications

• Touch and drag the tab at the bottom of the Notifications Panel to the top of the screen.

– or –

Tap . (The panel will also close when you tap a notification.)

Home Key

The Home Key takes you back to your default Home screen canvas (of the 7 total available canvases). Tap to access your main Home screen.

Note: Touch and hold to access Google Now.

Back Key

The Back Key returns you to the previously active screen. If the on-screen keyboard is currently open, the Back Key closes the keyboard.

Note: Touch and hold 🔄 to access Dual window.

Touchscreen Navigation

Your device is a touch-sensitive phone which allows you to select an on-screen option with a single touch and to easily scroll through long lists. Simply slide up and down through the display with your fingertip.

Your touchscreen provides an excellent way to interact with and use your Android phone. With the touch of your finger, you can access available applications, make menu selections, and access data saved to

your phone. The following terms are used for describing the different available actions using the touchscreen:

- Tap: A single finger tap selects items, links, shortcuts and letters on the on-screen keyboard.
- **Touch and hold**: Touch and hold an item on the screen by touching it and not lifting your finger until an action occurs. For example, to open a contact's available options, touch and hold the contact in the Contacts list until the context menu opens.
- **Drag**: Touch and hold an item for a moment and then, without lifting your finger, move your finger on the screen until you reach the target position. You can drag items on the Home screen to reposition them, as described in Add and Remove Widgets on the Home Screen, or drag the Notifications Panel open, as described in Notifications Panel.
- **Swipe or slide**: To swipe or slide, quickly move your finger across the surface of the screen, without pausing when you first touch it (so you don't drag an item instead). For example, you can slide the screen up or down to scroll through a list, or browse through the different Home screens by swiping from left to right (and vice versa).
- **Double-tap**: Double-tap to zoom on a web page or a map. For example, quickly double-tap a section of a web page to adjust that section to fit the width of the screen. You can also double-tap to zoom in and out when taking a picture (using the Camera), and when using Maps.
- **Pinch-to-Zoom**: Use your index finger and thumb in a pinch or spread motion to zoom in or out when using the Browser, Maps, or browsing pictures.
- **Rotate the screen**: From many applications and menus, the orientation of the screen adjusts to the phone's physical orientation. (See Change the Screen Orientation.)

Your Home Screen

The Home screen is the starting point for many applications and functions, and it allows you to add items like application shortcuts, or Google widgets to give you instant access to information and applications. This is the default canvas and accessible from any menu by tapping .

Home Screen

On the Home screen, you can view Quick Keys at the bottom of the screen. The Quick Keys and application icons provide easy, one-tap access to the functions you use the most.

To return to the Home screen:

Tap at any time, from any application

Extended Home Screen

The operating system provides multiple Home screen canvases to provide more space for adding icons, widgets, and more.

Slide your finger left or right across the Home screen. The default canvas is in the center with 2 extension canvases on either side of it. (For more information on sliding, see Touchscreen Navigation.)

Use the Applications Key

All of your phone's applications are located within the Applications screen. This key accesses shortcuts to your currently available applications.

Note: The Applications screen houses all default and downloaded applications (installed from Play Store).

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc to open the Applications screen.
 - To close the Applications screen, tap
- 2. Scroll left or right through the list and tap an icon to launch the associated application.

Applications: How to View, Open and Switch

All of the applications on your phone, including any applications that you downloaded and installed from Play Store or other sources, are grouped together on one Applications screen that you access from your Home screen. If you have more applications than you can currently see on the Applications screen, slide the screen left or right to view more.

The Applications screen contains all of the phone's applications (though not downloaded widgets and other downloaded material that isn't an application), including the Clock, Browser, Calculator, Camera, Play Store, YouTube, Voice Search, and much more.

Open the Applications Screen

Tap .

Close the Applications Screen

Note: The Applications screen closes automatically when you tap an icon to open its application. Dragging an icon onto your Home screen also closes the Applications screen automatically.

Open and Switch Applications

Multi-tasking is easy with Android[™]. Opened applications can keep running in the background when you open another application. There's no need to quit an application before opening another. You can easily switch among several opened applications. Android manages each application, pausing and starting them as needed to ensure that unused applications don't waste your phone's resources.

To open an application:

Simply tap its icon on the screen.

Tip: You can customize your Home screen with shortcuts to the applications you use most often. Applications are located on the Applications screen, but you can add an application shortcut to your Home screen for faster access. No matter where the icon is, on the Applications screen or your Home screen, just tap it to open and use it. See Add Application Icons to the Home screen for more information.

- 1. Tap and tap the icon for the other application you want to open.
 - or –

Simply tap the icon if the application you want is already on your Home screen.

To switch between multiple applications:

- 1. Touch . A list of previews of applications that you've used recently is displayed.
- 2. Tap the application icon you want to open.
 - or –

Tap to return to the current application.

Note: Swipe any application preview to remove it from the recently used apps screen. Pinch in and out to change the view type.

Add Application Icons to the Home Screen

Customize your Home screen with shortcuts to the applications you use most often.



- 2. Touch and hold the application icon you want to add to your Home screen.
- 3. Lift your finger to place the app on your Home screen, or drag the icon to where you want it on the screen, then lift your finger.

Customize Your Home Screen

You can customize your Home screen when you do the following.

- Create Shortcuts
- Add Widgets
- Create Contact shortcuts
- Change the Background (Wallpaper)
- Customize Application Icons

Create Shortcuts

Shortcuts are different from the Home screen Widgets. Shortcuts can access a specific contact, activate a feature, action, or launch an application.

To add a shortcut from the Applications screen:

1. Tap \frown to access the Home screen.

- 2. Select a location (canvas) for your new shortcut by scrolling across your available canvases until you reach the desired one. (See Extended Home Screen.)
- 3. Tap 🕮 to reveal all your current applications. By default, the applications are listed in a grid view.
- 4. Scroll through the list and locate your desired application.
- 5. Touch and hold the on-screen icon. This creates an immediate shortcut of the selected icon and closes the Applications screen. The new shortcut then appears to hover over the Home screen.

Note: The same shortcut can be added to any of the available canvases (Home or Extended). The application you add to the canvas will still appear within the Applications screen.

6. While holding the on-screen icon, position it on the current canvas. Once complete, release the screen to lock the shortcut into its new position.

To add a shortcut via the Home screen:

- 1. Tap \frown to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold on an empty area of the screen.
- 3. Tap either Apps or Widgets.
- 4. Touch and hold a selection from the list and drag it to your Home screen.

To delete a shortcut:

- 1. Tap to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold the desired shortcut. This unlocks it from its location on the current screen.
- 3. Drag the icon over **Remove** \square and release it.

Add and Remove Widgets on the Home Screen

Widgets are self-contained applications that can be accessed through your Applications screen or on the Home or Extended screens. Unlike a shortcut, this Widget appears as an on-screen application.

To add a Widget:

- 1. Tap \frown to access the Home screen.
- 2. Touch and hold on an empty area of the screen.
- 3. Tap the Widgets tab.
- 4. Touch and hold an available Widget and drag it to your current screen.

To remove a Widget:

1. Go to the Home screen canvas on which the widget is located.

- 2. Touch and hold the widget. This unlocks it from its location on the current screen.
- 3. Drag the widget over **Remove** \square and release it.
 - This action does not delete the Widget. It just removes it from the current canvas.

To place a Widget onto a different screen:

- 1. Touch and hold the widget you want to move.
- 2. Drag the widget to the edge of the screen (the left side if moving to a screen located on the left, right side if moving to a screen located on the right).
- 3. After about one second, the current screen will change. Repeat until you get to the desired screen.

Change the Phone's Wallpaper

You can select and assign your phone's background wallpaper.

1. Tap -> · · · Settings > Home screen > Wallpaper.

– or –

Touch and hold an empty spot on the Home screen, then tap the **Wallpapers** tab.

- 2. Tap Gallery, ID Wallpapers, Live wallpapers, Multi-photo, Photos, or Wallpaper gallery.
 - **Gallery** to use a picture saved on your phone as a wallpaper. You can crop the picture before setting it as a wallpaper.
 - **ID Wallpapers** to open the available wallpapers that were included in your USC ID pack.
 - Live wallpapers to open a list of animated wallpapers installed on your phone. Live wallpapers can be animated or even interactive. More Live wallpapers are available in the Play Store.
 - **Multi-photo** to combine and use pictures saved on your phone as a wallpaper. You can crop the picture before setting it as a wallpaper.
 - **Photos** to use the Photos app and set a picture saved on your phone as a wallpaper. You can crop the picture before setting it as a wallpaper.
 - Wallpaper gallery to use a default wallpaper from the wallpaper gallery.
- 3. Depending on the type of wallpaper, tap **Crop**, **Set wallpaper** or **Apply**.

Customize Applications Icons on the Home Screen

You can create your own custom application icon(s) using the images in your Gallery. Your customized application icon(s) are only applied to icons on your Home screen. The Applications screen is not affected.

1. Touch and hold an application icon until it's unlocked from its current position. Then drop it on the screen. The editing icon will appear in the upper right corner of the application.

2. Tap the application icon again and select a preloaded icon sign.

– or –

Tap the **Add new** to create a new icon using images from the Gallery.

Access Recently-Used Applications

Your phone keeps a running list of your most recently used applications.

- 1. Tap to open the recently-used applications window.
- 2. Tap an icon to open the related application.

Home Screen Clean View

You can see the wallpaper without items on the Home screen by pinching out. Pinch in or tap 🔄 to see applications and widgets again.

Quick Access

To view the quick access items, touch anywhere in the front key area and drag up. The following options are available: Voice Mate, Google Now, and QuickMemo+.

Change the Screen Orientation

This phone is capable of changing the orientation of screen content when the orientation of the phone itself has changed. The phone's built-in accelerometer senses movement and changes its angle/orientation. Note that some of the screens, applications and widgets do not support orientation changes.

The automatic screen orientation feature can be manually enabled to change the orientation for all enabled screens when rotation is detected.

Note: An example of a screen that automatically re-orients by moving the phone is the Messaging screen. This only requires you turn the phone to a horizontal position.



2. Tap **Auto-rotate screen** to enable (a blue checkmark displays) or disable the screen auto-rotation.

Status Bar

The Status Bar appears at the top of the screen. It displays icons indicating that you've received notifications (on the left) and icons indicating the phone's status (on the right), along with the current time.

If you have more notifications than can fit in the Status Bar, the to prompts you to open the Status Bar to view them all. (See Notifications Panel.)

Enter Text With the On-screen Keyboard

The on-screen keyboard displays automatically when you tap a text entry field. To manually display the keyboard, simply tap a text field where you want to enter text.

By default, there are 3 methods to enter text: **QWERTY keyboard**, **Phone keyboard**, and **Handwriting**.

To change the keyboard between **QWERTY keyboard** and **Phone keyboard**.

- 1. Tap on the keyboard.
- 2. Tap **Input language and keyboard layout**, then tap ⁽²⁾ next to the desired input language.
- 3. Tap the desired keyboard type and tap 🖆 repeatedly to go back to the entry screen.

QWERTY Keyboard

- 1. Tap a text field where you want to enter text.
- 2. Enter the desired text.
 - To enter numbers or symbols, tap [©]1#
 - To enter letters again, tap abc.

Note: If you do not want the screen to change orientations automatically, uncheck the Auto-rotate screen. Tap \bigcirc > 1 > 2 Settings > Display and select Auto-rotate screen.

3. When you have finished typing, tap for to close the keyboard.

Tips for Editing Text

Your phone gives you many options to make entering text easier, including copying, cutting, and pasting text, using voice-to-text input, customizing the user dictionary, using predictive text, and more.

To cut/copy and paste:

- 1. Touch and hold a word to highlight it.
- 2. Drag the blue highlight markers to highlight the text you want.

– or –

To select all the text, tap **Select all** in the context menu.

- To cancel the selection, simply tap unselected text or empty area.
- 3. Tap **Cut** or **Copy** in the context menu.
- 4. Please the cursor on the location where you want to paste the text.
- 5. Touch and hold the text field and tap **Paste**. The text that you pasted also remains in the phone's memory (temporarily), so you can paste that same text in another location.

Move Cursor Using Space Bar

Touch and hold the Space Key and slide your finger to the left or right to move the cursor.

Enter Suggested Word Using Gesture Control

Enter text on the keyboard and the related word suggestions appear. Flick upward on the left to select the left-side suggestion. Flick upward on the right to select the right-side suggestion.

Split Keyboard Using Gesture

The split keyboard feature allows you to use both hands to type while in landscape view. Each half of the keyboard withdraws to the left and right of the screen. Place both thumbs on the keyboard and slide them outwards in opposite directions.

To change the keyboard height:

Adjust height of keyboard to show more of the screen and to control keyboard more easily.

- 1. Tap -> Keyboard height and layout > Keyboard height.
- 2. Drag the blue bar to adjust the keyboard height.

To change the bottom row keys:

Touch and drag to add or delete keys or change the order.

- 1. Tap >> Settings > Language & input > LG Keyboard >> Keyboard height and layout > Bottom row keys.
- 2. Drag to add or delete keys or change the order.

Note: Only QWERTY, QWERTZ, and AZERTY keyboards can be customized. This function does not support some languages.

Phone Keyboard

To enter text, tap the key labeled with the desired letter until it appears on the screen. For example, tap ² ABC once for "a", twice for "b", or three times for "c".

Handwriting

Write the text with your fingertip. The touchscreen converts your movements into characters. To access handwriting mode, touch and hold (or whichever key is displayed), then tap .

Search Your Phone and the Web

You can search for information on your phone and on the web using the Search application. Some applications, such as Gmail, Contacts, and Browser have the ability to search contents within those specific applications. You can conduct the search by typing in the search terms or saying what you're looking for. Typing can be useful because the search application can provide suggestions so you don't necessarily have to type out your full request.

Phone and Web Search Using Text Entry

You can search on your phone and on the web by entering text.

1. From the Home screen, tap the Search Widget Google. (For information on how to add widget, see Add and Remove Widgets on the Home Screen.)

2. Enter the text you're searching for in the search field.

 You can use the Search preferences to configure some aspects of Google web search (for example, whether it makes suggestions below the search field as you type), and what phone features you want to include in searches.

To access these settings, touch and hold -> Settings.

- 3. Tap \bigcirc to search for the entered text.
 - or –

If what you want to search for appears in the suggestions list, tap that item to conduct the search.

4. If the phones asks you to select which browser to use, tap your preference. Then, make sure that the **Use as default app** check box is selected to keep this preference setting.

Phone and Web Search Using Voice Command

You can search on your phone and on the web by voice command.

From the Home screen, tap the 🖳 on the Google Search Widget.

For more information on Google Search, touch and hold -> Help from the Google search screen.

Using Clip Tray

Easily access the contents you stored in the Clip Tray whenever and wherever you want. You can copy images or texts and keep them in the Clip Tray. Then, you can paste them whenever and wherever you want.

- Tap and hold text and images while editing them and tap Clip Tray.
- Tap and hold a text input field and select **Clip Tray**. You can also access the Clip Tray by tapping and holding . then tapping

Note: You can save up to 20 items in the Clip Tray.

In Clip Tray, tap \square and tapping an item then select **Done** to delete them. This function may not be supported in the downloaded apps.

Text Link

Text Link recommends apps related to text in messages or to other text you've selected. It connects directly to the Calendar, Contacts, Phone, Messaging, Email, Browser, Maps, YouTube, Calculator, and more.

Note: If your phone is set to English or Spanish, Text Link performs more functions than in other language settings. Overly long sentences are subject to limitations. Arithmetic operators (such as +, -, * and /) start the Calculator. If Text Link is not linked to an app, the Browser can be used for searching.

To use Text Link:

- Tap a message bubble with the \mathscr{P} icon.
- Highlight text on a webpage or emails and select **Text Link**.
- Tap **Share** and select **Text Link**.

Phone Calls

With the USC National Network and your phone, you can enjoy clear calling across the country.

HD[™] Voice

Your phone is also HD Voice enabled, which means you can enjoy unparalleled voice quality in areas with HD Voice service. Experience the crystal clear difference of HD Voice from USC on calls between USC customers each using an HD Voice enabled phone while in areas with available HD Voice service.



Note: HD Voice service is available in select markets. Visit USC.com/coverage for more information.

Make Phone Calls

There are several convenient ways to place calls from your phone.

Call Using the Phone Dialer

The most "traditional" way to place a call is by using the phone's dialer screen.



- 2. Enter a phone number using the on-screen dialpad and tap
 - If you enter a wrong number, tap to erase digits one by one.
 - To erase the entire number, touch and hold

- You can open other applications during a call. The swill appear in the Status Bar while the call is underway.
- Press the Up/Down Volume Buttons to adjust the call volume.
- Use the on-screen buttons to add another call, put a call on hold, to use the speakerphone, and for other options, as described in In-Call Options.
- 3. Tap to end the call.

Tip: To redial your last outgoing call, follow step 1 to access the Dialer, tap the **Call logs** tab, locate the call entry and tap **S**.

You can also make calls from your Contacts list and from the Call logs.

Dialing Options

After entering numbers with the dialpad, you can use the following dialing options.

Tap it to view the following options when you entered any numbers:

- Add to Contacts: Tap to add the entered number as a new contact or to an existing contact entry. (See Save a Phone Number.)
- Speed dial: Tap to access the speed dials list. (See Set Up Speed Dialing.)
- Add 2-sec pause: Enter digits and select this option to introduce a two-second pause before the following sequence of digits is dialed by the phone. (See Dial and Save Phone Numbers With Pauses.)
- Add wait: Enter digits and select this option to have the phone dial the preceding set of digits first, and then dial the following sequence of digits when you tap Yes on the pop-up screen. (See Dial and Save Phone Numbers With Pauses.)
- One-handed operation: Allows you to dial a phone number using one hand. Tap > to switch to the right-hand dialpad and < to switch back to the left-hand dialpad.
- Edit tabs: Allows you to select which tabs to display and rearrange the order.
- Call settings: Tap to access the Call settings screen. (See Call Settings.)
- Enable Wi-Fi Calling: Tap to enable the Wi-Fi Calling feature.

Missed Call Notification

A missed call icon displays when you do not answer a call. When you do not answer an incoming call,

K is displayed in the Status Bar.

1. Touch and drag the Status Bar to the bottom of the screen to open the Notification Panel.

2. Tap the missed call notification. The **Call logs** screen will be displayed. To dial the phone number, tap **S**.

Wi-Fi Calling

You can make and receive calls via a Wi-Fi network. Wi-Fi Calling is an excellent solution for coverage issues in and around the home or wherever cellular coverage is limited.

When Wi-Fi Calling is enabled, all incoming and outgoing calls will be made via your Wi-Fi network. Minutes used while connected to the Wi-Fi network count against your available rate plan minutes.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🕃 Wi-Fi Calling.
- 2. Tap next to Wi-Fi Calling to turn it on.
- 3. Select a Wi-Fi Network and Follow the instruction to activate Wi-Fi Calling on your phone.

Important! If you are in an active Wi-Fi call and go out of range of your Wi-Fi network, the call will be dropped.

Call Emergency Numbers

You can place calls to 9-1-1 even if the phone's screen is locked or your account is restricted.

Note: When you place an emergency call, your phone automatically enters Emergency mode.

To call the 9-1-1 emergency number when the phone's screen is locked with a screen lock:

- 1. Touch and hold **Context** Freese and hold for 2 seconds.
- 2. Tap Shext to the 9-1-1 entry to place the call.

To call the 9-1-1 emergency number normally or when your account is restricted:

- 1. Unlock the screen. For more information, see Wake Up the Screen.
- 2. Tap 🗁 > 📞
- 3. Tap 9 WXXZ 1 00 1 00 5

Enhanced 9-1-1 (E911) Information

This phone features an embedded Global Positioning System (GPS) chip necessary for utilizing E911 emergency location services where available. When you place an emergency 9-1-1 call, the GPS feature of your phone seeks information to calculate your approximate location. Depending on several variables, including availability and access to satellite signals, it may take up to 30 seconds or more to determine and report your approximate location.

Important: Always report your location to the 9-1-1 operator when placing an emergency call. Some designated emergency call takers, known as Public Safety Answering Points (PSAPs) may not be equipped to receive GPS location information from your phone.

In-Call Options

Once you initiate a call, you will see these on-screen options.

- Add call to initiate a 3-way call.
- End to end the call.
- **Dialpad** to display the dialpad.
- **Bluetooth** (Only available when a Bluetooth headset is connected to your phone) to conduct the call via the Bluetooth headset for hands-free conversation. For details about pairing the phone with a Bluetooth headset, see Pairing Bluetooth Devices.

Note: When using the Bluetooth headset during a call, the Ongoing Call notification icon is blue in the Status Bar.

- **Mute** to mute the microphone during a call. The Mute button lights up to indicate the microphone is muted. To unmute the microphone, tap **Mute** again.
- **Speaker** to turn the speakerphone on or off. The Speaker button lights up to indicate that the speakerphone is on.

WARNING: Because of higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear while using the speakerphone.

Dial and Save Phone Numbers With Pauses

You can dial or save phone numbers with pauses for use with automated systems, such as voicemail or credit card billing numbers.

There are two types of pauses available on your phone:

- 2-Second Pause automatically sends the next set of numbers after two seconds.
- Hard Pause (Wait) sends the next set of numbers when you tap Yes on the pop-up.

Note: You can have multiple pauses in a phone number and combine two-second and hard pauses.

To dial or save phone numbers with pauses:

- 1. Enter the phone number.
- Tap :> Add 2-sec pause or Add wait.
- 3. Enter the additional numbers.
- 4. Tap **t** o dial the number.

– or –

Tap : > Add to Contacts to save the number in your Contacts.

Note: When dialing a number with a hard pause (Wait), tap **Yes** on the pop-up to send the next set of numbers.

Dial From the Contacts List

You can dial directly from your Contacts list.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > Contacts. - or -Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Contacts.
- 2. Find a contact to call and tap it to view the contact's information, then tap S next to the desired number.

Use Direct Dialing

With Direct Dialing, you are able to directly save a contact to your Home screen.

- 1. Touch and hold an empty area on a Home screen.
- 2. Tap the Widgets tab.
- 3. Scroll right and tap **Direct dial**.
- 4. Tap a contact from your Contacts List. The contact will appear on your Home screen.

To use Direct Dial:

Simply tap the contact on the Home screen.

Plus (+) Code Dialing

When placing international calls, Plus Code Dialing automatically enters the international access code for your location (for example, 011 for international calls made from the U.S.).

- 1. In the Dial screen, touch and hold 0^+ until you see a "+" on the display screen.
- 2. Dial the country code and phone number and then tap **C**. The phone automatically prepends the access code for international dialing, followed by the country code and phone number.

Receive Phone Calls

When you receive a phone call, the Incoming Call screen opens with the caller ID and any other available information (such as the caller's name, if saved in the Contact's list). The most recent incoming calls are recorded in the Call logs. (See Call Logs.)

Answer an Incoming Call

Swipe Swipe in any direction.

If **Answer an incoming call** is activated in the Gestures setting, bring the phone to your ear.

If you were already on a call, the first call is placed on hold while you answer the new call. To silence the ringer of an incoming call, press the **Volume Down Button**.

Your phone notifies you of incoming calls in the following ways:

- The phone rings or vibrates.
- The backlight illuminates.
- The screen displays an incoming call message.

Reject an Incoming Call

Swipe in any direction.

The caller is sent directly to your voicemail box to leave a message.

Answer a Roam Call With Call Guard Enabled

Call Guard is an option that helps you manage your roaming charges when making or receiving calls while outside the Nationwide USC Network. Please see Roaming Settings for more information about roaming.

Tap **Yes** to answer the call. (See Roaming Guard for additional information.)

Note: When your phone is off, calls go directly to voicemail.

End a Call

If you opened other applications while on a call:

- 1. Touch and drag the Status Bar to the bottom of the screen.
- 2. Tap End call.

Visual Voicemail

Visual Voicemail gives you a quick and easy way to access your voicemail. Now you can find the exact message you are looking for without having to listen to every voicemail message first. This new feature periodically goes out to your voicemail, and gathers the caller information from all of the current voicemails. It then populates a list with the caller name and number, along with the length of time and priority level of the voicemail message.

Set Up Visual Voicemail

Setting up Visual Voicemail follows many of the same procedures as setting up traditional USC voicemail. You should set up your USC voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated. Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off.

Note: To set up your traditional voicemail box, see Set Up Voicemail.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚾 Voicemail.
- 2. Tap **Personalize now** and follow the system prompts to:
 - Create a password (part of standard voicemail).
 - Record your name announcement.
 - Record your greeting.
- 3. When prompted to enter information, enter your numeric responses.

Important: **Voicemail Password** – USC strongly recommends that you create a password when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a password, anyone who has access to your phone is able to access your voicemail messages.

- 4. Once you have completed the setup process, return to the voicemail page (see step 1).
- 5. Tap the **Welcome to Voicemail** message on the screen to play a brief explanation of the voicemail services.

Review Visual Voicemail

Visual Voicemail lets you easily access and select which messages you want to review.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚾 Voicemail.
- 2. Tap a message to review it. The following is a description of the features available while reviewing a voicemail message.
 - Timeline provides a visual timeline for the current message. Touch and drag this bar to scrub through the message to different points.
 - Tap III to pause the playback, tap b to resume.
 - Speaker Off/On to turn the speakerphone on or off during playback. If the speakerphone feature was enabled within the Voicemail Settings menu, the speakerphone will always be automatically enabled during voicemail playback.
 - Call to call the person that left the message.
 - **Delete** to delete the message.

- Share to share the selected message using your favorite services like Email, Messaging, and others.
- Menu to access Archive, Settings, Help or Send feedback.

Listen to Multiple Voicemail Messages

When you are done listening to a voicemail message you can easily access other voicemail messages without returning to the main voicemail screen.



2. Swipe your finger left or right to display the next or previous message. It will begin playing automatically.

You can navigate through voicemail messages as frequently as you'd like. You can even move to the next or previous message before you're finished listening to the current one.

Visual Voicemail Options

Use the Menu Key to access and configure your Visual Voicemail options.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚾 Voicemail.
- 2. From this initial screen, you can:
 - Tap to compose a new voicemail message.
 - Tap Inbox to view the voicemail messages in other folder: Inbox, Trash, Archive.
 - Tap to access Search, Settings, Help, and Send feedback.
 - Tap to play all new messages.
 - Tap I to select multiple messages to delete, save, or mark as unread/read.
 - Tap 2 to subscribe to a monthly subscription of Premium Visual Voicemail.

Configure Visual Voicemail Settings

The Visual Voicemail settings menu lets you access settings for notifications, pictures, greetings, and more.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 💁 Voicemail.
- 2. Tap **Settings** and select from the following:
 - **Manage subscription** to subscribe and unsubscribe from the visual voicemail premium monthly subscription service. This may take a minute.

- Auto forward to email to send a copy of new messages to an email address of your choice.
- Personalize voicemail to change your voicemail greeting for incoming calls and update password.
- **Notifications** to determine how your are notified of new voicemails. Set the notification sound and vibrate option.
- Transcription language to choose what language to transcribe messages to.
- Delete messages to set Visual Voicemail to permanently delete messages from the Trash folder after a specific number of days.
- Display name to enter a name to identify yourself to people when replying or forwarding messages.
- **Mobile advertising preferences** to manage participation in the Mobile Advertising Program, including enabling bonus app features.
- Display ads to control whether ads display inside Voicemail. Turning ads off also disables bonus features.
- Speakerphone to automatically turn the speaker on or off.
- **Transcriptions displayed** to transcribe Voicemails from voice to text.
- **Themes** to choose the type of theme used for the application.
- View quick tips tutorial to view a visual tutorial about Visual Voicemail.
- Help to see the USC visual voicemail help.
- Send feedback to send some feedback to the Voicemail Feedback team.
- **Updates** to search for an upgrade to your Visual message software.
- About Voicemail to view build information about the current visual voicemail application.

Change Your Main Greeting via the Voicemail Menu

Your main greeting can be changed directly via the Visual Voicemail system. This direct access saves you from having to navigate within the voicemail menu.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚾 Voicemail.
- 2. Tap > Settings > Personalize voicemail.
- 3. Tap **OK** to connect to the USC voicemail system. Follow the prompts to change your current greeting.

Edit the Display Name via the Voicemail Menu

From your Visual Voicemail menu, you can quickly change the name attached to your voice messages.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🔤 > 🚾 Voicemail.
- 2. Tap > Settings > Display name.
- 3. Tap the text field and enter a new identifying name (used to identify you to recipients of your voice messages).
- 4. Tap **OK** to save your information.

Use Visual Voicemail to Delete Your Messages

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚾 Voicemail.
- 2. Touch and hold a voicemail entry from the list, select the messages to delete and tap

Voicemail (Traditional)

In addition to Visual Voicemail, your phone and USC service always offer traditional voicemail service accessed through the phone application.

Set Up Voicemail

You should set up your USC Voicemail and personal greeting as soon as your phone is activated. Always use a password to protect against unauthorized access. Your phone automatically transfers all unanswered calls to your voicemail, even if your phone is in use or turned off.



- 2. Touch and hold 1 ... to dial your voicemail number.
- 3. Follow the system prompts to:
 - Create your password.
 - Record your name announcement.
 - Record your greeting.

Important: **Voicemail Password** – USC strongly recommends that you create a password when setting up your voicemail to protect against unauthorized access. Without a password, anyone who has access to your phone is able to access your voicemail messages.

Voicemail Notification

There are several ways your phone alerts you to a new voicemail message.

- By sounding the assigned ringer type.
- By displaying within the Notifications area of the Status Bar when new unheard voicemail messages are received.

Note: When you are roaming off the Nationwide USC Network, you may not receive notification of new voicemail messages. USC recommends that you periodically check your voicemail by dialing 1 + area code + your wireless phone number. When your voicemail answers, tap \checkmark and enter your password. Roaming rates apply when you access voicemail while roaming off the Nationwide USC Network.

Note: Your phone accepts messages even when it is turned off. However, your phone notifies you of new messages only when it is turned on and you are in a USC service area.

Retrieve Your Voicemail Messages

You can review your messages directly from your wireless phone (using either traditional voicemail or Visual Voicemail) or from any other touch-tone phone.

Use Traditional Voicemail to Access Your Messages

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🔽.
- 2. Touch and hold <u>1</u> . If prompted, enter your voicemail password.
- 3. Follow the voice prompts to listen to and manage your voicemail messages.

Use Visual Voicemail to Access Your Messages

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🔤 > 🔽 Voicemail.
- 2. Tap an entry to listen to the message.

Note: You are charged for airtime minutes when you are accessing your voicemail from your wireless phone.

Use Another Phone to Access Messages

- 1. Dial your wireless phone number.
- 2. When your voicemail answers, tap the pound key on the phone ().
- 3. Enter your password.

Phone Call Options

Your phone application provides many useful features and options to help you make the most of your calling experience.

Caller ID

Caller ID allows people to identify a caller before answering the phone by displaying the number of the incoming call. If you do not want your number displayed when you make a call, follow these steps.

To permanently block your number, call USC Customer Service.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 📞
- 2. Tap * 6 MNO 7 PORB.
- 3. Enter a phone number and tap

Call Waiting

When you're on a call, Call Waiting alerts you of incoming calls by sounding a beep instead of a ring. Your phone's screen informs you that another call is coming in and displays the caller's phone number (if it is available).

To respond to an incoming call while you're on a call:

- Before accepting the incoming call, tap and drag one of the following on-screen options:
 - **Answer** to answer the new call. The first caller is placed on hold.
 - **Decline** to send the call to your voicemail box.

To switch back to the first caller:

From the In-Call options screen, tap Swap calls S.

Tip: For those calls where you don't want to be interrupted, you can temporarily disable Call Waiting by pressing $\frac{1}{7}$ $\frac{7}{10}$ before placing your call. Call Waiting is automatically reactivated once you end the call.

3-way Calling

With 3-Way Calling, you can talk to two people at the same time. When using this feature, the normal airtime rates will be charged for each of the two calls.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🔽
- 2. Make your call to the first recipient.

3. Once you have established the connection, tap Add call

- 4. Enter the second caller's phone number and tap **S** or select a number from your Contacts. (Your first call is automatically put on hold.)
- 5. When you're connected to the second party, tap **Merge calls** to combine both calls into a single 3-way call. If one of the people you called hangs up during your call, you and the remaining caller stay connected. If you initiated the call and are the first to hang up, all callers are disconnected.

Call Forwarding

Call Forwarding lets you forward all your incoming calls to another phone number – even when your phone is turned off. You can continue to make calls from your phone when you have activated Call Forwarding.

Activate Call Forwarding



- 2. Tap * 7 PORS 2 ABC.
- 3. Enter the area code and phone number to which you want your calls forwarded.
- 4. Tap _____. You will hear a tone to confirm the activation of Call Forwarding and the call will end.

Deactivate Call Forwarding

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🔽
- 2. Tap * 7⁻⁻⁻⁻⁻ 2⁻⁻⁻⁻ You will hear a tone to confirm the deactivation and the call will end.

Note: You are charged a higher rate for calls you have forwarded.

In-call Options

While you're on a call, you will see a number of onscreen options. Tap an option to select it.

• Add call to initiate a 3-way call.

- End to end the current call.
- **Dialpad** to display the dialpad to enter additional numbers, for example, an extension or access code.
 - For example: When you call your bank's 800 number, use your dialpad to enter your account number and PIN.
- **Speaker** to route the phone's audio through the speaker (On) or through the earpiece (Off).
 - Activate the speaker to route the phone's audio through the speaker. (You can adjust the speaker volume using the volume buttons.)
 - Deactivate the speaker to use the phone's earpiece.

Warning: Because of higher volume levels, do not place the phone near your ear during speakerphone use.

- Mute to mute the microphone during an active call. Tap again to unmute the microphone.
- **Bluetooth** (Only available when a Bluetooth headset is connected to your phone) to route the phone's audio through a connected Bluetooth headset (On) or through the speaker (Off). For details about pairing the phone with a Bluetooth headset, see Pairing Bluetooth Devices.
 - When the call is routed to a Bluetooth headset, the current call area shows the Bluetooth call icon (S).

Note: The Headset button is activated to show the current call is routed to the connected Bluetooth headset.

- To route the current call back to the phone, tap **Bluetooth** to temporarily use the phone. Tap it again to route the call back to the connected Bluetooth headset.
- When Bluetooth or the Bluetooth headset is turned off, the call is routed through either the earpiece or speaker and shows ().

Tap during a call to display a list of additional in-call features. Tap an option to select it.

- Contacts: Display your contacts list.
- **QuickMemo+**: Open the QuickMemo+ app.
- **Messaging**: Opens the Messaging app.
- Voice enhancement: Enhances voice clarity in noisy environments so you can hear more clearly.

Set Up Speed Dialing

Your phone can store up to 99 phone numbers in speed dial locations.

To assign a speed dial number to a contact:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛄 > 🕒 Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact whose phone number you want to store speed dial locations.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Tap 😬.
- 5. Tap a desired speed dial location number from 2 to 99.
- 6. Tap **Save**.

Note: If you assign a number to an already in-use speed dial location, you will be prompted to confirm that you want to replace the previous speed dial assignment.

Call Logs

The Call Logs tab of the phone application lists all recent incoming, outgoing, and missed calls. It offers a convenient way to redial a number, return a call, or add a number to your Contacts.

Open the Call Logs

■ Tap 🗁 > Call logs.

Calls are listed in the Call logs tab, the most recent calls are located at the top of the list. Scroll down to see older entries.

Note: Call logs record only calls that occur while the phone is turned on. If a call is received while your phone is turned off, it will not be included in the call logs. If you return a call from the voicemail menu, it will not be included in your phone's Call logs.

Call Logs Options

Tap an entry to view the date and time of the call and call duration. The following options are available:

- **b** to make a call.
- 🤍 to send a text message.
- Contact entry.

If several calls were made to one number or received by one number, the calls are displayed as one entry. When you tap this entry, the individual call logs are opened.

You can also touch and hold the entry to open a menu with more options, to communicate with that contact in other ways.

- Add to Contacts (for entries not saved in Contacts) to save the number to Contacts.
- View contact (for entries saved in Contacts) to view contact information.
- Edit number before call to edit a number before you redial.
- Copy call number to copy the call number.
- Reject call to add to the call reject list.
- Delete call logs to delete all the call logs.
- Delete all logs of this number to delete all the logs of this number only.

Make a Call from the Call Logs

From the Call logs tap S at the right of the entry.

Save a Number from the Call Logs

Touch and hold an entry and tap Add to Contacts.

1. Tap New contact.

– or –

Tap **Update contact**. Search for an existing contact name and tap an existing contact to add the new number to that existing contact.

2. Enter as much information as you want. (For more information about creating and editing contacts, see Get Started with Contacts.).

Note: You cannot save phone numbers already in your Contacts or from calls identified as **No ID** or **Restricted**.

Prepend a Number from the Call Logs

If you need to make a call from the Call logs and you are outside your local area code, you can add the appropriate prefix by prepending the number.

- 1. Touch and hold an entry and tap Edit number before call.
- 2. Tap the area immediately to the left of the phone number and enter the prefix.
- 3. Tap **to** call the number.

– or –

Tap **I** > Add to Contacts > New contact to save the amended number in your Contacts.

Clear the Call Logs

- 1. From the Call logs, tap **•** > **Delete all**.
- 2. If you are certain you want to clear the Call logs, tap Yes.

– or –

Тар **No**.

Save a Phone Number

You can store phone numbers and contact entries in your phone. You can also synchronize them with your Google Account, Microsoft Exchange account, or other accounts that support syncing contacts. (For more information, see Get Started with Contacts.)

- 1. Tap 🔷 > 🕓
- 2. Enter a phone number and tap > Add to Contacts > New contact or Update contact.
 - Search for an existing contact name and tap an existing contact to add the new number to that existing contact.

For more information about creating and editing contacts, see Get Started with Contacts.

Find a Phone Number

Your contacts are displayed alphabetically in a list. It is easy to search for a contact by name.



- 2. Scroll and search for the contact or start entering the name of the contact you're searching for in the Search field. As you type, contacts with matching names will appear above the keyboard. You can also scroll using the letters along the right side of the screen.
- 3. Tap a matching contact in the list to open its entry. To dial a number, tap

Text-to-Speech

The text-to-speech feature allows the phone to provide a verbal readout of on-screen data such as messages and incoming caller information (based on Caller ID).

Text-to-Speech Settings

- 1. Tap -> Settings > Language & input > Text-to-speech output.
- 2. Configure any of the following Text-to-Speech settings:
 - PREFERRED ENGINE: Choose which text-to-speech engine you prefer to use. Tap to set various engine settings.
 - **Speech rate**: Allows you to adjust the rate at which the displayed text is spoken by the phone. Choose from: **Very slow, Slow, Normal, Fast**, and **Very fast**.
 - Listen to an example: Plays a short example of what the text-to-speech feature will sound like on your phone when activated.
 - **Default language status**: Displays the default language used for this feature.

Contacts

The Contacts application lets you store and manage contacts from a variety of sources, including contacts you enter and save directly in your phone as well as contacts synchronized with your Google Account, your PC, compatible email programs (including Exchange Server), and your Facebook friends.

Get Started With Contacts

Use the Contacts application to add, view, and communicate with your family, friends and acquaintances.

Access Contacts



All of your contacts are displayed alphabetically in a list. If you have a new phone and haven't added any contacts yet, the Contacts application will display hints on how to start adding contacts to your phone.

To add contacts shortcut to the Home screen, touch and hold an empty spot on one of the Home screen canvases, and tap the Widgets tab. Swipe the widgets left or right until you find Contact or Favorite contacts widget and select it.

The Contacts List

Learn how to view and navigate through your phone's Contacts list.

■ Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts. You will see the Contacts list.

Scroll through the list to view all your contacts. To see a specific entry, scroll to it and touch it.

Tip: If you have a lot of contacts stored, you'll see a slider on the right when you're flicking up or down the list. To go directly to a letter, touch and hold the slider and drag it to a letter.

Contacts List Options

From the Contacts list, tap i to display the following options.

- Delete: Allows you to delete contacts.
- Share: Allows you to share contacts.
- Send message: Allows you to send a message to a contact.
- Send email: Allows you to send an email to a contact.
- Speed dial: Allows you to add a speed dial to your contacts.
- Manage contacts: Allow you to manage the options (Copy contacts, Import/Export, Join contacts).

- Edit tabs: Allows you to edit the tabs, including rearranging them.
- Settings: Allows you to set various contact settings.

Add a Contact

You can add contacts on your phone and synchronize them with the contacts in your Google Account, Microsoft Exchange account, or other accounts that support syncing contacts.

The Contacts application tries to join new addresses with existing contacts, to create a single entry. You can also manage that process manually.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap + to add a contact.
- 3. Tap a destination type (**Phone**, **Google**), if applicable.
- 4. Tap 🗣 to select a picture to display next to the name in your list of contacts and in the Caller ID.
- 5. Tap the **Name** field and enter a name for the new entry.
- 6. Tap the **Phone** field and enter a phone number.
- Tap the label button (to the right of the phone number field) to select one of the following categories: MOBILE, WORK, HOME, MAIN, WORK FAX, HOME FAX, PAGER, OTHER, CUSTOM.
- 8. Tap the **Email** field and enter an email address and select the label from **HOME**, **WORK**, **OTHER**, **CUSTOM**.
- 9. Tap the Address field and enter an address and select the label from HOME, WORK, OTHER, CUSTOM.
- 10. Tap the **Group name** field and select one of the default groups or tap (\pm) to create a new group.
- 11. Tap the **Ringtone** field and select the desired ringtone.
- 12. Enter information as much as you want and when you're finished, tap Save.

Add a Contact to Your Favorites

Favorites contains a short list of the contacts you communicate with most often.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛄 > 🕒 Contacts.
- 2. Tap a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap the star to the right of the contact's name. (A gold star appears.)

To remove a contact from your favorites list:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts > Favorites tab.
- 2. Tap a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap the gold star to the right of the contact's name. The star will turn gray, meaning it has been removed from your Favorites.

Edit a Contact

You can change or add details saved in your contact entries, such as setting specific ringtones to specific contacts or setting calls from specific contacts to divert to your voicemail. Some contact entries contain information from multiple sources: information that you added manually, information joined from multiple accounts to consolidate duplicates, etc.

If you find duplicate entries in Contacts, you can join them into a single entry. If you find that unrelated contacts were joined in error, you can separate them.

Changes made to information from one source do not automatically change the information on the other sources. For example, if you have information about a contact from a Google Account and an Exchange account and both are configured to sync contacts, changes to the contact from the Google Account are synced to that account on the web, but the information from the Exchange account will remain unchanged.

For more information about working with multiple accounts, see Synchronize Accounts.

Edit a Contact

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact whose details you want to edit.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Edit the desired contact information.
- 5. Tap **Save**.

Change a Contact's Default Phone Number

The default phone number is used when you initiate a call or send a text message using the context menu (by touching and holding a contact).

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact to view its details.
- 3. Touch and hold the phone number you want to set as the contact's default phone number.
- 4. Tap Set as default number. (A checkmark will appear next to the default phone number.)

Select a Ringtone for a Contact

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛄 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact to view its details.
- 3. Tap 🔼
- 4. Tap the **RINGTONE** field and tap a ringtone to select it. Then tap **OK**.
- 5. Tap **Save**.

Delete Contacts

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap the name of a contact.
- 3. Tap : > Delete.
 - If the contact contains information from a read-only account, you will not be able to delete it; you will only be able to change the sync settings for that account or delete the account itself.
 - If the contact contains information joined from a read-only account, a dialog box will inform you that you must separate the contact entry into individual contacts to delete the contact.

4. Tap Yes to confirm that you want to delete the contact.

Add a Number to a Contact

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact's entry.
- 3. Tap **Edit contact** in the menu that opens.
- 4. Tap (+).
- 5. Tap the label button to the right of the phone number field and select the relevant label.
 - To create your own label, tap **CUSTOM**.
- 6. Enter a phone number and tap **Save**.

Edit a Contact's Number

- 1. Tap -> -> Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold a contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Tap a phone number to edit.
- 5. Re-enter or edit the number and tap **Save**.

Assign Direct Dialing Numbers

Besides speed dialing, you are also able to directly save a contact to your Home screen.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold a contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Add to Home screen > Direct dial. The contact will be shown on the Home screen.

Note: If there is no available space on a particular Home screen canvas, you must delete or remove an item before you can add another item. In this case, you have the option of switching to another Home screen canvas.

To use direct dial:

Simply tap the contact on the Home screen.

Assign a Picture to an Entry

Assign a picture to display each time a certain contact calls you.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > Contacts.
- 2. Touch and hold the contact's entry.
- 3. Tap Edit contact.
- 4. Tap 😤.
- 5. Tap **Take photo** to take a new picture. The camera will launch.

– or –

Tap Select from Gallery to select a picture from the Gallery.

6. After cropping the picture as you want, (see Gallery Options) tap Save.

Find Contacts by Name

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap the **Search contacts** field.
- 3. Start entering the name of the contact you're searching for. As you type, contacts with matching names will appear below the search box.
- 4. Tap a matching contact in the list to open its entry.

Communicate with Your Contacts

From the Contacts or Favorites tab, you can quickly call or send a text (SMS) or multimedia message (MMS) message to a contact's default phone number. You can also open a menu to access different methods of communicating with that contact.

The Contacts application shares your contacts with many other applications, such as Gmail[™] (see Gmail) and messaging (see Text and Multimedia Messaging).

To connect by using Quick Contact for Android™:

1. Tap a contact's picture to open Quick Contact for Android.

2. Tap the icon corresponding to the type of communication you want to start.

Depending on the contact information saved, the available actions will be displayed above the name.

To communicate with a contact:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛄 > 🕒 Contacts.
- 2. Tap the contact's entry.
- 3. In the contact's details screen, tap the method you wish to communicate with the contact.
 - Tap Second next to the number you want to call to directly.
 - Tap
 next to the number you want to message.

Note: Anytime you see the green Call Key S next to a number, such as in your Favorites or Call logs, just tap it to call that number.

To call a contact's default number:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap Sheet to the contact entry.
- 3. If multiple numbers are stored, a pop-up window to select the number will open.

(For more information about placing phone calls, see Make Phone Calls.)

For more information about sending text and multimedia messages, see Text and Multimedia Messaging.

Import, Export, and Share Contacts

If you have contacts stored in vCard format on the phone's internal storage, you can import them into your Contacts application on your phone. You can also export contacts in vCard format onto the phone internal storage. Export your contacts to back them up to a computer or another phone.

Import Contacts From Your Internal Storage

You can import contacts from your internal storage directly to your phone.

Note: See Transfer Via PC or Laptop for details about copying files to your phone from your computer.

- 1. Copy the vCard files to your phone from your computer.
- 2. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > Contacts.
- 3. Tap : > Manage contacts > Import/Export > Import from internal storage.
- 4. If you have more than one account on your phone, tap the account into which you want to import the contacts.
- 5. Tap the files you wish to import and tap **Import** and **Yes** to confirm.

Export Contacts to Your Internal Storage

You can export all of the contacts on your phone, as vCard files. You can then copy this file to a computer or another phone that is compatible with this format, such as an address book application. (See Transfer Via PC or Laptop.)

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛄 > 🕒 Contacts.
- 2. Tap > Manage contacts > Import/Export.
- 3. Tap Export to internal storage.
- 4. Tap the contacts you want to export, then tap Export and Yes to confirm.
- 5. Enter a file name and tap **OK**.

Share a Contact

You can share a contact with someone by sending it to the person as a vCard file.

- 1. Tap -> -> Contacts.
- 2. Open the contact you want to share.
- 3. Tap : > Share.
- 4. Choose the method for sending.

Join and Separate Contacts

When you have two or more entries for the same contact, you can join them into a single entry. You can also separate contacts that were joined.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > Contacts.
- 2. Tap : > Manage contacts > Join contacts.
- 3. Select a tab at the top of the screen.
 - Tap **Join suggestion** to select entries to merge.
 - Tap **Joined contacts** to select entries to separate.
- 4. Checkmark the entry (or entries) you want, then tap **Join** or **Separate**.

Accounts and Messaging

With USC service and your phone's messaging capabilities, you have the opportunity to share information through many different channels and accounts.

Gmail

This email client is Google's web-based email service. (See Synchronize Your Google Account.)

From a computer, launch your preferred web browser and navigate to www.gmail.com. Depending on your synchronization settings, Gmail (along with calendar events, phone numbers and other contact information) on your phone is automatically synchronized between your phone and your Gmail account on the web.

Create a Google Account

You must create and/or sign into a Google Account to use Gmail, Google Hangouts[™], Google Calendar[™], and other Google Apps. Signing into a Google Account is also necessary to download applications from the Google Play Store app to sync your data (if applicable) with the Google servers, and to take advantage of any other available Google services on your phone.

If you don't have a Google Account, you will be prompted to create one. If you have an enterprise account through your company or other organization, your IT department may have special instructions on how to sign into that account.

- 1. From a computer, or from your phone's Browser, navigate to www.google.com.
- 2. On the main page, select Create an account.
- 3. Follow the on-screen prompts to create your free account.
- 4. Log into your provided email address, locate the email from Google, and respond to the new email to both confirm and activate your new account.

Sign into Your Google Account

If you have a Google Account but have not yet signed in with your phone, follow these instructions to sign in to your Google Account.

- 1. Launch an application that requires a Google Account (such as Play Store or Gmail).
- 2. Tap **Existing**.

Note: If you do not already have a Google Account, tap **New** and follow the on-screen prompts to create your new account.

3. Tap the **Email** and **Password** fields and enter your information.



5. Read the disclaimer about Backup and restore and checkmark the box to keep the phone backed up with the Google Account. Then, tap

Your phone then communicates with the Google servers to confirm your information.

Important: Some applications, such as Calendar, work only with the primary Google Account (the first Google Account set up with your phone). If you plan to use more than one Google Account with your phone, be sure to sign into the one you want to use with such applications first. When you sign in, your contacts, Gmail messages, Calendar events, and other information from these applications and services on the web can be synchronized with your phone. You will be prompted to sign in or to create a Google Account the first time you start an application that requires one, such as Gmail or Play Store.

Access Gmail

Access your personal Gmail account directly on your phone.

When you open the Gmail application, the most recent conversations are displayed in your Inbox.

■ Tap 🗁 > 🗑 > 🍪 Google > 🅍 Gmail.

All of your conversations are displayed in your Inbox unless you delete, archive, or filter them. Conversations with new messages are displayed with bold subject lines. To read a message in a conversation, tap the conversation. (See Read Your Messages.)

View Your Gmail Inbox when Gmail is Open

Add Another Google Account

Tap > Settings > Accounts & sync > Add account > Google > Existing or New.

Switch Between Accounts

Gmail displays conversations and messages from one Google Account at a time. If you have more than one account, you can open the Accounts screen to view how many unread messages you have in each account and switch accounts.

From your Inbox, tap the account name at the top left corner of the screen, then tap the account that contains the messages you want to read.

Read Your Messages

Tap a conversation that contains the message you want to read.

When you open a conversation, the first unread or starred message is displayed.

If you want to contact the sender, tap the Contact's picture ID to open Quick Contact. (See Communicate with Your Contacts.) When reading messages in a conversation, you can use the buttons at the bottom of the screen to archive the entire or delete it. After you delete a conversation, you can tap **UNDO** in a dark gray box that appears on the bottom of the screen. You can scroll to the bottom of a message to access buttons for replying to or forwarding the message, as described in Read and Reply to Gmail Messages.

To reread a message:

When you open a conversation, messages that you've already read are minimized into a tab that indicates the number of hidden messages.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 📴 > 😵 Google > 🍄 Gmail.
- 2. Tap the conversation you want to view.
- 3. Tap the contact name to open that message.

When reading a message or when its tab is selected, you can tap it to return a read message to the unread state. For example, to remind yourself to read it again later.

Send a Gmail Message

You can compose and send a message to people or groups with Gmail addresses or other email addresses.



Note: This will start the message from your default Gmail account. To send it from another account, tap the account name at the top left corner of the Inbox, then tap the account you want to use.

- 3. Enter a recipient's address. As you enter text, matching addresses are displayed from your Contact list. You can tap a suggested address or continue entering text to enter a new one.
- 4. Tap > Add Cc/Bcc to copy (normal or blind status) recipients, if necessary.
- 5. Enter a subject for the message in the Subject field.
- 6. Continue into the next field to compose your email message.
- 7. Tap > Attach file to add an attachment to the email.
- 8. Tap \blacktriangleright to send the email.
 - or –

If you're not ready to send the message, tap **Save draft** instead. You can read your drafts by opening messages with the Drafts label.

– or –

Tap **•** > **Discard** to erase the message (including any saved drafts).

Note: If you aren't connected to a network - for example, if you're working in Airplane mode - the messages that you send are stored on your phone, with the Outbox label until you connect to a network again.

Read and Reply to Gmail Messages

You can continue an email conversation by replying to a message or by forwarding it.

1. On a message, tap ***** to reply to the message.



- Tap to select from **Reply all** or **Forward**.
- Replying to or forwarding messages without changing the subject adds your reply to the current conversation. Changing the subject starts a new conversation.
- The message will open in a new screen where you can add or remove addresses, edit the subject, and add or remove text or attachments.
- You can add one or more people to an ongoing conversation by replying to all and then adding the new person's address(es) to the message.
- All of the messages in the conversation are included in the new message; any messages that follow the message you forward are omitted.
- 2. Tap \blacktriangleright to send the email.

Note: You can change the message action after you've started the message. Simply tap the *i* in the message header to the right of the current message action, then tap the one you want. For example, if you chose **Reply** but decide you want to **Reply all**.

Work with Conversations in Batches

With Gmail, you can archive, label, delete, or perform other actions on a batch of conversations at once.

- 1. From the Inbox or another label, tap the letter or Contact photo to the left of each message for all the messages you want to include in the batch.
 - When you highlight a conversation, the (Archive), (Trash), (Read/Unread), or
 (More) buttons appear at the top of the screen.

- 2. Tap (Archive), (Trash), (Read/Unread), or (More).
 - The chosen action affects the selected batch of messages. If you accidentally delete a batch of conversations, you can tap UNDO in the grey bar (that appears briefly after the action) at the bottom of the Inbox screen to return the messages to the Inbox or appropriate label. You can also use UNDO after archiving, and reporting spam. If you never work with batches of messages, you can hide the check boxes to leave more room for the subjects of conversations. (See Change Gmail Settings.)

Change Gmail Settings

You can change a number of settings for Gmail. Each Google Account has its own settings, so your changes affect only the current account. (See Switch Between Accounts).

Notification volumes and some synchronization settings can also be changed in the Settings application.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗑 > 🚱 Google > 🅍 Gmail.
- 2. Tap > Settings.
- 3. Tap **General settings** to change the following settings for all accounts:
 - Archive & delete actions: Choose if you want to display only the archive option, only the delete option, or both options.
 - Swipe to archive: Select to archive a conversation when you swipe it.
 - Sender image: Allows the senders image to be displayed beside the name in the conversation list.
 - **Reply all**: Mark the checkbox to make Reply all the default message action.
 - Auto-fit messages: Mark the checkbox to shrink the messages to fit the screen and allow zooming.

- **Auto-advance**: Sets which conversation list is viewed after archive or deletion.
- **Message actions**: Sets when to show message actions.
- Confirm before deleting: Checkmark the checkbox to ask to confirm before deleting a message.
- **Confirm before archiving**: Checkmark the checkbox to ask to confirm before archiving a message.
- **Confirm before sending**: Checkmark the checkbox to ask to confirm before sending a message.

Individual Account Settings

You can set each of your accounts with specific, individual settings.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛞 > 🚱 Google > 🅍 Gmail.
- 2. Tap **I** > **Settings**.
- 3. Tap the account whose settings you want to modify.
 - **Inbox type**: Select the default inbox.
 - Inbox categories: Allows you to choose what categories to display in your inbox.
 - Notifications: Checkmark to receive a Status Bar notification when mail arrives.
 - Inbox sound & vibrate: Opens a dialog box to set the Sync download amount for this account and how you want to be notified.
 - **Signature**: Opens a dialog box to enter the signature you want to send at the end of your email.
 - Vacation responder: Allows you to set up a message to send while you are on vacation.
 - Sync Gmail: Opens the Accounts & Sync screen to modify your sync settings for this account, or remove this account.
 - Days of mail to sync: Opens a dialog box to set the number of days of mail to sync. Modifying this setting affects the sync download in the Ringtone & vibrate setting.
 - Manage labels: Opens a dialog box to set which mail labels are synced.
 - Download attachments: Checkmark to automatically download attachments to recent messages using a Wi-Fi connection.
 - Images: Allows you to choose if you want to always display images or ask before showing.

Respond with Quoted Text

When you respond to a Gmail message you can choose to type within the previous text. For example, if the previous text includes multiple questions, you can insert your responses immediately after each question instead of responding as a separate message.

- 1. Open a Gmail message and initiate your response action (e.g., **Reply**, **Forward**, etc.).
- 2. Make sure the **QUOTE TEXT** checkbox below the Compose field is checkmarked, then tap **RESPOND INLINE**.
- 3. Tap where you want to insert your text, then enter your text as necessary.
- 4. Tap hin the upper right corner of the screen to send the email.

Email

Use the Email application to send and receive emails from your webmail or other accounts, using POP3 or IMAP, or access your Exchange ActiveSync account for your corporate email needs.

Although there is a separate Gmail application, the Email application can manage both Internet based email services (Gmail[™] and Yahoo![™]) and Corporate Work Email (Outlook[®]). The phone can also be manually configured to connect to other email systems.

Note: If you have multiple email accounts, you must configure each account with its own settings.

If you want to send and receive email messages through an ISP (Internet Service Provider) account (such as Outlook), you will first need to set up an IMAP or POP account.

- Internet Message Access Protocol (IMAP) This mail retrieval protocol is frequently used in large networks and commercial and institutional settings. IMAP4 is the current standard.
- Post Office Protocol (POP) This protocol is supported by most ISPs and is currently more common among consumer applications. POP3 is the current standard.

Note: For more information, review your email carrier's support documents or contact your IT administrator.

Add an Email Account (POP3 or IMAP)

The Email application only reveals all currently added email accounts. To view additional email accounts within the main Email screen, they must first be added.



- 2. Do one of the following:
 - If this is your first time to add an email account, tap Yahoo or Other on the Select email provider screen.
 - If you have already added an email account in Email, tap :> Settings > + Add account.
 If the Select email provider screen is displayed, tap Yahoo or Other.
- 3. Enter the **Email address** and **Password** for your email account and then tap **Next**.
 - Tap Manual setup to configure your connection settings manually (POP3, IMAP, or Exchange). Follow the on-screen prompts and enter the information specific to your carrier.

Important: If the account type you want to set up is not in the phone database, you will be asked to enter more details. You should get all pertinent information for the email account, such as incoming and outgoing server settings, before you proceed.

4. Enter the account name and your name and tap **Done**.

Corporate Email (Outlook)

The Email application also provides access to your Outlook Exchange server via your phone. If your company uses Microsoft Exchange Server 2003, 2007 and 2010 as the corporate email system, you can use this email application to wirelessly synchronize your email, Contacts and directly with your company's Exchange server.

Important: This Outlook application does not utilize Microsoft[®] ActiveSync to synchronize the phone to your remote Exchange Server. This synchronization is done wirelessly over the air (OTA) and not via a direct connection.

Set Up a Corporate Email

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🖉 Email.
- 2. Tap Microsoft Exchange (from the add new email account screen).
- 3. Enter your **Email address** and **Password** information, then tap **Next**. Consult your Network Administrator for further details.
 - Email address: Your Outlook work email address.
 - **Password**: Typically your network access password (case-sensitive).
- 4. Enter a Server address, Domain and tap Next.

- **Server**: Your exchange server remote email address. Typically starts with mail.XXX.com. Obtain this information from your company network administrator.
- Domain: Enter your network domain\login username.
- If your network requires SSL encryption, tap the Use secure connection (SSL) box to place a checkmark and activate this additional level of security.
- If your exchange server requires this feature, leaving this field unchecked can prevent connection.

Note: Signal interruptions or incorrect username or password information can cause completion issues.

5. Read the on-screen activation disclaimer and, if prompted, tap Activate.

Note: Depending on the type of account, you might be required to enable security to sync the account.

- 6. Configure your **Update schedule**, **Days to sync email** (days to synchronize between your phone and server), and activate any other email settings, then tap **Next**.
- 7. Identify your new account with a unique name and provide the outgoing name, then tap **Done**.

Important: You can synchronize over the air (not directly) with an Exchange Server running Microsoft Exchange Server 2003 Service Pack 2 (SP2) or Microsoft Exchange Server 2010.

Note: You can have multiple Work Email (Microsoft Exchange) accounts active on your phone.

Open Email

Reading and replying to email on your phone is as simple as on your computer.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🧶 Email.
- 2. Tap a message to read, manage, or reply to.
 - From your Inbox screen, tap is to select the following options: Search, Refresh, Folders, Sort by, Downloads and Settings.
 - While in a message, the options described in the image below are available.

Create and Send Email

Create and send email using any account you have set up on your phone. Increase your productivity by attaching files such as pictures, videos, or documents to email messages.

- 1. From the Inbox, tap
- 2. Enter the recipient's email address in the **To** field.
 - You can add as many message recipients as you want.

Note: To send an additional carbon copy (Cc) or a blind carbon copy (Bcc) of the current email to other recipients, enter the recipients in the **Cc** or **Bcc** field.

- 3. Tap the Subject field and enter the email subject.
- 4. Tap the body field and compose your email.
 - To add an attachment (such as picture, video, contact, event, audio, etc.), tap
 - You can access the internal storage and navigate to the file you wish to attach.
 - Tap the file you wish to attach.
- 5. Tap \ge to send the email.

Note: If you close the messaging window before sending it, it is stored in Drafts.

Reply to or Delete an Email Message

Replying to or deleting an email is simple.

- 1. From the Inbox, tap an email message to view it.
- 2. With the email message displayed, tap and choose **Reply** or **Reply all**.
 - If you select **Forward**, you must specify the message's recipients.
- 3. Enter a new message and tap **>**

Delete an Email Message

Touch and hold an email (from your inbox list) and tap **Delete** from the pop-up context menu.

– or –

With the email message displayed, tap \Box .

Configure and Sync Corporate Email Settings

You can sync and configure various settings for your corporate email and create a corporate email signature.

Sync Your Accounts

1. Tap -> • Settings > Accounts & sync.

- 2. Tap **Microsoft Exchange**, then select the Corporate account to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- Place a checkmark next to each option if you want the phone to automatically synchronize. If you want to manually synchronize, tap > Sync now.

Configure Corporate Email

- 1. Tap → Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap **Microsoft Exchange**, then select **Email Settings** and tap the desired account to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- 3. The following settings are available.
 - Account name: Displays the name used by the phone to track the account.
 - Your name: Displays your name. Tap this to change it.
 - Use signature: To add a signature or other information to outgoing email.
 - Signature: Displays a signature. Tap this to change it.
 - Update schedule: Choose the update schedule.
 - **Folders to sync**: Select the folders you want to synchronize.
 - Days to sync email: Choose how many days of email you want to sync.
 - Message format: Select the format you want to view email messages in.
 - Message size limit: Allows you to set the size limit for messages.
 - Download over Wi-Fi: Attachments will be queued until Wi-Fi is connected.
 - File size to download over Wi-Fi: Choose the Download file size.
 - Account & sync: Goes back to Accounts & sync screen.
 - Calendar events to sync: Choose the Calendar events to sync.
 - Auto resend times: Set the number of tries to resend a failed email message.
 - Always Cc/Bcc me: Allows you to copy yourself to emails sent out.
 - **Out of office settings**: Allows you to set your out of office settings and message.
 - Security settings: Set digital signatures and encryption to secure email.
 - Corporate directory: Searches online directory for the recipient input.
 - Server policy: View the server policy currently applied.
 - Notifications: Allows you to decide whether to notify you of new email.

- Notification sound: Allows you to select the notification sound for new emails.
- Vibrate: Allows you to configure vibrate options for new emails.
- Vibrate Type: Allows you to select the vibration type for new emails.
- Exchange server settings: Allows you to change the server settings for your account.
- Remove account: Allows you to remove the account.
- 4. Tap (Tap) to return to the previous screen.

For more detailed Corporate email information, see Corporate Email (Outlook). For more information on Corporate Calendar synchronizing, see Synchronize Your Corporate Account.

Configure General Email Settings

- 1. Tap (→) > (Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap **Email** to display the account's synchronization settings screen.
- 3. Tap Email Settings and select General settings to set the following settings.
 - Set default account: Allows you to set the default account.
 - Select download storage: Select the download storage location to Internal storage/SD card.
 - Email preview: Allows you to set how much lines of email to display as a preview in the mailbox.
 - Conversation view: Allows you to view email messages sent or received with the same subject in one thread.
 - **Split view**: Allows you to view the email list with email contents in landscape orientation.
 - Load linked images: Select when you want to load linked images.
 - Ask before deleting: Checkmark to set the phone to ask before deleting email.
 - Auto-advance: Select which screen to display after deleting an email.
 - **Resize image**: Set the default size for image attached while composing.
 - VIP settings: Set Notifications, Sound, Vibrate, Vibrate Type for VIP lists.
 - **Trusted certificates**: Trusted certificate information is available.
- 4. Tap (Tap) to return to the previous screen.

Text and Multimedia Messaging

With text messaging (SMS), you can send and receive instant text messages between your wireless phone and another messaging-ready phones. When you receive a new message, you will be notified by

your phone. Messaging is available via the Messaging application in your Applications screen. The sicon appears in Status Bar when a new text message is received.

Note: See your service plan for applicable charges for text messaging.

Compose Text Messages

Quickly compose and send text messages on your phone.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > > 💷 Messaging > 🗹.
- 2. Tap the **To** field and enter the recipient's phone number or email information using the on-screen keyboard.
 - Contacts: As you enter either a phone number or email address, if the information matches a current contact's entry information, you will see a match. When you see a match, tap the associated name to complete the addressing.
 - Mobile: You can enter a wireless phone number directly.
 - Email: You can also enter the recipient's email address.
- 3. Tap a matching entry from the on-screen dropdown list. This list is populated by matches found from your managed accounts.
- 4. Tap the text field and enter your message.
 - To enter a smiley from the menu options, tap :> Insert smiley. Make a selection from the list to insert it into your current message.
 - To enter emojis, tap $^{\textcircled{0}1\#}$, then tap $^{\textcircled{0}}$, and select a category at the bottom of the keyboard.
- 5. Review your message and tap **Send**.

Read and Reply to Text Messages

When you receive a text message, your phone will notify you.

• Open the Notification Panel and tap the text message notification.

– or –

Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Messaging and tap the new message.

Reply to a Text Message

- 1. While viewing a message, tap the text field.
- 2. Compose your reply or use the preset messages or icons.

- To enter a message, use your on-screen keyboard. (See Enter Text With the On-screen Keyboard.)
- To enter a smiley from the menu options, tap : > Insert smiley. Make a selection from the list to insert it into the message.
- To enter emojis, tap $^{\odot}$, then tap $^{\odot}$, and select a category at the bottom of the keyboard.
- 3. You may select additional messaging options by tapping 🧾.
- 4. Review your reply and tap **Send**.

Send a Multimedia Message (MMS)

When you need to add a little more to a text message, you can send a multimedia message (MMS) with pictures, voice recordings, audio, video files, contacts (vCard), location or memos.

Note: See your service plan for applicable charges for multimedia messaging.

Compose Multimedia Messages

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 💻 Messaging > 🗹.
- 2. Tap the **To** field and enter the recipient's phone number or email information. As you enter the phone number or email address, matching contacts appear on-screen. Tap an available matching recipient or continue entering the phone number or email address.
- 3. Tap the text field and enter your message.
- 4. Tap 🦉 .
- 5. Select a multimedia attachment type:
 - Image: Opens the Gallery application. Use the on-screen navigation to select the picture you
 wish to send with the outgoing message.
 - **Take photo**: Opens the Camera application. Take a picture, and then tap **OK** to use this image in your message. (See Take Pictures.)
 - Video: Opens the Gallery application. Use the on-screen navigation to select a video and attach it to your outgoing message.
 - Record video: Opens the Camcorder application. Record a video, then tap OK to use this video in your message. (See Record Videos.)
 - Audio: Opens a menu that allows you to browse for audio files using different applications.
 - **Record voice**: Opens the message recorder.
 - After recording your message, tap @ to attach it to your message.
 - Location: Opens a map screen. Select a location, then tap Attach to use this.

- **Contact**: Opens your Contacts list and allows you to select of a Contact to send.
- Schedule: Opens your Schedule event list and allow you to select an event to send.
- Slide: Allows you to create a slideshow with your media files.
 - Insert a multimedia file, then tap \mathscr{O} > Slide. You can also enter text to each slide.
- Draw: Allows you to draw and attach an image like QuickMemo+.

Note: To remove or replace a picture or an audio attachment, on the Compose screen, tap ent to the attachment.

6. When you are finished creating your new MMS message, tap **Send MMS**.

Save and Resume a Draft Message

While composing a text or multimedia message, tap 🔄 to automatically save your message as a draft.

To resume composing the message:

- 1. On the All messages screen, tap the desired draft message. A draft icon 🖉 will be displayed.
- 2. When you finish editing the message, tap **Send** or **Send MMS**.

Managing Message Conversations

Text and multimedia messages that are sent to and received from a contact (or a number) are grouped into conversations or message threads in the All messages screen. Threaded text or multimedia messages let you see exchanged messages (similar to a chat program) with a contact on the screen.

To read a text message:

- Do one of the following:
 - On the All messages screen, tap the message thread to open and read it.
 - If you have a new message notification, touch and slide the Status Bar down to open the Notifications Panel. Tap the new message to open and read it.

To view a multimedia message (MMS):

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 드 Messaging.
- 2. On the All messages screen, tap a message thread to open it.
- 3. While viewing a message, tap the play icon (on the video or audio file) to playback the file or tap the image to view the picture.

Tip: The file attachment on the multimedia message can be saved to your phone's internal storage. To save the attachment, touch and hold the file and tap **Save attachment** from the Message options context menu.

Note: When Auto-retrieve in multimedia message settings is disabled, only the message header is downloaded. To download the entire message, tap the **Download** button in the message. For details, see Text and Multimedia Message Options.

To reply to a text or multimedia message:

- 1. Tap -> -> Messaging.
- 2. On the All messages screen, tap a message thread to open it.
- 3. While viewing a message, tap the text field and type your reply message.
- 4. Once completed, tap **Send** or **Send MMS**.

To return to the All messages screen from a text message thread, tap

Note: To view the details of a particular message, in the message thread, touch and hold the message to open the options menu, and then tap **Details**.

Note: If a message contains a link to a web page, tap the message and then tap the link to open it in the web browser.

Note: If a message contains a phone number, tap the message and then tap the phone number to dial the number or add it to your contacts.

To protect a message from deletion:

You can lock a message so that it will not be deleted even if you delete the other messages in the conversation.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Messaging.
- 2. On the All messages screen, tap a message thread to open it.
- 3. Touch and hold the message that you want to lock.
- 4. Tap **Lock message** on the options menu. A lock icon is displayed at the right hand side of the message.

Delete Messages

You can delete a single message or several messages at a time.

To delete a message thread:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 트 Messaging.
- 2. On the All messages screen, tap the message thread that you want to delete.
- 3. Tap **:** > **Delete**.
- 4. Tap Select all or choose the desired messages and tap Delete.

5. When prompted to confirm, tap **Yes**. Any locked messages in the thread will not be deleted unless you select the **Delete locked messages** check box.

To delete several message threads:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🗖 Messaging.
- 2. On the All messages screen, tap :> Delete.
- 3. Tap the **Select all** checkbox at the top left corner, then tap **Delete**.
- 4. When prompted to confirm, tap **Yes**. Any locked messages in the thread will not be deleted unless you select the **Delete locked messages** check box.

To view contact details and communicate with a contact:

When you have received a message from someone in your stored contacts, you can tap the contact's photo or icon in the message thread to open a menu of options. Depending on the stored contact information, you can view the contact details, phone or send an email message to the contact, and more.

Text and Multimedia Message Options

The messages settings menu lets you control options for your text and multimedia messages including message limits, size settings, and notifications.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 트 Messaging.
- 2. On the All messages screen, tap :> Settings.
- 3. Adjust the following settings according to your needs:
- Storage
 - Delete old messages: Enable this option to delete older text messages when the limit for maximum number of text messages is exceeded.
 - **Text message limit**: Sets the maximum number of text messages that can be stored on the phone (per conversation).
 - **Multimedia message limit**: Sets the maximum number of multimedia messages that can be stored on the phone (per conversation).
 - Attachment storage: Sets the contents on Internal storage or SD card.
 - Signature: Tap this to automatically add signature (blue checkmark displays).
 - Callback number: Check this to automatically add callback number (blue checkmark displays).
- Text message
 - **Priority**: Select **Normal** or **High**.

- Message reassembly: Enable this option (blue checkmark displays) so that multi-segment messages can be reassembled and shown as a single message. Each segment will still count toward your usage.
- Multimedia message
 - **Group Messaging**: Send a single message as multimedia message when there are multiple recipients.
 - Auto-retrieve: Enable this option to automatically retrieve the entire content of your multimedia message. When checked, the multimedia message header, message body, and any attachments will automatically download to your phone. If you disable this option, only the multimedia message header will be retrieved and displayed.
 - **Roaming auto-retrieve**: Disable this option if you only desire the multimedia message headers to download while roaming. Enable this option to automatically download your complete multimedia messages even while roaming.
 - **Priority**: Select Low, Normal, or High.
- **Conversation theme**: Allows you to select the desired conversation theme for the conversation wallpaper and message bubbles.
- Notification
 - **Notifications**: Enable this option if you wish to receive a notification in the Status Bar when a new text or multimedia message arrives.
 - **New message pop-up**: Enable this option if you wish to see a new message as a pop-up.
 - **Preview**: Enable this option if you wish to preview the contents of messages when new messages arrive.
 - Notification sound: Allows you to select a ringer to sound when a new message is received. Tap this option, and then select a ringtone that is specific to new text and multimedia messages. A sample will briefly be played upon selection.
 - **Vibrate**: Enable this option if you want the phone to vibrate when a new text or multimedia message is received.
 - Vibrate type: Choose what type of vibration you wish to apply to new messages.
- Quick message: Tap this to add or edit quick messages. Quick message is the specified text
 message to send out when you want to ignore an incoming call and respond to the caller with
 instead.
- Send message with Enter key: Enable this option if you want to send messages by tapping the Enter key on the keyboard.
- **Text Link display**: Enable this option if you want the phone to show Text Link icons to indicate apps released to message contents.
- Emergency alerts

- **Presidential alerts**: This allows presidential alert to be always presented. It is grayed-out because presidential alerts are of high importance and should not be disabled.
- Extreme alerts: Enable this option to receive extreme alerts.
- Severe alerts: Enable this option to receive severe alerts.
- **AMBER alerts**: Enable this option to receive AMBER alerts on child abduction.
- **Test alerts**: Enable this option to receive test alerts.

Social Networking Accounts

Stay in touch on the go with all your social networking accounts. Post updates on Facebook and Twitter, review your LinkedIn contacts, see what everyone's talking about on YouTube, and more.

Facebook

Post updates, read what your friends are up to, upload pictures and check-ins, and more with on-the-go Facebook access.

Install the Facebook App on Your Phone

Before you use Facebook on your phone, you must download and install the app from the Google Play Store app.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗰 > 陀 Play Store.
- 2. Touch the Search icon and search for "facebook".
- 3. Touch Facebook from the results list.
- 4. Touch **INSTALL**, and then touch **ACCEPT**.
- 5. When the download is complete, touch **OPEN**. To open the app from the Home screen, touch > **Facebook**.

Sign in to Your Facebook Account from Account Settings

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Accounts & sync > Add account.
- 2. Touch Facebook.
- 3. Enter your Facebook username and password and touch Log In.
- 4. Choose to sync or not to sync your contacts, then touch **Done**.

Google Hangouts

The Google Hangouts application lets you have real-time text conversations with your friends.

Open the Hangouts Application

■ Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚱 Google > 🥹 Hangouts.

Chat with Friends

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚱 Google > 🥹 Hangouts.
- 2. Tap + to view your contacts list. It includes all of the Google Accounts you've added.
 - Tap the name of the person in your contacts list. If your friend is not yet on Hangouts, you can invite your friend via SMS.

– or –

- Tap the text field to enter a name, email or number.
- 3. Enter your message.
- 4. Tap 🕨

Synchronize Accounts

Your phone is able to synchronize data from a variety of different sources or sites. These accounts can range from Google, a Corporate Exchange Server, and other social sites, including Facebook and Twitter.

Enable Auto-Sync

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🐼 Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap Auto-sync data to place a checkmark.
 - Tap an account you've already set up to choose the type of data you want to synchronize.
 For example, you can choose to sync your Google Calendar and/or Gmail data.

Synchronize Your Google Account

By default, there are no accounts managed by the phone. These must be added manually.

- 1. Tap (→) > (Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap Add account > Google.
- 3. Tap Existing.

Note: If you do not already have a Google Account, tap **New** and follow the on-screen prompts to create your new account.

4. Tap the **Email** and **Password** fields and enter your information.

- 5. Tap . Your phone then communicates with the Google servers to confirm your information.
- 6. Read the disclaimer about Backup and restore and checkmark to keep the phone backed up with the Google Account. Then, tap

Configure Google Sync Settings

- 1. Tap (→) > (Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap **Google** and select the Google Account to reveal the account's synchronization settings screen.
- 3. Tap the type of data you wish to synchronize (Calendar, Contacts, Gmail, Google+ Photos, Google Play Books, and many more).
- 4. Tap to return to the previous screen.

Synchronize Your Corporate Account

Your phone is capable of synchronizing with your company's Exchange Servers.

To add a new Corporate account:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💮 > Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap Add account > Microsoft Exchange.
- Follow the on-screen prompts to create your new Corporate email account. (See Corporate Email (Outlook).)
- 4. Tap **Next**.
- 5. Read the disclaimer and tap **Activate**.
- 6. Tap the options you wish to configure and tap **Done**.
 - Select items to sync.: Checkmark this if you wish to set as the default account.
 - Sync Email: Checkmark this option to sync emails.
 - Sync Contacts: Checkmark this option to sync contacts.
 - Sync Calendar: Checkmark this option to sync calendar.
 - **Sync Tasks**: Checkmark this option to sync tasks.
 - Update schedule: Allows you to configure when to update emails.
 - Days to sync email: Allows you to configure how many days of data you want to sync.

For more detailed Work/Corporate email information, see Corporate Email (Outlook).

Apps and Entertainment

All your phone's features are accessible through the Apps list.

Google Play Store

Play Store provides direct access to Android applications and games to download and install on your phone.

Access the Play Store

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗰 > 환 Play Store.
- 2. If not already logged in with your Google Account, tap **Existing**.
- 3. Enter your account information and tap
- 4. Touch Accept to agree to the Play Store terms of service.

Note: Play Store options may vary depending on the version installed in your phone. Your Play Store application will update automatically when available.

Select and Install a Google Application

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗰 > 🖻 Play Store.
- 2. Browse for an application. Once you have decided on one, tap it to view its details.
- 3. Read the application descriptions and comments.
- 4. Tap **INSTALL** (for free applications) or the price button (for paid applications).

Note: Use caution with applications which request access to any personal data, functions, or significant amounts of data usage times.

- 5. Read the app's access requirements and tap **AGREE** if you agree to them.
- 6. Check the progress of the current download by opening the Notifications Panel.
- 7. You will be notified when the item is downloaded and installed on your phone.
- 8. On the Play Store screen, tap **∃** > **My apps**, tap the installed application in the list, and then tap **OPEN**.

Launch an Installed Google Application

- 1. Tap → → Play Store > > My apps.
- 2. Tap the desired application, then tap **OPEN**.

OR

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮.
- 2. Tap the icon of the newly installed application.

Reinstall a Google Application

If the Android Operating System is ever updated, any data contained on the phone will be erased. The only data stored on the phone are Google applications available via Play Store.

Note: Pictures, videos, applications and music are stored in the phone's internal memory. Contacts and Calendars are stored remotely on your remote Google or Outlook servers.

- 1. Tap → Play Store > > My apps.
- 2. Swipe the screen to the left and scroll through the list of previously downloaded Google applications and choose the one you wish to reinstall.
- 3. Follow the on-screen instructions.

USC ID

ID Packs are bundles of applications, ringtones, wallpapers, settings, and more. ID Packs are installed using an application called USC ID.

You can have multiple ID Packs installed at any one time and you can easily switch from one ID Pack to another without losing any applications already installed.

Note: This application will initially be labeled as Mobile ID. After activation, it will be updated to USC ID.

Install Your First ID Pack

Note: Your phone must be activated, your battery should be fully charged, and you should be in a network coverage area before you install an ID Pack.

- 1. Tap 🕏 and browse the ID packs and tap the desired one.
- 2. Read the information screen for a description of the ID Pack and touch Install.

Note: Touch Agree to accept the Terms & Conditions of the ID Pack, if necessary.

3. If prompted, touch **Continue** on any following screens until you see the Downloading icon in the Status Bar.

Note: While the ID Pack is downloading in the background, you can begin to explore the features of your new phone from the Home screen.

When the download is complete, you will see the Download finished icon Marine in the Status Bar.

WARNING: DO NOT interrupt the download process.

4. Open the Notifications Panel if the download is complete, then tap **ID ready to install** to install the ID Pack.

Switch ID Packs

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗑 > ₩ USC ID.
- 2. Tap \boldsymbol{v} , then tap an ID Pack to replace your current pack.

Note: Certain features of USC ID are subject to change. For the most up-to-date information about using USC ID, please visit www.USC.com.

USC Applications

You can access a wide variety of USC applications in many different categories with your phone and data service. Currently, various applications, such as Scout[™] by Telenav, USC Music Plus, and USC TV & Movies are available when you download them from Play Store or USC Zone.

Note: Some USC data applications may not work with a Wi-Fi connection present. If prompted, disable your phone's Wi-Fi feature while using these applications.

Download USC ID Packs

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🗑 > 🕅 USC ID.
- 2. Swipe the screen to the right to **All ID Packs**.
- 3. Scroll down and tap the **USC** category.
- 4. Tap any of the available USC ID Packs and follow the on-screen prompts to install the USC ID Pack.

Note: Once you download and install one of the USC ID packs, various USC applications will appear on your Applications screen. When you switch from the USC pack to another ID pack, or choose a new ID pack, the USC applications will remain installed and visible on your Applications screen.

To download and install USC apps:

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > [application name]. Then download or update the application.
- Follow the instructions to customize your application (such as selecting a favorite team or driver) or tap to explore your options.

Note: Important Privacy Message – USC's policies often do not apply to third-party applications. Thirdparty applications may access your personal information or require USC to disclose your customer information to the third-party application provider. To find out how a third-party application will collect, access, use, or disclose your personal information, check the application provider's policies, which can usually be found on their website. If you aren't comfortable with the third-party application's policies, don't use the application.

Music

You can play audio files that are stored in your phone's storage. Copy audio files from your computer onto your phone before you open the Music application. The Music Player application supports audio files in numerous formats.

Google Play Music

Google Play Music lets you browse, shop, and play back songs purchased from the Google Play Store app, as well as songs you have loaded from your own music library. The music you choose is automatically stored in your Google Music library and instantly ready to play or download.

■ Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🚱 Google > 🍿 Play Music.

Note: Learn more about Google Play Music at music.google.com.

Music Player

You can play music and set as ringtone.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🛄 > 🞵 Music.
- 2. You can select music tracks from the following tabs:
 - **Songs**: To browse through your downloaded music library.
 - Albums: To display your music library sorted by album.
 - Artists: To display your music library sorted by artist.
 - **Genres**: To display your music library sorted by genre.
- 3. Tap to see the additional options.
 - Favorites: To display your music library sorted by favorites.
 - Playlists: To select a customized playlist you've created.
 - Folders: To browse for music files using folders.
 - **Nearby devices**: To browse music files on other DLNA-certified media servers.
 - **Cloud**: To browse music files saved on the cloud.
- 4. Once you've displayed a list of songs, you can browse through your available titles.
 - To listen to a song or playlist, tap it to begin playing.

Play a Song

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 📖 > 🗗 Music > Songs tab.
- 2. Select the song you want to play.

Create a Playlist

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💮 > 🞵 Music.
- 2. Tap > Add to playlist.
- 3. Select the songs you want to add to the playlist and tap Add.
- 4. Tap **New playlist** and enter a name then tap **OK**.

Assign a Song as a Ringtone

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \square Music > Songs tab.
- 2. Touch and hold a song you'd like to use as your new ringtone. A context menu is displayed.
- 3. Tap **Set as ringtone** and select **Phone ringtone** to set it as the default ringtone or **Contact ringtone** to set it as a ringtone for a specific contact.
- 4. Confirm the song has been successfully assigned by navigating to your phone's ringtone menu.
 - Tap > Settings > Sound > Ringtone.
 - Open the Contact entry and check the **Ringtone** field.

Back Up Your Downloaded Music Files

USC recommends that you back up your downloaded music files to your computer. Although the downloaded files can only be played on your phone and on your account, backing them up to your computer lets you access the files in case your phone memory is damaged. (See Transfer Via PC or Laptop)

- 1. Connect your phone to your PC using a USB cable.
- 2. Select Media device (MTP) and use your computer to navigate to phone's Music folder.
- 3. Select and copy the music files to a folder on your computer's hard drive.

YouTube[™]

YouTube is a video sharing website on which users can upload and share videos. The site is used to display a wide variety of user-generated video content, including movie clips, TV clips, and music videos, as well as video content such as video blogging, informational shorts and other original videos.

Note: YouTube is a data-intensive feature. USC recommends that you upgrade to an unlimited data plan to avoid additional data charges.

- 1. Tap → > YouTube.
- 2. To search for videos, tap \mathbf{Q} .

- 3. Enter the text to search for or tap Ψ to search by voice.
- 4. If entering text, tap a suggestion below the search box or tap \bigcirc to search.
- 5. Scroll through the search results and tap a video to watch it.
- 6. Tap \frown to return to the previous page.

GPS Navigation

Your phone's built-in GPS capability gives you access to a number of location-based services, including Maps and Scout[™] by TeleNav.

Google Maps™

You can use Google Maps to find your current location, to view real-time traffic conditions, to get detailed directions by foot, public transportation, bicycle, or car, and to navigate by using spoken, turn-by-turn driving instructions using the Google Maps Navigation (beta) service. You can search on a street map or a satellite image to locate an address or a landmark, and you can view some locations as if you were strolling down the street. If you join Google Latitude, you can view your friends' locations on your maps and share your location and other information with them. There are some locations that Maps does not have information about.

Launch Google Maps

1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > 👯 Maps.

Note: Before using any navigation programs, make sure your phone is set to allow location detection, and then select which sources you want to use.

Tap 🗁 > 😳 Settings > Location. Tap the Location switch and tap Mode > High accuracy (GPS and networks), Battery saving (Networks only), and/or Device sensors only (GPS only).

2. Tap •. The map centers on a blue circle that indicates your location. An arrow indicates the direction the device is facing. A transparent blue circle around the dot indicates that your actual location is within the circle.

To get an address and additional information for a location:

- 1. Touch and hold a location on the map. A bar with the address and a thumbnail from Street View (if available) opens at the bottom of the screen.
- 2. Drag the bar upwards to access additional options.

To utilize Google Maps:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 📖 > 🗱 Maps.
- 2. Pinch out or in to zoom in or out of the current map view.

– or –

Tap each icon at the top of the screen.

- Q (Search) to search for a location.
- M (Directions) to get directions.
- Your activity) to access your favorite places.
- Image: (Menu) to view locations and additional information overlaid on the map.

To search for a location:

- 1. While viewing a map, tap \mathbf{Q} .
- 2. In the search box, enter the place you're looking for.
 - You can enter an address, a city, or a type of business or establishment. For example, "theater in New York."

- 3. Tap **X**. Red markers indicate search matches on the map.
- 4. Tap a marker to display a bar that contains the name and travel information. Drag the bar upwards to open a screen with more information about the location, as well as options for obtaining directions.

To get directions:

- 1. While viewing a map, tap Υ .
- 2. Enter a starting point in the **Choose starting point** field, or leave as is to allow GPS to find your location, and your destination in the **Choose destination** field.
 - To reverse directions, tap 1.
- 3. Tap the icon for car, public transit, biking, or walking directions.
- 4. The directions to your destination appear as a blue route. Select a gray route if you prefer it.
- 5. Drag the bar up to view directions as text or tap \land to navigate to the destination.

Scout by Telenav

Scout by Telenav is a daily personal navigator that helps you get where you're going. It lets you see and hear turn-by-turn directions and it can provide important, personalized information about traffic and alternate routes.

Get Scout by Telenav

- 1. Tap -> -> Play Store.
- Tap APPS > USC > Scout GPS Navigation & Traffic and follow the prompts to download and install the app.

Note: Before using any navigation programs, make sure your phone is set to allow location detection, and then select which sources you want to use.

Tap \bigcirc > 10 > 20 Settings > Location. Tap the Location switch \bigcirc

Use Scout by Telenav

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > Scout.
- 2. Follow the on-screen instructions to access, launch, and use.

Web and Data

Your phone's data capabilities let you wirelessly access the Internet or your corporate network through a variety of connections, including Wi-Fi, USC 4G, Data Services (USC 3G Network), and Virtual Private Networks (VPN).

This section addresses your phone's data connections and the built-in web browser. Additional datarelated features can be found in Accounts and Messaging, Apps and Entertainment, and Tools and Calendar.

Connect Wi-Fi

Wi-Fi is a wireless networking technology that can provide Internet access at distances of up to 100 meters, depending on the Wi-Fi router and your surroundings.

To use Wi-Fi on your phone, you must connect to a wireless access point, or hotspot. Some access points are open and you can simply connect to them without entering any information. Others are hidden or implement other security features, so you must configure your phone to connect to them.

Turn off Wi-Fi when you're not using it to extend the life of your battery.

When you connect to a Wi-Fi network, the phone obtains a network address and other information it needs from the network, using the DHCP protocol. To configure the phone with a static IP address and other advanced settings, tap **•** > Advanced Wi-Fi from the Wi-Fi settings menu.

Turn Wi-Fi On and Connect to a Network

Use the Wireless & networks setting menu to enable your phone's Wi-Fi radio and connect to an available Wi-Fi network.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🏵 Settings > Wi-Fi.
- 2. Tap the Wi-Fi switch () to turn Wi-Fi on and scan for available Wi-Fi networks.
 - A list of available Wi-Fi networks will be displayed. Secured networks are indicated by a lock icon.
 - If the phone finds a network that you have connected to previously, it automatically connects to it.
- 3. Tap a network to connect to it.
 - If the network is secured, you will be prompted to enter a password. (Ask your network administrator for details.)
 - When you're connected to a network, you can tap the network name in the Wi-Fi settings screen for details about the speed, security, address, and related settings.

To receive notifications when open networks are in range:

By default, when Wi-Fi is on, you receive notifications in the Status Bar when your phone detects an open Wi-Fi network.

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Wi-Fi.
- 2. Tap the **Wi-Fi** switch of to turn Wi-Fi, if it's not already on.
- 3. From the Wi-Fi menu, tap -> Advanced Wi-Fi > Wi-Fi notification checkbox to enable/disable the feature.

Add a Wi-Fi Network

You can add a Wi-Fi network manually if it does not broadcast its name (SSID) or if you want to add a Wi-Fi network when you are out of its range.

To add a secured network, you need to contact the network's administrator to obtain the password or other required security credentials.

- 1. Turn on Wi-Fi, if it's not already on.
- 2. From the Wi-Fi settings screen, tap : > Add network.
- 3. Enter the **Wi-Fi name (SSID)** of the network. If the network is secured, tap the **Security** dropdown menu and tap the type of security used for the network.
- 4. Enter the required passwords and security credentials.
- 5. Tap Connect.

The phone will connect to the wireless network. Any credentials that you entered are saved, so you are connected automatically the next time you come within range of this network.

To forget a Wi-Fi network:

You can also make the phone forget about the details of a Wi-Fi network that you have added. For example, if you don't want the phone to connect to it automatically or if it is a network that you no longer use.

- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Wi-Fi.
- 2. Tap the Wi-Fi switch for to turn Wi-Fi, if it's not already on.
- 3. In the Wi-Fi settings screen, touch and hold the name of the network.
- 4. Tap Forget network.

Wi-Fi Direct

Wi-Fi Direct supports a direct connection between Wi-Fi enabled phones without an access point. Due to the high battery usage of Wi-Fi direct, it is recommended that you plug your phone into a power outlet while using the Wi-Fi Direct feature.

To turn on Wi-Fi Direct:

- 1. Tap -> Settings > Wi-Fi > > Wi-Fi Direct.
- 2. Tap Search to search for available phones.
- 3. Tap the available phones.

Note: Tap **I** > **Help** for more information.

Virtual Private Networks (VPN)

From your phone, you can add, set up, and manage virtual private networks (VPNs) that allow you to connect and access resources inside a secured local network, such as your corporate network.

Prepare Your Phone for VPN Connection

Depending on the type of VPN you are using at work, you may be required to enter your login credentials or install security certificates before you can connect to your company's local network. You can get this information from your network administrator. Before you can initiate a VPN connection, your phone must first establish a Wi-Fi or data connection. For information about setting up and using these connections on your phone, see Launch a Web Connection and Turn Wi-Fi On and Connect to a Network.

Set Up Secure Credential Storage

If your network administrator instructs you to download and install security certificates, follow the instructions below.

- 1. Tap -> Settings > Security.
- 2. Tap Install from storage for desired certificates.

You can then download and install the certificates needed to access your local network. Your network administrator can tell you how to do this.

Add a VPN Connection

Use the Wireless & networks settings menu to add a VPN connection to your phone.

- 1. Tap -> . Settings > More... > VPN.
- 2. Tap **Basic VPN** or **LG VPN**.
- 3. Tap Add Basic VPN network or Add LG VPN network.

Note: A screen lock is required to configure VPN.

- 4. Configure the settings according to the security details you have obtained from your network administrator.
- 5. When finished, tap **Save**.

The VPN is then added to the VPNs section of the VPN settings screen.

Connect to or Disconnect From a VPN

Once you have set up a VPN connection, use the Wireless & networks settings menu to connect to or disconnect from the VPN.

Connect to a VPN

- 1. Tap → Settings > More... > VPN.
- 2. Tap **Basic VPN** or **LG VPN**.
 - Basic VPN: Sets your phone to use the built-in Android VPN client supporting basic features.
 - LG VPN: Sets your phone to use an advanced LG VPN client supporting full IP Security features and interoperability. You can add an LG VPN network or select from your list of VPN connections.
- 3. In the VPNs section, tap the VPN that you want to connect to.
- 4. When prompted, enter your login credentials, and then tap **Connect**. When you are connected, the VPN connected icon appears in the notification area of the Status Bar.
- 5. Open the web browser to access resources such as intranet sites on your corporate network.

Disconnect From a VPN

- 1. Touch and drag down the Status Bar to open the Notifications Panel.
- 2. Tap the VPN connection to return to the VPN settings screen, and then tap the VPN connection to disconnect from it.

When your phone has disconnected from the VPN, the VPN disconnected icon is displayed in the notification area of the Status Bar.

Browser

Your phone's web browser gives you full access to both mobile and traditional websites on the go, using data service or Wi-Fi data connections.

Learn to Navigate the Browser

Navigating through menus and websites during a data session is easy once you've learned a few basics. Here are some tips for getting around:

Scrolling

As with other menus on your phone, you'll have to scroll up and down to see everything on some websites.

To scroll a web page:

Slide your finger on the screen in the direction you wish to scroll.

Selecting

Once you've learned how to scroll, you can start navigating the web.

To select items or links:

Simply tap a link or an item.

Links, which are displayed as underlined text, direct you to web pages, select special functions, or even place calls.

Go Back

To go back one page:

Tap _____ on your phone. Repeat this process to keep going back through your recently visited pages.

Find and Copy Text on a Web Page

To find text on a web page:

- 1. Tap : > Find on page.
- 2. Enter the text you're looking for.
 - As you type, the first word with matching characters is highlighted on the screen and subsequent matches are boxed.
- 3. Tap To jump to and highlight the previous or next matching word.

To copy text from web page:

- 1. Open a web page and scroll to the beginning of the text you want to copy
- 2. Touch and hold the first word of the text you want to copy.
- 3. Drag either selection tab to expand or reduce the range of selected text.
 - To cancel the selection, simply tap unselected text or empty area.
- 4. Tap **Copy** on the pop-up menu. The text you selected is copied to the clipboard. You can now use the techniques described in Enter Text With the On-screen Keyboard to paste the copied text into a text field.

Go to a Specific Website

Follow the instructions to go to a particular website by entering a URL (website address).

1. Tap the URL field (top of the Browser window) and enter a new web address.

- As you enter the address, possible matches are displayed. Tap an entry to launch the desired website.
- 2. Tap the suggested website.

– or –

Tap **Go** on the keyboard.

Browser Menu

The Browser menu offers additional options to expand your use of the web on your phone.

Open the Browser Menu

The Browser menu may be opened anytime you have an active data session, from any page you are viewing.

From any open web page, tap

Options available within the Browser menu include:

- Forward: Allows you to go one page forward (if you had gone back to previous pages).
- New tab: Allows you to add new browser tab.
- Bookmarks: Allows you to set up and use custom bookmarks.
- Add to bookmarks: Allows you to save the current page to your bookmarks.
- **Homepage**: Allows you to go to the homepage.
- **History**: Displays a history of previously visited web pages.
- Share: Allows you to share the web page with others.
- Find on page: Allows you to search the current Web page for a word.
- **Desktop view**: Allows you to view the current page in desktop view.
- Save for offline reading: Allows you to save the current page for reading offline.
- **Capture plus**: Allows you to capture a screen shot of the current web page from top to bottom without cutting.
- **Print**: Allows you to print the web page.
- Settings: Allows you to configure and manage your Browser settings.
- Exit: Allows you to completely exit the Browser.

Adjust Browser Settings

You can change the page settings for your browser, including the default zoom level, pop-up blocking, display options, setting your home page, and more.

- 1. Tap it to open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap **Settings**.
- 3. Select a sub-category and make the desired changes.
 - General: Settings for homepage and form auto fill.
 - **Privacy and security**: Settings for managing personal data from web browsing and usage.
 - Accessibility: Adjust screen and text size.
 - Advanced: Adjust JavaScript and other web content settings.
 - Bandwidth management: Settings for load images.

Set the Browser Home Page

Customize your web experience by setting your browser's home page.

- 1. Tap i to open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap Settings > General > Set homepage.
- 3. Select one of the available options and enter the necessary information.

Reset the Browser to Default

- 1. Tap i to open the Browser menu.
- 2. Tap Settings > Advanced > Reset to default.
- 3. Tap Yes to complete the process.

Create Website Settings

You can create settings for individual websites.

- 1. Tap ito open the Browser menu.
- Tap Settings > Advanced > Website settings. These advanced settings that can be configured for individual sites (ex: Clear location access).
- 3. Tap **OK** to complete the process.

Create Bookmarks

Make browsing easier by setting up and using custom bookmarks.

Accessing Your Bookmarks

You can bookmark web pages so that you can quickly return to them.

- 1. From any open web page, tap it to open the option menu.
- 2. Tap **Bookmarks**. Three tabs are revealed:
 - Bookmarks: Displays a list of your current bookmarks.
 - History: Displays a record of your browsing history. These records are organized into folders such as: Today and Most visited.
 - **Saved pages**: Displays the pages you've saved for offline reading.

Saving Websites To Your Bookmarks

- 1. From any open web page, tap **•** > Add to bookmarks.
- 2. Enter a descriptive name and URL for the new bookmark.
- 3. Tap **OK** to store the new entry to your Bookmarks list.

Create Bookmarks from Other Tabs

- 1. From any open web page, tap it to open the option menu and tap **Bookmarks**.
- 2. Tap the **History** tab.
- 3. Tap the star icon adjacent to a web page entry. Enter the desired information and tap **OK**.

– or –

Touch and hold an entry from the list to display a context menu. Then, tap **Add to bookmarks** to add the selected entry to your current list of bookmarks.

Create a New Home Page

- 1. From any open web page, tap it to open the option menu and tap **Bookmarks**.
- 2. Tap either the **Bookmarks** or **History** tab.
- 3. Touch and hold an entry from the list to display a context menu.
- 4. Tap **Set as homepage** to assign the selected entry as your new homepage.

Add Bookmarks to Your Home Screen

- 1. From any open web page, tap it to open the option menu and tap **Bookmarks**.
- 2. Touch and hold an existing entry from the list to display a context menu.

3. Tap Add shortcut to home to add the selected entry to your Home screen.

Connections Optimizer

The Connections Optimizer is a tool that automatically selects the best mobile network for your phone, including "remembered" Wi-Fi networks.

About Connections Optimizer

The Connections Optimizer helps you manage and enhance your data experience by finding and connecting to "remembered" Wi-Fi networks on your phone. Remembered Wi-Fi networks are networks with which you have previously chosen to connect. Active Wi-Fi connections may offer improved performance and generally improve battery life while allowing you to talk on the phone and use data at the same time.

The Connections Optimizer works by searching for available "remembered" Wi-Fi networks. If you do not leave your Wi-Fi antenna on all the time, you will only notice the Connections Optimizer operating at certain times of the day in a small number of locations on the network. Your Wi-Fi antenna will conserve battery by scanning for connections periodically (not continuously), and if no connection is achieved, the antennas will be turned off. You may also manually turn the antennas off during the scan period.

To facilitate quality assurance and enable feature enhancements, information is collected about your battery levels, Wi-Fi and network connections and usage. No personal information is collected.

Enable Connections Optimizer

- 1. From home, tap 🗁 > 😇 > Kettings > More... > Mobile networks > Connections Optimizer. You will see a disclaimer.
- 2. Read the disclaimer and touch I Agree to turn Connections Optimizer on.

Disable Connections Optimizer

- 1. From home, tap 2 Settings > More... > Mobile networks > Connections Optimizer.
- 2. Uncheck the box on the Connections Optimizer page.

Data Services General Information (3G and 4G Networks)

With your USC service, you are ready to start enjoying the advantages of data services. This section will help you learn the basics of using your data services, including managing your user name, launching a data connection, and navigating the web with your phone.

Important: Certain data services requests may require additional time to process. While your phone is loading the requested service, the touchscreen or on-screen keyboard may appear unresponsive when in fact they are functioning properly. Allow the phone some time to process your data usage request.

4G Spark LTE

4G Spark LTE provides your phone with wireless Internet access over greater distances than Wi-Fi and delivers data transfer rates of up to 30 to 60 Mbps. To connect your phone to 4G Spark LTE network, you need access to a 4G Spark LTE base station.

For more information about the availability of 4G Spark LTE in your location, visit USC.com/coverage.

Note: The availability and range of the 4G Spark LTE network depends on a number of factors including your distance to the 4G Spark LTE base station, and infrastructure and other objects through which the signal passes.

Set Your Network Options

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > More....
- 2. Tap Mobile networks > Network mode.
- 3. Select LTE/CDMA or Global. The phone will scan for the best available USC network and will automatically connect to it.

When your phone is connected via USC Spark, the USC Spark icon LTE 2 appears in the Status Bar and tells you the approximate signal strength (number of bands displayed).

Check 4G LTE Network Status

- 1. Touch 🗁 > 😳 Settings > More... > Mobile networks.
- 2. Touch **4G settings**. The network provider name and IP address are displayed.

Your User Name

When you buy your phone and sign up for service, you're automatically assigned a user name, which is typically based on your name and a number, followed by "@USCpcs.com." (For example, the third John Smith to sign up for USC data services might have jsmith003@USCpcs.com as his user name.)

When you use data services, your user name is submitted to identify you to the Nationwide USC Network. Your user name will be automatically programmed into your phone. You don't have to enter it.

Update Your User Name

If you choose to change your user name and select a new one online, you must then update the user name on your phone.

- Tap > Settings > System updates > Update profile.
 - Your profile will be automatically updated by the network.

Launch a Web Connection

Launching a web connection is as simple as opening the browser on your phone.

■ Tap 🗁 > 🖲 > 🌎 Browser.

Note: You can connect to the Internet via Mobile network or via Wi-Fi. (Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🏵 Settings > Wi-Fi.)

Once the Browser loads, you are directed to the home page.

Tip: To change the default home page, tap **i** > **Settings** > **General** > **Set homepage**.

Note: The Browser automatically launches when a web link is touched from within an email or text message.

Data Connection Status and Indicators

Your phone notifies you of the current status of your data connection through status icons in the Status Bar. The following symbols can be displayed:

Your phone is connected to the high-speed 4G USC Mobile Broadband Network. When the signal bands are animated, your phone is scanning and connecting. During data transfer, the animated icon is not used (for example, when you are opening a web page). When the signal bands are gray, your phone is connected to the network, signal is weak.

When both the bands and the 4G icon are gray, your phone is connected to the 4G network but is not currently transferring data.

3G

Your phone is connected to the high-speed USC Mobile Broadband Network(3G/1x). When the arrows are animated, your phone is transferring data. When the arrows are gray, your phone is connected to the network but is not currently transferring data. In either state, you can receive incoming calls.

If you do not see an indicator, your phone does not have a current data connection. To launch a connection, see Launch a Web Connection.

Camera and Video

You can use the camera or camcorder to take and share pictures and videos. Your phone comes with a 13 megapixel camera with an auto-focus feature that lets you capture sharp pictures and videos.

Note: Be sure to clean the lens with a microfiber cloth before taking pictures. A lens cover with smudges from fingers can cause blurry pictures with a "halo" effect.

Take Pictures

Taking pictures with your phone's built-in camera is as simple as choosing a subject, pointing the lens, and pressing a button.

To take a picture:



- 2. Frame your subject on the screen.
- 3. A group of squares will indicate when the camera has focused.
- 4. Tap . Your picture will be automatically saved to the Gallery.

Record Videos

In addition to taking pictures, you can record, view, and send videos with your phone's built-in video camera.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 📴 > 🖸 Camera.
- 2. Frame your subject on the screen.
- 3. Tap 🖭 to start recording the video.
- 4. The length of the recording is displayed on the top of the screen.

Note: Tap to take pictures while recording video.

- 5. Tap U to pause recording video. You can resume recording again tapping U.
- 6. Tap 💭 to stop recording. Your video will be automatically saved to the Gallery.

Camera and Video Settings

From the camera mode, tap each icon to adjust the following camera settings.

- Blash Tap to turn the flash On, Off or set it to Auto.
- Swap camera to swap between the rear camera lens and the front camera lens.
- Mode to select the mode from: Auto, Magic focus, Panorama and Dual.
 - Auto: Automatically focuses on a subject.
 - Magic focus: Allows you to change the focus on a picture after taking it.
 - **Panorama**: Creates a wide photo of a panoramic view. Hold the phone horizontally, press the shutter to start and slowly sweep the camera across the scene.
 - Dual: Captures a photo or records a video using both camera lens. Touch and hold the small screen to resize or move it.
- Settings to adjust the following camera and video settings.
 - Dynamic tone (HDR): Combines photos taken at multiple exposures into one optimal photo to get a better photo in tricky lighting situations.
 - Image size: Set the size of your picture. Choose from 13M 4160x3120, W10M 4160x2340, 9M 3120x3120 or 3M 2048x1536.
 Set the size of your video. Choose from UHD 3840x2160, FHD 1920x1080, HD 1280x720 or 120HD Slow Motion.
 - **Cheese shutter**: Allows you to take pictures with voice commands. When on, just say "Cheese", "Smile", "Whiskey", "Kimchi", or "LG" to take a picture.
 - **Timer**: Set your camera's timer. This is ideal if you want to be a part of the picture.
 - Grid: Allows you to easily take pictures by displaying grid lines for easy alignment.
 - **SD card**: Set the storage location for your videos or pictures. Choose from **IN** (internal storage) or **IN** (microSD card)..
 - Help: Allows you to learn how a function works. This icon will provide you with a quick guide.

Multi-point Auto-focus

When you take a picture, the Multi-point Auto-focus (AF) function operates automatically and will allow you to see a clear image.

Gesture shot

The Gesture shot feature allows you to take a picture with a hand gesture using the front camera. To take photo, raise your hand, with an open palm, until the front camera detects it and a box appears on the screen. Then close your hand into a fist and a timer will start, allowing you time to get ready.

Super Zooming

You can use a zoom up to 8 times while taking pictures.

Tip: This function operates automatically while zooming in and out.

Note: Use a steady hand. This feature does not work with some functions Objects can be overlapped when taking a picture of fast-moving subjects.

View Your Pictures

The Gallery is where you can access the Gallery of stored camera images. You can view them in a slideshow, share them with your friends, and delete and edit them.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🐻 > 🌄 Gallery.
- 2. Select a location and tap an image to view your picture.

Gallery Options

The Gallery application presents the pictures and videos in your storage, including those you've taken with the Camera application and those you downloaded from the web or other locations.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc **Gallery** to view the images stored in the storage.
 - Drag left or right to view more albums.
- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap a picture in an album to view it.

- Tap a picture group again to reveal the following icons:
 - Camera: Opens the Camera.
 - Share: You can share the picture via various methods such as Messaging or Bluetooth.
 - **Delete**: Deletes the picture.
- Tap a picture in an album then tap i for the following options: SmartShare, Set image as, Move, Copy, Copy to Clip Tray, Lock, Slideshow, Rotate left, Rotate right, Crop, Add location, Rename, Print and Details.
- Tap to return to the previous screen.

Assign Pictures

After taking a picture, assign it as a picture ID for a Contacts entry or as the Home screen background image (wallpaper).

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > 🔤 Gallery.
- 2. Tap an album and tap an image to view it.
- 3. With the picture displayed, tap :> Set image as.
- 4. Select an option.
 - Contact photo to assign the picture to a Contact entry as a picture ID. Tap an entry from Contacts, crop the image and tap OK to assign the picture.
 - Home screen wallpaper to assign the picture as a background image, crop the image and tap OK to assign the picture.
 - Lock screen wallpaper to assign the picture as a background image for your lock screen.

Wallpaper to assign the picture as a background image, crop the image and tap SET
 WALLPAPER to assign the picture.

Dual Feature

The Dual feature allows you to take a picture or record video with the front and rear cameras at the same time.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > 🚺 Camera.
- 2. Tap MODE > 🛄.

Note: Drag the small screen to move it to your desired location. Touch and hold the small screen to resize it. Tap on the small screen to switch screens.

3. Tap to take a picture.

OR

Tap to record a video. Tap to stop dual recording.

Video Options

The Gallery is where you can access the Gallery of stored video images. You can view them, share them with your friends, and delete and edit them.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc **Gallery** to view the videos stored in storage.
 - Scroll left or right to view more albums.
- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap a video to view it. You can access the following options:
 - QSlide: Enables an overlay on your phone's display for easy multitasking.
 - **B** SmartShare: Shares media files with DLNA certified devices.

- Menu: Tap to access Screen ratio, Subtitles, Share, Trim, Settings, and Details.
- Screen shot: Captures a screen shot while playing a video.

Note: Tap **E** > **Settings** > **Screenshot on**.

- Volume: Tap to display the Volume slider bar, then adjust the playback volume on the slider bar.
- **Cock/Unlock**: Locks the touch keys to prevent unintentional touches.

Play a Video

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc **Gallery** to view videos stored in the storage.
 - Scroll left or right to view more albums.
- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap a video in an album to play.
 - Tap the video to view the playback controls.

Note: While playing a video, slide the left side of the screen up or down to adjust the screen brightness. While playing a video, slide the right side of the screen up or down to adjust the sound. While playing a video, tap the timeline point to preview that portion of the video via a small screen. Tap the small screen to jump to that part of the video.

While playing a video, slide your finger from left to right (or vice versa) to fast-forward and rewind.

Live Zoom

Live Zoom allows you to zoom in or zoom out on a portion of a video that is being played to make the desired section appear larger or smaller.

When viewing a video, use your index finger and thumb in a pinching or spreading motion to zoom in or out.

Note: Do not press too hard; the touch screen is sensitive enough to pick up a light, but firm touch.

Dual Play

Dual Play (connected wired or wirelessly to two displays) can be run on a different screen.

Note: Connect two devices using wired (Slimport-HDMI) cable or a wirelessly (Miracast). The connectable device can be a TV or a monitor supported by an HDMI cable or Miracast. The Gallery, Video apps are supported on Dual Play.

Tap conce when two displays are a different status (i.e. the monitor is playing a video and your phone's video app is displaying empty screen), then Dual Play will start. Not all videos are supported by Dual Play.

Dual Play operates at 1280X720 or higher display resolution.

Tools and Calendar

Learn how to use many of your phone's productivity-enhancing features.

LG Health

The LG Health helps you manage your health and maintain good exercise habits by tracking logs and competing with people.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > Slide the screen to the far left \bigcirc > LG HEALTH.
- 2. On the Profile page, enter your profile information and tap **Save**.

3. Tap the desired options for your health.

Note: This feature is provided for user convenience. Please use for reference only.

QSlide

The QSlide function enables an overlay on your phone's display for easy multi-tasking.

1. While using an app that supports QSlide, tap 🔀 to access QSlide.

– or –

Open the Notifications Panel and touch an app from the **QSLIDE APPS** section.

- 2. Use the slider C to adjust the transparency of the overlay.
- 3. You can make a call, or choose other phone options.
- 4. Tap \times to exit the QSlide function.

Note: The QSlide function can support up to two windows at the same time.

QuickRemote

QuickRemote turns your phone into a Universal Remote for your home TV, cable box, audio system.

1. From the Home screen, tap 10 > 10 QuickRemote > 10.

– or –

Touch and slide the Status Bar downwards and touch 00 > ADD REMOTE.

Note: If QuickRemote is not shown, tap and checkmark the QuickRemote.

2. Select the type of device and its manufacturer, then follow the on-screen instructions to configure the device(s).

Tip: To quickly use the QuickRemote feature, touch and slide the Status Bar downward and tap 00 on the Quick Settings bar to activate it.

Tap it to select Magic Remote setting, Edit remote name, Learn remote, Move remote, Delete remote, Settings, and Help.

Note: QuickRemote features an ordinary remote control and infrared (IR) signals to operate the same way. Therefore, be careful not to cover the infrared sensor when you use the QuickRemote feature. This function may not be supported depending on the model, the manufacturer or service company.

Universal Remote

You can create your own personalized universal remote and choose where to place all of the buttons.

- 1. From the Home screen tap 100 > 100 QuickRemote.
- 2. Tap > Universal remote.
- 3. Enter the Remote name and touch **OK**.
- 4. Place the buttons you want on the remote at the desired location and tap Next.

Note: Swipe to the left and right to view additional buttons.

5. Tap the button to be learned.

- 6. Point original remote 4 inches away from the IR receiver at the top of the phone.
- 7. Press and hold the button on the original remote for 2 seconds.
- 8. Tap **Save** to save the configurations.

QuickMemo+

The QuickMemo+ feature allows you to create memos and capture screen shots. You can use QuickMemo+ to easily and efficiently create memos during a call, with a saved picture or on the current phone screen.

1. Access QuickMemo+ from the Quick Access items.

– or –

While viewing the screen you want to capture and create a memo on, slide the Status Bar down and tap .

- 2. Create a memo using the following options:
 - Tap to undo the most recent action.
 - Tap to redo the most recently deleted action.
 - T: Tap to use a complex concept function.
 - Ze: Tap to select the pen type and color.
 - Tap to use the eraser to erase the memo that you created.
 - Tap to save the current memo.
 - Tap to select the desired options.

Note: Please use a fingertip while using the QuickMemo+ feature. Do not use your fingernail.

- 3. Tap 🔲 to save the current memo.
- 4. Tap **QuickMemo+** or **Gallery** to select where to save the QuickMemo+.

Discard QuickMemo+s:

View the Saved QuickMemo+

Your QuickMemo+ can be saved in the QuickMemo+ application or in the Gallery application.

To view QuickMemo+ saved in one of your QuickMemo+:

■ Tap → > QuickMemo+ and select the memo.

To view QuickMemo+ saved in your Gallery:

Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Gallery and select the QuickMemo+ album.

Dual Window

The Dual Window feature splits the screen to enable multi-tasking, drag and drop interaction, auto-linking and recently used apps.

1. Touch and hold the **Back Key** to split the screen.

2. Touch or drag an app icon to the desired space.

- 3. Tap 😑 🔄 to display the following options. You can also drag the tabs to change the size of the windows.
 - 😳 : Switch two screens.
 - Change the apps list.
 - Eull screen view.
 - Close the apps.

Calendar

With the Calendar application you can view the events you have scheduled in the coming days, weeks, or months.

Open the Calendar

■ Tap → > > Calendar. If you have created or subscribed to more than one calendar through Google Calendar[™] on the web, events from each calendar are displayed in a different color. (For information about which calendars are displayed on your phone, see Display and Synchronize Calendars.)

Note: To go to any day in any Calendar view, tap **E** > **Go to date**.

Change Calendar View

You can change the calendar view.

■ Tap => Day, Week, Month, Year, Agenda. Each view displays the events in your calendar for the period of time that you specify.

Day View

Agenda View

View Event Details

You can view more information about an event in a number of ways, depending on the current view.

In Agenda, Day, Week, or Month, tap an event to view its details.

Create an Event

You can use the Calendar tool on your phone to create events that appear on your phone and in your Google Calendar on the web.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Calendar and then \bigcirc .
 - You can also touch and hold a spot in **Day, Week**, or **Month** view to open the new event screen with that day and time already entered.

- 2. Add details about the event.
 - Enter a name, and other optional details about the event, just as you would on Google Calendar (on the web). If you have more than one calendar, you can choose the calendar to which to add the event. Tap + to add more reminders.(See Set an Event Reminder.)
- 3. Scroll to the bottom of the screen and tap **Save**.
 - The event will be added to your Calendar. You can also access and configure the event from Google Calendar on the web.

Edit or Delete an Event

You can edit or delete an event that you created on the phone or on the web. You can also edit or delete events created by others, if they have given you permission.

Edit an Event

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc = Calendar and then tap the event to open it. (See View Event Details.)
- 2. Tap 2. (For information on how to create or change event information, see Create an Event.)
- 3. Make your changes to the event.
- 4. Tap **Save**.

Delete an Event

Tap an event to view the event details. Then, tap 1. Tap **Yes** to confirm.

Set an Event Reminder

You can set one or more reminders for an event, whether or not you created the event or have permission to edit its other details.

- 1. Open Calendar and tap the event to open it. (See View Event Details.)
- 2. Tap + Add reminder to add a reminder.
- 3. Tap the reminder time to display a pop-up menu and choose your desired setting.
 - At the designated time, you will receive a notification to remind you about the event. (See Respond to an Event Reminder.) You can also use Google Calendar (on the web) to configure additional reminders.

Delete an Event Reminder

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Calendar and then event to open it.
- 2. Tap \times to remove a reminder.

Respond to an Event Reminder

If you set a reminder for an event, the reminder notification appears in the Status Bar when the reminder time arrives. (See Notifications Panel.)

- 1. If you receive notifications in the Status Bar, drag the Notifications Panel down to your notifications. Tap the event notification to open the list of Calendar notifications.
- 2. Tap an event in the Calendar Notifications list to view more information about that event.
- 3. Tap **Snooze** in the Calendar Notifications list to receive the reminder again 5 minutes later.

– or –

Tap **Dismiss** in the Calendar Notifications list to delete all reminders in the list.

4. Tap () when viewing the Calendar Notifications list to keep the reminders. The reminders will remain in the Status Bar.

Display and Synchronize Calendars

Initially, all calendars that you create or subscribe to through Google Calendar on the web are also displayed in the Calendar application on your phone. You can select which calendars to show or hide on the phone, and which to keep synchronized.

(For more information, see Synchronize Accounts.)

Only the calendars that you've created or subscribed to on the web are shown in the Calendars list.

To select calendars to display:

- 1. Tap > Calendars to sync.
- 2. Checkmark the desired accounts to display those calendars.

Change Calendar Settings

You can change the settings for how the Calendar application displays events and how it notifies you of upcoming events.

- Tap 2 -> 0 -> 16 Calendar and then tap -> Settings -> Calendar settings.
 - Week starts on: Opens a dialog box to configure from when the week starts on.
 - Hide declined events: When checkmarked, declined events so that they are not displayed in your calendar views. Tap to remove the checkmark and display all events in your calendar views.
 - Weather: Show weather info on Calendar.
 - Show events by: Select event display type Event brief or Timeline.
 - Show week number: Displays the week number out of the year.

- Lock default time zone: Lock event times and dates to default time zone.
- Clear search history: Allows you to remove all the searches you have performed.
- About calendar: Display calendar application version.
- Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 📶 Calendar and then tap ፤ > Settings > Event notification settings.
 - Default reminder time: Allows you to select the default time set for event reminders.
 - Notifications: Checkmark to allow notifications of new events. When Notifications is set, you
 can select the notification type, notification sound, vibrate or vibrate type, and whether to popup the notification or not.
 - Quick responses: Edit default responses when emailing guests.

Folders

Folders allow you to organize other Home screen shortcuts and icons, or folders that contain all your contacts, contacts with phone numbers, or starred contacts. Your folder's contents are kept up to date automatically. Organizing in folders can create space to add more shortcuts, widgets, or applications on the Home screen.

Add a Folder

- 1. Drag and drop an app icon over another app icon.
- 2. A folder will be created with both app icons in it.

Rename a Folder

- 1. Tap the folder icon to open it.
- 2. Tap Folder +
- 3. Enter the new folder name and tap **OK**.

Note: You can also change the folder color.

Organize Items in a Folder

Just drag a shortcut, an icon, or a folder and drop in a folder.

Clock

You can use the Clock application to monitor several types of information at once, in addition to the current date and time.

Open the Clock App

The Clock application also allows you to set alarms.

1. Tap -> -> Clock.

- 2. Tap an existing alarm to change its time and other attributes or tap **Add alarm** to add a new one.
- 3. Set the time of the alarm. You can change the time by scrolling up/down the hour and minute and AM/PM field or tap the hour and minutes fields to enter the time with the keyboard.
- 4. Tap **Repeat** to set the days when you want the alarm to sound. (If you don't set a repeat, the alarm will only sound on the assigned day.)
- 5. Tap **Snooze duration** to open a dialog box to set the amount of time to wait before sounding the alarm again if it is not dismissed. You can set the alarm to ring repeatedly from 5 minutes up to 1 hour.
- 6. Tap **Vibration** to have the phone vibrate, in addition to playing the ringtone.
- 7. Tap Alarm sound to select a ringtone for the alarm. The ringtone plays briefly when you select it.
- 8. Slide the button on the **Alarm volume** slider to the right to increase the alarm volume and to the left to decrease it.
- 9. Tap **Auto app starter** to set the application you want to automatically open when you stop the alarm.
- 10. Tap **Puzzle lock** to checkmark the setting, which requires you to wake up enough to solve a simple puzzle to dismiss the alarm.
- 11. Tap **Memo** to enter a name for the alarm.
- 12. When you're finished, tap **Save**.

Change Clock Settings

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 💽 > 🖉 Clock.
- 2. Tap > Settings.
- 3. You can set the following options:
 - Alarm in silent mode: Tap to place a checkmark and allow your phone to play alarms even when it is in Silent mode.
 - Volume button behavior: Allows you to set the desired behavior of the volume buttons when pressed during an alarm.
 - **Puzzle lock**: Allows you to choose the puzzle type to use during the puzzle lock.
 - Vibrate type: Allows you to set the vibrate type.

Set a Timer

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > Clock > Timer tab.
- 2. Tap the **Hour/Minute/Second** sections to set the timer.
- 3. Tap **Settings** to set the following options:
 - Vibration: Set the phone vibrate along with the alert sound. (A blue checkmark appears.)
 - Alert sound: Select the alert sound.
 - Alert volume: Set the alert volume.
- 4. Tap start.
 - Tap Reset to reset the timer and start over.
 - Tap Resume to resume the timer after it's stopped.
 - Tap **____** to stop the timer.

Set World Clock

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Clock > World clock tab.
- 2. Tap to add a city.
- 3. Enter the city name in the search field and tap \bigcirc on the keyboard.

As you enter letters, the cities which starts from the letters are displayed.

Scroll through the cities list and tap the city.

4. You can add cities as many as you want. Repeat steps 2 and 3.

Play Stopwatch

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc Clock > Stopwatch tab.
- 2. Tap to start stopwatch time.
- 3. Tap **stop** to stop the stopwatch.
 - While measuring time, tap to view lap times.

Tasks

You can add your tasks in the Tasks application and synchronize with MS Exchange account.

Synchronize MS Exchange

- 1. Tap (→) > (Settings > Accounts & sync.
- 2. Tap Add account.
- 3. Tap **Microsoft Exchange** to enter your email address and password information.

For further information about adding a Microsoft Exchange account, see Set Up a Corporate Email.

4. Make sure that you place a checkmark on **Tasks**.

Add a Task

- 1. Tap Tasks.
- 2. Tap to add a new task.

- 3. Tap Tasks and select an account to save the current task.
- 4. Enter the corresponding information on each field and tap **Save**.

Calculator

You can use the Calculator application to solve math problems.

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Calculator.
- 2. Enter numbers and arithmetic operators on the screen.
 - Tap to use the QSlide for easy multitasking.
 - Touch and hold the Calculator's display to open a menu where you can copy what you've entered and access other tools.
 - Tap
 to delete the last number or operator you entered. Touch and hold
 to delete numbers repeatedly.
 - Tap ⁶⁰ to clear the screen.
 - Tap i to open an Options menu to view your Calculation history or change panels between Scientific/Basic calculator and Settings.

Bluetooth

Bluetooth is a short-range communications technology that allows you to connect wirelessly to a number of Bluetooth phones, such as headsets and hands-free car kits, Bluetooth-enabled handhelds, computers, printers, and wireless phones. The Bluetooth communication range is usually up to approximately 30 feet.

Turn Bluetooth On and Off

By default, your phone's Bluetooth feature is set to Off. Turning Bluetooth on makes your phone "discoverable" by other in-range Bluetooth phones.

Note: Activating Bluetooth can drain your battery faster and reduce your available usage times. To conserve your phone's battery, turn off Bluetooth when not in use. Always turn off your Bluetooth when you are in locations that prohibit its use.

Turn Bluetooth On

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > Settings > Bluetooth.
- 2. Tap of to activate the feature. When active, appears within the Status Bar.

Turn Bluetooth Off


- 1. Tap -> Settings > Bluetooth.
- 2. Tap ••• to deactivate Bluetooth.

Bluetooth Settings Menu

The Bluetooth settings menu allows you to set up many of the characteristics of your phone's Bluetooth service.

Includes the following:

- Entering or changing the name your phone uses for Bluetooth communication
- Setting your phone's visibility (or "discoverability") for other Bluetooth phones

To access the Bluetooth Settings menu:

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc > \bigcirc Settings > Bluetooth.
- 2. Tap of to activate the feature. When active. (2) appears within the Status Bar.
- 3. Set the following Bluetooth options:

 Tap the check box next to your device name to place a checkmark and make your phone visible to other phones for pairing and communication. Tap again to uncheck and make your phone invisible.

Note: By default, the visibility option is set to 2 minutes. This value appears as a countdown within this field. You can change the visibility timeout. From the Bluetooth settings screen, tap **Visibility timeout**, then tap your preference.

4. Tap **Search for devices** at the bottom of the screen to search for in-range Bluetooth-compatible devices. Make sure the target device is set to be discoverable.

Pairing Bluetooth Devices

The Bluetooth pairing process allows you to establish trusted connections between your phone and another Bluetooth device. When you pair devices, they share a passkey, allowing for fast, secure connections while bypassing the discovery and authentication process.

Pair Your Phone

- 1. Verify your Bluetooth is active.
- 2. From the Bluetooth settings page, tap the check box next to your device name to make your phone visible. Your phone must be visible to successfully pair with an external device. If you want to search a new device, you also need to make that device visible. (See the instruction manual from the manufacturer.)
- 3. Tap Search for devices. (Your phone will display a list of discovered in-range Bluetooth devices.)
- 4. Tap a device from the list to initiate pairing.
- 5. Depending on the device, you might have to tap **Pair** to accept the passkey (if they match), confirm matching passkeys, or enter the passkey or PIN Code.
- 6. Tap **Done** > **OK** if you entered a passkey or PIN code.
- 7. The external device will then have to accept the connection and enter your phone's PIN code.

Note: Due to different specifications and features of other Bluetooth-compatible phones, display and operations may be different, and functions such as transfer or exchange may not be possible with all Bluetooth compatible phones.

Pairing between two Bluetooth phones is a one-time process. Once a pairing has been created, the phones will continue to recognize their partnership and exchange information without having to re-enter a passcode again.

Disconnect a Paired Phone

Disconnecting a paired device breaks the connection between the device and your phone, but retains the pairing. At a later point when you wish to reconnect the device, there is no need to setup the connection information again.

1. Verify your Bluetooth is active.

- 2. From the Bluetooth settings page, tap ^(*) next to the previously paired device (under the PAIRED DEVICE section).
- 3. Tap Unpair.

Note: Disconnections are manually done but often occur automatically if the paired device goes out of range of your phone or if it is powered off.

Send Items via Bluetooth

Depending on your paired phone's settings and capabilities, you may be able to send pictures, videos, Contacts information, or other items using a Bluetooth connection.

Note: Prior to using this feature, Bluetooth must first be enabled, and the recipient's phone must be visible. If no phones are detected, tap **Search for devices** to begin a new search.

Send Contact Information



- 2. Tap an entry to open its details page.
- 3. Tap **:** > Share > Bluetooth.
- 4. Tap a paired phone.
 - The external Bluetooth phone must be visible and communicating for the pairing to be successful.

Send Pictures and/or Videos

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🌄 Gallery.
- 2. Tap an album to open it and view its contents. (The pictures and videos in the album are displayed in chronological order.)
- 3. Tap < , then checkmark pictures and/or videos to share.
- 4. Tap Share > Bluetooth.
- 5. Tap a paired phone.
 - The external Bluetooth phone must be visible and communicating for the pairing to be successful.

Disconnect Bluetooth Connection During an Active Call

You can manually disconnect or unpair from a Bluetooth phone through the Bluetooth settings menu.

During an active call, where the audio is being routed through a connected Bluetooth phone (headset or hands-free connection), tap **Bluetooth** to route the phone's audio through the connected Bluetooth headset (On) or through the speaker (Off).

- When the call is routed to a Bluetooth headset, the current call area is surrounded by a blue box, the Bluetooth button indicates it's on, and the Bluetooth call icon is displayed in the Status Bar.
- When Bluetooth is turned off, the call is routed through either the earpiece or speaker, the call area is surrounded by a green box, the Bluetooth button indicates it's off, and the Call icon is displayed in the Status Bar.

Note: Communication can be toggled between the Bluetooth headset and the phone earpiece or speaker by tapping the Bluetooth button On or Off.

SmartShare

You can use the SmartShare feature easily in the Gallery and Music apps.

Enjoy Content Via a Variety of Devices

You can share your phone's content with a variety of devices.

Tap I to share the content in the Video and Music apps.

• Tap :> SmartShare to share the contents.

Playing / Sending

• Play: You can play the content via a TV, a Bluetooth speaker, etc.

- Beam: You can send the content to the device of Bluetooth and SmartShare Beam supported.
 - SmartShare Beam: Transfers the content fast via Wi-Fi Direct.

Enjoy Content from Nearby Devices

You can enjoy the content from nearby devices (i.e., PC, NAS, Mobile) in the Gallery and Music apps.

Connecting Devices

Connect your device and other devices supported by DLNA in the same Wi-Fi network.

Searching Other Devices

- 1. Tap Nearby devices, then you can see the DLNA-supported devices.
- 2. Connect to the device to view the content.

Using Content from the Cloud

You can use content from the cloud (i.e., Dropbox) in the Gallery and Music apps.

Using the Cloud

Note: The supported features may vary depending on the cloud. Retrieving data may take some time depending on the cloud.

- 1. Select **Cloud** in the Gallery and Music apps.
- 2. Select the cloud what you want to use and log in.
- 3. You can use the content of the cloud after logging in.
- 4. Set the cloud settings to select the app to use the cloud.

microSD Card

A microSD[™] card is an optional accessory that allows you to store images, videos, music, documents, and voice data on your phone.

Insert a microSD Card

To insert a compatible microSD card into your phone.

- 1. Insert your fingernail into the slot located on the lower left of the back cover and lift the cover up gently.
- 2. Carefully insert the microSD card into the slot located above the SIM card slot.
- 3. Re-install the back cover.

Remove a microSD Card

Before removing your phone's microSD card, use the Storage settings menu to unmount the card.

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Storage > Unmount SD card.
- 2. Insert your fingernail into the slot located on the lower left of the back cover and lift the cover up gently.
- 3. Gently pull the microSD card out from the slot.
- 4. Replace the back cover.

Note: You can easily damage the microSD card by improper operation. Please be careful when inserting, removing, or handling the microSD card.

Note: Make sure your battery is fully charged before using the microSD card. Your data may become damaged or unusable if the battery runs out while using the microSD card.

View microSD Card Memory

The Storage settings menu gives you access to your microSD card memory information.

With the microSD card inserted, Tap 2 Settings > Storage. Scroll down to view the total and available memory space.

Format the microSD Card

Formatting a microSD card permanently removes all files stored on the card.

- 1. From home, touch 💷 > 😳 Settings > Storage.
- 2. Scroll down the screen, touch Erase SD card > Erase SD card.
- 3. Touch Erase everything to confirm the process.

Note: The formatting procedure erases all the data on the microSD card, after which the files CANNOT be retrieved. To prevent the loss of important data, please check the contents before you format the card.

Unmount the microSD Card

When you need to remove the microSD card, you must unmount the microSD card first to prevent corrupting the data stored on it or damaging the microSD card.

- 1. From home, touch \bigcirc > \bigcirc Settings > Storage.
- 2. Touch Unmount SD card.
- 3. Remove the microSD card. See Remove a microSD Card.

Transfer User Contents From an Android Phone to Your LG US995

If you want to transfer your user contents (i.e., pictures) from an Android phone to your LG US995, you can perform one of the following steps.

Transfer Via PC or Laptop

You can transfer user contents via a desktop or laptop using a USB cable.

- 1. Connect the Android phone to a computer using a USB cable. Then open the Android phone's Notifications Panel.
- Tap USB connected, then (depending on the phone) tap Media device (MTP) or Send images (PTP).
- 3. On the computer, open **My computer** (or **Windows Explorer**), click the removable drive associated with your phone, then transfer all of the files you want to the computer.
- 4. On the computer, safely stop/remove the USB Phone. For example, for Windows[®] XP, use the Safely Remove Hardware option.
- 5. On the Android phone, open the Notifications Panel, tap **USB connected** > **Charge phone** then disconnect the previous Android Phone from the computer.

- 6. Connect the LG US995 to the computer using the supplied USB cable.
- 7. In the PC connection menu on the LG US995, tap Media device (MTP).
- 8. On the computer, organize the files in the folder, transfer the files into the LG US995 folder, then safely stop/remove the USB Phone.
- 9. On the LG US995, open the Notifications Panel, tap **USB connected** > **Charge phone**, then disconnect it from the computer.

Transfer Via Bluetooth Connection

You can transfer user contents between Bluetooth-enabled phones via Bluetooth connection.

For example, to transfer pictures and videos:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 📴 > 🌄 Gallery.
- 2. Tap S, then choose the file you want to send (or check **Select all** to send all files).
- 3. Tap Share and tap Bluetooth. The Bluetooth menu appears.
- 4. Tap **Search for devices** at the bottom of the screen to find the phone you want to send the file to.

Then tap the phone and pair the devices to start the transfer.

- or -

If the phone that may receive your file was already paired, it would be on the list of PAIRED PHONES. Tap the phone to start the transfer.

Note: Any applications supporting **Share**, such as Music can send files via Bluetooth.

Transfer Via Cloud Storage

You can transfer user contents via the cloud service as Dropbox, Box Cloud, etc. after installing the apps from the Accounts & sync menu, Update Center, or Play Store.

Note: It is recommended that you access your content through the cloud using a Wi-Fi connection to avoid data consumption.

Settings

This section provides an overview of items you can change using your phone's System settings menus.

Wireless Networks

This group of settings lets you control your phone's Wi-Fi settings, Bluetooth, Tethering, VPN, Mobile networks, and more.

Airplane Mode

Airplane Mode (flight mode) allows you to use many of your phone's features, such as games, and music, when you are in an airplane or in any other area where making or receiving calls or data is prohibited. When you set your phone to Airplane Mode, it cannot send or receive any calls or access online data.

Activate Airplane Mode

- 1. Press and hold the **Power/Lock** Button O to display the phone options.
- 2. Tap Turn on Airplane mode.
 - or –
- 1. Tap -> -> Settings.
- 2. Tap the **Airplane mode** switch for the function on. While in Airplane Mode, your phone's Status Bar will display **X**.

Deactivate Airplane Mode

- 1. Press and hold the **Power/Lock** Button O to reveal the phone options.
- 2. Tap Turn off Airplane mode.
 - or –
- 1. Tap → Settings.
- 2. Tap Airplane mode switch ere to turn the function off.

Wi-Fi Settings

Your phone lets you take advantage of Wi-Fi hotspots for high-speed data access using available computer networks. For details on your phone's Wi-Fi features and settings, see Connect Wi-Fi.

Wi-Fi Calling Settings

You can make and receive calls via a Wi-Fi network. Wi-Fi Calling is an excellent solution for coverage issues in and around the home or wherever cellular coverage is limited. When Wi-Fi Calling is enabled, all incoming and outgoing calls will be made via your Wi-Fi network. Minutes used while connected to the Wi-Fi network count against your available rate plan minutes, see Wi-Fi Calling.

Bluetooth Settings

Your phone's Bluetooth capabilities let you use wireless headsets, send and receive pictures and files, and more. For details on your phone's Bluetooth settings, see Bluetooth Settings Menu.

Mobile Data

You can check the current data usage, set to enable/disable mobile data, or set the mobile data limit.

Turn Mobile Data On or Off

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🏵 Settings > Mobile data.
- 2. Tap the **Mobile data** switch of to turn it on.
 - or —

Tap the Mobile data switch er ev to turn it off.

Call Settings

Your phone's Call settings menu lets you configure International call options and TTY mode.

Voicemail Settings

You can configure your voicemail settings. For details on Voicemail settings, see Configure Visual Voicemail Settings.

Smart Dialing

Activate to make a call to the U.S. from abroad without entering the national code. Touch and hold 0 or tap the contact.

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the Smart dialing checkbox to enable/disable the feature.

North American Dialing

Replace + code as needed for outgoing calls. The Smart dialing option must be disabled.

- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the **North American dialing** checkbox to enable/disable the feature.

International Dialing

Set international dialing code for outgoing calls. The Smart dialing and North America dialing options must be disabled.

- 1. Tap -> · · · Settings > Call > International dialing.
- 2. Enter the international dialing code and tap **OK**.

Incoming Voice Call Pop-up

Activate to display the incoming call pop-up when using an application.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🤨 Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the **Incoming voice call pop-up** checkbox to enable/disable the feature.

Call Reject

You can set call rejection and manage the reject list.

- 1. Tap -> Settings > Call > Call reject.
- 2. Tap Call reject mode and set an option.
- 3. Tap Reject calls from to set up the rejection list.

Decline with Message

You can send out a simple text message when you want to ignore an incoming call and respond to the caller with a text instead. You can add or edit quick messages.

- 1. Tap -> > Settings > Call > Decline with message.
- 2. Tap a quick message to edit it.

– or –

Tap to add a new quick message.

3. Enter a message and tap **Save**.

Privacy Keeper

You can set whether the phone to display the caller's information or not when you receive a call.

- 1. Tap -> > Settings > Call > Privacy keeper.
- 2. Tap Hide all info, Show number only, or Show caller info.

Auto Answer

Tap to set auto answer with handsfree.

- 1. Tap -> • Settings > Call > Auto answer.
- 2. Tap Off, 1 sec, 3 sec or 5 sec.

TTY Mode

A TTY (also known as a TDD or Text Telephone) is a telecommunications phone that allows people who are deaf, hard of hearing, or who have speech or language disabilities, to communicate by telephone. Your phone is compatible with select TTY phones. Please check with the manufacturer of your TTY phone to ensure that it is compatible with digital cell phones. Your phone and TTY phone will connect via a special cable that plugs into your phone's headset jack. If this cable was not provided with your TTY phone, contact your TTY phone manufacturer to purchase the connector cable.

Turn TTY Mode On or Off

- 1. Tap -> Settings > Call > TTY mode.
- 2. Tap **TTY Off** to turn TTY mode off or tap **TTY Full, TTY HCO** or **TTY VCO**.

To access the state Telecommunications Relay Service (TRS) for assistance with TTY calls:

■ Dial 7 ^{ress} 1 ∞ 1 ∞ to reach an operator.

For additional information about USC Relay Services and TTY compatibility, call USC Relay Customer Service at **800-676-3777** or visit www.USCrelay.com.

Note: In TTY Mode, your phone will display the TTY access icon. When enabled, TTY mode may impair the audio quality of non-TTY phones connected to the headset jack.

WARNING: 9-1-1 Emergency Calling USC recommends that TTY users make emergency calls by other means, including Telecommunications Relay Services (TRS), analog cellular, and landline communications. Wireless TTY calls to 9-1-1 may be corrupted when received by public safety answering points (PSAPs), rendering some communications unintelligible. The problem encountered appears related to software used by PSAPs. This matter has been brought to the attention of the FCC, and the wireless industry and the PSAP community are currently working to resolve this.

Hearing Aids

Tap to place the checkmark to turn on hearing aid compatibility.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🕫 Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the **Hearing aids** checkbox to enable/disable the feature.

Proximity Sensor

You can access the proximity sensor through the Call Settings menu.

When receiving and making calls, this sensor automatically turns the backlight off and locks the touch keypad by sensing when the phone is near your ear. This extends battery life and prevents the touch keypad from activating unintentionally during calls.

To enable the Proximity Sensor:

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the **Proximity Sensor** checkbox to enable it. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

Voice Enhancement

You can set the phone to enhance voice clarity in noisy environments so you can hear more clearly.

To set noise reduction:

- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the Voice enhancement checkbox to turn it on. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

Save Unknown Numbers

You can set the phone to save the phone numbers not saved in Contacts yet.

To save unknown numbers:

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Call.
- 2. Tap the Save unknown numbers checkbox to turn it on. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

Power Key Ends Call

You can set the phone to end calls with **Power/Lock** Button O, in addition to call screen.

To set to end calls with Power button:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > Call.
- 2. Tap Power key ends call to enable it. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

Roaming Settings

With your phone and global roaming service from USC WorldwideSM Wireless Service, you can make phone calls and use wireless data services around the globe on compatible CDMA and GSM/UMTS networks.

Roaming Icon

Your display screen always lets you know when you're off the Nationwide USC Network.

Anytime you are roaming, the phone displays the CDMA roaming icon (Δ) or the GSM roaming icon (1). If you are roaming on a digital system, you will see the roaming icon along with the text – **Digital Roam** –.

Roam on Other Digital Networks

When you're roaming on digital networks, your call quality and security will be similar to the quality you receive when making calls on the Nationwide USC Network. However, you may not be able to access certain features, such as data services, depending on the available network.

Note: If you're on a call when you leave the Nationwide USC Network, your call will be dropped. If your call is dropped in an area where you think USC service is available, turn your phone off and on again to reconnect to the network.

Check for Voicemail Messages While Roaming

When you are roaming off the Nationwide USC Network, you may not receive a notification of new voicemail messages on your phone. Callers can still leave messages, but you will need to periodically check your voicemail for new messages if you are in a roaming service area for an extended period of time.

- 1. Dial your 10-digit wireless phone number.
- 2. When you hear your voicemail greeting, tap 4.
- 3. Enter your passcode at the prompt and follow the voice prompts.

When you return to the Nationwide USC Network, voicemail notification will resume as normal.

Roaming Mode

Your phone allows you to control your roaming capabilities. By using the Roaming menu option, you can determine which signals your phone accepts.

Choose from two different settings on your dual-band phone to control your roaming experience.

- 2. Tap **Roaming mode** to change the CDMA roaming mode.
 - Home only to access only the home area mobile network, which is the Nationwide USC Network. This option also prevents roaming on other networks.
 - **Automatic** to seek service off the Nationwide USC Network. When USC service is unavailable, the phone searches for an alternate system.
- 3. Tap each Domestic roaming option and International roaming option to place a checkmark and connect to voice and data service while roaming.

Note: With Data roaming unchecked, you can still transmit data with a Wi-Fi connection. See Connect Wi-Fi.

Roaming Guard

Roaming guard makes it easy to manage your roaming by requiring confirmation before placing or answering a roaming call.

To turn Call Guard on or off:

- 1. Tap -> Settings > Roaming > Roaming guard.
- 2. Tap each roaming guard option activate or deactivate this function. When active, an extra key press is required for dialing when in a roaming area.

Note: Call Guard is turned on by default on your phone. Voice dialing and speed dialing are not available when you are roaming with Call Guard enabled.

To place roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > .
- 2. Enter 1 + area code + the seven-digit number and tap

To answer incoming roaming calls with Call Guard on:

- 1. Swipe Sin any direction. A message will be displayed notifying you that roaming charges will apply.
- 2. Tap **Yes**.

Data Roam Guard

Depending on service availability and roaming agreements, your phone may be able to access data services while roaming on certain digital systems. You can set your phone to alert you when you are roaming off the Nationwide USC Network and try to use data services such as messaging.

Note: Data Roam Guard is turned on by default on your phone.

To set your Data Roam Guard notification:

- 1. Tap \bigcirc > \bigcirc Settings > Roaming > Roaming guard.
- 2. Tap the **Domestic data roaming**, **International data roaming** checkboxes or both to place a checkmark and activate the function.

To use data services when Data Roam Guard is active:

 When a pop-up notification appears informing you that data roam charges may apply, tap Connect or Always Connect to connect.

Share & Connect

Your phone lets you use the wireless technology that enables data transmission between devices using NFC, Wi-Fi, etc.

NFC Settings

NFC (Near Field Communication) is a wireless technology that enables data transmission between two objects when they are brought within a few inches of each other. When you enable NFC on your phone, it can exchange data with other NFC-enabled devices or read information from smart tags embedded in posters, stickers, and other products. From the NFC settings menu, you can manage direct sharing and pairing.

Turn On NFC

- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Share & connect.
- 2. Tap the **NFC** switch of to activate.

Note: When NFC is turned on, you can use the Tap & pay feature to pay for items just by touching your phone to a reader at a register. If your device doesn't have a default app, you can browse Google Play for other payment apps.

Android Beam

When this feature is turned on, you can beam app content to another NFC-capable device by holding the devices close together.

For example, you can beam Browser pages, YouTube videos, contacts, and more. Just bring the devices together (typically back to back) and then touch your screen. The app determines what gets beamed.

Turn On Android Beam

- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Share & connect.
- 2. Tap the **Android Beam** switch (IFC turns on automatically).

SmartShare Beam

Turn on to receive multimedia contents via SmartShare Beam from LG phones or tablets.

Turn On SmartShare Beam

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Share & connect.
- 2. Tap the **SmartShare Beam** and tap the **SmartShare Beam** switch () to activate the feature.
- 3. Turn on the SmartShare Beam feature on other LG phones or tablets supporting SmartShare Beam to send/receive photos, musics, videos and documents.

Media Server

Share media content with nearby devices via DLNA.

1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 😌 Settings > Share & connect.

2. Tap **Media sever** and checkmark the **Content sharing** checkbox to allow nearby devices to access your content.

Miracast

You can mirror phone screen and sound onto LG Miracast dongle or TV wirelessly.

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > Share & connect > Miracast.
- 2. Tap the **Miracast** switch of to turn on this feature.
- 3. Turn on the Miracast feature on your TV or connect to a LG Miracast dongle.

Tips: To start the Miracast feature quickly, tap the Miracast icon **Panel** in the Notifications Panel. While mirroring, Wi-Fi Hotspot cannot be used simultaneously.

More Settings

You can change more settings in the Wireless Networks category.

USB Tethering

You can share your phone's data connection with a computer by turning on USB tethering.

To share your phone's data connection via USB cable:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🏵 Settings > More....
- 2. Connect your phone to your computer with a USB cable.
- 3. Tap the **USB tethering** switch **or** to activate it. Then tap **OK** to confirm.

Note: You cannot access your phone's internal memory on your computer when using USB tethering.

Wi-Fi Hotspot

You can share your phone's data connection with up to eight phones at once by turning your phone into a Wi-Fi hotspot.

To share your phone's data connection as a portable Wi-Fi hotspot:

- 1. Tap -> Settings > More... > Wi-Fi hotspot.
- 2. Tap the **Wi-Fi hotspot** switch to activate it. After a moment, the phone starts broadcasting its Wi-Fi network name (SSID), so you can connect it with up to eight (8) computers or other phones.
- 3. To change the network name (SSID) or secure its Wi-Fi network, tap Set up Wi-Fi hotspot.
- 4. In the dialog box, configure the following options.

- Tap the Wi-Fi name (SSID) field and enter a new network SSID (name) that other computers see when scanning for Wi-Fi networks.
- To secure the Wi-Fi network, tap the Security menu and select WPA2 PSK (Wi-Fi Protected Access 2 with a Preshared Key). When a password field is added to the dialog box, enter a password. You will need to enter this password when you connect the phone's hotspot with a computer or other phone.
- Tap the SSID Visibility field to decide if you want your hotspot to be displayed to other devices.
- To limit the number of phones to share your phone's data connection, tap Max users and select the number of the phones to limit.
- 5. Tap **Save**.

Bluetooth Tethering

This feature allows you to connect other devices to your phone via Bluetooth and share its internet connection.

Turn on Bluetooth Tethering

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings > More....
- 2. Tap the **Bluetooth tethering** switch ^{(off) on} to activate.

Help

Displays help information for USB tethering, Wi-Fi hotspot, and Bluetooth tethering.

Mobile Networks Settings

You can choose whether to turn on or off the LTE radio band. You can also set whether to enable or disable data access on your phone.

Enable/Disable Data Access

- 1. Tap -> Settings > More... > Mobile networks.
- 2. Tap the **Data enabled** checkbox to enable/disable the feature.

4G Settings

Allows you to view your 4G network provider and IP address.

- 1. Tap -> > Settings > More... > Mobile networks.
- 2. Tap the **4G settings** to check **Network provider** and **IP address**.

Network Mode

Allows you to choose your preferred network mode.

- 1. Tap -> Settings > More... > Mobile networks > Network mode.
- 2. Choose from the following options:
 - Tap **Global** to turn on the Global radio band.
 - Tap LTE/CDMA to turn on the LTE/CDMA radio band.
 - Tap **CDMA** to turn on the CDMA radio band.
 - Tap **GSM/UMTS** to turn on the GSM/UMTS radio band.

Connections Optimizer

Your phone can be set to automatically connect you to Wi-Fi networks on your device's remembered list and, if applicable, to the USC 4G Network.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 🕮 > 🏵 Settings > More....
- 2. Tap Mobile networks > Connections Optimizer.
- 3. Read the message and tap **I agree**.

VPN Settings

From your phone, you can add, set up, and manage virtual private networks (VPNs) that allow you to connect and access resources inside a secured local network, such as your corporate network. For details on your phone's VPN settings, see Virtual Private Networks (VPN).

Device Settings

This group of settings lets you configure your phone's sound, display, gestures, power saver and apps.

Sound Settings

In the Sound settings menu, you can configure call and notification ringtones, audio volumes, as well as some related settings.

Sound Profile

- 1. Tap -> -> Settings.
- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap Sound > Sound profile.
- 3. Tap one of the three options.

To switch to silent mode:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🐯 Settings.
- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Sound** > **Sound profile**.
- 3. Tap Silent.

– or –

Press the down Volume Button until you see 📈 on the screen.

Volumes

Adjust your phone's volume settings to suit your needs and your environment.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 😂 Settings.
- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Sound** > **Volumes**.
- 3. Adjust each volume level.
 - **Ringtone**: Changes the volume of your call ringtones (if applicable).
 - Notification sound: Allows you to set this volume level. This is the volume of the ringtone when you receive a notification.
 - Touch feedback & system: Changes the volume for feedback taps and system notifications.
 - Music, video, games & other media: Changes the volume of your music, videos and other media.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

Tip: You can adjust the ringer volume on the Home screen or Applications screen, or almost any screen by using the Volume Buttons on the back of your phone. In other applications such as Music, YouTube, spoken directions, and other audio, the Volume Buttons control the volume of the application.

The phone ringtones alert you of incoming calls.

To select a ringtone for voice calls:

Vibrate when tapping the Home touch buttons and during other UI interactions.

To read out the incoming call and the message event automatically.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Sound** > **Message/call voice notifications**.
- 3. Tap for to turn the feature on and set the desired options.

Display Settings

Adjusting your phone's display settings not only helps you see what you want, it can also help increase battery life.

Brightness

Adjust your screen's contrast (brightness) to suit your surroundings.

Note: Long backlight settings reduce the battery's talk and standby times. For the best battery performance, use the shortest convenient timeout.

Screen-off Effect

Select the screen-off effect when locking and turning off the screen.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Display** > **Screen-off effect**.
- 3. Tap the desired option.
- 4. Tap **OK**.

Note: To preview the screen-off effect, tap Preview.

Auto-Rotate Screen

Choose whether the phone automatically switches the orientation of the screen as you turn it sideways or even upside down.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Display**.

3. Tap the **Auto-rotate screen** checkbox to automatically rotate the screen (a blue checkmark will appear).

To disable the auto-rotate feature, tap the **Auto-rotate screen** checkbox again so that the checkmark is removed.

Note: Some applications on your phone do not support the Auto-rotate feature.

Daydream

Screensaver will be on when the phone is sleeping while docked and/or charging.

Home Touch Buttons

Configure the Home touch button options.

To select home touch buttons' combination:

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Display** > **Home touch buttons** > **Button combination**.
- 3. Drag the icons to rearrange the Home touch buttons.

To select home touch buttons' color:

- 3. Tap the desired color theme from the list.

To turn on transparent background:

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🏵 Settings.

- 3. Tap the Transparent background checkbox. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

To select which apps hide the home touch buttons:

- 3. Tap the checkbox next to the apps you want to hide the home touch buttons (A blue checkmark will appear)

Notification LED

Configures the notification flash options.

- 3. To activate LED light for notification, tap the **Notification LED** switch (PC) and .
- 4. Tap each item to receive a notification with an LED light flash.

Home Screen

Configure your phone's home screen settings.

Select Home

Choose the desired Home theme.

- 3. Choose **Home** (standard Android layout) or **EasyHome** (simplified version for users less familiar with Android navigation).

Allows you to view help tips for the Home screen.

Lock Screen

Lock screen menu lets you configure screen lock options and when to be locked.

Select Screen Lock

You can increase your phone's security by setting up a face unlock, knock-code, pattern, PIN, or Password. When these features are enabled, you must show your face, draw the correct unlock pattern, enter the PIN, or enter the password on the screen to unlock and regain access to the phone.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap Lock screen > Select screen lock.
- 3. Select the desired screen lock option from the following options.
 - None: No lock screen.
 - **Swipe**: Swipe any part of the screen to unlock the screen.
 - **Face Unlock**: Unlocks the screen through facial recognition. Follow the prompts. You are asked to set a Pattern and/or PIN as a backup.
 - Knock Code: The Knock Code feature allows you to create your own unlock code using a combination of knocks on the screen. You can access the Home screen directly when the screen is off by tapping the same sequence on the screen.
 - Pattern: Opens a set of screens that guide you through drawing a screen unlock pattern. It's recommended that you enter backup PIN as well in case that you might lost the pattern. Then, you can set vibrate on touch or whether to make the pattern visible.
 - **PIN**: Enter a numeric PIN to unlock screen.

• **Password**: Enter a password to unlock screen.

From then on, any time you wish to turn the phone on or unlock the screen, you must draw your unlock pattern or enter the PIN or password to unlock the screen.

Note: You have five opportunities to enter your unlock Pattern, PIN or Password. If you've entered wrong information five times in a row, you must wait 30 seconds before you can attempt again.

Note: When using Knock Code, failing to enter the correct sequence 5 times will display an outlined grid box to allow you precise entry. If you fail 1 more time, the backup PIN or Google account sign-in is required.

- If you've set up a Google Account on the phone, tap the **Forgot pattern?** button. You will be able to unlock the phone with your Google Account username and password or entering you Backup PIN.
- If you haven't created a Google Account on the phone, you must perform a factory reset.

CAUTION! If you perform a factory reset, all user applications and user data will be deleted. Please remember to back up any important data before performing a factory reset.

- When you can't recall your screen lock:
- 1. Turn the phone off.
- Press and hold the following keys at the same time: Volume Up Button + Power/Lock
 Button on the back of the phone.
- 3. Release the **Power/Lock Button** only when the LG logo is displayed, then immediately press and hold the **Power/Lock Button** again.

- 4. Select the desired wallpaper and tap Yes or Set wallpaper.

Widgets

Show widgets on the lock screen.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Lock screen**.
- 3. Tap the Widgets checkbox to show widgets.(A blue checkmark will appear)

Missed Calls & New Messages

Show notifications of missed calls and new messages on the Lock screen.

- 1. Tap 🗁 > 😇 > 🐯 Settings.
- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap Lock Screen.
- 3. Tap the **Missed calls & new messages** checkbox to turn on the feature.(A blue checkmark will appear.)

Shortcuts

Customize clocks and shortcuts on the lock screen.

- 1. Tap → Settings.
- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Lock screen** > **Shortcuts**.
- 3. Tap each shortcut key to select the desired shortcut key.
- 4. After personalizing, tap **Save**.

Weather Animation

Show weather animation effect on the lock screen based on auto-updated weather data.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Lock screen**.
- 3. Tap the **Weather animation** checkbox to show weather animation. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

Contact Info for Lost Phone

Select whether to display the owner information on the lock screen and customize the owner information.

- 3. Tap the **Contact info for lost phone** checkbox to show owner information on the lock screen. (A blue checkmark will appear.)

Lock Timer

Choose the amount of time before the screen automatically locks after the screen has timed-out.

- 2. From the DEVICE section, tap **Lock screen** > **Lock timer**.
- 3. Tap the desired time.

Power Button Instantly Locks

To prevent possible interference with aircraft systems, the U.S. Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) regulations require you to have permission from a crew member to use your phone while the plane is on the ground. To prevent any risk of interference, FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while the plane is in the air.

Turning Off Your Phone in Dangerous Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone off when in a blasting area or in other areas with signs indicating two-way radios should be turned off. Construction crews often use remote-control RF devices to set off explosives. Turn your phone off when you're in any area that has a potentially explosive atmosphere. Although it's rare, your phone and accessories could generate sparks. Sparks can cause an explosion or fire, resulting in bodily injury or even death. These areas are often, but not always, clearly marked. They include:

- Fueling areas such as gas stations.
- Below deck on boats.
- Fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities.
- Areas where the air contains chemicals or particles such as grain, dust, or metal powders.
- Any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle's engine.

Note: Never transport or store flammable gas, flammable liquids, or explosives in the compartment of your vehicle that contains your phone or accessories.

Restricting Children's Access to Your Phone

Your phone is not a toy. Do not allow children to play with it as they could hurt themselves and others, damage the phone or make calls that increase your USC invoice.

Using Your Phone With a Hearing Aid Device

While some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate. The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless phones, to assist hearing device users to find phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box. The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully. Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs.

M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. T4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless phone rating values are then added together. A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for best use. In the above example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless phone meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the

two values equal M5. This should provide the hearing aid user with "normal usage" while using their

hearing aid with the particular wireless phone. "Normal usage" in this context is defined as a signal quality that's acceptable for normal operation. The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules. The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard. To ensure that the Hearing Aid Compatibility rating for your phone is maintained, secondary transmitters such as Bluetooth and WLAN components must be disabled during a call. Note: HAC statement This phone has been tested and rated for use with hearing aids for some of the wireless technologies that it uses. However, there may be some newer wireless technologies used in this phone that have not been tested yet for use with hearing aids. USC further suggests you experiment with multiple phones (even those not labeled M3/T3 or M4/T4) while in the store to find the one that works best with your hearing aid device. Should you experience interference or find the quality of service unsatisfactory after purchasing your phone, promptly return it to the store within 14 days of purchase. (A restocking fee may be applied to exchanges. Visit USC.com/returns for details.) More information about hearing aid compatibility may be found at: fcc.gov, fda.gov, and accesswireless.org.

Getting the Best Hearing Device Experience With Your Phone

To further minimize interference:

- Set the phone's display and keypad backlight settings to ensure the minimum time interval:
- 1. Tap -> : Settings > Display > Screen timeout.
- 2. Tap the minimum time interval setting.
- Position the phone so the internal antenna is farthest from your hearing aid.
- Move the phone around to find the point with least interference.

When you're talking on a cell phone, it's recommended that you turn the BT (Bluetooth) or WLAN mode off for HAC.

Caring for the Battery Protecting Your Battery

The guidelines listed below help you get the most out of your battery's performance.

- Recently there have been some public reports of wireless phone batteries overheating, catching fire, or exploding. It appears that many, if not all, of these reports involve counterfeit or inexpensive, aftermarket-brand batteries with unknown or questionable manufacturing standards. USC is not aware of similar problems with USC phones resulting from the proper use of batteries and accessories approved by USC or the manufacturer of your phone. Use only USCapproved or manufacturer-approved batteries and accessories found at USC Stores or through your phone's manufacturer, or call 1-866-866-7509 to order. They're also available at USC.com/accessories. Buying the right batteries and accessories is the best way to ensure they're genuine and safe.
- In order to avoid damage, charge the battery only in temperatures that range from 32° F to 113° F (0° C to 45° C).
- Don't use the battery charger in direct sunlight or in high humidity areas, such as the bathroom.
- Never dispose of the battery by incineration.
- Keep the metal contacts on top of the battery clean.
- Don't attempt to disassemble or short-circuit the battery.
- The battery may need recharging if it has not been used for a long period of time.
- It's best to replace the battery when it no longer provides acceptable performance. It can be recharged hundreds of times before it needs replacing.
- Don't store the battery in high temperature areas for long periods of time. It's best to follow these storage rules:
 - Less than one month:
 - -4° F to 140° F (-20° C to 60° C)
 - More than one month:
 - -4° F to 113° F (-20° C to 45° C)
- Do not disassemble or open crush, bend or deform, puncture or shred.
- Do not modify or remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, immerse or expose to water or other liquids, expose to fire, explosion or other hazard.
- Only use the battery for the system for which it is specified.
- Only use the battery with a charging system that has been qualified with the system per CTIA Certification Requirements for Battery System Compliance to IEEE1725. Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.

- Do not short circuit a battery or allow metallic conductive objects to contact battery terminals.
- Replace the battery only with another battery that has been qualified with the system per this standard, IEEE-Std-1725. Use of an unqualified battery may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage or other hazard.
- Only authorized service providers shall replace battery(If the battery is non-user replaceable).
- Promptly dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations.
- Battery usage by children should be supervised.
- Avoid dropping the phone or battery. If the phone or battery is dropped, especially on a hard surface, and the user suspects damage, take it to a service center for inspection.
- Improper battery use may result in a fire, explosion or other hazard.

Always unplug the charger from the wall socket after the phone is fully changed to save unnecessary power consumption of the charger.

Your LG US995 uses a wireless charger based on the WPC Qi standard. Only use a manufacturerapproved wireless charger (sold separately).

Disposal of Lithium Ion (Li-Ion) Batteries

Do not handle a damaged or leaking Li-Ion battery as you can be burned.

Radio Frequency (RF) Energy Understanding How Your Phone Operates

Your phone is basically a radio transmitter and receiver. When it's turned on, it receives and transmits radio frequency (RF) signals. When you use your phone, the system handling your call controls the power level. This power can range from 0.006 watt to 0.2 watt in digital mode.

Knowing Radio Frequency Safety

The design of your phone complies with updated NCRP standards described below.

In 1991–92, the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE) and the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) joined in updating ANSI's 1982 standard for safety levels with respect to human exposure to RF signals. More than 120 scientists, engineers and physicians from universities, government health agencies and industries developed this updated standard after reviewing the available body of research. In 1993, the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted this updated

standard in a regulation. In August 1996, the FCC adopted hybrid standard consisting of the existing ANSI/IEEE standard and the guidelines published by the National Council of Radiation Protection and Measurements (NCRP).

Body-Worn Operation

This device was tested for typical body-worn operations with the back of the phone kept **0.39 inches (1cm)** between the user's body and the back of the phone. To comply with FCC RF exposure requirements, a minimum separation distance of **0.39 inches (1cm)** must be maintained between the user's body and the back of the phone. Any alt-clips, holsters, and similar accessories containing metallic components may not be used. Body-worn accessories that cannot maintain **0.39 inches (1cm)** separation distance between the user's body and the back of the phone, and have not been tested for typical body-worn operations may not comply with FCC RF exposure limits and should be avoided.

SAR (Specific Absorption Rate)

This model phone meets the Government's requirements for exposure to radio waves. Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radiofrequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Counsel on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy.

The exposure limit for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR is a measure of the rate of absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements. Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. Because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels to use only the power required to reach the network, in general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government adopted requirement for safe exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model.

While there may be differences between SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure. The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of http://www.fcc.gov/oet/ea/fccid/after searching on FCC ID ZNFUS995.

To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone. Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone. We will provide you notice of material changes—and we may provide you notice of non-material changes—in a manner consistent with this Agreement (see –Providing Notice To Each Other Under The Agreement" section). If a change we make to the Agreement is material and has a material adverse effect on Services under your Term Commitment, you may terminate each line of Service materially adversely affected without incurring an Early Termination Fee only if: (a) you call us within 30 days after the effective date of the change; (b) you specifically advise us that you wish to cancel Services because of a material change to the Agreement that we have made; and (c) we fail to negate the change after you notify us of your objection to it. If you do not notify us and cancel Service within 30 days of the change, an Early Termination Fee will apply if you terminate Services before the end of any applicable Term Commitment.

Our Right To Suspend Or Terminate Services

We can, without notice, suspend or terminate any Service at any time for any reason. For example, we can suspend or terminate any Service for the following: (a) late payment; (b) exceeding an Account Spending Limit; (c) harassing/ threatening/abusing/offending our employees or agents; (d) providing false

or inaccurate information; (e) interfering with our operations; (f) using/suspicion of using Services in any manner restricted by or inconsistent with the Agreement and Policies; (g) breaching, failing to follow, or abusing the Agreement or Policies; (h) providing false, inaccurate, dated, or unverifiable identification or credit information or becoming insolvent or bankrupt; (i) modifying a Device from its manufacturer specifications (for example, rooting the device); (j) failing to use our Services for an extended period of time; (k) failing to maintain an active Device in connection with our Services; or (I) if we believe the action protects our interests, any customer's interests, or our networks.

Your Right To Change Services & When Changes Are Effective

The account holder can typically change Services upon request. In some instances, changes may be conditioned on payment of an Early Termination Fee or certain other charges, or they may require a new Term Commitment. Changes to Services are usually effective at the start of the next full invoicing cycle. If the changes take place sooner, your invoice may reflect pro-rated charges for your old and new Services. We may, but are not obligated to, provide you the opportunity to authorize someone else to make changes to your Services, which will include the authority to make changes that will extend your Term Commitment. You are responsible for any changes to your Services made by a person you authorize, and those changes will be treated as modifications to this Agreement.

Your Right To Terminate Services

You can terminate Services at any time by calling us and requesting that we deactivate all Services. In addition, if you return or provide your Device to USC and fail to either deactivate service on the Device or activate another Device in connection with your Service, we reserve the right to terminate your Service, and if you are subject to a Term Commitment, you may be charged all or part of an Early Termination Fee. You are responsible for all charges billed or incurred prior to deactivation. If Services are terminated before the end of your invoicing cycle, we won't prorate charges to the date of termination and you won't receive a credit or refund for any unused Services. **Except as provided above, if you are subject to an Early Termination Fee, you must also pay the invoiced Early Termination Fee for each line of Service that you terminate early.**

Credit Checks & Credit Information

We agree to provide you Services on the condition that you have and maintain satisfactory credit according to our standards and policies. You agree to provide information that we may request or complete any applications that we may provide you to facilitate our review. We rely on the credit information you furnish, credit bureau reports or other data available from commercial credit reference services, and other information (such as payment history with us) to determine whether to provide or continue to provide you Services. The Services we offer you can vary based on your credit history. We may at any time, based on your credit history, withdraw or change Services or place limits or conditions on the use of our Services. You agree to provide us updated credit information upon request. We may provide your payment history and other account billing/ charge information to any credit reporting agency or industry clearinghouse.

Account Spending Limits ("ASL")

An ASL is a temporary or permanent limit (typically based on credit history, payment history, or to prevent fraud) that we place on the amount of unpaid charges you can accumulate on your account, regardless of when payment on those charges is due. We reserve the right to determine which charges count toward an ASL. If you have an ASL, we may suspend your Services without prior notice if your account balance

reaches the ASL, even if your account is not past due. We may impose or increase an ASL at any time with notice. An ASL is for our benefit only and should not be relied on by you to manage usage.

Deposits & Returning Deposits

We may at any time require a deposit as a guarantee of payment for you to establish or maintain Service ("Deposit"). By providing us a Deposit, you grant us a security interest for all current or future amounts owed to us. We may change the Deposit at any time with notice. You can't use a Deposit to make or delay payments. The Deposit, the length of time we hold the Deposit, and changes to the Deposit are determined based on your credit history, payment history, and other factors. Unless prohibited by law, we may mix Deposits with our other funds and it won't earn interest, and we reserve the right to return the Deposit as a credit on your invoice at anytime. If your Services are terminated for any reason, we may keep and apply your Deposit to any outstanding charges. We'll send any remaining portion of the Deposit to your last known address within 90 days after your final invoice—if it is returned to us, we will forward it on to the appropriate state authorities to the extent required by law.

Restrictions On Using Services

You can't use our Services: (a) in a way that could cause damage or adversely affect any of our other customers or our reputation, networks, property, or Services; or (b) in any way prohibited by the terms of our Services, the Agreement, or our Policies. You cannot in any manner resell the Services to another party. For additional restrictions on the use of our Services, see our Acceptable Use Policy and Visitors Agreement, which are available on our website, and the detailed plan or other information on Services that we provide or refer you to during the sales transaction.

Your Device, Number & Email Address

We don't manufacture any Device that we might sell to you or that is associated with our Services, and we aren't responsible for any defects, acts, or omissions of the manufacturer. **The only warranties on your Device are the limited warranties given to you by the manufacturer directly or that we pass through. Device performance may vary based on device specifications (for example, a device's software, memory, and storage), and device performance may impact access to all of our Services.** Your Device is designed to be activated on our networks and in other coverage areas that we may make available to you. As programmed, it will not accept wireless service from another carrier. Except for any legal right you may have to port/ transfer your phone number to another carrier, you have no—and cannot gain any (for example, through publication, use, etc.)—proprietary, ownership, or other rights to any phone number, identification number, email address, or other identifier that we assign to you, your Device, or your account. We'll notify you if we decide to change or reassign them. Your CDMA USC PCS phone may have software programming lock that protects certain of the handset's operating parameters against unauthorized reprogramming. If your device has a software programming lock, and you wish to obtain the software program lock code for your CDMA USC PCS phone, please visit USC.com or call 1-888-211-4727 for information and eligibility requirements.

Porting/Transferring Phone Numbers

We don't guarantee that number transfers to or from us will be successful. If you authorize another carrier to transfer a number away from us, then that is considered a request by you to us to terminate all of the Services associated with that number. You're responsible for all charges billed or incurred prior to deactivation and for any applicable Early Termination Fees.

Coverage; Where Your Device Will Work; Service Speeds

Our coverage maps are available at our authorized retail locations and on USC.com. The specific network coverage you get will depend on the radio transmissions your Device can pick up and Services you've chosen. Our coverage maps provide high level estimates of our coverage areas when using Services outdoors under optimal conditions. Coverage isn't available everywhere. Coverage and Service speeds are not guaranteed. Coverage is subject to change without notice. Service speeds may depend on the Service purchased. Actual speeds will vary. Estimating wireless coverage, signal strength, and Service speed is not an exact science. There are gaps in coverage within our estimated coverage areas that-along with other factors both within and beyond our control (for example, network problems, network or Internet congestion, software, signal strength, your Device, structures, buildings, weather, geography, topography, server speeds of the websites you access, actions of third parties, etc.)-may result in dropped and blocked connections, slower Service speeds, or otherwise impact the quality of Service. Services that rely on location information, such as E911 and GPS navigation, depend on your Device's ability to acquire satellite signals (typically not available indoors) and network coverage. While your Device is receiving a software update, you may be unable to use your Device in any manner until the software update is complete.

Roaming

The term "roaming" typically refers to coverage on another carrier's network that we may make available to you based on our agreements with other carriers. These agreements may change from time to time, and roaming coverage is subject to change without notice. Your ability to receive roaming coverage depends on the radio transmissions your Device can pick up and the availability of roaming coverage. We make no guarantee that roaming coverage will be available. Roaming coverage may exist both within and outside our network coverage areas. Your Device will generally indicate when you're roaming. Depending on your Services, separate charges or limits on the amount of minutes used while roaming may apply. Certain Services may not be available or work the same when roaming (for example, data Services, voicemail, call waiting, etc.). For information on whether roaming applies, see your service plan details.

About Data Services & Content

Our data Services and your Device may allow you to access the Internet, text, pictures, video, games, graphics, music, email, applications, sound, and other materials ("Data Content") or send Data Content elsewhere. Some Data Content is available from us or our vendors, while other Data Content can be accessed from others (for example, third party websites, games, ringers, applications, etc.). We make absolutely no guarantees about the Data Content that you access on your Device. Data Content may be: (1) unsuitable for children/minors; (2) unreliable or inaccurate; or (3) offensive, indecent, or objectionable. You're solely responsible for evaluating the Data Content accessed by you or anyone through your Services. We strongly recommend that you monitor data usage by children/minors. Data Content from third parties may also harm your Device or its software. We are not responsible for any Data Content. We are not responsible for any damage caused by any Data Content that you access through your Services, that you load on your Device, or that you request that our representatives access or load on your Device. To protect our networks and Services or for other reasons, we may place restrictions on accessing certain Data Content (such as certain websites, applications, etc.); impose separate charges; limit throughput or the amount of data that you can transfer; or otherwise limit or terminate Services. If we provide you storage for Data Content that you have purchased, then we may delete the Data Content without notice or place restrictions/limits on the use of storage areas. Data Content stored on a Device, transmitted over our networks, or stored by USC may be deleted, modified,

or damaged. You may not be able to make or receive voice calls while using data Services. Data Content provided by our vendors or third parties is subject to cancellation or termination at any time without notice to you, and you may not receive a refund for any unused portion of the Data Content.

Specific Terms & Restrictions On Using Data Services

In addition to the rules for using all of our other Services, unless we identify the Service or Device that you have selected as specifically intended for that purpose (for example, wireless routers, Data Link, etc.), you can't use our data Services: (1) with server devices or host computer applications or other systems that drive continuous, heavy traffic or data sessions; (2) as a substitute or backup for private lines or frame relay connections; or (3) for any other unintended use as we determine in our sole discretion. We reserve the right to limit, suspend, or constrain any heavy, continuous data usage that adversely impacts our networks' performance or hinders access to our networks. If your Services include Web or data access, you also can't use your Device as a modem for computers or other equipment, unless we identify the Service or Device you have selected as specifically intended for that purpose (for example, with "phone as modem" plans, USC Mobile Broadband card plans, wireless router plans, etc.).

Software License

If USC provides you software as part of the Service and there are not software license terms provided with the software (by USC or by a third party), then USC grants you a limited, revocable, non-exclusive, non-transferable license to use the software to access the Services for your own individual use. You will not sell, resell, transfer, copy, translate, publish, create derivative works of, make any commercial use of, modify, reverse engineer, decompile, or disassemble the software. USC may revoke this license at any time.

Fees, Activation & Miscellaneous Charges

Based on our Policies, we may charge activation, prepayment, reactivation, program, or other fees to establish, change, or maintain Services. Certain transactions may also be subject to a charge (for example, convenience payment, changing phone numbers, handset upgrades, etc.). You will be provided notice of these types of fees before we complete the requested transaction.

Account & Service Charges

You are responsible for all charges associated with your account and the Services on your account, no matter who adds or uses the Services. Charges include, but are not limited to, the monthly recurring charges, usage charges, charges for additional services, taxes, surcharges, and fees associated with your Services. These charges are described or referred to during the sales transaction, in our marketing materials, and in confirmation materials that we may send to you. Depending on your Services, charges for additional services may include operator and directory assistance, voicemail, call forwarding, data calls, texts, and Web access. If you (the account holder) allow end users to access or use your Devices, you authorize end users to access, download, and use Services. You may have the opportunity to purchase Services on a subscription basis where we assess subscription charges that allow you access to the Services and/or provide you a certain amount of use of the Services for a defined period of time. Depending on your Service, certain types of subscription charges may be assessed automatically upon activation and automatically assessed for subsequent subscription periods. Subscription Services offered on a recurring basis do not end until terminated by you or us. Subscription charges for recurring Services occur at the beginning of each bill cycle. Information regarding your bill cycle for subscription Services will be provided when you order the Services. For Services offered on a per-day basis, you will generally be charged for use before or at the time of use. In certain instances, we

may charge you at some point after you use the Services. Unless otherwise disclosed, Services offered on a perday basis end 24 hours after Service is initiated.

How We Calculate Your Charges For Billing Purposes

Regular Voice Calls: We round up partial minutes of use to the next full minute. Time starts when you press "Talk" or your Device connects to the network and stops when you press "End" or the network connection otherwise breaks. You're charged for all calls that connect, even to answering machines, voicemail, or voice transcription services. You won't be charged for unanswered calls or if you get a busy signal. For incoming calls answered, you're charged from the time shortly before the Device starts ringing until you press "End" or the network connection otherwise breaks. If charges vary depending on the time of day that you place or receive calls (for example, Nights and Weekend plans), you're charged for the entire call based on the rate that applies to the time period in which the call starts. Call time for a single call may be subject to a maximum duration and may be automatically terminated if the maximum duration is exceeded. Rates that vary based on the time of access will be determined based on the location of the network equipment providing service and not the location of your Device or your Device's area code (if applicable).

Push-to-Talk Charges: Charges for push-to-talk calls are billed to the person who starts the call and calculated by multiplying the duration of the call by the applicable rate and number of participants. You're charged at least 6 seconds of airtime for each call you start; subsequent communications in the same call are rounded up to and billed to the next second. Time begins when you press any button to start a push-totalk call and ends approximately 6 seconds after completion of a communication to which no participant responds. Subsequent pushto-talk communications are considered new calls. Charges apply for the entire period of time the push-to-talk call is connected to our network. Depending on your plan, nationwide, international, or group push-to-talk calls may use the local push-to-talk minutes in your plan and result in additional or different charges. Responses to call alert transmissions are treated as new push-to-talk transmissions even when responding within 6 seconds of receiving the alert. Push-to-talk billing methods are subject to change as we introduce new push-to-talk Services.

Data Usage: Unless we specifically tell you otherwise, data usage is measured in bytes, kilobytes, megabytes, and gigabytes—not in minutes/time. 1024 bytes equals 1 kilobyte ("KB"), 1024 KB equals 1 megabyte, and 1024 megabytes equals 1 gigabyte. Bytes are rounded up to KB, so you will be charged at least 1 KB for each data usage session ("data session"). Rounding occurs at the end of each data session, and sometimes during a data session. Depending on your data Services, usage may be charged against an allowance or on a fixed price per KB, and you may be subject to limitations on the amount of data usage. If you are charged on a fixed price per KB, any fractional cents will be rounded up to the next cent. You are charged for all data directed to your Device's Internet address, including data sessions you did not initiate and for incomplete transfers. As long as your Device is connected to our data networks, you may incur data charges. Examples of data for which you will be charged includes the size of a requested file or Data Content (game, ringer, etc.); Web page graphics (logos, pictures, banners, advertisement, etc.); additional data used in accessing, transporting, and routing the file on our network; data from partial or interrupted downloads; re-sent data; and data associated with unsuccessful attempts to reach websites or use applications. These data charges are in addition to any charges for the Data Content itself (game, ringer, etc.). Data used and charged to you will vary widely, even between identical actions or data sessions. Estimates of data usage-for example, the size of downloadable files-are not reliable predictors of actual usage. Your bill won't separately list the number of KB attributed to a specific action/data session.

Your Bill

Your bill provides you notice of your charges. It reflects monthly recurring charges (usually billed one bill cycle in advance), fees, taxes, Surcharges, product and equipment charges, subscription charges, and usage/transaction specific charges (usually billed in the bill cycle in which they're incurred). Some usage charges, such as those that depend on usage information from a third party, may be billed in subsequent bill cycles and result in higher than expected charges for that month. Bill cycles and dates may change from time to time. Your bill may also include other important notices (for example, changes to your Agreement, to your Service, legal notices, etc.). Your paper bill may not include itemized billing detail. More specific billing information is available online. Paper bills may be subject to an additional charge. Unless prohibited by law, other charges (for example, data Services or taxes and surcharges) will not include itemized detail but will be listed as total charges for a category. If you choose Internet billing, you will not receive paper bills.

Your Payments; Late Fees

Payment is due in full as stated on your bill. If we do not receive payment in full by the date specified on your bill, a late payment charge, which may be charged at the highest rate permissible by law, may be applied to the total unpaid balance. We may also charge you any costs we pay to a collection agency to collect unpaid balances from you. If we bill you for amounts on behalf of a third party, payments received are first applied to our charges. You may be charged additional fees for certain methods of payment. We may charge you, up to the highest amount permitted by law, for returned checks or other payments paid by you and denied for any reason by a financial institution. Acceptance of payments (even if marked "paid in full") does not waive our right to collect all amounts that you owe us. We may restrict your payment methods to cashier's check, money order, or other similar secure form of payment at any time for good reason.

Taxes & Government Fees

You agree to pay all federal, state, and local taxes, fees, and other assessments that we're required by law to collect and remit to the government on the Services that we provide to you. These charges may change from time to time without advance notice. If you're claiming any tax exemption, you must provide us with a valid exemption certificate. Tax exemptions generally won't be applied retroactively.

Surcharges

You agree to pay all USC surcharges ("Surcharges"), which may include, but are not limited to: Federal Universal Service; Regulatory and Administrative charges; gross receipts charges, and other charges. **Surcharges are not taxes, and we are not required by law to assess them. They are part of our** rates we choose, at our discretion, to collect from you, to recover certain costs and are kept by us. The number and type of Surcharges will be provided on your invoice and may vary depending upon the location of the billing address of the Device and can change over time. We determine the amount for these charges, and these amounts are subject to change, as are the components used to calculate these amounts. We will provide you notice of any changes to Surcharges in a manner consistent with this Agreement (see –Providing Notice To Each Other Under The Agreement" section). However, because some Surcharges are based on amounts set by the government or based on government formulas, it will not always be possible to provide advance notice of new Surcharges or changes in the amount of existing Surcharges. Information on Surcharges is provided during the sales transaction and is available on our website.

Disputing Charges - You Must Still Pay Undisputed Charges

Any dispute to a charge on your bill must be made within 60 days of the date of the bill that initially contained the charge. Disputes can only be made by calling or writing us as directed on your invoice or elsewhere. You accept all charges not properly disputed within the above time period—undisputed charges must still be paid as stated on your bill.

Protecting Our Network & Services

We can take any action to: (1) protect our networks, our rights and interests, or the rights of others; or (2) optimize or improve the overall use of our networks and Services. Some of these actions may interrupt or prevent legitimate communications and usage-for example, message filtering/blocking software to prevent spam or viruses; limiting throughput; limiting access to certain websites, applications, or other Data Content; prohibitions on unintended uses (for example, use as a dedicated line, or use as a monitoring service), etc. For additional information on what we do to protect our customers, networks, Services, and equipment, see our Acceptable Use Policy and Visitors Agreement at our website.

Your Privacy

Our Privacy Policy is available on our website. To review the policy, visit USC.com/legal/privacy.html. This policy may change from time to time, so review it with regularity and care.

Call Monitoring: To ensure the quality of our Services and for other lawful purposes, we may monitor or record calls you make to us or we make to you (for example, your conversations with our customer service or sales departments).

Authentication and Contact: You (the account holder) may password protect your account information by establishing a personal identification number ("PIN"). You may also set a backup security question and answer in the event you forget your PIN. You agree to protect your PIN, passwords, and other account access credentials like your backup security question from loss or disclosure. You further agree that USC may, in our sole discretion, treat any person who presents your credentials that we deem sufficient for account access as you or an authorized user on the account for disclosure of information or changes in Service. You agree that we may contact you for Service-related reasons through the contact information that you provide, through the Services or Devices to which you subscribe, or through other available means, including text message, email, fax, recorded message, mobile, residential or business phone, or mail.

CPNI: As we provide telecommunications products and Services to you (the account holder), we develop information about the quantity, technical configuration, type, location, and destination of telecommunications products and Services you use, as well as some other information found on your bill ("CPNI"). Under federal law, you have the right and we have a duty to protect the confidentiality of your CPNI. For example, we implement safeguards that are designed to protect your CPNI, including authentication procedures when you contact us. For some accounts with a dedicated USC representative, we may rely on contacting your pre-established point of contact as the standard authentication measure.

Third-Party Applications: If you use a thirdparty application, the application may access, collect, use, or disclose your personal information or require USC to disclose your information—including location information (when applicable)—to the application provider or some other third party. If you access, use, or authorize third-party applications through the Services, you agree and authorize USC to provide information related to your use of the Services or the application(s). You understand that your use of third-party applications is subject to the third party's terms and conditions and policies, including its

privacy policy. Be sure that you have reviewed and are comfortable with the third party's policies before using its application on your device.

Information on Devices: Your Device may contain sensitive or personal information (for example, pictures, videos, passwords, or stored credit card numbers). USC is not responsible for any information on your Device, including sensitive or personal information. If possible, you should remove or otherwise safeguard any sensitive or personal information when your Device is out of your possession or control, for example when you relinquish, exchange, return, or recycle your Device. By submitting your Device to us, you agree that our employees, contractors, or vendors may access all of the information on your Device. If you exchange, return, or recycle through us, we typically attempt to erase all data on your Device, but you must remove all data from your Device before you provide it to us.

Location-Enabled Services

Our networks generally know the location of your Device when it is outdoors and/or turned on. By using various technologies to locate your Device, we can provide enhanced emergency 911 services and optional location-enabled services provided by us or a third party. Network coverage or environmental factors (such as structures, buildings, weather, geography, landscape, and topography) can significantly impact the ability to access your Device's location information and use of location-enabled services.

You agree that any authorized user may access, use, or authorize USC or third-party location-enabled applications through the Services. You understand that your use of such location-enabled applications is subject to the application's terms and conditions and policies, including its privacy policy. If you activate location-enabled services for devices used by other authorized users, you agree to inform the authorized user(s) of the terms of use for locationenabled applications and that the Device may be located.

911 Or Other Emergency Calls

Public safety officials advise that when making 911 or other emergency calls, you should always be prepared to provide your location information. Unlike traditional wireline phones, depending on a number of factors (for example, whether your Device is GPS-enabled, where you are, whether local emergency service providers have upgraded their equipment, etc.), 911 operators may not know your phone number, your location, or the location of your Device. In certain circumstances, an emergency call may be routed to a state patrol dispatcher or alternative location set by local emergency service providers. Enhanced 911 service ("E911")—where enabled by local emergency authorities—uses GPS technology to provide location information. Even when available, however, E911 does not always provide accurate location information. If your Devices have a safety feature that prevents use of the keypad after dialing 911—you should follow voice prompts when interacting with emergency service providers employing interactive voice response systems to screen calls.

If Your Device Is Lost or Stolen

Call us immediately if your Device is lost or stolen because you may be responsible for usage charges before you notify us of the alleged loss or theft. A lost or stolen Device does not reduce or remove your Term Commitment. You will remain liable for any monthly recurring charges associated with the Service on your Device after you notify us of the alleged loss or theft. You agree to cooperate if we choose to investigate the matter (provide facts, sworn statements, etc.). We may not waive any applicable Early Termination Fees if you choose to terminate Services as a result of loss or theft of your Device.

Disclaimer of Warranties

UNLESS EXPRESSLY PROVIDED IN WRITING OTHERWISE, WE MAKE NO REPRESENTATIONS OR WARRANTIES, EXPRESS OR IMPLIED, INCLUDING (TO THE EXTENT ALLOWED BY LAW) ANY IMPLIED WARRANTY OF MERCHANTABILITY, NONINFRINGEMENT, OR FITNESS FOR A PARTICULAR PURPOSE CONCERNING YOUR SERVICES (INCLUDING YOUR DEVICE AND ANY SOFTWARE OR APPLICATIONS ON YOUR DEVICE). WE DON'T PROMISE UNINTERRUPTED OR ERROR-FREE SERVICES AND DON'T AUTHORIZE ANYONE TO MAKE WARRANTIES ON OUR BEHALF. USC PROVIDES ALL SOFTWARE AND APPLICATIONS ON AN "AS IS" BASIS WITH ALL FAULTS, ERRORS, AND DEFECTS.

You Agree That We Are Not Responsible For Certain Problems

You agree that neither we nor our parent, subsidiary, or affiliate companies, nor our vendors, suppliers, or licensors are responsible for any damages, delay, interruption or other failure to perform resulting from: (a) anything done or not done by someone else; (b) providing or failing to provide Services, including, but not limited to, deficiencies or problems with a Device or network coverage (for example, dropped, blocked, interrupted Services, etc.); (c) traffic or other accidents, or any health-related claims relating to our Services; (d) Data Content or information accessed while using our Services; (e) an interruption or failure in accessing or attempting to access emergency services from a Device, including through 911, Enhanced 911 or otherwise; (f) interrupted, failed, or inaccurate location information services; (g) information or communication that is blocked by a spam filter; (h) damage to your Device or any computer or equipment connected to your Device, or damage to or loss of any information stored on your Device, computer, equipment, or USC storage space from your use of the Services or from viruses, worms, or downloads of malicious content, materials, data, text, images, video, or audio; or (i) things beyond our control, including acts of God (for example, weather-related phenomena, fire, earthquake, hurricane, etc.), riot, strike, war, terrorism, or government orders or acts. You should implement appropriate safeguards to secure your Device, computer, or equipment and to back up your information stored on each.

You Agree That Our Liability Is Limited - No Consequential Damages

TO THE EXTENT ALLOWED BY LAW, OUR LIABILITY FOR MONETARY DAMAGES FOR ANY CLAIMS THAT YOU MAY HAVE AGAINST US IS LIMITED TO NO MORE THAN THE PROPORTIONATE AMOUNT OF THE SERVICE CHARGES ATTRIBUTABLE TO THE AFFECTED PERIOD. UNDER NO CIRCUMSTANCES ARE WE LIABLE FOR ANY INCIDENTAL, CONSEQUENTIAL, PUNITIVE, MULTIPLE, OR SPECIAL DAMAGES OF ANY NATURE WHATSOEVER ARISING OUT OF OR RELATED TO PROVIDING OR FAILING TO PROVIDE SERVICES IN CONNECTION WITH A DEVICE, INCLUDING, BUT NOT LIMITED TO, LOST PROFITS, LOSS OF BUSINESS, OR COST OF REPLACEMENT PRODUCTS AND SERVICES.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION AND ARBITRATION PLEASE READ THIS CAREFULLY; IT AFFECTS YOUR RIGHTS

In those rare instances where your concern is not resolved to your satisfaction through calls to our customer care, you and USC each agree to try to resolve those disputes in good faith after you provide written notice of the dispute as set forth below. If the dispute is not resolved, you and USC agree that the dispute will be resolved through individual binding arbitration or small claims court, instead of courts of general jurisdiction.

Mandatory Arbitration and Waiver of Class Action

Instead of suing in court, you and USC agree to arbitrate all Disputes (as defined below) on an individual, non-representative, basis. You agree that, by entering into this Agreement, you and USC are waiving the right to a trial by jury or to participate in a class action or representative action. This agreement to arbitrate is intended to be broadly interpreted.

In arbitration, there is no judge or jury. Instead Disputes are decided by a neutral third-party arbitrator in a more informal process than in court. In arbitration, there is limited discovery and the arbitrator's decision is subject to limited review by courts. However, just as a court would, the arbitrator must honor the terms of the Agreement and can award damages and relief, including any attorneys' fees authorized by law. "Disputes" shall include, but are not limited to, any claims or controversies against each other related in any way to or arising out of in any way our Services or the Agreement, including, but not limited to, coverage, Devices, billing services and practices, policies, contract practices (including enforceability), service claims, privacy, or advertising, even if the claim arises after Services have terminated. Disputes also include, but are not limited to, claims that: (a) you or an authorized or unauthorized user of the Services or Devices bring against our employees, agents, affiliates, or other representatives; (b) you bring against a third party, such as a retailer or equipment manufacturer, that are based on, relate to, or arise out of in any way our Services or the Agreement; or (c) that USC brings against you. Disputes also include, but are not limited to, (i) claims in any way related to or arising out of any aspect of the relationship between you and USC, whether based in contract, tort, statute, fraud, misrepresentation, advertising claims or any other legal theory; (ii) claims that arose before this Agreement or out of a prior Agreement with USC; (iii) claims that are subject to on-going litigation where you are not a party or class member; and/or (iv) claims that arise after the termination of this Agreement.

Dispute Notice and Dispute Resolution Period

Before initiating an arbitration or a small claims matter, you and USC each agree to first provide to the other a written notice ("Notice of Dispute"), which shall contain: (a) a written description of the problem and relevant documents and supporting information; and (b) a statement of the specific relief sought. A Notice of Dispute to USC should be sent to: General Counsel; Arbitration Office; 12502 Sunrise Valley Drive, Mailstop VARESA0202-2C682; Reston, Virginia 20191. USC will provide a Notice of Dispute to you in accordance with the "Providing Notice To Each Other Under The Agreement" section of this Agreement. USC will assign a representative to work with you and try to resolve your Dispute to your satisfaction. You and USC agree to make attempts to resolve the Dispute prior to commencing an arbitration or small claims action. If an agreement cannot be reached within forty-five (45) days of receipt of the Notice of Dispute, you or USC may commence an arbitration proceeding or small claims action.

Arbitration Terms, Process, Rules and Procedures

(1) Unless you and USC agree otherwise, the arbitration will be conducted by a single, neutral arbitrator and will take place in the county of the last billing address of the Service. The arbitration will be governed by either: (a) rules that we mutually agree upon; or (b) the JAMS Comprehensive Arbitration Rules & Procedures (the "JAMS Rules"), as modified by this agreement to arbitrate, including the rules about the filing, administration, discovery and arbitrator fees. The JAMS rules are available on its website at jamsadr.com. Notwithstanding any JAMS Rule to the contrary or any other provision in arbitration rules chosen, by agreement, to govern the arbitration, we each agree that all issues regarding the Dispute are delegated to the arbitrator to decide, except that only a court (and not the arbitrator) shall decide any disagreements regarding the scope and enforceability of this agreement to arbitrate.

(2) The Federal Arbitration Act ("FAA") applies to this Agreement and arbitration provision. We each agree that the FAA's provisions—not state law—govern all questions of whether a Dispute is subject to arbitration. To the extent that this agreement to arbitrate conflicts with the JAMS Policy on Consumer Arbitrations Pursuant to Pre-Dispute Clauses Minimum Standards for Procedural Fairness (the "Minimum Standards"), the Minimum Standards in that regard will apply. However, nothing in this paragraph will require or allow you or USC to arbitrate on a class-wide, representative or consolidated basis.

(3) The arbitrator may award declaratory or injunctive relief only in favor of the individual party seeking relief and only to the extent necessary to provide relief warranted by that party's individual claim. YOU AND USC AGREE THAT EACH MAY BRING CLAIMS AGAINST THE OTHER ONLY IN AN INDIVIDUAL CAPACITY, AND NOT AS A CLASS MEMBER IN ANY PUTATIVE CLASS OR REPRESENTATIVE PROCEEDING. Further, unless both you and USC expressly agree otherwise, the arbitrator may not consolidate more than one person's claims, and may not otherwise preside over any form of a representative or class proceeding. If any portion of this provision is found to be unenforceable, then the entirety of this arbitration provision shall be null and void.

(4) We each are responsible for our respective costs, including our respective counsel, experts, and witnesses. USC will pay for any filing or case management fees associated with the arbitration and the professional fees for the arbitrator's services.

(5) An arbitrator's award will be a written statement of the disposition of each claim and will also provide a concise written statement of the essential findings and conclusions which form the basis of the award. The arbitrator's decision and award is final and binding, with some limited court review under the FAA, and judgment on the award may be entered in any court with jurisdiction.

(6) As an alternative to arbitration, we may resolve Disputes in small claims court in the county of your most recent billing address. In addition, this arbitration agreement does not prevent you from bringing your Dispute to the attention of any federal, state, or local government agency. Such agencies can, if the law allows, seek relief against USC on your behalf.

No Trial By Jury and No Class Action

IF FOR ANY REASON A CLAIM ARISING OUT OF OR RELATING TO THIS AGREEMENT IN ANY WAY PROCEEDS IN COURT RATHER THAN IN ARBITRATION, REGARDLESS OF WHETHER THE CLAIM IS AN ACTION, COUTERCLAIM OR ANY OTHER COURT PROCEEDING, WE EACH AGREE THAT TO THE EXTENT ALLOWED BY LAW, THERE WILL NOT BE A JURY TRIAL OR CLASS ACTION AND WE EACH UNCONDITIONALLY (1) WAIVE ANY RIGHT TO TRIAL BY JURY AND (2) WAIVE ANY RIGHT TO PURSUE DISPUTES ON A CLASSWIDE BASIS, INCLUDING JOINING A CLAIM WITH THE CLAIM OF ANY OTHER PERSON OR ENTITY OR ASSERT A CLAIM IN A REPRESENTATIVE CAPACTITY ON BEHALF OF ANYONE ELSE IN ANY OTHER PROCEEDING.

Indemnification

You agree to indemnify, defend, and hold USC and our subsidiaries, affiliates, parent companies, vendors, suppliers, and licensors harmless from any claims arising out of or relating to your actions, including, but not limited to, your use of the Service and any information you submit, post, transmit, or make available via the Service; failing to provide appropriate notices regarding location-enabled services (see "Location-Enabled Services" section); failure to safeguard your passwords, backup question to your shared secret question, or other account information; or violating this Agreement or any policy referenced in this Agreement, any applicable law or regulation, or the rights of any third party.

Providing Notice To Each Other Under The Agreement

Except as the Agreement specifically provides otherwise, you must provide us notice by calling or writing us as instructed on your invoice. We will provide you notice through one or more of the following: in your bill, correspondence to your last known billing address, to any fax number or email address you've provided us, by calling you on your Device or any other phone number you've provided us, by voice message on your Device or any other phone number you've provided us, or by text message on your Device.

Contacting You Regarding Billing and Collections

You expressly authorize, and specifically consent to allowing USC and any of USC's agents to contact you in connection with any and all matters relating to unpaid past due charges you owe USC. You agree that, for attempts to collect unpaid past due charges, USC and any of its agents may contact you at any mailing address, telephone number, cellular phone number, email address, or any other electronic address that you have provided, or may in the future provide, to USC. You agree and acknowledge that any email address or any other electronic address that you provide to USC is your private address and is not accessible to unauthorized third parties. For attempts to collect unpaid charges, you agree that in addition to individual persons attempting to communicate directly with you, any type of contact described above may be made using, among other methods, pre-recorded or artificial voice messages delivered by an automatic telephone dialing system, pre-set email messages delivered by an automatic emailing system, or any other pre-set electronic messages delivered by any other automatic electronic messaging system.

Other Important Terms

Subject to federal law or unless the Agreement specifically provides otherwise, this Agreement is governed solely by the laws of the state encompassing the billing address of the Device, without regard to the conflicts of law rules of that state. If either of us waives or doesn't enforce a requirement under this Agreement in an instance, we don't waive our right to later enforce that requirement. Except as the Agreement specifically provides otherwise, if any part of the Agreement is held invalid or unenforceable, the rest of this Agreement remains in full force and effect. This Agreement isn't for the benefit of any third party except our corporate parents, affiliates, subsidiaries, agents, and predecessors and successors in interest. You can't assign the Agreement or any of your rights or duties under it, unless we agree to the assignment. We can assign the Agreement without notice. You cannot in any manner resell the Services to another party. The Agreement and the documents it incorporates make up the entire agreement between us and replaces all prior written or spoken agreements—you can't rely on any contradictory documents or statements by sales or service representatives. The rights, obligations, and commitments in the Agreement that—by their nature—would logically continue beyond the termination of Services (for example, those relating to billing, payment, 911, dispute resolution, no class action, no jury trial) survive termination of Services.
